Council, Christacos & Public Eager to See Beijing in Center

The drab and ugly Roosevelt Center may, by next autumn, change like Cinderella into a princess. That was the possibility that emerged at Monday night's regular city council meeting when Robert Manzi, city attorney, explained how the city might be able to take over perpetual care of the facades of the commercial buildings.

Because the Center is listed in changes now in process on Centhe National Register of Historic Places, Manzi said, the city after Labor Day. may be able to establish a special assessment to fund the renovation. As part of the package to take on this responsibility the city would require a perpetual easement covering the building facades only.

This development followed a presentation in which Sal Daniello, attorney for the Liu family who hope to open a Chinese restaurant in the old High's location, requested council support for a beer, wine, and liquor license for the restaurant. Daniello described a high quality, "tablecloth restaurant" in which patrons are served on fine china and with crystal and silverware. The facility would be similar to the Beijing Restaurant near Laurel, also run by the family.

Virtually everyone still present at the council meeting, which by this time was running after midnight, spoke in favor of the restaurant and the liquor license petition. Many who had dined at the Beijing Restaurant praised both its food and its ambience. Since alcohol would be served only in connection with meals and no public bar would be involved, no potential problems were fore-seen. A special waiver would, however, be required to grant the license, since the space is within 1000 feet of the doorway to Center School. (The school itself is expected to be vacated within two years.)

An interesting special feature planned for the restaurant would be a visible demonstration of wok cooking in the small window area on Centerway previously utilized by Realty 1. The possibility exists as well that outdoor service might be expanded onto the roof area if the restaurant succeeds.

James Cassels of Green Ridge House summed up the general mood of those present when he said that the projected restaurant would be "a great asset to the Center."

Renovation Plans

George Christacos, owner of the commercial center buildings. then went to the speaker's stand: He expressed his commitment to renovating the decaying structures. In consultation with architect Klaus Klatt, Chistacos had presented a plan to the city which includes cleaning, repairing and painting the exterior of the buildings, installation of awnings and beautifying of the facades. This work would occur once the sidewalk and roadway

City Director of Planning Celia Wilson commented, however, that the Klatt plan and figures developed by Coakley & Williams, consultants for the city, show a "wide disparity" in cost. She questioned whether the former plan fully addresses all the cosmetic and structural details necessary.

Christacos explained that he had an appointment to meet with Coakley & Williams and that he did not find these discrepancies to be an insurmountable problem.

Both the restaurant petition and the Center renovation proposals will be taken up for action at a special council meeting on Tuesday, July 24. By that time Manzi will have worked up an agreement binding on all parties that will deal with owner and tenant rights concerning signage, as well as other details of the renovation process for which the city will put up the money and take over responsibility for maintenance of the facades. Christacos said that he may have a tenant for the unused theater building, who will use the space "as a theater." On that optimistic note, council moved on to other

July 24 Meeting Besides the liquor license application and the agreement with Christacos, council will take up at the July 24 meeting the School Board's plans for an elementary school on the North End site and issues involving Schrom Hills Park. At that time council will also set meeting times for future

Council Looks at North End School Plans Next Tuesday

Next Tuesday, July 24, the Greenbelt City Council will consider a resolution to transfer the city-owned North End property to the county for construction of a new elementary school. Representatives of the county school system will be present to answer questions raised at council's July 16 meeting.

These issues include the impact of a one-story or two-story school on the site, the possible need for a stormwater retention pond, the impact on neighborhood homes and other issues concerning the ultilization of the 13-acre tract.

At this week's council meeting a petition with 131 signatures was presented favoring a two-story elementary school on the North End property instead of the already approved one-story facility. A stream of speakers expressed their view that a twostory structure would reduce the size of the building's footprint, allow for the preservation of more trees, and be more economical to heat.

Those who favored the one-story design argued that this design provides better accessi-bility for the handicapped, is safer and is educationally pref-

According to school system officials, any change in the school design would delay the opening of the school, scheduled for September 1992, by about one year.

Decision Making Time

It is time for council to take decisive action on the North End School.

For nearly two years, Greenbelt has been grappling with the school issue. After much debate, many public hearings, a mail referendum, and finally a city referendum, the majority of voters chose to build a new school at North End rather than renovate Center School.

Next began the arduous task of planning the school itself. The county school administration held several public meetings and during a five-hour-long planning session at Center School in August 1989 reviewed possible plans for the school. All citizens were invited to participate. Many came. Plans were made, discarded and changed and finally a plan for a one-story school emerged. Supporters of this plan argued that a one-story facility is better from both an educational and safety standpoint.

In January 1990 the state set aside funds for construction of the school, which must be started within two years. By this time the detailed plans were well underway.

When the stakes were placed this spring, the size of the school became visually evident. Although the architect moved the play areas so that back yards will not be lost, the impact of the school on the site caused some concern.

Council was petitioned by citizens seeking a two-story structure which they believe would take fewer trees and be more economical to operate.

Should the city pursue a two-story school, new plans would have to be made, submitted and approved - a process that school officials say could take a year. While a remote chance such a delay could jeopardize state funding and even risk losing our new school.

Greenbelters will never be unanimous on any issue. Someone will be displeased at whatever decision is reached.


Isn't it time we put away our differences and start working together to attain what we all want - the best school we can get for our children?

Unless there is a compelling reason, which we have not heard, it is time for council to sign over the North End School property to the school board so they can proceed with construction. Our children need a new school, the sooner the better.

In response to the letter of Rodney Roberts appearing in the July 12 News Review, please be advised that the City Council agreed, at a public meeting held on June 13, 1988, that only four specific sycamore trees would be saved and not razed by the Centerway construction project. Three of these trees have not been touched and are being protected by fencing. At a subsequent meeting held on July 11, 1988, the City Council agreed to the removal of another tree based upon the recommendation of the City's landscape architect that the parking lot entrance road be relocated in order to return to the road configuration closer to that of the original plan.







JOE'S TIPS OF THE WEEK

Hello Again ! !

Continuing with the hot weather and last week's article, another aspect of dealing with airconditioning problems pertains only to our furry friends who travel frequently in our vehicles. In last week's article we said that in the maximum a/c selection passenger compartment air is drawn thru and re-entered thru the evaporator for a more efficient cooling. When we carry our pets with us they tend to lose their fur and after a period of time it gets sucked up into the evaporator, thus blocking up the cooling cores, cutting down the effect of cold air movement across the evaporator cores With my fleet experience on emergency response vehicles I used to see this condition quite often on police K-9 vehicles. The fix for this condition isn't so bad. You have to gain access to the evaporator core and simply vacuum it out. Once doing so you restore adequate circulation of air movement thru the evaporator core, bringing the cooling effect back into the system.

While on the subject of a/c cooling and contamination of system components, the last time you went to the store and purchased a half gallon of your favorite ice cream you probably bought it pretty much frozen solid and rather cumbersome to dip yourself a triple scooper! Then after a few days in your freezer you went back for another triple scooper and noticed it went soft and was not so hard to dip! You wonder why?? Well, I would have to say the cooling condensor under or in the back of your refrigerator is blocked up with household goodies, most likely dust and papers. After a period of time, this will cut down on the cooling effect drastically if you don't do any preventive maintenance. The solution is to pull the refrigerator out from the wall and gain access to the condensor coil and vacuum all around and make sure the condensor fan is free from papers and children's toys that slide under the refrigerator blocking up the operation. By keepink the coil clean you will gain electrical savings in efficiency of your unit and it will work better too!! Much colder and your ice cream won't get soft either!!
