# GHI Board Ponders Renegotiation Of Mortgage Terms at Fixed Rates

At two December meetings of the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., the board focused on the process of modifying the mortgage note held on GHI property by the National Cooperative Bank (formerly the National Consumer Cooperative Bank). As explained by GHI General Manager Ron Colton, the mortgage is a five-year adrate mortgage justable (ARM). The interest rate is adjusted every five years and can increase a maximum of 21/2% at each adjustment interval. However, when the mortgage was put in place, the method of determining the interest rate at future adjustment intervals was left open to nego-

Since the first adjustment will take place in 1986 and the NCB appears to be pressing for an early settlement of this issue, the board grappled with the factors affecting interest rate negotiations at its meetings on both December 6 and 20.

Colton explained that three factors must be decided in the negotiations: the index—that is, the objective measure (often a U.S. government obligation or index) to which the mortgage rate will be tied; the margin, the rate above the index at which the rate will be pegged; the period, the interval over which the index will be averaged to arrive at the basic index rate.

A letter on this subject from CMB Funding Corporation, a subsidiary of the NCB, recently proposed that the index be the five-year Treasury security index with the margin set at 1½% above that index. Although the period of the index was not specified, Colton indicated that he would expect a lender to try to make the period as short as pos-

sible in order to make the interest rate conform as closely as possible to current conditions when the adjustment occurs. From GHI's viewpoint, a short averaging period could be advantageous (if the index happened to be at a low point) or disadvantageous (if it coincided with a period of high interest rates). If the interest rate increased by the full 2½%, Comptroller Don McGinn estimated that each member's charges would increase by an average of \$17 per month.

At the December 6 meeting there was some sentiment among board members for exploring the possibility of converting the present ARM to a fixed rate mortgage at the current interest rate. At the December 20 meeting, Colton reported that the bank would not consider this conversion unless the term of the loan was shortened to 10 years — an action which would add, on average, about \$18 per month to each member's charges.

Board members were divided on

Board members were divided on whether to pursue this possibility: Director Janet Cantwell felt this option would probably not be popular with most members; Director Frank Gervasi felt that the savings represented by shortening the term by five years made the possibility worth looking at. All board members agreed that any such conversion would require membership approval. A motion by Gervasi to instruct Colton to continue discussion of the fixed rate terms passed 5-1,

with Director Wayne Williams opposed. (Directors Don Volk and Ray McCawley were absent.)

The board felt some urgency a bout the negotiations after President Margaret Hogensen reported that she believes the NCB intends to sell the GHI mortgage to another lender, possibly early in 1985. The board seemed to feel that they would rather negotiate the terms of setting interest rates with NCB than with some unknown lender. Williams urged that Colton present his recommendations on the rate negotiations at the first meeting in January and Colton agreed to do this.

Membership Concerns

Items of general concern introduced by members at the December meetings included an issue brought up by Finance Committee member June Didas. She wondered how well the new Share Loan Service Corporation is serving the needs of the membership, particularly in the area of refinancing to pay off soon-to-be-due balloon mortgages. She cited an instance of a member who wished to take out a "second mortgage" on a GHI unit in order to pay off a balloon. According to Didas, SLSC refused to make a second trust loan; instead, the member was told the unit would have to be, in effect, refinanced with all the attendant settlement costs such refinancing

Didas reminded the board that a point stressed to membership See GHI, page 4, col. 1

# School Board Hearing On Budget January 9

A public hearing on the Prince Georges County Board of Education's Fiscal Year 1986 budget will be held in the Eleanor Roosevelt High School auditorium on Wednesday, January 9 at 7:30 p.m. Individuals and groups wishing to make statements should register in advance by calling 952-4324.

The proposed \$362.5 million budget would continue the reduction in class size, initiate a new disciplinary program for high school students, improve textbooks and instructional supplies, and upgrade computer facilities and clerical staffing for elementary schools.

The proposed budget includes multi-year enhancements that either improve upon prior plans or introduce new initiatives. These include staffing of elementary and secondary school guidance counselors, library media aides, elementary school secretaries, helping teachers, and auxiliary custodians.

Approximately 70 percent of the proposed \$28.9 million increase for FY-86 would be required to maintain existing services for the new school year, after adjustments for enrollment decline and inflationary expenses. This also includes fulfilling the second year of negotiated contract settlements for employee salaries and benefits.

The remaining 30 percent of the increased funding would be used for the overall enhancement of the system's instructional and support programs.

Chief among these improvements is the effort to reduce class size systemwide by the mathematical average of one student per class. This effort would employ 126 teachers, offsetting the number of teaching positions lost to enrollment decline. The new effort would cost approximately \$2.3 million.

The Superintendent has also proposed the initiation of an inschool suspension program for unruly students and a countywide alternative education center for students facing expulsion. The proposal, which is now undergoing extensive review, would cost approximately \$546,000 for the new school year.

Classroom supplies and materials, textbooks and library books would also be upgraded under the new budget recommendations.

# New Police Station Tops List Of Projected Capital Items

Construction of a new police station and an indoor swimming pool and purchase of parkland are the large items around which council is building a \$6,000,000 capital improvements bond issue. Council met in a work session on December 10 to review comments made at the public hearing on October 29 as well as the city staff's updated list of those capital items which merit consideration. Staff also provided rough cost estimates.

A new police building heads the list of needs (\$1.5 million). Other items in the "bricks and mortar" category are rehabilitation of North End Center (\$600,-000), an addition to the public works facilities (\$380,000) and a possible addition to the Youth Center or renovation for a women's locker room (\$100,000). City Manager James Giese expects these items could be kept generally to \$2 million. A new indoor pool (\$1 to \$2 million) and improvements to the outdoor pool (\$160.000), Giese thought, could probably be done for a total of \$2 million. The third category -purchase of park lands and development of parks might add up to another \$2 million.

New IRS regulations require municipalities selling tax-exempt bonds to use the proceeds of the bonds within a year of their sale. The city does not have to sell the bonds all at one time, however. Once agreed to by voters in a referendum, the city could sell the bonds over a period of several years, as projects are ready to go. Giese also noted that short term bond anticipation notes could be used to finance preliminary work such as engineering studies. New development over the next 10 years will help spread the cost of the bond issue.

Council would like to hold the referendum this spring, perhaps as early as mid-March. More decision-making by council must occur first, pin-pointing what projects would be included.

# Road Improvements Planned For Greenbelt Rd. Corridor

(The following is a continuation of the December 27, 1984, article on the plans for Smith-Ewing and Tidler tracts currently under study by APB)

Projected development of the Tidler and Smith-Ewing tracts east of the Greenway Shopping Center is of concern to city officials because of the impact of any increase in population on the nearby network of roads. For this reason traffic projections have been undertaken.

### Road Improvements

Major road improvements are slated along Greenbelt Road from Kenilworth Avenue to Mandan Road. In its traffic study on the Tidler and Smith-Ewing tracts, Greenhorne & O'Mara, Inc. wrote, "To accommodate the projected traffic volume along Greenbelt Road as a result of all proposed developments, the following improvements have been assumed (to be in place) for the purpose of this study." Listed were:

- 1. Widening of Greenbelt Road between Southway and Mandan Road; scheduled for FY 87 in the County Capital Improvement Program (CIP).
- 2. Extension of Hanover Parkway to Good Luck Road and Princess Garden Parkway; scheduled in the County CIP for FY 84 (delayed because all land for this project has not yet been acquired).
- 3. Relocation and reconstruction of the northbound Baltimore/ Washington Parkway entrance/ exit at Greenbelt Road and other improvements (delayed because funding for this project was not passed by the United States Senate; legislation will be again introduced by Congressman Steny Hoyer in the next session of Congress).
- Closing of the Southern ramp to southbound Baltimore/Washington Parkway with a new ramp constructed at the Golden Triangle. (City council takes a dim

view of closing the Southway ramp.).

 Provision of a double left turn lane at southbound Southway onto eastbound Greenbelt Road, a special project planned by the State Highway Administration.

Construction of the Kenilworth Avenue/Greenbelt Road grade separation is already underway.

The Greenhorne & O'Mara study team concluded that, "While the projected Greenbrook (Tidler) and Smith-Ewing traffic "does effect (sic) the surrounding roadway network it does not significantly increase levels of service." They found that following total development of the projects and proposed highway improvements, the level of service in the evening peak hours would change from "C" to "D" at Hanover Parkway and from "B" to "C" at Southway.

There are six divisions of levels of service—"A" through "F"—where Level "A" indicates the best possible traffic operation and Level "F" the worst. In Prince Georges County, Level "D" is the adopted standard as the "acceptable level of service on the county's highways." Level "D" is described as "conditions approaching unstable flow, delays are moderate to heavy, significant signal time deficiencies are experienced for short durations during the peak traffic period."

### What Have We Here?

To the Editor:

First let me make one thing clear-I most heartily approve and congratulate the Public Works Department on doing something about the decades-old eyesore at the entrance to old Greenbelt Lake, now renamed Buddy Attick Park. During the early part of December I became increasingly elated to see the progress each day as I drove to and from work, the ugly mudhole filled in, the sinuous curbing installed, the roadside pay phone removed and the plantings begun.

But then as the days of December wound down, my sense of elation turned to one of growing apprehension. On successive days massive boulders began appearing out of nowhere, first on one side of Crescent road and then on the other, 39 by latest count, as if some giant asteroid had struck in the center of the road and exploded. Then large mulched circles surrounded by green sod began to appear-and multiply until they numbered 25 in all, each planted with shrubs arranged in a circle around a central tree. Where circles wouldn't fit, there appeared triangles and rectangles. And then set in the middle of all this, a low Japanese-style palisade enclosing an earthen mound upon which sits a monumental rough-hewn stone.

What have we finally ended up with here? Apparently a hybrid of a Japanese tea garden and a highly formal Victorian English garden, neither of which alone or, worse, together, is the least bit appropriate as an entrance to the wonderfully natural park that

we all enjoy.

How did all this come about? A call to the City Office disclosed that Parks Superintendent Dennis Doornekamp of the Public Works Department created the design, and with the general approval of City Manager James Giese it was constructed. Apparently no thought was given to seek the advice or approval of any citizen group-the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, for example-since such was not the custom in the past. Besides, Doornekamp had designed the Bicentennial Garden across Greenbelt Rd. from the Holy Cross Lutheran Church, and it had met with the approval of the community, as far as is known.

Fair enough, but there's a world of difference between these two projects in the design problem they present. The Bicentennial Garden is a small formal arrangement set most appropriately in a formal oval of grass enclosed by concrete curbing. A formal design makes eminent sense there. It does not as the entrance to a natural park-all

What to do about it? Is it too late to change? I think not. This ambitious and highly-visible project is far too important to let it become a permanent statement of our collective aesthetics. Let's even at this late date embark on the process of citizen involvement that should have been followed from the start. Council, take the initiative, get the Park and Recreation Advisory Board involved, hold a redesign competition, present the results to the citizens in a public hearing, and only then make a selection. If the Pennsylvania Avenue Development Committee can do it for D.C., so can we for Greenbelt. Surely in this way we can arrive at a landscape solution that is both fitting and beautiful. Our lovely natural park deserves no less, and neither do





After a brief discussion of semantics, during which Comptroller McGinn explained that, strictly speaking, there are no second (or first) trusts on GHI homesthe proper term is a first or second assignment of equity - he proposed that Didas submit her questions in a letter. He said he would get answers to her questions and reply to them.

When board members questioned Colton about the status of SLSC loans and policies, he replied that efforts are underway to make SLSC instruments correspond more closely to members' needs. He cited efforts to develop additional types of loans, such as threeor five - year ARMs. SLSC currently offers only a one-year ARM, Also SLSC has recently lowered its interest rates. He reported that SLSC, through November, had 17 mplications for loans and that nine had been closed.

Other items brought before the board by members included an objection to the posting of a "Restricted Parking" sign in the 6 Court of Ridge Rd. It was explained that the court had had restricted parking (by poll of the residents) since 1969 but that the sign had been removed during rehab and only recently replaced. Signs which were lost or removed are being replaced in all courts, according to Maintenance Superintendent Joe Whalen. The board directed that a new poll of 6 Court of Ridge be taken in view of the complaint and the age of the last poll.

On the subject of the appearance of the GHI garages, member Janet James pointed out that when the garages were originally painted green and white, they matched the dwelling units. Now, in her words, "They don't match anything." She recommended that, when they are repainted, one of the rehab colors from the court be picked for the garages.

At the December meeting, member Steve Curtis presented a petition which would provide for the gradual reduction of the size of the board of directors from nine to five members. Since the matter would require a bylaws change, the petition was re-ferred to the Ad Hoc Bylaw Com-

# Pet Owners are Warned **Animals Need License**

All cats must have a city license and all dogs a County license as stated in the Greenbelt City animal regulations. To obtain either license a veterinarian's receipt or other proof of current rabies vaccination must be brought to the City Office Building.

If an animal is found or reported to be running at large (not in its respective yard or on a leash not more than eight feet in length) it will be picked up by the Animal Control Warden. The owner will be charged a fine to retrieve the pet.

Impounded animals will be held for no longer than three days. If the animal is licensed, a reasonable effort will be made to contact the owner within that day impoundment. After three days the animal will be sent to the County Animal Control Shelter in Forestville, where it




