Upcoming City Election Spurs Voter **Registration Drive in Greenbelt East**

Plans for conducting a voter registration drive were the chief action item on the agenda of the September 7 meeting of the Greenbelt East Advisory Committe (GEAC). GEAC hopes to encourage more Greenbelt East-ers to register to vote in Greenbelt before the upcoming City Council election.

Roy Dahl presented a draft of the flyer designed by the voter registration subcommittee, with information on how, when and where to register, as well as reasons why. The flyer was approved for distribution by GEAC, which also voted to spend \$125 to have it printed for distribution throughout the communities in Greenbelt East.

A current listing of registered voters in each GEAC community was distributed, to be crossreferenced with the list of residents. Only those not currently registered will receive the flyer. Follow-up canvassing, by telephone or door-to-door visiting, is planned.

In anticipation of the election, President Bob Zugby was re-quested to arrange for a candidates' night, to be held at Greenbriar between the close of nominations and the November 7 election.

The Sun Also Rises

GEAC discussed the brief appearance of Sunrise property developer Ronald Cohen at the August 22 council worksession and considered what steps, if any, GEAC could take to prevent highdensity residential development of the property.

The site is currently zoned for the density of development Cohen is proposing, although a site plan has yet to be approved. Rezoning of the site to permit commercial development would require a traffic impact study. No rezoning would be approved by the County if the expected level of service were to be worse than the level projected for all currently approved developments and planned road improvements.

City council member Ed Putens shared with GEAC a memorandum from Celia Wilson, City Planning & Development Coordinator, presenting her analysis of traffic impact of Sunrise Village. Wilson concluded that, "with planned road improvements,

the adjacent road network can absorb traffic by an apartment complex but not by an office development at the density stud-The Hanover Parkway ied." Greenbelt Road intersection could absorb the traffic from commercial development at a maximum density of 35,000 square feet, according to Wilson's analysis.

Zugby decried not only the traffic impacts but the concomitant demand for city services of the 478 apartment units currently planned. "We are looking at," he said, "intolerably high density residential development or intolerably high density commercial development from a devel-oper who doesn't need or seek our approval."

Putens suggested that a third alternative might be possible, the acquisition of the property for parkland. For the city to attempt condemnation and purchase would require passage of a bond issue with an accompanying rise in the tax rate, clearely not a feasible alternative. Putens help out the hope, however, that a significant infusion of federal funds might be possible and that the National Park Service could be interested in adding the prop-

erty to its Greenbelt holdings. The sense of the meeting was that GEAC would continue to monitor the Sunrise situation as site plans are presented to the Advisory Planning Board and City Council for approval and as any other developments arise throughout the city and county approval processes.

Other Issues

In addressing the recurring Schrom Hills Park Lake wetlands theme, Zugby reported that he had drafted a letter asking for an update on the status of the wetlands permit. He intended to mail it within the week to the Corps of Engineers, the city and county, state and federal representatives.

Dahl presented his idea for an alternate alignment of the new exit ramp from the Baltimore-Washington Parkway onto Greenbelt Road. The planned realign-ment will move the ramp north and east, affecting Greenbriar and creating what will a third set of traffic lights on Greenbelt Road from Hanover Parkway to the Greenway Center entrance. Would it be possible, Dahl wondered, to create a separate exit for northbound Parkway traffic onto eastbound Greenbelt Road? He envisioned either flying a ramp to Greenbelt Road over the westbound 95 exit to the northbound

Roberts Biography

Rodney Roberts, 31, a lifelong resident of Greenbelt, grew up at 2-G Research Road. He went to school in Greenbelt, attending North End Elementary School and Parkdale High School, and was active in city sports.

Roberts currently lives at 38-M Ridge Road and works for Boyd Enterprises, a minorityowned business based in Greenbelt. He is a mechanic, welder and shop foreman. Also a skilled carpenter, he has helped his friends remodel their houses and is proud of the fact that he lives in a historic community. Roberts is dedicated to the pres-

An active environmentalist and outdoorsman, Roberts is also a woodland and wildlife photographer whose work has been displayed locally. As co-chair of the Committee to Save the Green Belt, he has organized weekly tours of the "green belt" for almost two years. In addition, he has designed and constructed two prize-winning booths in the city's Labor Day Festival. Proceeds from the sale of his collection of photographs of the Greenbelt woods were donated to the committee.

Green - Handled Spades to Turn Earth For Green Line Station

The groundbreaking ceremony for Metrorail's Green Line terminus in Greenbelt is expected to attract federal, state and county officials as well as the Greenbelt community on Saturday, October 7 at 10 a.m. Three dozen green-han-dled shovels will be wielded by guests to scoop up the first spadefuls of earth that will mark the start of the longawaited Greenbelt station. The event will take place on the station site located south of the Beltway and directly west of Cherrywood Lane and the Springhill Lake Apartments.

As the 1989 City election ap-proaches, it is a good time to review what the candidates for City Council in 1987 said was important and what has happened since that election.

During the 1987 election campaign, the candidates pledged to revitalize Roosevelt Center? Today, little has changed.

During the 1987 election campaign, the candidates pledged to expand and enhance programs for Greenbelt's ever-growing senior population? While the city's ion department has em ployed a therapeutic recreational coordinator to improve and expand some programs for special populations, these programs need to be expanded further. The city's failure to act on a Senior Daycare Center has resulted in the loss of a State grant for \$140,000. Disappointingly, no definitive plans exist to construct or house additional senior programs. Today, only a little has been done.

During the 1987 election campaign the candidates pledged to

seek additional bond funding only after detailed and careful planning, and only with a definite program! Toward this pledge, they got it half right. The bond issue for Schrom Hills Park was well thought out. The bond issue for the community center left more questions than it had answers.

During the 1987 election campaign, the candidates promised to move forward on senior housing? Today, it remains an unmet need.

For the last 20 years, citizens have sought to resolve the future of Greenbelt Lake Park by adonting a plan to govern its future? Today, only a few steps have been taken to resolve this issue.

The Council members we elect this November must be committed to deliver on their promises.

Remember to judge candidates - both incumbents and challengers - not only on what they say they'll do but more importantly on their previous performance in public office. Promises are easy; delivering on those is a true litmus test! It is also easy to forget that promise once elected. It is hard work to keep those pledges once made.

All current candidates for City Council have a track record. Examine that record carefully. Ask incumbents for a copy of their previous campaign literature. Check their performance against their litany of promises.

For newcomers to the election campaign, check with people in the community who have worked with them to see if they did what they said.

Credit Where It's Due To the Editor:

Many times over the past 11 years as a public official I have been taken to task for the shortcomings of either myself or state government. I accept this not very pleasant task as part of the job of a delegate. However, in fairness, it would also be pleasant to be acknowledged when one has been at least moderately responsible for doing something worthwhile. What I am referring to is your coverage of dignitaries affixing the Drug Free School Zone signs at Greenbelt Elementary School on August 28. While a number of officials were saluted in the article, I found that my name and that of School Board member Suzanne Plogman were absent.

I was the first legislator to introduce the Drug Free School Zone bill at the state level over two years ago. No one was interested and the bill died in committee. Last fall, Suzanne Plogman introduced a resolution for drug free school zones to the school board. It passed overwhelmingly.

Early in the fall of 1988 I wrote to Governor Schaefer asking for his support of this safe school legislation. This, after months (spent) trying to garner support for the bill. I am pleased that the Governor and my legislative colleagues saw the merit in the legislation which as your article stated, Mayor Weidenfeld first discovered while visiting New Jersey.

The Drug Free School Zone is important and I am law pleased, as I know Ms. Plogman must be, to have worked hard for its passage. If it helps even one child feel that his or her school is a safer environment, then the effort is more than worthwhile.

Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority officials are confident that the Green Line from Fort Totten to Greenbelt will open in late 1993 as scheduled. The Corps of Engineers, they note, has already indicated its intent to grant a construction permit for the service and inspections yard. The permit awaits the Fish and Wildlife Service's recommendation, which is expected this week.

A permit had been withheld by the Corps for over a year because of concerns about disturbing extensive wetlands on the BARC site. Evaluation of the tract has been conducted by various agencies including the Environmental Protection Agency and the Fish and Wildlife Service. To address the problem, Metro is expected to employ mitigation measures, such as replacement of the wetlands excavated.

In December 1988, the airport groups lost their suit to stop construction of the Green Line in Prince Georges County. They had cited safety and environmental concerns and the historic status of the airport. This summer the groups withdrew their appeal. Instead, they are trying to persuade members of Congress to authorize the building of the underground instead of line Metro's present plan to place the tracks above ground across the end of the airport runway.

Metro officials say the cost for a tunnel would be prohibitively expensive. They also note that required approvals were given by various agencies in an August 1988 memorandum of agreement

On June 27, 1989, citizens of Greenbelt approved \$3 million in bonds to finance a community center and expressed preference for establishing such a community center at Center School.

Council has established a Community Center Task Force to be responsible for the development of a plan and guidelines for the reutilization of Center School as a community center after it is transferred to the city. This shall include the allocation of space to various special uses and activities.

The task force shall consist of six citizen members, preferably some with background in architecture and historic preservation, and from the business community. In addition to the six citizen members, the task force shall in-clude one representative each of the city's Advisory Planning Board, Park and Recreation Advisory Board, Community Relations Advisory Board, Greenbelt Arts Advisory Committee, and the Senior Citizen Task Force. The Community Center Task Force shall:

- 1) Review and consider the evolution of the community center idea from its inception in the early 1980s, including concept plans, use proposals, surveys, and community needs.
- Evaluate the need to preserve the architectural integrity of the Center School building which is listed in the Register of Historic Places, as well as the relationship of the use of the building to the original Greenbelt town plan as relates to the reutilization of the building.
- Conduct public meetings to solicit public input on the community center idea.

At its regular meeting, held on September 11, 1989, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland adopted Charter Amendment Resolution 1989-1 (Resolution Number 701), and the following title of the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment:

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, AD-OPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF AR-TICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNO-TATED CODE OF MARYLAND, (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE, "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL", SUB-TITLE "HOME RULE" TO AMEND THE CHAR-TER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT FOUND, IN WHOLE OR IN PART, IN THE COMPILATION OF MUNICIPAL CHARTERS OF MARYLAND (1983 EDI-TION AS AMENDED), AS PREPARED BY THE DE-PARTMENT OF LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE PURSU-ANT TO CHAPTER 77 OF THE ACTS OF THE GEN-ERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND OF 1983, BY RE-PEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMEND-MENTS SECTION 4, TITLE "CREATION, QUALIFICA-TIONS; COMPENSATION", TO PROVIDE THAT THE MAYOR SHALL RECEIVE A SALARY OF \$6,000 PER ANNUM AND THAT THE OTHER MEMBERS OF COUNCIL EACH SHALL RECEIVE A SALARY OF \$5,000 PER ANNUM \$5,000 PER ANNUM

The above titled Charter amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 13th day of November, 1989, unless on or before the 23rd day of October, 1989 there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting the above Charter amendment be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.
