Strong Views Expressed For and Against Proposed Museum, Financing Questioned

More than 50 Greenbelters (and one College Park resident) crowded the city council chambers on July 8 to give their opinions on the proposed museum to be established by the city's purchase of an original, government-built home from the 1930's. Thirty-four persons spoke for or against the project. Exactly half supported the museum unequivocally. Fourteen either directly opposed the museum or opposed any city participation in funding it. Three others tempered their opposition by calling for a referendum on the issue to get the voters' views. In addition, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld read a letter from Walter and Leonie Penney opposing the use of tax money for a museum.

Those opposed to city funds being used to purchase the museum building made their point repeatedly: the sponsors of the museum, in their view, have not given the public a clear idea of what their fund-raising capacity is and whether they will be able to sustain it on down the road in order to assure the public that the financial commitment of the city would be limited. Judging by the tough questions put to Sandra Barnes, Chair of the 50th Anniversary Committee, and Mary Linstrom, Co-Chair of the Museum Subcommittee, about the finances of the museum support group, the Friends of the Greenbelt Museum (FOGM), the council members got the opposition's message.

Mayor pro tem Thomas X. White asked questions about the FOGM commitment to conduct operations of the museum and whether the group has a timetable with targeted amounts to be raised. Weidenfeld asked whether FOGM has a plan for helping fund the museum building. if possible, and for raising money to operate and staff the museum.

Linstrom reported that FOGM has almost 200 members and has raised \$7500 with the single appeal it has undertaken to date. Barnes defended the achievements of the group, saying that she felt 200 members was a very successful result for a first try. She emphasized that a museum is a long-term commitment by the city and the community. She also mentioned plans to study some other small museums to see what makes them successful.

Museum Funds Budgeted

The 1986/87 Greenbelt budget allows for funds to purchase the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. unit at 10B Crescent with the funding spread over five years at \$11,000 per year. Councilman Joseph Isaacs said that he understood that this 5-year plan was adopted to make it possible for FOGM to contribute to the capital outlays for the building.

The GHI home which has been offered for a museum is almost ideally located, according to Don Volk, vice-president of FOGM. It is an original masonry building; it is close to the Center, inner walkways, a playground and an underpass, all features of the original planned community; it is close to the library and visitors can use the library parking lot. Librarian Betty Allen, who is in charge of the library's Tugwell Room, said there would be "lots of things we could do in the Tugwell Room more effectively" with a museum nearby.

Supporter's Views

Richard Stevenson, a College Park resident. led off by saying he strongly supported the museum and handing Linstrom a check to back up his words. Al Herling pleaded the case of the museum eloquently. He pointed out that it is very difficult to raise money without an investment by the city to get the project started. He said the present has an "obligation to provide a vision to the future" and "to those who say 'manana,' I say the time is now."

Proponents of the museum included a surprisingly large number of museum professionals. In what must surely be the newest example of Greenbelt activism. Dr. Keith Winsell, who has lived in Greenbelt for one week. said that he felt that the mseum is a worthy project which would be of interest to professional people. Winsell said that he is trained as a social historian.

Janie Mutchler, a fundraiser and member of FOGM pointed out that it is much easier to raise funds if the project has a permanent space which is historically correct. Alan Virta, a member of Prince Georges Historic Preservation Committee (but speaking for himself) noted that many people in East Greenbelt, where he lives, support the museum. He also said he was "delighted that the debate was focusing on dollars." since this ensures a small beginning which can be supported. Christina O'Boyle, who is on the professional staff of a museum, gave the opinion that the potential for success is present in Greenbelt.

Prospects for Success

The outlook for success of the museum was a subject of widely varying views. Steve Curtis, with his gift for colorful analogy, compared the museum to the city dial-a-ride bus which he described as a "\$17 per ride bus service" and hoped the museum would not turn out to be a "\$20 . . per visit museum." He also expressed fears that the volunteer efforts would not last beyond 1987 and that GHI might eventually have to buy back something which did not work.

On the other hand, GHI Presi-

dent Margaret Hogensen enumerated a list of visitors from other parts of the U.S. and from abroad who came to study GHI and the Greenbelt planned community. For these visitors, she said, the museum would be an added attraction and of great interest. Leta Mach suggested that the museum would be the object of study by school children such as those whom she teaches in an educational enrichment class at Center School. For such children the museum would be a firsthand learning experience, she felt. North End School Option

Several speakers suggested that the North End School might be a better site for a museum than a GHI home, particularly one as small as the proposed unit. which is a so-called $1\frac{1}{2}$ - bedroom dwelling. Lucille Jacoby pointed cut that the unit might be too small to accommodate a group of 25-30 visitors. She also pointed out that access for the handi-capped would be difficult. Other speakers, however, opposed con-sideration of North End School as a museum location. In reply to a question from Councilmem-ber Antoinette Bram. Barnes said that only a GHI home would provide an authentic setting for a museum. Volk said that housing the museum in a GHI unit was the only way to give it the "feel" of the original Greenbelt. And on the subject of the city's financial commitment. Virta said that it would be "open-ended" in the North End School.

Several speakers suggested that the proposal be put to a referendum. Weidenfeld, however, noted that this could be suggested for any issue which came before the council and that way there would be a referendum every month or two. Isaacs noted that the previous council (of See MUSEUM, page 4, col. 1

Running Club Holds Race, Picnic July 19



New Rules for Public Hearings Suggested To the Editor:

It seems to this veteran observer of city council meetings that there needs to be some prompt improvement and refinement in the conduct of public hearings. There is the not so small matter of courtesy and fairness to the captive audience.

As I had to leave the recent public hearing on the proposed Greenbelt Museum at 11 p.m., 1 was astounded to hear the next day that a critical verbal salvo was lobbed at the opponents of the museum by a council mem-ber.

Since I was not present, a requested replaying of the cable TV tape verified that the aforesaid citizens, who took the time and effort on one of the hottest evenings on record to present their opinions, were verbally chastised as to their "negative approach" and were counseled to reconsider their positions.

Is there not a current council rule to the effect that no council member may impugn the motives of a fellow council member? If the mayor did not rule the remarks out of order, as I believe they were, what rule is in place to prevent another incident like this?

I recently testified at the county council's public hearing on bond authorization. Although I am sure that most of the members did not agree with me on the desirability of breaking up the road bond referendum into geographical segments for the enlightenment of the voters in November, I was thanked and received no advice or rebuke. Incidentally, no comments pro or con on the disposition of the issue were made at the session. Perhaps this method may be the way to go. Eunice E. Coxon

Summer Athletes in Danger To the Editor:

Those who have recently taken up strenuous exercisting, particularly running and jogging, should know that running in hot weather is definitely dangerous and can lead to injury and death. The only two deaths that I can recall of runners in the Washington area who were running in a race occurred a few years ago in suburban Virginia on an extremely hot day with high humidity. Both runners became disoriented and lost and went off the course.

Greenbelters have an ideal situation for running around the 1¼ mile Greenbelt Lake because water is available from the fountain and you can run one mile in the shade by turning around at the mile markers. If you run in the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center or the Greenbelt National Park you should plan your run in such a way that you will be able to get water from a stream to pour over yourself or carry drinking water with you. The rule is to run slower and shorter distance in very hot, humid weather. Bob Ryan of Channel 4 TV News has published a HUMITURE CHART showing that combinations of temperature and humidity of 105-130 (90 degree temperature and 70% humidity equals 106 HUMITURE) with a danger of sunstroke, heat cramps, or heat exhaustion likely and heatstroke possible with prolonged exposure and physical activity. You should drink plenty of water before, during and after running. Experienced race direc. tors always provide water.

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Police Blotter

Based on Informtion Released by the Greenbelt **Police Department**

Three girls, between ages of 5 and 8, were the victms of an indecent exposure incident on July 6 at about 4 p.m. at the end of Centerway near Nyman Realty. The suspect approached the girls, patted one on the buttocks and then exposed himself. He then left on foot in the direction of the Roosevelt Center. The suspect was described as a white male, in his 20's, about 5'7" and weighing about 140 lbs. He had red hair and was wearing glasses. a light-colored shirt and blue jeans.

On July 7 two female juveniles reported being solicited by two males in a passing car. The first suspect was described as a white male, 25-30 years old. 5'10" wearing sun glasses. The passenger was a black male. The vehicle was described as a silver 4door car, possibly at Datsun. The incident occurred on Ridge Road near Green Ridge House at about 4 p.m.

Through investigation by Det./ Pfc. William Allwang two persons have been arrested for a strong-arm robbery which occurred in the 9300 block of Edmonston Road on June 23. The juvenile was charged with robbery and held at Boys' Village in Cheltenham. The adult male, a nonresident, was charged and released pending trial.

A woman inside a store in Greenway Shopping Center was the victim of a indecent exposure. A man approached her in an aisle and exposed himself. The woman followed the man to his vehicle, took a description and license number and reported the incident to the police. Within hours, Officer David Lucia arrested a non-resident male for the offense.

A woman from Pennsylvania was robbed of her purse in the parking lot of the Holiday Inn on Hanover Drive on July 5 at 9:50 p.m. The suspects hit the victim, took her purse and fled on foot.

Both were described as black males in their early 20's, about 6' tall. One was wearing gray pants and a green shirt with yellow sleeves.


While returning home from the fireworks, a woman was assaulted at Research and Hillside Roads. No injuries were sustained. The identity of the suspect is known and warrants are expected.



LARGEST SELECTION OF WALLCOVERINGS IN THIS AREA





which he was not then a mem-ber) had decided not to hold a referendum on building priorities at the time of last council election. He felt that if a referendum were held on the museum, other projects to be funded from the bond issue should be included.

Council Comments

At the end of the hearing, each council member commented on the hearing and several gave their own perspectives. Weidenfeld thanked the participants for their good commentary and said the council members weigh these views along with those gathered in other conversations with people in the community and then they decide; he emphasized that there are never any easy answers. White, who called public hear-ings in Greenbelt "a cherished

event," said the council needs to know more about the ongoing commitment of the support group. He urged that more thought be given to its programs and that the city's commitment be measured against a real balance sheet. However, he also maintained that "if we are going to have a museum" in a GHI unit, the present opportunity should not be lost.

Bram, who characterized the hearing as a "healthy battle," said that she strongly felt that those who "have a negative ap-proach to the idea of a museum" should "give yourselves a chance to think it over." Many times. she said, "we get wrapped up in our-

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

Isaacs emphasized that the dream of having a GHI home as a museum goes back many years and that there seems to be a "window of opportunity" that needs to be seriously addressed. He maintained that "we have to know where we've been to know where we're going." He said that he is favorable to seeing a GHI home purchased. However, he spoke of a need to understand the financial commitment from both the side of the city and the support group. He urged the
