Hunting Ridge Seeks Annexation to Greenbelt

At an amiable work session July 24, the mayor and the Greenbelt city council met with six representatives from the Hunting Ridge Condominium Association, Inc. (HRCIA). The group discussed provisions necessary for Hunting Ridge and nearby areas to be annexed into the city of Greenbelt. It was the third meeting of council and HRCIA representatives to discuss the annexation.

The main reason cited for Hunting Ridge's request is "to enhance the prospects for high-quality, low-density development in the area around Hunting Ridge," according to the draft agreement the association presented to council. The annexation would mean added revenue to the city through taxes imposed on its new citizens and, in exchange, the city would provide added services to the new citizens.

The area to be annexed includes all property south of Greenbelt, east of the Beltway, north of Good Luck Road and west of and including the FEPCO right-of-way extending south from the eastern border of the city to Good Luck Road. These boundaries were selected because they are identifiable, they include nearly all undeveloped land south of the eastern section of the city and planned roads "would not straddle city limit lines raising questions as to jurisdiction for policing and regulating construction," the memo presented to council by City Manager Jim Giese stated.

Goddard Space Village is not being considered in the agreement because the greater value of the property would require a larger number of petition signatures than an agreement excluding it. Mayor Gil Weidenfeld also noted that Goddard residents have not petitioned for such action.

The Lanham Boys Club property in the northeast corner of Good Luck Road and the Beltway will not be annexed either, the group decided. Weidenfeld commented, "I think the Lanham Boys' Club could resent (our seeking annexation)."

Giese added that annexation of the Lanham Boys' Club "could result in some unnecessary political turmoil . . . and that annexation of the property would yield no benefit to the city" because it is tax exempt.

A ten-foot strip of land adjacent to Goddard Space Village will not be annexed since it appears to be of no value to the city and would create an enclave of Goddard Space Village apartments. The city is prohibited from creating enclaves.

The annexation area will encompass 37-acre Schrom Hills Park, currently owned by the Park and Planning Commission. A preliminary design by the Commission for this land includes

a lake for storm water management, an open play area, two tennis courts, a playground, parking and bathroom facilities and nature trail. However, Giese noted, implementation of these plans appears to be "a long way off."

Annexing the park land follows a city policy, according to Weidenfeld. He said, "It has been the city's foresight to know that every area that is separated from other parts of the city needs to have some recreational facility."

Taxation Problem

A potential problem with annexing the park is the possibility of double taxation for Greenbelt's new residents—they may be required to continue paying park tax to the MNCPPC while paying the city to maintain parks as well. "The court has said you can pay a tax to the county and you can pay a tax to the city," Giese commented.

The amount of the city park tax is approximately \$58 per year per resident.

However, this issue of concern for both the city and Hunting Ridge will be investigated further and council will try to resolve the double taxation administratively or seek state legislation, according to Weidenfeld. "The city will do everything within its powers to eliminate (this) inequity" of some citizens of Greenbelt being taxed double, he said.

City taxes, on the other hand, would be imposed on "the first day of Fiscal Year 1986 (July 1, 1985) or six months after the date on which annexation becomes effective, whichever comes last" according to the association's draft agreement.

Another area of concern still unresolved is the right-of-way of Hanover Parkway, currently an unofficial access road to Hunting Ridge. HRCIA is requesting that the city be responsible for routine maintenance of Hanover Parkway. The road, however, is privately owned and the city has no authority to maintain it. The matter will be resolved when the county acquires the right-of-way for extending Hanover Parkway. Hunting Ridge also expects

Hanover Parkway to be widened to four lanes adjacent to Hunting Ridge at the expense of the city or others. They are requesting that the city seek their approval before such action occurs.

The county executive reportedly has stated an intention to widen the road to four lanes although, See HUNTING RIDGE, p. 5, c. 1

NEW RECREATIONAL CENTER OPENED AT WINDSOR GREEN

"The view out there is marvelous!" Guests joining Windsor Green residents at the opening ceremonies for the new community center looked out over the distant city of Washington from the high hill where the recreational complex is located. On a clear day one can see the U.S. Capitol, the National Shrine at Catholic University and even the Washington Cathedral.

The second-most absorbing topic of conversation at the champagne reception, which was held on April 29, was the promise of a traffic light at Mandan and Greenbelt Rds. State Senator Leo Green, who had engineered the "coup," received loud applause for his role in bringing about this decision by the Maryland Secretary of Transportation. The department had been for years rejecting requests to install a light at this intersection which nearby residents felt had become increasingly dangerous.

Delegates Gerard Devlin, Joan

Pitkin and Charles Ryan, as well as county council member Richard Castaldi, shared the spotlight with Green. All were recognized for their part in helping to create the climate for the favorable decision.

"Our success," reported Senator Green, "came through the efforts of the community. This is the way the system should work—when we as elected officials can respond successfully to your need." He praised those present for "keeping the pressure on us."

Besides a community house, the Windsor Green recreational facilities include a swimming pool and tennis courts. They were constructed by the developer of the subdivisions, U.S. Homes, and will be owned and operated by the homeowners association.

Barry Polanski, serving as emcee for the official ceremonies at the gala opening, introduced many of those present who had played an active role in preparing for the occasion. Among these were Ed Putens, who had represented the homeowners on the Windsor Green board of directors since its inception; Linda Miller, newsletter chairperson; Barbara Hoelk, who runs the center and supervises the instructional program; Becky Putens, who organized the reception; and Dennis and Debbie Skelly, who through their Ricker Realty helped sponsor the affair. Other special guests included past State Senator Mary Conroy, Greenbelt's mayor Gil Weidenfeld and councilmember Toni Bram; and Frank Hutson, Windsor Green resident, who was expecting soon to be sworn in as Greenbelt's police chief.

The reception was catered by resident Marie White. Doty Varda made the cake.





Weidenfeld said, there is always a possibility this will not occur. "We are making an effort to avoid asking the city to spend money (on) Hunting Ridge," said Renahan. "We are not asking for the road to be widened," he added, noting that HRCIA expects the developers to foot the bill. (Western Development paid for Hanover Parkway to replace an easement through the Greenway Shopping Center, which had served as a temporary access road to Goddard.)

However, HRCIA President Philip Barnacz added that the association is looking for "the cost to not be put on Hunting Ridge."

Weidenfeld responded, "I can't reasonably see how the city would put that burden" on Hunting Ridge.

Finally, Giese noted that the city will have to prepare a statement specifying how the city

would provide services to the annexed area and that many of the matters discussed during the evening could be included in the statement.

"I would say the council has succeeded nobly in meeting our biggest concerns relating to developing of the policies," Renahan of HRCIA noted.

"All the things discussed here tonight were taken in good faith and a good understanding," Weidenfeld said. "I don't think there is any disagreement."

Schedule

A tentative schedule of dates relating to the annexation proceedings was set at the meeting. HRCIA is to formally submit a petition to annex at the August 13 regular Council meeting. The Council will then schedule a Special Meeting on August 20 to introduce a resolution for annexation and to set a public hearing date, which is expected to be October 2. Should the Council de-

cide to proceed with the annexation after the public hearing, it could do so at its October 15 meeting. The annexation would then become effective on December 1, 1984 unless the resolution was petitioned to referendum by either 20% of the registered voters in the city or in the area to be annexed. In that event, the resolution would not become effective unless a majority of the voters at a special referendum election approved the annexation.
