City to Gain Single Family Houses With Smith-Ewing/Tidler Rezoning

On June 24 the Prince Georges County Council, sitting as the District Council, approved six petitions for rezoning 105.19 acres of the Smith-Ewing and Tidler properties. The largest parcel, 39.4 a., will be developed in the R-55 zone-single family, detached homes-a category in short supply in Greenbelt.

The mix of zoning categories that has now emerged is the result of two years of negotia-tions between the developers and the neighboring residents. The Greenbelt City Council's support eased the path through the arduous rezoning process. Even the recommendations of denial for the four commercial zones by both the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commis-sion (MNCPPC) technical staff and the Hearing Examiner, Barry Cramp, were virtually ignored by both the Planning Board and the District Council secure in the knowledge that the community was satisfied.

So anxious were community leaders to gain more detached housing that they were willing to accept commercial development on the east side of Hanover Parkway. The 1970 Master Plan called for no commercial zones east of Hanover Parkway.

While the R-55 zone was the sweetener, the threat that the existing 21.8 a. of the Smith-Ewing property (see map), zoned R-10 or high-rise residential, could be developed now, was the enforcer. The residents of Greenbriar, Windsor Green/Glen Ora and Hunting Ridge so strongly opposed highrise apartments towering above their homes that they were willing to take in trade the low- and mid-rise commercial buildings sought by the develop-

Opposition

MNCPPC technical staff views, in opposition to the commercial zone applications, were presented to the District Council by planner Paul Fields. Hanover Parkway, with its six lanes and grassy median, has traditionally been seen as the logical barrier between the commercial development of Greenway Shopping Cen-ter/Maryland Trade Center Park to the west and the residential areas to the east, he explained. "Hanover Parkway is a separation," said Fields. "Commercial development (on the east side of the street) would intrude." The zoning hearing examiner, Fields continued, had also recommended denial of the commercial zone applications. The examiner, too, called Hanover Parkway a "dividing line." A street is a logical barrier, Fields explained. "The wider the street, the more barrier it is . . . protection to the

The technical staff had recommended R-T, residential townhouse, for the four properties proposed for commercial zones. Park and Planning's transportation study, recently completed. called for down-zoning these four parcels to a density not greater than R-T. (The Master Plan for the Greenbelt-College Park area is currently under study).
Fields acknowledged that the

Planning Board had disagreed with the staff's recommendations. saying the proposed rezonings "satisfied the spirit of the Master Plan." The commercial zones would be oriented west toward Hanover Parkway, not east toward the residential areas, the Planning Board had said.

Applicants

George Brugger, attorney for all six applications, called the negotiated proposal "custom tailored" to the needs of the developers and the wants of the community. He spoke of the "long road to get to this point . . . the arduous meetings between the owners, developers, residents and municipal officials." Neighboring lands are all developed, he noted, what we were looking at is the "hole in the donut, what should go into it."

The property rises dramatically at the eastern edge of the Smith-Ewing property creating, he said, the appropriate barrier to sepa-

rate the residential areas to the east, Hanover Parkway, the barrier used by the technical staff and the zoning examiner, he termed "erroneous." The four low- and mid-rise office buildings and the residence inn planned along the east side of Hanover Parkway, he claimed, would provide the best transition from the high intensity use of the shopping center on the west to the residential areas on the east.

The 34.25 a. of townhouses planned for the Tidler property just east of the four commercial zones would include the use of wooded buffer strips in order to "respect already existing devel-

opments."

The R-55 detached homes, to be located south of Windsor Green, will be built in clusters with green space, including existing vegetation, left as is in

the stream valley areas.

Brugger told the District Council that the seven pounds of traffic studies he held in his hands would show that in the peak hours traffic would be better with a mix of commercial and residential zones than either all commercial or all residential. Plans "your C.I.P. for the extention of Hanover Parkway and the widening of Greenbelt Road." he told council, "which are to take place concurrently with our development will result in no re-

City Council to Seek Re-routing Of Hanover Parkway Extension

Following the representation from the community of
Hunting Ridge at the July 15 Greenbelt City Council meeting that the present design for the extension of Hanover Parkway appeared to impact adversely on the condominium development, council set up a special work session on Mon-day, July 22 to explore the issue further. Present at the meeting were James R. Novak, Director of the county's Department of Public Works and Transportation, and Carl Sheffel, highway engineer. Among a fairly large contingent from Hunting Ridge were two representatives who had spoken at the earlier meeting - Thomas Renahan, president of the civic association, and Donald Reider, chair of the Facilities and Services Committee.

According to Reider, about 126 residents, a third of the current population of Hunting Ridge, who occupy three buildings along the proposed right-of-way for Hanover Parkway, would be adversely affected by the proximity of that roadway to their property lines. In particular he was concerned about vehicle lights shining at night directly into the groundfloor apartments, about excessive noise, and about what residents felt was inadequate attention to a drainage problem because of the relatively flat terrain. He felt that the resale value of these homes would be adversely affected by such prob-

Since the city already owns the land directly across the roadway. which has been dedicated for park land, Hunting Ridge residents wondered if the right-of-way could not be moved one street No trees would be affected, they said; currently the city's prop-erty looks like a "moonscape." (It contains mounds of clay dirt piled up from an earlier grading in the development process on what used to be the old Schrom Airport runway, a World War II facility.)

Both Sheffel and Novak disputed that the roadway would be as close to the residences as was contended. Homes would be 50 feet from the curb and gutter line, they said. But Reider disputed their figures. He was able to measure from 30 to 38 feet-

"I never got 40," he said. Renahan agreed. "If you actually see this-walk over this land-there would be no doubt that the road is close," he said.

Daycare Centers

The demand for day care and afterschool care in Prince Georges County is growing. According to a recent report, Child Care, An Interim Report, issued last January by the Task Force on Child Care in Prince Georges County, nearly 100,000 children under age 14 need day care. However, the report says, existing family and group day care centers, nurseries, and camps only provide for about 15,000 children. This means that many families are looking in vain for care for their children and that there is a big market for those who would like to operate day care cen-

The Greenbelt Branch Library has a number of books to help parents find and evaluate day care facilities. Childcare Information Research, a nonprofit organization in Seat Pleasant, publishes the Guide to Daycare and Nursery Schools for Maryland, 1984-1985, a reference book which can be consulted at the library. It covers group day care providers in Prince Georges and Montgomery counties, has a checklist for evaluating a center, and reprints the state regulations controlling day care. Three recent books available for loan on choosing among day care alternatives are Working Parents' Guide to Child Care, by Bryna Siegel-Gorelick; Monday Through Friday: Day Care Alternatives, by Jane Merrill Filstrup; and Mother Care, Other Care, by Sandra Scarr.

Those who would like to operate a day care center should read A House Full of Kids: Running a Successful Day Care Business in Your Own Home, by Karen Murphy. Also, be aware that the Day Care Registration Unit of the P. G. County Department of Social Services schedules orientation meetings for those thinking of operating a day care facility. Call them at 779-1471 for date and place of meetings. The Day Care Registration Unit will also provide a list of day care providers in Prince Georges County arranged by zip code if you give them a call.







duction of the level of service provided now on those roads (level E)."

Covenants

Brugger spelled out for the District Council the various promises that had been made to the City of Greenbelt and written into a 99-year covenant, signed by both parties and enforceable by the city. A height limit on the mid-rise office building closest to Greenbelt Road will allow the residents in adjacent Glen Ora townhouses, because of the steep rise in the land, to look out over the office building. Their views will not be blocked, said Brugger. A buffer of existing trees at that same corner is also required.

In recommending approval of the rezoning the city council also required that adequate public facilities tests of the MNCPPC would be met both at the usual time of subdivision review and again at the time of site plan review; the city be given site plan review; and a traffic circulation plan be prepared by the developers at each of these two reviews.

Community Support

Susan Malone, representing the combined neighboring com-munities of Windsor Green, Greenbriar, and Hunting Ridge was present to assure the District Council of that group's support, as was city administrative aide Michael McLaughlin.

The people's zoning counsel. Ron Schiff, referring to the 1949 zoning plan for the area, called the change in the character of the neighborhood in the intervening years — a permissible reason for rezoning - "uncontroverted. There is enough evidence (for the rezoning) to be fairly debatable," he said.

"All things go well for those who love God and Greenbelt," Hilda Pemberton, District Council member, summed up the results of the 35 minute oral arguments and resulting six motions, all of which were approved 7 to 0. A super-majority or six votes was required for the four applica-tions that did not conform to the Master Plan. Castaldi made the motions. (Floyd Wilson was out of the country and Sue Mills was conducting county business elsewhere that morning, Amonett explained to those attending the hearing.)

Frank Casula was the only member of council to vote caution as he spoke of the necessity to have the county's planned "road improvements and traffic controls in place when the new developments are opened or we're going to have complete chaos."

The Crisis Center, open a year in the Greenbelt/College Park area, is operated by the Psychiatric Institute of Washington and provides counseling, crisis intervention and short-term psychotherapy to people in emotional crisis. Immediate or next day appointments can be made by calling 982-0075. Hours are flexible; fees are based on ability to pay and no one is turned away.

The Crisis Center is staffed by nurse therapists who help people confronted with a variety of stresses that have become overwhelming, such as the loss of a loved one, the trauma of unemployment, family difficulties or substance abuse. The Center's staff, after evaluating the situation, can provide intensive shortterm therapy or make recommendations for more long-term help.

County Letter Describes Highway Improvement Projects In Greenbelt

by Virginia Beauchamp

In response to the city's request at a special work session on July 22 with county and state highway officials, James R. Novak, Director of the county's Department of Public Works and Transportation, sent a letter recently to the city describing highway projects now scheduled for construction within the Greenbelt city limits.

In chronological order, these are as follows:

Hanover Parkway

Originally scheduled with design plans completed and specifications already available for bids, the extension of Hanover Parkway to Good Luck Rd. has been put on hold by council's request to consider rerouting the roadway opposite Hunting Ridge about one road lane to the east on to city park property. (See separate story.) This move will delay the start of construction from the projected September 1985 schedule. In fact, it may put this project behind two other road projects.

Greenbelt Rd.

One is the widening of Greenbelt Rd. from Mandan Rd. to the Baltimore-Washington Parkway and from the western end of the Parkway bridge to the eastern limits of the Kenilworth Ave.-Greenbelt Rd. interchange now under construction. The other is the construction of the extension of Cherrywood Lane in the Capitol Office Park development from Ivy Lane to Edmonston Rd., at a point north of the State Highway Administration's salt dome. On the other side of the Beltway, the present Cherrywood Lane will be widened to 60 feet except in areas where right-ofway restrictions may make this impossible (probably alongside the supermarket in the Beltway Plaza). Construction is expected to begin in fall 1986.

Both sections of the Greenbelt Rd. widening (to 6 lanes) and the two ends of Cherrywood Lane will remain unconnected until their respective bridges are also built. Here things get more complicated. The county will design the relocation of the exit ramps from the Parkway northbound on to Greenbelt Rd. but the Federal Highway Administration will design the bridge structure. Both designs are scheduled for completion in spring 1986. Construction can only occur, however, when federal funding is appropriated. Because this will take an aot of Congress, no definite plans can be made at the

ber of county, state and federal agencies that must approve the design. "The city has been putting the pressure on (for the road construction)," he said. "Now if you take it off, this will cause delay. It puts you back to the beginning."

Councilmember Tom White disagreed. "Our pressure has concerned the widening of Greenbelt Rd.," he said

But councilmember Ed Putens commented that this was the first time he had seen the road design. "We are deeply concerned about the residents in the area,"

Possible Routing

Using a ruler, city manager Jim Giese pointed out that moving the roadway was not such a simple matter. Since the section of roadway in question is a long curve, engineers would have to start at some distance north, where property on both sides is in private ownership, in order

The Cherrywood Lane bridge over the Beltway has been funded for design, according to No-vak's letter, and a consultant engineer is being engaged. Acquisition of right-of-way for the bridge structure and its approaches, as well as the construction itself, wlil be funded by bonds supported by county TIF reven-ues (tax incremental financing). The bridge is expected to be completed by the fall of 1990.

to bring the road boundary out 12 feet opposite the closest Hunting Ridge building. Renahan, using the same ruler, said that they never intended a change so drastic. In fact, by starting opposite the corner of the building in question, he said, the roadway would be straightened, making it much safer for travel. As for the question, raised by Giese, that the city's land had been given on the condition that it be used as greenspace, Renahan commented that the greenspace taken on the east by the roadway change would be replaced by other greenspace to the west.

"I'm interested in doing what the city and the citizens want." Novak said, but he wanted an official communication from the city requesting a right-of-way change. In the meantime he agreed to look over the possibilities and to alert the city if there should be any unforeseen problem resulting from

Renahan assured council that Hunting Ridge residents were not interested in using delaying actions to avoid construction of the road, "We are not trying to sabotage plans." He also felt uncomfortable, he said, that there should be any linkage between construction delay on Hanover Parkway and approval for construction of the Maryland Trade Center III building.

Speaking for council, Mayor Weidenfeld agreed that there was no such linkage-that access on Greenbelt Rd. was council's main concern in the other matter. Referring to the construction of Hanover Parkway, however, Weidenfeld summed up the views of the other three councilmembers present at the meeting (P''ski was absent)-"This is forever. While it's still on paper is the better time to address these concerns." The item will a r on the next city council as

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF AR-TICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL".
