# GHI Extends Sidewalk Between 2, 4 Court Southway; Ban on Plant Removal Proposed

GHI will extend through to Southway the inner walkway between 2 and 4 courts of Southway, which currently dead-ends in front of 4A. This was the decision of the board at its July 13 meeting. The extension will ease access to their gardensides for residents of 2 and 4 Courts, as well as providing greater access to the inner walkway system for the community at large.

The issue, which had been discussed by GHI staff previously with the owners of 4-A Southway, was raised at this time because of the impending sale of the unit. GHI will relocate a dozen plants and shrubs belonging to 4-A that have grown in the access lane between the gardensides of the two courts, reset the yard line, and install a concrete sidewalk from the current end of the walkway to Southway.

Staff had recommended that GHI build a board fence along the 4-A yard line and the new walkway but the board declined.

"GHI doesn't build fences," stated board member Betty

Audit Committee Reports

The purchaser of 4-A, Suzanne Zappasodi, is a member of the board. She excused herself from discussion, noting for the record the possibility of a conflict of interest. This issue had been raised earlier by the Audit Committee in one of the three reports they submitted to the board. The committee noted that at the June 22 meeting. members of the board absented themselves during discussion or did not vote on items without mentioning a possible conflict of interest. The committee recommended that procedures be clarified in such cases. The matter was referred to staff for drafting of appropriate language.

President Wayne Williams, citing a conflict of interest, turned the gavel over to Andrea Haslinger for discussion of another Audit Committee report, concerning a request for a recount during the 1989 annual meeting. The board had discussed the issue at an earlier meeting, focused on whether a vote by card is equivalent to a need for counting again. The audit committee's report concluded that there is a more ser-

ious underlying issue, "whether a member has the right to request a recount, as provided in 'Robert's Rules", regardless of the method used for the initial vote."

The report further questioned whether the results of the vote should be accepted, particularly since the board had a personal interest in the outcome of the vote. (The request for a recount had come on a motion to amend a motion to amend a motion to amend the bylaws concerning indemnification of officers of the corporation.) The report was referred to the Nominations and Elections Committee.

In the third report, the Audit Committee noted that the board had passed a resolution authorizing the establishment of a petty cash checking account, but with no limits placed on the size of individual checks or the annual amount of the account. The committee recommended that the board reconsider its resolution and incorporate restrictions on the use and annual amounts of the petty cash account.

Bylaws

The board discussed, with a great deal of input from members in attendance, a process for review of the bylaws and drafting of any needed changes. Changes in Maryland corporation law in 1988 had raised questions concerning the comprehensiveness of the bylaws. In addition, previous revisions may have introduced internal inconsistencies.

Options for the revision process included review by an attorney, review by an outside consultant, comparison of the existing bylaws with a generic set of bylaws, review by the bylaws committee with input by the finance committee, and no revision whatsoever.

The board agreed that General Manager Ronald Colton would review the bylaws and generate an issues list by the first meeting in September. Drawing upon the resources he feels necessary, including advice of counsel and comparison with "generic" bylaws, he will identify any items missing and any internal inconsistencies that should be addressed by the board.

Court Party Ideas

Ann Townsend-Young of the Member and Community Relations Committee presented a draft of the packet the committee is preparing for Co-op Month, to help GHI members organize a court party. The packet will contain ideas and information for organizing and conducting a party, including items that can be obtained from the city, food facts, playground maps, and ways to inform court residents and nearby neighbors about the event.

Eunice Coxon wanted to know if stimulating sociability would encourage people to vote, volunteer for committees, and organize a crime watch. Townsend-Young said the committee welcomes suggestions on how to tie the crime watch into celebrating Co-op Month.

The packet will be advertised in the September issue of the GHI newsletter and will be available at the Labor Day reception.

#### Plant Ban

The Architecture and Environment Committee, in its report of June 13, had passed a motion recommending that GHI forbid its members from removing "perrennial plantings, yard border hedges, or other valuable permanent plantings" from GHI and that a fine should be imposed. In discussing whether to implement these recommendations, members and the board raised questions about the definitions of 'valuable permanent plantings" and "perennial plantings," about the ability to adequately police and enforce such a regulation, and about the desirability of such stringent regulations on plants and gardening.

The issue arose because a hedgerow of azalea bushes had been dug up and removed by the heirs following the death of a member, with bushes being given to neighbors, family members, and friends "from as far away as Cumberland." The A&E committee hoped to prevent a recurrence of what they viewed as the destruction of a prominent Greenbelt landmark.

As members in attendance pointed out, the resolution as proposed would not prevent such a recurrence and could place an onerous burden on every gardener in GHI. By speaking only of removal "from GHI" the committee left open the possibility that plants could be legally moved from their "landmark" position as long as they remain in GHI. Conversely, would members have to get permission every time they wanted to transplant a tulip, by definition a perennial planting? Would members lose ownership of everything they planted as soon as it went into the ground? Would anyone buy and plant valnable shrubs if they lost all ownership rights thereby?

The board concluded that the resolution needed further clarification and referred it back to the A&E committee.

Other Actions

The board refused to pursue the request of a member that GHI sell him a portion of GHI common area on which he would build a single family home. An option by which the member would lease the area and build a house on it which would become the property of GHI was also opposed by the board. It was felt that any pursuit of the matter. which would have to be referred See GHI MEETING, page 4

On September 2, 1988 the Labor Day Festival Committee named Bruce Bowman as Greenbelt's 1988 Outstanding Citizen. Bowman served one term as a city councilman and countless years as an election judge.

While many of his highvisibility roles have subsided, this consumer advocate and "cooperator" quietly continues to help Greenbelters and others through his work with memorial societies designed to provide information and dignified funeral services at reasonable prices.

Selecting 1988's Outstanding Citizen from the pool of 14 well-oualified nominees was difficult. Getting Bruce into the audience at the time of the announcement was a challenge! Fortunately, his wife Ruth convinced him to attend the concert that preceded the opening ceremonies.

# **Gypsies Are Now Moths**

By now the gypsy moth caterpillars have made their transformation into moths. Female and male moths differ in habits and appearance. Female moths have wings but cannot fly. Their wings are white with small dark marks along the front edge and These marks sometimes rub off. With wings outspread, female moths measure up to 2 inches from tip to tip. (Few moths this size have white wings.) Male gypsy moths are brown with numerous black markings and can be confused with many other moths. Male moths are atattracted to the females' sex odor (pheromone) and are one of the few day-flying moths found in Maryland. Neither the male nor the female adult moth eats leaves. Adult moths live short lives, during which time they mate and the female deposits an egg mass. This occurs from July to mid-August.

It is very important that homeowners cooperate in the city's endeavors to control the gypsy moth population. The city is asking that you do not scrape egg masses at this time. The city's consultants will be surveying and monitoring egg masses this fall. They need the egg masses to remain so they can get a proper count and determine where the most heavily infested areas are located. The time to scrape egg masses is in February and March, before they hatch in April. The city will give plenty of notice to homeowners when the time comes to scrape.

In addition, it is important to prepare trees for next years infestation. This fall is the perfect time to fertilize the trees. The healthier the tree, the better chance it has of surviving a defoliation. City Horticulturist Bill Phelan will provide information on the best fertilization techniques in future issues of the News Review.

#### Solutions? To the Editor:

There is a problem in Center-way that I would like to bring up at a council meeting, but I have no solutions to present. I would like to get feedback and suggestions from other Greenbelters.

The problem is people blocking access to the drive-up mailbox with their cars to use the Sovran Automatic Teller Machine. I find it infuriating to be frustrated almost every morning when a quick mail drop-off becomes an aggravating inconvenience. Not only is the lower parking lot available for the ATM, but so are the first few spaces along Centerway, and especially the four designated 10minute spaces along the lower curb, which are often empty. I never have a problem parking to use the Sovran ATM.

What's more infuriating is while some simply don't observe the mailbox, others have been very rude in response to my approaches and unsympathetic to my concern.

There are no signs telling ATM customers not to park there, nor is the curb painted yellow to alert people. But I'm not sure that "no parking" signs would work. Most of them leave their cars running thinking that by the time someone complains, they'll be ready to move it out of the way.

But complaining doesn't seem to be working. I would appreciate suggestions as to how to deal with the problem from others who have experienced this problem.

Reconstruction of Centerway Bid Item 1989-4

Sealed proposals addressed to the City of Greenbelt Purchasing Office for the RECONSTRUCTION OF CENTERWAY will be received until 2:30 p.m. local time. Thursday. August 31, 1983. This project is to provide a reconstructed roadway and improved curbs, sidewalks, drainage. lighting, and planting for the full length of Centerway (approximately 700 l.f.).

# **ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON Recycling and Refuse Collection Procedures**

Citizens efforts and participation are essential to meet state and county mandates to considerably increase the city's recycling of waste materials. Therefore, Council is establishing an ad hoc committee to evaluate existing refuse collection procedures and to consider any modifications to increase the amount of waste materials to be recycled; to consider the efficiency of refuse collection procedures and convenience of service to refuse customers; to consider fees being charged; and to address ways and means of accomplishing recycling in areas presently not receiving city refuse service.

The committee shall consist of eleven members to be appointed by the Council:

A chairman to be selected by the Council;

Four residents of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. to be nominated by the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc.;

One resident each of Lakeside, Boxwood, Lakewood, and Woodland Hills to be nominated by their respective civic association; and

Two members from areas presently NOT receiving city refuse collection service.

In order for Council to appoint members to this ad hoc committee as soon as possible, citizens from areas presently not receiving city refuse service who wish to serve on this committee are encouraged to contact the City Clerk, Tel: 474-3870, at the earliest possible date.

#### Police Blotter

Police Department
Three juveniles were enticed by three men into an apartment in the 9100 block of Breezewood Terrace with promises of candy and money if they could do a certain number of situps and pushups. After the children performed the exercises, the men grabbed and knocked down the children, slightly injuring one. The suspects are described as: a black man, 30, 6 ft., slim build; a white man, 40's, 6 ft. slim build, black hair; and a white man, slim build, medium brown hair. Investigation is continuing.



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
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## Museum Activities

Thirty-five persons on a Smithsonian Resident Associates tour visited Greenbelt on Sun day, June 25. Led by noted Washington, D.C. guide, Jeanne Fogle, the group was escorted through the Greenbelt Museum. went on a walking tour of the city, and talked with Greenbert pioneer Ben Rosenzweig. Barbara Havekost, city staffer and member of the Friends of the Greenbelt Museum board, fielded questions on Greenbelt's history at an orientation session held in the Municipal Building. Other recent visitors included Girl Scout Troop #1411, the group study exchange team 1989 from Sweden.

FOGM board member Keith Winsell testified in April before the Interior Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee supporting funding for the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial. The memorial has been long in the planning stage with the site chosen near Hains Point.

The late Congressman Claude Pepper's staff assistant notified Winsell that the committee approved \$5,852,000 for construc-tion of the memorial. The funding will be added to \$317,342 remaining from a prior appropriation. If approved by both the House and the Senate, the memorial, consisting of series of stone slabs depicting highlights from FDR's speeches and a waterfall garden, will be constructed by the National Park Service. Construction could begin as early as 1990.

Roosevelt, on Rexford Tugwell's recommendation, approved the construction of Greenbelt. The city was built to provide jobs for thousands of unerployed persons, to furnish housing for low and moderate income persons and as an experiment in community planning. Letters of support for the memorial project can be addressed to Maryland's Senators, Paul Sarbanes and Barbara Mikulski, and Congressman Steny Hoyer.



(Continued from page 1) to the members at the annual meeting fer decision, would set dangerous precedents. GHI would be offering to sell part of its open space and would have to allow all members to bid on any land it decided to sell, not just the requesting member.

The board also discussed at length the policy on window repairs, which the staff expects to become a significant cost issue over the next 15 years, beyond the scope of the regular maintenance budget. Over time, the seals between panes on the thermal windows break, allowing moisture to get between the panes and fogging the windows. Options for types of windows to replace the thermal windows and for financing of the replacements, perhaps from the maintenance reserve funds, were discussed.

The Greenbelt Museum is seeking zoning easement to convert the garage into an office. Because GHI is the owner of record of the unit, all members of the board were required by the new state ethics legislation to sign affidavits attesting that they had not made any campaign contributions to members of the county council who would be voting on the zon-






