# New Research Group Meets Here to Discuss Control of Traffic Congestion on Beltway

by Lisa Feinberg Congestion and safety on the Capital Beltway are a major concern for residents in the greater Washington region. Citizens and business leaders, together with state and local elected and appointed officials - over 200 in all, met in a "Conference on the Capital Beltway" to discuss these concerns on March 14 at Martin's Crosswinds in Greenbelt. Later the Traffic Research Foundation, Inc., a non-profit organization formed to deal with serious transportation problems facing the region, was launched at a meeting

The new foundation will inform and educate the public and government officials about the quality, effectiveness, deficiencies and problems of current local, interstate and intrastate transportation routes. More specifically, the foundation's goals center on traffic congestion and safety on the Capital Beltway, including the need for eastern and western bypass facilities, transportation

These activities recognize that the Beltway, designed as a regional bypass around Washington, now serves predominantly local traffic and in fact has been described as "greater Washington's main street." They also recognize that about a third of today's Beltway traffic is truly non-local and could be diverted from the Beltway if an alternative route were available.



The traffic situation is a "regional problem causing regional action," said Robert Gladstone at the September 12 meeting. Founder and president of Quadrangle Development Corporation, he noted that by the twenty-first century the Beltway will be inundated with traffic, resulting in a decrease of productivity because of poor employee morale.

Gladstone also pointed out that last year there were more than 2.300 accidents reported on the Beltway and, if the situation continues, he believed economic growth will also be impaired.

Hal Kassoff, administrator of the Maryland State Highway Administration. explained that the Department of Traffic has been focusing on completion of the Metro program, which he referred to as the backbone for transportation to and from the District of Columbia. But the highways are still very important, he said, adding that there is a "new era of concern for highway transportation."

Jack Herrity. Chairman of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors, emphasized that ". . .

roadway congestion is the most important regional transportation issue this community has faced since the creation of Metro. . . . We have to pull together and meet the challenge of traffic congestion on our roads and bridges, especially the Capital Beltway."

Three-Phase Program

Herrity's proposal for a threephase program was approved. Phase 1, he said, will document objectively the need for a Washington bypass. The Phase 2 undertaking will arrive at a consensus within the region on the need for the bypass. Once a consensus is reached. Phase 3 will identify some funding mechanism to pay for construction of the bypass.

Presented to the newly formed group were recommendations from the March 14 Conference on the Capital Beltway. At that earlier conference the controversial Inter-County Connector (ICC) in Maryland was discussed as an important element of greater Washington's future transportation system. It was suggested that completion of the ICC be accelerated.

In addressing the conference, Prince Georges County Executive Parris Glendening explained that even though six of nine Beltway-related interchange projects "identified as needed" in the county have been funded, "we, like our sister jurisdictions, will quickly reach maximum capacity."

Glendening suggested that (1) "planned and programmed improvements to the Beltway itself and its interchanges be completed and substantial improvements to feeder routes and ancillary roads be programmed to

improve the flow of traffic" and (2) "we must look at non-Beltway alternatives to the movement of people," such as an "outer beltway in some configuration, to a significant cross-county high way, such as the ICC and to non-road alternatives."

He stressed that "all our regional plans and local plans for the movement of people are predicated on completion of the entire Metro system. . . ."

# Plogman Is Nominated to Fill County School Board Vacancy

Suzanne Plogman, Greenbelt's school board candidate, was nominated by county executive Parris Glendening to fill the district's vacant school board seat.

Glendening announced the nomination Sunday night, September 28, at a Windsor Green fund raiser for Plogman. Plogman is already a candidate in the November 4 election for the position.

Plogman who turned 33 Monday called the announcement "a great birthday present," "It's an honor to be nominated to the school board by a county executive who has made county education his administration's number one priority," she said.

"The appointment would give the second district a vote on some critical upcoming issues and give our district some representation as the budget process begins." Plogman said. The district seat has been vacant since this summer when board member Lesley Kreimer, also of Greenbelt, resigned to become vice principal at Thomas Pullen Middle School.

Special in-person registration will be held at all Giant Food Stores in Prince Georges County on Saturday, October 4, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Registered voters unable to vote in person on general election day. November 4. can obtain absentee ballot information by calling 952-3270 from 8 a.m. until 9 p.m., Monday through Friday, except holidays. All completed applications for absentee ballots must be in the Election Office by 9 p.m., October 28.



"Antonio's is certainly a pretty solid restaurant these days, with mainly good food, reasonable prices and vastly improved decor.

'Among the appetizers, fried zucchini is excellent, as are the white beans. And so are the mussels, which are plump and fresh.

"There are some good side touches here, like the excellent house-made bread, dense, yeasty and very fresh. And there's a remarkably good Caesar salad as an option with the entrees.

"The strong points among the entrees are the pastas, which are made in house, and the red sauces, which have been nicely fruity and fresh tasting.

### Police Blotter

Based on Information Released by the Greenbelt Police Department

As she was leaving her car ter parking in the Beltway after Plaza parking lot about 10:45 a.m., September 20 a 51-year-old woman was struck on the head by one of three black males 16 to 18 years of age, who stole her purse. They fled on foot into the Springhill Lake apartment complex. The first was 6'0", 170 lbs., wearing a tan jacket, blue jeans and a dark baseball cap. The second was 5'6", 140 lbs., wearing a dark blue Adidas warm-up suit with red and blue stripes and a blue baseball cap. 





Since it is not always small and is too wide to jump, it is best to go right or left for about 10 yards, then cross the stream and get back on the path. The path continues behind the old power station to the lake path. Go right for 20 yards, until a leaf-covered soft dirt path is found. Turn left here onto the path and go for about a quarter of a mile, at which point the lake path is rejoined for 100 yards. Then veer off to the right onto a very secluded path until it rejoins the lake path near the water fountain at the refreshment stand. For more information call Larry Noel at 474-9362.



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# Utopia's 'Bell, Book & Candle' Is Really a Bewitching Play

Watching the Greenbelt Arts Center's production of John Van Druten's "Bell, Book, and Candle" is a delightful

way to spend an evening.

The Greenbelt Players do a splendid job in projecting a combination of light comedy and believability in witchcraft. The play, about 20th century witches, is produced by special arrangement with Dramatist Play Services and directed by A.C. Mendenhall and Marie Tousignant. The directors can be proud of their efforts.

The woman meets man and falls in love theme is complicated by the fact that the woman in this case is a witch and witches can't fall in love. They can, however, cast spells and there are a few spells cast with unpredictable results.

Although all of the players do good job, it is Greenbelter Sean Coe who stands out. Cast as Nicky Holroyd, brother of the main character, Coe does such a professional job that he is at once Nicky, and not a character in a play. From the moment he casts a spell on the telephone, he captivates the audience with his realistic portrayal of a young man sure of himself and his abilities as a witch (warlock). He is caring, self-assured, petty, arrogant, revengeful, fun-loving -all of these and more. And when he dances across the stage in an imitation of a flamenco dancer it's not really funny but the natural kind of thing one would expect from a young man-and the audience tends to smile indulgently.

Judy Holland, also a Greenbelter, does a superb job as Aunt Queenie, the effervescent, bungling "old maid" aunt who is also a witch. She projects an "other world" quality that endears her to the audience and makes them believe that she really does stir up potions and other such things, although she never actually says she does. Greenbelter Carolyn Boone and

Marty Derx are well cast as the lovers Gillian Holroyd and Shep Henderson. Pretty Carolyn in her black cocktail dress and handsome Marty in his tuxedo look the part of a modern young couple falling in love. Both give good performances. However, at times it was difficult to hear Carolyn because she did not always face the audience. This was partly because the script often called for her to turn her back on Derx as she spoke. Perhaps this could be overcome by having him move so that in turning away from him, she was, at least, partly facing the audience. In spite of this the couple do a more than adequate job of convincing the audience of the reality of their feelings for each other.

Two character players round out the cast. Richard Mills, as Sidney Redlitch, author of a book on witchcraft, is at his best when showing his fear of the other worldliness of the others. Last, but very necessary to the plot, is Pyewacket the cat or "familiar" of Gillian, who in real life is Fonzo Mendenhall.

Holt Wetherald did a splendid job with the set for the first two acts. It really helped to set the mood of the play. However necessary as is the change for act 3, the room does not seem to reflect the personality of a very modern young woman but rather that of an older, more sedate person. On the other hand the clothing worn by all characters fits the time and the mood and age of each. It is surely no accident that the young witch, Gillian, wears black.

All in all this play is worth seeing. It continues to run Friday and Saturday nights, October 10. 11. 17 and 18.



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
