CFG Is Briefed on Roads Issues; Holds Annual Membership Meeting

An overall view of transportation issues in the Greenbelt area was given by Frank Derro, at the Citizens for Greenbelt (CFG) annual meeting on Thursday, March 2. Derro is on the staff of the transportation planning division, Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission.

Derro spoke about what is presently contained in the Master Plan for the Greenbelt area.

At the urging of those present, he concentrated on potential plans for Kenilworth Avenue. Using a large map of the area, he drew circles around the major employment areas in the county: Greenbelt, Laurel, Bowie, Largo, the University of Maryland, Port America, and Andrews Air Force Base, where thousands of jobs are expected to be added in the next few years. This increase will expand the need for added transportation facilities, he said.

Derro explained that SubRegion I on the Master Plan, the area north of Greenbelt, is rapidly developing. Planning and zoning are an attempt to make sure supporting facilities will be in place to cope with the density of population and employment.

One problem is how to get people to and from the employment centers efficiently and economically. Nine out of 10 people will probably do it by car, Derro said. As an example he noted that two-thirds of the people going to work in the District of Columbia go by car—one-third single car drivers and one-third in car or van pools. The remaining third use public transportation. Thus, said Derro, more roads are needed.

Derro listed two proposed road changes that would affect Greenbelt: an extension of Kenilworth Avenue, and a planned closing of the Crescent Road/Kenilworth Avenue intersection across from the District III offices. Because the intersection is too close to the Beltway exit, it will be moved to Ivy Lane. However, how to do it is for Greenbelt to decide, he said, because it is a local issue.

On the other hand, Kenilworth Avenue is needed for north-south traffic. Because I-95, the B-W Parkway, and Route 1 also serve north-south traffic, Derro believes that Kenilworth will serve

mostly for local trips, most of them originating or ending in Greenbelt. To back up this contention, he explained that Kenilworth will be a major arterial to a two-million sq. ft. office building near the College Park Metro station, Westchester, Golden Triangle, Capital Office Park and Greenway Center. East of Springhill Lake and the railroad there are hundreds of acres of industrially zoned land; however, much of it is flood plain. Three thousand parking spaces will be needed for the Greenbelt Metro station. There will be a lot of interest, Derro said, for development in the Greenbelt Metro area. All of this means a need for roads, but Kenilworth will be a crucial link.

Eunice Coxon lamented the proposal to fill in wetlands such as Schrom Hills, the Metro area and Greenhome and O'Mara. Metro is a foregone conclusion, Derro answered, but the transit authority does have to meet federal requirements. That is one reason they are behind schedule with the Greenbelt Metro station.

To a complaint from Marsha Barrett that it is not possible to cross Kenilworth Avenue safely on foot, Derro replied that when the new intersection was planned 10 years ago, homes in Berwyn Heights and Greenbelt were miles from the intersection and people "shouldn't want to walk" there. He added that bike and hiker trails were added to many of the roads.

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld asked if there were any backup plans for an alternate route, should the wetlands prevent further extension. Derro thought that it would be difficult but not impossible to find an alternative.

To Ann Pisano's query about why more roads are needed, since the county executive had announced a slowing down of development, Derro indicated that these plans are for providing "transportation movements" for what had already been approved. Since development tends to go in cycles, he added, five years or so from now when development picks up again, the roads will be there. There are just pockets of land left to be developed in Greenbelt, he said, but south of Greenbelt there are thousands of acres. As long as these stay in private hands, they will eventually be developed. The only way to stop it is for the county to own it as parkland.

When Pisano asked what impact citizens could have on the Master Plan, Derro replied that citizens have to go to every public hearing on the Master Plan and make themselves heard.

Membership Actions

CFG's meeting took place before and after the speaker. President Marvin Holmes presided.

Membership chairman Eunice Coxon introduced Benjamin Ab-

ramowitz, local artist, sculptor and teacher, who was to announce the winner of CFG's logo contest. "There are no winners, no losers," Abramowitz said. He went on to explain why none of the entries had been chosen. Although there were good entries, none represented the Citizens for Greenbelt but seemed more environmental. Most also could not be easily reproduced for letterheads, as logos are usually used. Abramowitz thought it was important for contestants to research the history of the organization. "The logo has to last a long time," he said. "It has to be very simple." "We want someone to win this as much as you want to win it," he added. "We should be able to produce one little logo."

He offered an hour of his time to anyone who needs it and started that evening by meeting in the hall with some of the contestants who were present. Coxon announced that the contest would remain open and that all Greenbelters from high school age on up would be eligible to enter.

School Site Vote

Secretary Ruth Kastner explained to members that although CFG members had voted in favor of a new school at the North End school site at the previous meeting, the motion was null. A perusal of CFG minutes had resulted in finding that at the 1987 annual meeting, the group had voted in favor of using North End for a community center. In order for the organization to vote in favor of using the North End property as a school site, she said, the first motion would have to be rescinded and then another vote taken. This could be done at this meeting, she said, but since notice had not been given it would take a two-thirds vote. If notice had been given, only a majority vote would be needed.

Barry Schlesinger, chairman of the planning and zoning committee, offered three issues that he hoped the group would act on. (1) a request by Greenhome and O'Mara for rezoning of a tract of land near Westchester Park presently zoned residential (Yeager tract); (2) a bill before the state legislature that would exclude the directors of the Park and Planning Commission from the merit system; and (3) a bill which would change the rules for night zoning hearings so that 25 parties-of-record would be needed and also the support of the council member who lived in that district. The group voted to support the need for only 10 parties-of-record and no council member support. The first two failed.

A bylaw change was passed to allow the membership to set the amount of dues. Coxon then moved that dues be increased to \$2 per year, effective May 1. This also passed overwhelmingly.

SCHROM HILLS PARK MASTER PLAN TOPIC OF PUBLIC MEETING

The public is invited to comment on the master plan for the new Schrom Hills Park at a public meeting to be held Monday March 13 at 8 p.m. in the city council chambers. The current master plan for the park has evolved from three earlier sessions last year, at which citizens talked about what they would like to see in the park. City consultant Grace Fielder, of Greenman & Pedersen of Laurel then put these ideas into a plan for the park.

At the first public hearing on June 15 citizens gave Fielder a wish list of ideas for the park. At the second meeting on September 27 she presented two plans for the park showing how various recreation facilities could be placed in the area.

The plan shown at the November meeting by the consultant was the one picked by the citizens, with added suggestions from the September 27 meeting.

Schrom Hills Park is a 41-acre site located north and east of Hanover Parkway and south of Greenbrook development. \$415,000 will be available to develop the park, mostly from the city's \$6 million bond issue and from grants. The city is still trying to acquire several more acres for the park.

Master Plan Description

The master plan for the park calls for the entrance to be located across from Space Court, with parking and two small buildings (one rest room/storage, one concession/office) nearby, and an allé, an aisle formed by a formal planting of trees, leading north into the park.

On either side of the allé area will be ball fields, one a softball field and the other a combined soccer and football field. Because of topographical and geological considerations, the fields would have to be located at the southern end of the park.

The northern section of the park will have a pond or will remain as wetlands, for it will function as a stormwater management facility. A maintenance trail will run around it and through the park. The central section of the park will remain in its wooded, natural state.

Other suggestions for the park include: nature trail through the wooded area, informal play area, picnic areas, playgrounds, a sledding hill on the steep eastern slope and wildflower plantings on the steep western slope along Hanover Parkway.

Three issues were in contention at the planning sessions: the pond, ballfield lights and parking.

It is still not known whether a pond will be built in the northern end of the park or whether the area will remain as wetlands. The United States Army Corps

Sandy Bowers, for the nominating committee, presented the following slate of candidates for the 1989-90 year: president, Marvin Holmes; vice-president, Julian Weiss; secretary, Ruth Kastner; treasurer, Alan Freas. Ruth Kastner was nominated for president from the floor. There was no second to the nomination. The slate of candidates was then voted by acclamation. Later Ruth Kastner pointed out that she had looked at the bylaws and could find no need for a second to a nomination. She added that she was just bringing it up so that this would be on the record for another time.

Holmes appointed Betty Maffay and Leonie Penney to an ad hoc audit committee. He also announced that there was no chair for the transportation or health committee and asked members to consider taking on one of these jobs.

of Engineers will make the decision. The Corps believes wetlands help filter out pollutants and silt.

The question of whether to put lights at the ballfields excited much controversy. Neighbors of the park do not want lights, but citizens associated with sports teams have said there is a real need for more lighted ballfields in the city, (see News Review 12/22/88).

Ninety parking spaces are called for in the master plan of the park. People have expressed concern that there may not be enough parking spaces.

At the November 22 meeting Fielder estimated that the total construction cost would be \$1,073,967. Of this, \$416,300 would be the cost for clearing, grading, site landscaping and associated activities.

The softball area is estimated to cost \$144,387, including fence, bleachers, backstop, with \$11,000 for lighting the parking lot and field. The soccer field is estimated to cost \$112,815 with, again, \$11,000 for parking and field lighting.

Development of the allé would cost \$257,588, with \$104,000 allotted for surface paving stones and \$63,000 for the two small buildings.

Other park facilities were estimated to cost a total of \$142,876. These would include an eight-foot paved path, \$32,940; an eight-foot unpaved path, \$23,000, and playground equipment \$15,000.

The city council's Advisory Planning Board (APB) reviewed the Schrom Hills Park master plan on February 1. It recommended: no lighting for the ballfields; shifting the softball field to provide room for expansion of the parking area; asking the consultant to re-evaluate the need for parking at the park; recommending that council seek funds for the completion of Hanover Parkway, including sidewalk; and if no pond is built, having council allocate additional funds to design amenities for the wetlands.

The city council's Parks and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB) has reviewed the master plan but has yet to issue a report. Chair Keith Chernikoff said that PRAB has some disagreements with the plan.

Error Found

I stand by my statement that the school board's claim that the North End site is somehow closer to more students is incorrect. However, I have found an error in my calculation of straight-line student distances to Center School and the North End site. My corrected figure is that the North End site is, on average, 15% farther from the student population than Center School, not 29% as I previously reported.

Although the school board has yet to substantiate their claim, I would be happy to provide data supporting my own conclusions upon request.

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Driver Loses His Life In Two-Truck Collision

The driver of a pick-up truck lost his life late Monday morning, March 6, when he lost control of his vehicle, struck a refuse truck and ran into a ditch, according to a report by Pfc. David A. Buerger of the Greenbelt Police Department. The driver was headed south on Edmonston Rd. just south of Cherrywood Lane. He was transported to Prince Georges Hospital where he was later pronounced dead as a result of his injuries.

The Beltsville refuse truck, which had been headed north on Edmonston Road, flipped onto its side following the impact. The driver received only minor injuries and did not require medical assistance at the scene, police said. Police believe weather and road conditions were a contributing factor, but the exact cause of the accident was still under investigation.

Magnet School Application Procedures Outlined

Two options — the "first-come first-served" general session and a lottery — are available to register applications for the Prince Georges County School System's magnet school programs for the 1989-90 school year.

For the first option, an application for each child needs to be submitted in person at the "first-come first-served" session on Friday, Mar. 17, at Largo High School, 505 Largo Road, Largo. Multiple applications may be submitted by one individual at this session, as long as all such applications are for the children of the same immediate family. Applications may be submitted by a non-family member such as a friend or neighbor. This session will accept applications for 70 percent of the available seats in next year's programs.

For the lottery option, an application for each child must be received by mail or hand delivery by Friday, March 31. The lottery itself will be held on April 21 through a computerized random selection method. Two groups of applications are eligible for this lottery: all applications received by the March 31 deadline, and all applications not accepted through "first-come first-served" process. Duplicate applications will be discarded. This process will accept applications for 30 percent of the avail-





Police Blotter


