# Location of Projected New Sidewalk Along Crescent Unresolved by Council

On Monday, February 9, the Greenbelt City Council held both a public hearing and a regular session and still finished business in little more than an hour. Even moving two items from the consent agenda did not delay the conclusion of business.

The public hearing continued a hearing on January 27, which in turn had been a rescheduled meeting because of bad weather earlier. The subject was the proposed reconstruction of Eastway, reconstruction of Hillside Road from Crescent to Northway and construction of a sidewalk on Crescent Road from Hillside to Gardenway. City Manager James Giese explained that the roads would be reconstructed to a 40foot width with concrete curbs and gutters. Five-foot concrete sidewalks would be provided on the north side of Eastway and the west side of Hillside Road. In addition to the five-foot concrete sidewalk along Crescent Road. a short sidewalk would be built from the corner of Gardenway and Crescent Road over a dirt path that connects with the inner walkway. A fence would be necessary alongside the Gardenway underpass because the sidewalk will cross over the underpass.

Only one citizen was present for the hearing. Penny Koines of 60 Court Crescent explained that it was her first time to appear before council. She asked council to consider putting the Crescent Road sidewalk on the inner curve. Present plans call for a sidewalk on the outer curve, where the homes are located. However, Koines felt the other side was more widely used by people getting into and out of cars which were parked on that side. She noted that the area was a muddy mess from people's walking there. She also suggested that it might be less expensive to construct the sidewalk there since it would be shorter on the inner curb.

#### **Decision Deferred**

After the public hearing was adjourned, the subject came up again in the regular council session. The staff, however, recommended that the matter be deferred because of the significant differences between cost estimates and money available for the projects. Community Development Block Grant Funds of \$173,000 were available for the projects. However, the engineers have es-timated that about \$80,000 in addition would be needed to complete the projects.

The Advisory Planning Board has suggested that the Crescent Road sidewalk be located on the inside of the road and that the Eastway sidewalk meander away from the street instead of being adjacent to the curb. Council niember Thomas White noted that the Crescent Road residents he had spoken with favored a sidewalk on the inside of Crescent because that is where the cars park, the residents feel there is more pedestrian traffic on that side and they are concerned about placing a sidewalk close to drivedays and yards. Giese was not sure about the availability of adequate public land and the way the sidewalk would be handled around the underpass if it were on the inside of the curve. Council Member Toni Bram suggested that placing the sidewalk on the other side ought to be considered. Mayor Gil Weidenfeld hoped council would receive more comments from residents affected.

#### Other Business

In other business, council--Introduced for first reading an ordinance to amend city personnel regulations to bring them into conformance with requirements of the Federal Government imposed under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

-Introduced for first reading and suspension of the rules for final approval of an amendment to a resolution authorizing the negotiated purchase of equipment to participate in the county's Criminal Justice Information System. The original resolution Information had contained the price of a single printer rather than four.

-Asked staff to collect information about grants for possible renovation of North End School from the Citizens Concerned for a North End Center, as well as to explore the possibility of energy grants. Staff would then organize the information and send copies to council and the Community Relations Advisory Board. On the consent agenda, coun-

The second part of the twopart "Greenbelt's History" series will take place on Wednesday, February 25, 7-9 p.m., at the Greenbelt Library meeting room. Co-sponsored by the library and the Prince Georges Community College, under the auspices of Greenbelt's 50th Anniversary Committee, the first half of the series explored the city's roots in the Resettlement Administration of Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

Part Two will delve into the community life of early residents and explore the physical changes to the city over the last 20 years. Elizabeth Allen, librarian in charge of the Rexford Tugwell collection. will discuss the social fabric Greenbelt's pioneers fashioned in creating cooperatives and a host of institutions, including the county's first public kindergarten.

City Manager James K. Giese will review the development years. As City Manager for the last 24 years. Giese has guide Greenbelt from a community of homes with one small shopping center (Beltway Plaza was just under construction when he ar rived) to the current period o explosive commercial growth How and why these changes occurred still provokes many questions as well as explanations.

# **GHI HEARS CITY PLANS** FOR STREETS, SIDEWALKS

At the regular Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board meeting on Thursday evening, February 12, Assistant City Manager Michael McLaughlin briefed board members and GHI staff on the next road improvement projects the city will be undertaking on Eastway, Crescent and Hillside. Also discussed were some individual issues brought up by members, and staff provided reports on the parking policy implementation and maintenance status.

The roadwork to be done in the Eastway-Crescent-Hillside area is a continuation of improvements aiready carried out at the south end of Greenbelt beyond Westway. McLaughlin said that this work involves widening the streets to a standard 40-foot width, which will have an impact or, adjacent residents' yards and means that some shrubbery and trees will have to be removed and replaced. The city will meet with affected residents in these areas. according to McLaughlin, Assistant GHI manager Steve Wright noted that "Some of these things will require GHI approval, since they affect common areas".

In addition to the roadwork which will include curbs and gutters, new sidewalks are planned along the north side of Eastway. the west side of Hillside and the east side of Crescent Road between Eastway and Hillside. These would be designed to tie in as much as possible to the internal walkway system. Mc-Laughlin agreed with some board members' comments that some of the sidewalk project could be eliminated, and emphasized that the city is interested in GHI's advice on this work because of the housing cooperative's involvement in the area under discussion. McLaughlin noted that this is likely to be the last such work to be undertaken in GHI areas, because the city needs to improve roads in other areas such a: Springhill Lake. In reply to questions from the board, Mc-Laughlin's estimate of the total cost of these improvements was about \$240,000, of which about \$160,000 could come from Community Development Block Grant funds. The sidewalks on Hillside and Eastway would cost about \$15,000 and \$\$9,000 respectively, not being a large part of the outlay.

One particular problem that was brought up by GHI Manager Ron Colton was Crescent Road at the Mobil station. where "people usually try to cross" the difficult (and dangerous) intersection) Colton said that "It would be good to encourage people to use the Gardenway underpass." in connection with the sidewalk network. Board member Nancy Hut. chins agreed, saying "This is a real problem." and suggested that the city put in crosswalks or reroute the walkway to the underpass.

Board member Ray McCawley was of the opinion that the proposed Crescent Road sidewalk should be dropped, and moved to approve the major roadwork on the three streets with omission of that sidewalk. Board member Chuck Hess agreed with this. When informed that the city staff's suggested priority list was for Eastway roadwork to be done first, then Hillside roadwork, Hillside sidewalk, Eastway sidewalk and lastly Crescent sidewalk, McCawley amended his motion in that way and the motion passed.

On a related matter, McLaughlin noted that since the roadwork has been completed in the south end of Greenbelt, the issue of a sidewalk along the Crescent-Ridge curve has been clarified so that it is worth reconsidering. Hutchins therefore moved to request the city to complete the sidewalk from 7 Court Crescent to the intersection of Ridge and Westway, along the outer side of the curving road. This motion was also passed. (To be Continued)




#### Lecture on Nutrition to Be At Library on Feb. 23

## **Resident Admits Holdup At Co-op Supermarket**

#### by Jack Brickman In a holdup-robbery which took place about 12:30 p.m. Sunday, February 15 at the Co-op Supermarket, 121 Centerway in Roosevelt Center, a man in the express checkout lane pulled a handgun and demanded the money from cash register. The female the cashier was terrified when, according to police spokesman Pat McAndrew, the man poked the weapon into the cashier's side and pulled the trigger. The gun did not discharge. She gave him \$180 from the register and he fled through the front door.

Officer Tom Keifline, investigating the robbery, was able to gather information from store employees and others pointing to a suspect whose photograph was on file with Prince George's County police as the result of a previous arrest. The robbery victim was shown the photograph and McAndrew reports that she positively identified the man in the photo as the robber. Keifline then obtained an arrest warrant for the suspect. Ray Nash Lewis, 29, of 7076 Hanover Parkway. He arrested Lewis at that address on Monday, February 16. The handgun used in the robbery, recovered at the time of the arrest, proved to be a pellet gun, says McAndrew, and it had not fired when the trigger had been pulled during the robbery because it had been empty.

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
