School Transfer Issues Discussed By City Council and School Board

The Greenbelt City Council met with representatives of the Prince Georges County School Board on July 18 to discuss issues relating to the transfer of the city-owned North End School for Center School. The city and school system staffs will develop an agreement for the transfer, with additional meetings between council and school representatives only if issues emerge that cannot be resolved by the staffs.

In a survey conducted by the school board and in the June 29 bond referendum, Greenbelt citizens indicated their preference for a new elementry school on the site of the city-owned North End School, with Center School converted to a city community center. Now the city, the school board and the county must agree on terms for the exchange. An all-day planning session will be held in the city on August 2 so that citizens can participate in planning the new school.

The main point of contention between the city and the school board was the city's request that all asbestos at Center School either be removed or encapsulated before the building is turned over to the city. Associate Superintendent of Schools Frank Tracy assured the city that all federal standards for asbestos in schools have been met. Director of Planning John Huffman said that testing showed the ceiling tiles to be asbestos free.

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld noted replacement of the heating system will require removal of some asbestos and requested that this be done before the transfer. However, Deputy Superintendent Ed Fellegy said that the city must assume that responsibility since the school system had no immediate plans to replace that equipment. Fellegy said that he would provide the city with the results of an asbestos analysis for Center.

The city's other main concern was preservation of the wooded area around the North End site. While the school representatives said that they could not make any definite statements about how much of the land could be left undisturbed until later in the planning process, they professed sensitivity for the preservation of woodlands. Fellegy noted that the school system had no desire to disturb land if it is not needed for educational purposes.

Greenbelt School Board representative Suzanne Plogman noted that she had received a letter from one of the homeowners closest to the site and that the nearby residents would be invited to participate in the planning process.

Huffman said that in previous discussions, citizens had requested that a separate driveway and bus loading zone be provided. However, provision of such a zone will require placing the building further back on the site, increasing the loss of woodlands.

David Lange asked about a dispute between the school board and the county library system over the boundary between the library and Center School, most notably who owned the parking lot. School Board attorney Paul Nussbaum denied that there was a dispute, saying that the library lease clearly leaves the lot in the board of education property. However, he said that he was 'not in a position to answer" Lange's question of whether the lot would be transferred to the city

Other Concerns

There was little debate, or even discussion, about the city's' other requests for Center School. These items included city access to the school for inspections before the transfer, assurance that the building will be properly maintained, transfer of the kitchen equipment in working condition and an historic inventory of fixtures and equipment.

The city also asked the school representatives to consider whether they would like to rent some space in Center School after the transfer. Weidenfeld explained that the city would be interested in providing space for recreational, educational or cultural activities of benefit to residents and others. In addition, he said that although the city was not primarily interested in leasing out office space, if the city cannot immediately utilize the entire building, the city might rent some of it to help defray operating costs. Fellegy said that they had no immediate plans to rent space for either purposes, but would take it into consideration now that they know it is a possibility.

North End School

The city also had some concerns about the new school to be built on the North End site. Again, most of these topics met with no opposition from school system representatives. In addition to preservation of green space, the city sought opportunities for the city and its citizens to participate in planning the school and hoped for a joint use agreement for the athletic fields and other facilities.

One request, for community center facilities such as exist in Deerfield Elementary School in Laurel, received a negative hearing. Fellegy noted that although the school system would like to comply, the Deerfield facility, he said, had been built with assistance from the Maryland National Park and Planning Commission. Since that assistance is no longer available, Fellegy indicated that the budget would

determine what can be provided. Plogman noted that, at minimum, city groups will be able to use the school on a rental basis.

The budget similarly will determine whether the city's final request, for a hardwood floor in the gym, can be met. Fellegy said the school representatives will look at that request, but that it may have to be done on an "if bid accommodates" basis.

Schedule

Director of Planning John Huffman said that the school system must provide a rough schematic design for the new elementary school to the state by September 1 in order to receive funding. The planning process will be completed between then and June 1990, at which time construction will begin. The school should then be completed in time for the beginning of the 1992-93 school year.

Citizens May Participate In School Design Phase

The Prince Georges County Public Schools will conduct two sessions on the schematic design for the new elementary school to be constructed on the North End Elementary School site.

The first session will be held Monday, July 31 at the William Paca Instructional Services/Staff Development Center, 7801 Sheriff Road, Landover at 1:30 p.m. This session will provide the instructional and supervisory staff an opportunity to assist in designing the new school to meet the county's educational standards.

The second session will be held Wednesday, August 2 at the Center School Media Center from 1 to 6 p.m. This session will provide an opportunity for community leaders and citizens participation in the initial design phase.

R. C. Garcia of the SHWC, Inc. Architect - Engineers - Planners will conduct the design ses-

In order to receive state funding for the school, a schematic design must be submitted to the Interagency Committee on School Construction by September 1.

RABBI & MRS. KENNETH BERGER KILLED IN IOWA PLANE CRASH

Former Greenbelter Rabbi Kenneth R. Berger, age 42, and his wife, Aviva, age 40, were among the passengers killed in the crash of United Airlines Flight 232 in Sioux City, Iowa on July 19. Two of their children who were on the flight were injured. Avigayl, age 16, is hospitalized in serious condition and Jonathan, age 8, is in satisfactory condition. Not traveling with the family was the Berger's third child, Ilona, age 13, who was at Camp Perlman in Starlight, Pennsylvania.

Rabbi Berger, Mishkan Torah's spiritual leader from 1974 to 1981, was a member of the first graduating class of the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in Philadelphia. During his tenure at Mishkan Torah, the Conservative synagogue became the first in the metropolitan area to affiliate also with the Reconstructionist movement. It was the first synagogue in Prince Georges County and the third in the area to have its religious school granted full accreditation by the Metropolitan Washington Board of Jewish Education. Rabbi Berger and his wife spent summers in B'nai Brith's Camp Perlman, where the rabbi was on

At the time of his death Rabbi Berger led the congregation of Temple Rodeph Shalom in Tampa, Florida.

During his years in Greenbelt, Rabbi Berger participated in community affairs and enjoyed marching with the clergy in the Labor Day parade and working at the Mishkan Torah booth during the festivities. He was an active member of the Greenbelt Clergy.

Reflecting on the Greenbelt Clergy and his friendship with Rabbi Berger, the Reverend Edward Birner of the Holy Cross Lutheran Church, said, "It was a significant time for Greenbelt's religious leaders, who built up a marvelous relationship through our discussions and our meetings with theologians. . . . Kenny was so open to this kind of discussion."

Rev. Birner said that he and his wife, Nancy, were reminiscing about the times we had Sabbath dinner with Kenny and Aviva and about the time we became the (temporary) "sole owners" of all the 'chometz" food before the Passover holiday. He said, "I know the Bergers were responsible for planting trees in our name in Israel."

Reverend Birner also recounted that when the Greenbelt Clergy group was formed, he wondered "whether we could speak the name of Jesus Christ in front of the rabbi." Rabbi Berger's response was, Mr. Bir-

ner said, "Ed, nothing you would say would ever offend me."

Rabbi Berger also brought to the group an awareness of all clergy besides the Christian-Judaic religions.

The rabbi has been described as caring and "always being there" when someone was in need. Rabbi Saul Grife, the present rabbi of Mishkan Torah, called him a "great friend and wonderful colleague from whom I learned a lot."

Arnold Strasser, a former president of the congregation, said, "Ken was a man who pushed himself and others to look beyond what they thought of themselves and to think big and to be first class." Jordan Choper observed, "The rabbi touched a lot of people and brought out their abilities for leadership in the synagogue and Jewish community."

"Rabbi Berger was a regular guy—he enjoyed children and played on the synagogue softball team," recalled Dave Herschler, president of the congregation.

Aviva Berger's friends remembered her as caring and willing to participate when called upon. She was born in Israel and had served in the Israeli army.

Choper described Aviva as "a very strong individual with a quiet manner. She was concerned about her children's welfare and fheir activities as well as the activities of the synagogue. Mindful of being the rabbi's wife, she was skilled in getting her ideas across in a diplomatic manner."

In addition to their children, Rabbi and Mrs. Berger are survived by Rabbi Berger's parents, Jules and Lillian Berger of Philadelphia, and two brothers, Barry and Sam and Aviva's mother of Florida, a sister and brother.

A memorial service will be held tonight, Thursday, July 27, at 8 p.m. at the Mishkan Torah. Expressions of sympathy may be made in the form of donations to the Rabbi Kenneth and Aviva Berger Memorial Fund for Furthering Education, c/o Mishkan Torah, Ridge and Westway Roads, Greenbelt 20770.





"Newtown Approaches" To the Editor:

In dealing with the result of the recent referendum, we must do everything possible to make sure Center School works as a community activities facility. The programs proposed for Center School must be provided adequate space, improved accessibility to Center School must be assured, and the other elements of the entire center area must be strongly linked. In other words the strong interrelationship originally envisioned in 1937 is vital to realizing a well patronized, thriving program at Center However, to achieve these high goals, it will be necessary for the city to broaden its definition of a Community Center so that it includes the library, the museum, the recreational facilities, the commercial center and immediately surrounding residential areas.

Therefore, I propose that the City, in conjunction with Federal, State and County governments and private sector developers, establish the Rosevelt Community Center Economic Development Corporation.

This corporation would provide public/private sector monies for: (1) low interest loans to private developers, keeping the cost of ommercial proprenovation of community erties down; (2) property improvements (e.g., to cover funding not projected in renovation of maintenance 3) meeting ex-Center School needs, (4) panded parki nkage between strengthening various facilit (e.g., the conhe recreation verted school mmercial cencenter and th ter could all e linked via a

skywalk, impr

ing accessibility

and reducing pedestrian/vehicular conflict); (5) to facilitate transportation between sites outside the center, including the new metro site, further increasing accessibility to all of these community center activities.

If our Council and City Manager have the willingness to bring our city together through creative, newtown approaches, we will have made the best of our most recent decision.

Returning to work they were sent home for the rest of the day, according to a post office spokesman. Both men are now back on the job.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON Recycling and Refuse Collection Procedures

Citizens efforts and participation are essential to meet state and county mandates to considerably increase the city's recycling of waste materials. Therefore, Council is establishing an ad hoc committee to evaluate existing refuse collection procedures and to consider any modifications to increase the amount of waste materials to be recycled; to consider the efficiency of refuse collection procedures and convenience of service to refuse customers; to consider fees being charged; and to address ways and means of accomplishing recycling in areas presently not receiving city refuse service.

The committee shall consist of eleven members to be appointed by the Council:

A chairman to be selected by the Council;

Four residents of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. to be nominated by the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc.;

One resident each of Lakeside, Boxwood, Lakewood, and Woodland Hills to be nominated by their respective civic association; and

Two members from areas presently NOT receiving city refuse collection service.





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

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While enduring these hot muggy days, one little piece of plastic can cause a world of overheating problems to your late model vehicle. With the newer stream-lined body contour that our vehicles incorporate and the limited front grill area, fresh air entry is limited. Mounted underneath the front grill area. approximately 12-16 inches in back of the bumper area, there is a plastic air directional wing. This piece of plastic directs fresh air into the front grill area and radiator for cooling at highway speeds. Without it, at highway speeds and engine overload there is just not enough fresh air circulation for cooling. The most common problem with these air wings is that they get knocked off when parking at front curb stops, and they also get removed without knowing just what function they serve.
