Reduction in Interest Rate on Rehabilitation Loan Lowers GHI's Payments by \$30,000

The board of directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. heard good news and bad news at its meeting on June 19. The good news came in the form of a much reduced mortgage payment to the National Cooperative Bank (NCB), resulting from the readjustment of the interest rate on the multi-million dollar rehabilitation loan held by the bank.

Beginning August 1 and continuing for the next five years, the rate will be 8.85%, down from 13.25%. This change reduces the monthly payment due NCB by approximately \$30,000. The current payment is about \$129,604 with about \$10,000 of the payment coming from the rehabilitation stabilization fund and the remainder from monthly members' charges. The new payment will be \$99,578.

The change was reflected in a 627.500 spending authorization for the NCB payments approved by the board for the next six months. According to GHI Comptroller Don McGinn, \$777.626 would have been required to make these payments if the rate had not dropped.

The board did not deal with any possible disposition of the savings. A draft report of the Finance Committee considering the effect of the rate reduction on the rehab stabilization fund was also held over to a later meeting.

Then GHI General Manager Ron Colton gave the board the bad news: GHI, which has a \$100,000 deposit in First Maryland Savings & Loan stands to lose between \$35,000 and \$45,000 in interest as a result of Baltimore Circuit Court Judge Joseph H. Kaplan's decision on June 19 to put the S&L into receivership. According to press reports on the consequences of receivership, this action effectively freezes large deposits at no interest and will probably postpone full recovery until 1990 or beyond. This long period during which GHI's money will earn no interest accounts for the esti-

board a possible method whereby GHI might regain its money sooner. Under his proposal, GHI would offer to buy from the Maryland Deposit Insurance Fund, which will dispose of First Maryland's assets, approximately 31 GHI mortgages held by First Maryland, providing that GHI's money in the S&L can be used as part of the purchase funds. The 31 mortgages have an estimated value of \$1 million. Under Colton's plan, GHI would offer about \$900,000 and its funds in First Maryland for the mortgages, If MDIF accepted the offer, GHI would then sell the mortgages to another lender for \$1 million. thereby effectively regaining its \$100,000 in the S&L. The board authorized Colton to make the offer to MDIF providing no corporate funds are at risk and subject to approval by the corporate counsel. The

revision of the mutual ownership contract which governs GHI members' right of occupancy in GHI homes. The MOC had been revised to accommodate the change in occupancy criteria approved by the membership at the May 14 annual meeting. This change allows two unrelated adults to occupy or own a GHI home; the previous criteria had restricted occupancy to a member (or a married couple) and the immediate family of the member.

out the document. The board, faced with a very long agenda, felt unable to work through these changes at that time. The revised MOC will be considered at the meeting on July 10.

Larger Homes Rehab Loan

Acting on Colton's assurance that a 15-year, fixed rate mortgage commitment for the larger townhome rehabilitation loan was expected momentarily from the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation, the board authorized acceptance of the commitment at a rate not to exceed 11%. Colton urged the advance authorization because the loan rate will be lower (possibly as low as 10.3%) if the loan can be closed in 30 days. Therefore, it was necessary to have authorization in hand so that the commitment could be accepted as soon as it was received. Agreeing, the board voted to authorize acceptance.

Meetings

When only half the topics on the agenda had been dealt with by midnight, the board agreed to add a meeting in July. The summer schedule of board meetings, therefore, will be July 10 and 24 and August 14.

Vent Pipes

The board accepted a report from the Aesthetics and Environment Committee which recommended that exposed external vent pipes continue to be banned in GHI and, further, that such pipes would have to be removed in order to bring the unit up to standard at time of resale. The board also accepted a minority report from former A&E Committee member (and present Audit Committee member Alan D. Freas, Jr.). While agreeing that such violations should be put right before resale, Freas' minority report argued that in cases where the violation existed before the current owner purchased, the expense of correcting the violation should be borne by GHI. He pointed out that if the GHI resale inspection failed to detect the violation before the current member purchased the unit, the current member (who would have had no way of knowing that the unit was in violation) should not have to bear the cost of remedying the fault. These reports were put on the agenda for the next meeting.

Betty Deitch, Chair of the Member and Community Relations Committee, also presented a report, calling on the board and audit committee members as well as the general membership to assist in planning and manning the GHI booth at the Labor Day Festival. She warned that failure to get help would mean no booth at the festival.

GDC BOARD MEETS, ELECTS OFFICERS, SETS GARAGE POLICY

At Thursday evening's meeting of Citizens For Greenbelt (CFG), the first and immediate topic to be discussed was what position to take on proposed plans for renovation of Roosevelt Center Mall since a work session of the city on this subject was to follow in a few days. The CFG agenda, however, also dealt with the issue of a renewed application for a liquor license by the Copa, a proposed restaurant, music and video establishment in Beltway Plaza. Opposition to the license was reaffirmed. Another agenda item was the recently publicized prospect of a county-wide bond issue. Several interesting insights into the office building surge in the Greenbelt area, and into the probable motivations behind the county's push for money for road developments, emerged during the evening's discussion.

Following a look at some of the proposed plans drawn up for Roosevelt Center., members and visitors were asked by CFG president Keith Chernikoff for their opinions. Several people stressed that the condition of the sidewalks was an immediate concern: "We shouldn't wait on the sidewalks until everything is done-that's a safety factor-the rest is cosmetics." Proposed new buildings and/or second story additions drew more mixed comments. with participants seeking information on the need for these. Chernikoff noted that if more buildings are put into the Center, the city would have to provide more parking for such development.

Another point brought up was the possible move of the post office away from Greenbelt if local residents do not lobby to keep it. The federal government apparently wants a larger space for the post office. This possible move accounted for a projected restaurant in that area on the plans for the Center. Several members expressed dissatisfac. tion with the prospect of parking garages and increased traffic associated with new buildings and office additions, though one member stated "I think we would be remiss to oppose the owner (of the Center buildings) building new buildings - life changes"; she added that a second story addition (in the plans) "could be a good addition to the city."

Another member, on the other hand, brought up the results of a civic survey on the Center charette which showed that most residents wanted minimal change: "Just clean the facades, fix the sidewalks." Chernikoff noted that the presently projected plans are much more ambitious than this, and emphasized that the city

therefore needs guidance and input from citizens on the direction Greenbelt should take.

The parking situation, present and future, appeared to be of most concern to those at the meeting. Typical comments were: . . there's always been available parking, so we don't need a double level parking garage;" "A parking garage would draw too many people;" and Chernikoff remarked that the city has a commitment to construct an indoor swimming pool. probably the original pool. which near would put an additional burden on parking.

A motion was then passed to put Citizens For Greenbelt on record with the consensus that (1) the sidewalks should be promptly repaired, (2) the city should pursue, with the owner. renovation of the Center facades' original Art Deco style, (3) parking circulation should be improv-

Democrats Compete for State Senate

Green Seeks 2nd Term

State Senator Leo Green will seek reelection to the Maryland Senate from the 23rd Legislative District which he has represented since 1982. A former two-term mayor of Bowie, Green also served in the House of Delegates from 1974 to 1978. In his 23 years as a Bowie resident, he has been active in many civic and charitable organizations.

He was president of the Bowie Citizens Association and a coach. referee and board member of the Bowie Boys and Girls Club. After serving as chairman of the Board of Visitors at Bowie State College. Green went on to the Board of Trustees of Maryland's State Universities and Colleges, which directs and manages the state's four-year public colleges.

He is a trustee of the Prince Georges United Way, the Patuxent District of the Boy Scouts of America and the Prince Georges Chapter of the American Cancer Society. A past president of Associated Catholic Charities of Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments and served as its vice chairman. He is a veteran and a member of the Greenbelt American Legion Post.

In the State Senate, he is a member of the Finance Committee and the Joint Oversight Committee on Health Care Cost Containment. He is chairman of the Joint Committee on the Management of Public Funds. His other committee assignments are the Joint Committee on Federal Relations, Joint Legislative and Executive Committee on Pensions and the Joint Committee on Spending Affordability. By gubernatorial appointment, he is a member of the Governor's Employment and Training Council and its Executive Committee.

Green co-chaired the Senate working group which increased funding for Prince Georges County's Magnet Schools Program and is a supporter of the Civiletti Commission recommendations which, by 1989, will raise the county's share of state edu-cation aid by 37 percent over 1984 levels.

A supporter of legislation beneficial to municipalities. Green has been repeatedly honored with awards from the Maryland Municipal League and the Prince Georges Municipal Association.

In June of this year, the Maryland Cooperative Coalition presented him with its Distinguished Statesman Award, and the Montgomery and Prince Georges Park Police Lodge of the Fraternal Order of Police selected him as "one of Prince Georges County's best elected officials for 1986."

Green is a practicing attorney with law offices in Bowie. He received his law degree from Georgetown University and his undergraduate degree in economics from Mount St. Mary's College in Emmitsburg, from which he received its Distinguished Alumni Award in 1979.

If successful in his reelection bid. Green plans to continue to push for the upgrading of all major highway arteries in the district, a substantial effort which is now underway. Other priorities include education funding, more home rule for Prince Georges County and accelerated state action against drug abuse, which is not declining in Maryland at a rate proportionate to the rest of the country.

Green and his wife. Alhen, are the parents of eight children and reside in Bowie at 3123 Belair Drive.

Daniello Files for Senate

Salvatore A. Daniello, known as Sal to his friends, was born in Orange. New Jersey on March 19, 1932 where he attended grammar and high school. Sal moved to Prince Georges County in February 1954. after being dis-charged from the U.S. Marines. having served in Korea during the second Korean Winter Campaign in 1952. Sal attended the University of Maryland in 1954-'55 and later attended and graduated from the American University with a Bachelor of Sciences degree in Business. ed, and (4) parking lots should be upgraded.

On The Building Boom

In connection with the office building growth around Greenbelt, one meeting participant suggested that a new factor in the "economics of building" is about to enter; the forthcoming national tax reform bill, now in House - Senate conference, will likely "cut out a lot of the tax breaks" and thus "cut the development pressures." He argued that "There hasn't been one instance in which the city has successfully 'gone to the wall' to stop a building it didn't want" so we should postpone new buildings until the new bill (comes in)." This turn of events. he said, means that "builders will now be pushing for quick action to get in under the wire."

County Bond Issue

The county government proposes to borrow up to 80 million dollars to finance work on many road and bridge projects. including both local projects such as enlargement of the existing Greenbelt bridge over the Baltimore-Washington Parkway, and new projects such as a road system around the projected large development in the Laurel area called Konterra.

Eunice Coxon reviewed her own experiences in attempting to get information on some of these matters. Citing the need for a bus service from New Carrollton to Upper Marlboro as an example of an alternative to more road building, she said "I'm not against proper roads, but I don't feel that I should pay for roads to benefit a developer." She read a letter of opposition to the Konterra-related road projects, re-ceived from citizen activist Walter Maloney, who feared that "a large road-related slush fund could be created." She herself was "bothered about who is going to pay for the various pieces of the Greenbelt Road/BW Parkway interchange," arguing that the money should be coming out of county operating costs rather than a bond issue.

Again, a possibility of other motivations was put forth by a participant who suggested that "What's going on is to put the BW overpass and several other local needs into the bond issue, to push the Konterra project."

On the basis of this discussion, a motion was passed "That the county's commitment to the BW Parkway/Greenbelt Road interchange is an independent commitment, and is not dependent on any proposed means for raising the funds."




