Blue Reflective Glass Is Highlight Of Capital Office Park Extension

Greenbelt's ever-changing landscape has a new dimension. Rising high on a hill overlooking the Beltway is the first of twin office buildings that will become the centerpiece for the Capital Office Park development when the more than 60-acre full-service complex is complete. Joining four existing structures and the Greenbelt Hilton and Towers, the eight story Building 5 is expected to open in May 1987. When fully developed the park will consist of the Hilton, eight office buildings and a private heliport serving businesses employing 5,000 persons.

Developed by Springhill Lake Associates Limited Partnership, Capital Office Park (COP) is bounded by the Capital Beltway and Kenilworth Avenue. Four existing buildings and the Hilton are sited south of Ivy Lane, with Building 5 and future structures positioned on the north side.

A new look featuring blue reflective glass is to distinguish the newer cluster of buildings across Ivy Lane from the existing chunky grouping. The new style is described by the architectural firm of CHK as "creating a little different image and more strength." yet that blends in harmoniously with the strong sculptured look of the first set of buildings. CHK architects designed the Springhill Lake Apartment development, the Hilton and Capital Office Park.

"The evolved design is a great complement to what we have there now and fits in with our overall concept," said Richard Perkins, a partner in Springhill Lake Associates.

According to CHK architect Lou Bernardo, the design change is "today's architecture and makes a statement that gives the total park character."

The 173,800-gross-square-foot Building 5 has 165,000 square feet of rentable space. Both this structure and Building 6 will feature semi-circular glass bays enhanced by dramatic blue reflective glass exteriors.

"This is a new color and design," said Dennis Burke of Community Realty Company, Inc., the firm that leases and manages Capital Office Park.

Bernardo felt the change would enhance the park's desirability. "There is enough diversity and at the same time there is a cohesiveness by the sharing of similar design factors," he commented.

Bernardo explained that "a visual togetherness" will be achieved by use of similar building materials and site orientation. The first three completed buildings form a cluster that angles away in parallel rows from the Beltway to take advantage of the

The reelection of Parris Glendening as Prince Georges County Executive and the passage by voters of a bond referendum to improve and construct roads and other county facilities sent a clear message that the development boom in the county will continue. For over a decade officials have sought increasing revenues by attracting high-quality office parks, high-technology and industrial centers and hotels.

Greenbelt is the hub of what has been coined the "Billion Dollar Circle" — where the Baltimore-Washington Parkway, Capital Beltway, Greenbelt Road and Kenilworth Avenue all come together. Here three office complexes — Capital Office Park, Maryland Trade Center Park and The Golden Triangle — have been given Priority Project status by the Prince Georges County Economic Development Corporation (EDC). Working under contract to the county, EDC is a private, non-profit organization promoting economic development within the county.

EDC's current publication, "Follow Success to Prince George's County, Maryland, describes Greenbelt as follows: "... the model planned community of Greenbelt has always sought quality development. That policy is visible today in custom-built houses and in residential projects like Glen Ora and Greenwood Village; and in office parks like the Maryland Trade Center, the Golden Triangle and Capital Office Park. The city's ... retail centers are active, as the biggest, Beltway Plaza Regional Shopping Mall, continues to expand, and the newest, Greenway Center, continues to run ahead of forecasts."

The mushrooming of intense development in Greenbelt and its environs has, however, caused serious traffic problems, especially in Greenbelt East (that part of the city east of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway:. Over the years the city has argued that public improvements, highways in particular, should be in place before development is permitted to go forward. Now that reconstruction of the Greenbelt Road/Kenilworth Avenue interchange is underway and other improvements, such as the extension of Hanover Parkway, are programmed, concern is being voiced that their completion will signal further development of still-vacant lands, so that roads will continue to be clogged.

The same concern about over-development has caused successive Greenbelt city councils to oppose widening of Kenilworth Avenue extended northward to Muirkirk Road and Route 1. It is believed inevitable that such widening would bring increased traffic, especially trucks, into the city.

The Greenbelt News Review in coming months will publish an ongoing series of articles on commercial and residential development projects in the city.

seasons and maximize energy conservation. The warm gray structures consist of precast concrete and window overhangs giving protection from the summer

Bernardo pointed out that while the fourth existing building stands alone, it is "architecturally harmonious" with those built earlier. There is the same strong sculptured look, the solar bronze and thermopane window glass and site orientation. Building 4, he said, is the "transition build-ing" which ties in the existing design with the new conceptwhere precast concrete and window overhangs still predominate but, for the first time, some reflective insulating glass was introduced to eliminate the need for overhangs.

"The Jewel"

The blue reflective glass, which Bernardo describes as "the jewel of that composition," is the hallmark of Building 5. This time, pure wire precast concrete is utilized. The newest structure will house state-of-the art energy efficiency and life safety systems,

as well as an underground garage. A fitness center is planned.

The building's main entrance off Ivy Lane leads into a high tech lobby with plastic laminates on some walls, polished stainless steel column covers and elevator doors, and marble floors. A land-scaped patio area will tie Buildings 5 and 6 together.

Perkins described parking areas as heavily landscaped and at various grades to avoid a "flat look."

"They echo the forms of the buildings," said Bernardo. Parking areas will be reached from Kenilworth Avenue via Ivy Lane. and later from the yet-to-be-built Cherrywood Lane.

The 10-story Building 6 will join its twin "when market conditions are favorable," said Perkins. The buildings are sited on 19.5 acres between Ivy Lane and the future Cherrywood Lane which will span the Beltway and connect with Kenilworth Avenue when Metrorail is completed.

The Capital Office Park master plan calls for Buildings 7 and 8

East-bound Lanes Open On Greenbelt Road Bridge

The next phase of the reconstruction of the Greenbelt Road Kenilworth Avenue intersection began on the afternoon of Monday, December 15 when east-bound traffic on Greenbelt Road began using the new bridge over what will be Kenilworth Avenue.

Mike Snyder, District Engineer of the State Highway Administration said that the traffic delays experienced Tuesday were due in part to the timing of the lights, and part to the separation of the lights for Greenbelt Road traffic.

Snyder said the Wednesday morning rush hour traffic was much better than Tuesday's and that things should improve over the next few days as the crew fine-tunes the traffic signal timing. He noted that when the initial detour was begun a year ago it took three to four days to fully adjust the signals.

However, Snyder said that delays should be expected due to the separation of the Greenbelt road signals until westbound traffic begins using the bridge. That is, since the Greenbelt Road traffic now requires two separate signals, more time is required for a full signal cycle. The rains predicted for Wednesday and Thursday may delay required asphalt work, but Snyder expects all Greenbelt Road traffic to be using the bridge by the end of the year.

Once westbound Greenbelt road traffic is shifted, no further traffic pattern changes are expected for about six months. Snyder said the entire reconstruction project is still expected to be completed by mid-summer of next year.

Within the next few days, children will be out of school and, most likely, flying down sideand driveways on new skates, bikes or just plain footpower in the excitement of holiday play.

And joggers - old and new will be out in new suits, shoes or whatever. And the beware part is that most of them - and some of the children - will be in the street.

This week, police in the metropolitan Washington area are publicizing their crackdown on drunk drivers, and drivers and pedestrians alike must watch for this obvious danger. But in Greenbelt, where walkways are prevalent and walking is almost a Greenbelt virtue, residents may be lulled into thinking that the dangers are only out there on the Beltway or Greenbelt Road.

Not so, comments PFC Patrick McAndrew of the Greenbelt Police Department. Recently. a resident was very seriously injured by a car driven into her as she got into her own car. There appears to be little she could have done to avoid the accident.

The last two pedestrian fatalities in Greenbelt, however, might have been avoided. Both people were struck down while walking in the road after dark, one in an



Fond Memories

To the Editor:

On a recent Monday evening, traveled from Frederick to Greenbelt to retrieve some of my early News Review stories. Accompanied by my 13-year old son, I endured the ups and downs of Beltway traffic, finally landing in the parking lot at Greenbelt Plaza Apartments.

I was a staffer on the News Review from 1976 to 1982, a little over five years. But for a fire which destroyed our building in Greenbelt Plaza, I'm sure I would still be coming to the News Review every week to type and write news stories.

On this particular rainy Monday night, re-entering that subterranean room, with its blazing orange walls, eclectic office furnishings and diverse decor was a bittersweet walk down memory lane for me. After gathering several years' worth of yearbooks, I hauled them to a nearby table and began paging through Greenbelt history. Brief as my stories were back then, they began to appear in those volumes, from the first four paragraph account about the "Nook and Cranny" back in 1977, winding down through succeeding years with a piece on refunding, a reenact-ment of Leo Gerton's famous fish fry and tidbits on Utopia events.

While gingerly flipping through those books. I found articles by other gifted former Greenbelters and by the time I had finished this mental flashback nearly three hours had elapsed. I was having so much fun I didn't realize that time had sped by so quickly. Ignoring my son's pleadings to go home, I pulled about 30 old newspapers from the bank of files, all the time talking to the editor and snatching looks around the office.

"Something is different about this place", I thought. Then I realized that there were newer pieces of furniture and typewriters, and that a network of pipes on the ceiling had been relieved of their asbestos coverings. "That must be it," I thought. Frankly, the office looks a lot better now.

As I drove home, memories of past Tuesday nights kept coming back as the mile markers melted away. In that room, aided by some of the most dedicated pro-

fessionals I've ever met, I discovere dthe joy of writing. I had lived through many rollercoaster moments while going through those first stories, but I wouldn't trade the News Review experience for all the Pulitzers in the world.

As I drove on, the bustle and clamor of a new issue being born came to mind. Some excerpts:

"Do we go to eight pages or

"Who has the head sheet?"

From a baffled typist to the editor: "Mary Lou, what is this

"I really enjoyed your last story, Hally."

'Harry, that hat beats them

"Who scarfed the tape?" "There's a hole in this type-writer ribbon!"

And from a hassled editor trying to think through this din: "Shhhhhhhhh.!!"

Add to these voices the almost constant entering and exiting of nearly every citizen in Greenbelt, assorted children and an occasional stray cat. you have one of the most vital hubs of ongoing activity in the city. Contrary to what many people may think, Greenbelt's action isn't happening solely at the many meetings the City Council chambers. It's happening in the News Review office. For a few hectic hours each week, this is the heart of the city of Greenbelt.

With much regret, my family and I left Greenbelt and now live in a different community about 40 miles north. We've come to think of the bustling city as home, but old habits die hard. Even now, nearly five years later, I still think I should be going to the News Review office on Tuesday nights. In my mind's eye, I'm still there, plunking away on that old museum piece of a . . . typewriter, helping get yet another issue of the paper out on time.

As the News Review begins its 50th year of continuous publication, a former staffer would like to wish the paper and its past. present and future staff a happy anniversary. Hopefully, with the support of the people of Greenbelt, there will be many more.







and the heliport to be located on about 16 acres off the new Cherrywood Lane.

A decision has not been made on building a gas station on Ivy Lane near the State Highway Administration building.

Leasing 4

"We don't suffer the same leasing problems as some other developments in the Greenbelt area," said Perkins.

Since the first building made its debut in January 1980, Capi-tall Office Park has been successful in its leasing efforts. Except for temporary vacancies, the four existing buildings remain fully leased. In the county the vacancy rate for office buildings is about 15%. The rate is expected to fall, however, when the Federal tax reform bill is implemented, because reduction of tax shelters should slow future office building construction.

Perkins is upbeat about Capital Office Park's future. "We deal strictly in economics rather than tax benefits," he explained.

Jim Myrtle, business development specialist for the Prince Georges County Economic Development Corporation. attributes Capital Office Park's success to

easy access to highways, airports and rail; to its high visibility on the Beltway; and to its highquality design and construction.

Greenbelt, he noted, is located strategically in the middle of the Baltimore - Washington corridor (including Annapolis) near governmental agencies - National Aeronautics and Space Administration and Beltsville Agricultural Research Center - and institutions of higher learning, such as the University of Maryland, Prince Georges Community College and Capital Institute of Technology.

According to Myrtle. road improvements that are underway and planned in the Greenbelt area and the expected arrival of Metrorail in the mid-1990's also make Greenbelt a choice location in the corridor for commercial, industrial and residential devel-





Asst. Manager Arrested In Drug Fair Robbery

by Jack Brickman The assistant manager of the Drug Fair at Beltway Plaza and two male accomplices have been arrested by Greenbelt police in the armed robbery of the store in which the assistant manager was employed, according to po-lice spokesman Pat McAndrew. Shortly before the store's midnight closing time on Saturday. December 13 the three men, carrying handguns and a sawedoff .22 caliber rifle, entered the store. In an effort to conceal their identity during the robbery one man wore a paper bag over

his head, another wore a nylon

stocking and the third held a hat

over his face. They made off with over \$12,000 in cash.

Greenbelt police detectives William Allwang and Tim Hahn, investigating the robbery, learned from store employees that they had recognized the voice of one of the holdup men as that of the store's assistant manager. Talbert A. Simpson, age 25, of Silver Spring. Following up on this information. Detectives Allwang and Hahn arrested Simpson at his home and recovered the weap ons which had been used in the robbery, together with \$3,279 of the stolen money. Simpson had been employed at the store for about two months. according to

McAndrew. Through further investigation detectives Allwang and Hahn were able to identify Simpson's two accomplices.
