Tour of City for Foreign Visitors Gives Local Reporter a Fresh Look

A tour of the city given for three city planners from Poland gave this reporter an opportunity to take a fresh look at Greenbelt—to see it as it was planned and as the growing community it is today.

It was a hot and muggy July 10 when the Polish delegation arrived here on the last lap of a day-long tour of Prince Georges County. The delegation was guided by Bob Seidel, program manager of the Johns Hopkins/Poland Technical Assistance Project. The delegates were Dr. Janusz Kot, Department of Urban Development Economics, University of Lodz; Maria Niemczyk, Deputy Director, Ministry of Physical Planning, Warsaw; and Dr. Zbigniew Zuziak, chief architect of Cracow, faculty of Urban Design and Physical Planning, Technical University of Cracow. Their visit was part of the county government's participation in a state program to help Poland's new government establish democratic and free market institutions. The county had been asked to provide education and training in the management of local government.

This is part of the state's plan to assist the new Polish government to set up a training center in the region of Lodz (pronounced "Woodge") to help educate Polish citizens about how democracy works at the local level and to prepare them to participate in local affairs. Lodz is about 30 miles from Warsaw and is Poland's second largest city and the center of the country's light industry.

With Mayor Gil Weidenfeld as host and using the city's air-conditioned van the tour began in the original planned community with the first stop between Center School, the first school/community building (1937), and the swimming pool (1939). City Manager James K. Giese, the tour narrator, explained briefly the history of Greenbelt, how it had been built during the Depression to put people to work and to provide low income housing. It had also served as an experiment in city planning based on the garden city ideas of an Englishman, Ebenezer Howard. Niemczyk and Dr. Zuziak were familiar with the plans of Howard. Giese further pointed out that city planners had used features such as following the topography of the land, clustered housing around a parking area, an inner

walkway system with underpasses under roads, and a self-contained shopping center. From the van we looked past the pool to the commercial shopping center where the first cooperative stores had been built.

Going up Gardenway to the Spellman pedestrian overpass, Giese pointed out several things—the connection to the newer part of town, the garden plots which had been continuously used since 1938 and some of the remaining trees and green space. Unfortunately, he explained, much of the original green belt had been sold and developed. Recently the city has managed to buy back some of that green belt which had been zoned for development.

How big is the city, the Polish officials wanted to know. Five square miles, Giese answered. The city had grown from a population of 2,800 in 885 housing units to approximately 20,000 people in 9,500 housing units.

As the van went up Ridge Road past the neat houses and trim gardens, Giese explained that the older part of town had become a cooperative and was no longer rental units. What are the greatest problems, the Poles asked. Controlling growth, Giese replied. The officials were surprised to learn that the city does not have control over development and zoning since the county decides on zoning matters. There is a concept in this country, Giese explained, that a man's home is his castle and that concept has influenced how zoning was decided. The city can use its influence to see that zoning requirements are carried out, but cannot stop growth of what is already zoned.

Reaching the defense homes Giese explained that they were built as temporary housing during World War II. Tenants in this and the rest of the original part of town were chosen for their ability to contribute to the community with certain other restrictions. They were poor because of the Depression, Giese said but often well educated.

To the right of Ridge Road the world-famous Beltsville Agricultural Research Center was pointed out to the visitors. Many Greenbelters work there, he said.

Next we drove through part of Boxwood where the well-spaced houses built in the '60s now were shaded by trees—and a quick look at Greenbelt's new police station.

Then, crossing over Crescent Road to Greenbelt Lake, the van was driven down to the spillway and the visitors got a look at one of the places set aside for recreation usage, the lake, picnic tables, play area, and lots of green space. On the way out, we passed the city's new recycling area with containers for glass, aluminum and newspapers. It will be enlarged, they were told.

Coming out to Kenilworth Avenue and crossing over, the van entered Capital Office Park. The visitors commented on the attractive buildings, landscaping and good roads. Privately owned and developed, the office park has been under construction since 1979. Greenbelters consider this to be a premier office park not just in the city but in the county as well. This development has worked with the city to preserve green space, Giese said, then added, to some residents any development is unwelcome. The county See VISITORS, page 2

Youth Football Cancelled; Basketball Program Shaky

At its August 7 meeting, the Board of Directors of the Greenbelt Boys and Girls Club voted not to offer a football program this year. The Board noted a lack of interest in the program this year, particularly on the part of adults. Despite pleas for volunteers since the end of last football season, no adult has come forward to be the Football Commissioner, to organize and oversee the program, and no new coaches were recruited.

"A Broader Perspective"

To the Editor:

I'm glad so many folks took up their cudgels! Alas, nature does manage forests with disease, insects, and fire, for instance. My idea was to get things out in the open. Pardon the pun.

If you really want to talk about biodiversity, I believe that it is greatest along the woods' edge or transition zone with fields, in natural forest openings, along streams, and, yes, along paths, not in the forest primeval. This is not to say that the majesty of the climaxed forest isn't awe inspiring in itself. I enjoy the splendor of nature as much as anyone.

The statement "Greenbelt can meet the recreational needs of its residents without the further loss of our valuable woodlands" was nice, but there was no following HOW statement. My intent was not just to use woodlands nor only to use part of those newly acquired acres.

Do we have "motorcycles, off-trail vehicles, or all-terrain vehicles" tearing around Greenbelt Lake? Then, why would it happen on other Greenbelt trails?

Reasonable is what Greenbelters deem adequate for their variable and collective needs and are willing to support. I doubt that we'll get carried away if our open space is properly surveyed and appropriate sites and needs are identified for recreational purposes. Such land is not lost, gone or unavailable. It is open green space for everyone's enjoyment.

We should hear more from the youth and adult softball, baseball, football and soccer teams, etc. in Greenbelt. What percentage of their practice time and games are played in Greenbelt? Most of the practice and about half the games should be. Greenbelt youth, in particular, need to be in Greenbelt to practice or some will be excluded for lack of transportation. The statement about the county, not Greenbelt, needing more ballfields is indicative of the attitude that bothers me and many others. For instance, what is the number of acres per 1000 residents set aside for athletic fields in Greenbelt. How does that compare to other cities in P.G. County?

And to "What's Next?", alias, the Amusement Park, it was great! A little comic relief never hurt any person, place or plant. Hopefully, we've eliminated the possibility of storage buildings, salt sheds, housing and other non-open-space initiatives on the green belt.

No doubt I'll be hung in effigy at the August 13 meeting of the Committee to Save the Greenbelt, but then I expected that. What

I really hope to accomplish is to put the availability and maintenance of open green space in a broader perspective than I've seen of late.

has helped by building some of the roads including the new overpass across the Beltway which will connect directly to the new Metro rapid rail transit system.

Then we went over this new overpass to Springhill Lake, pausing to notice the large machinery on the right where Metro construction would take place. Looking at the Springhill Lake apartment project this reporter was able to understand the admiration expressed by the Polish officials. One of the largest garden projects in the county, with 2,900 housing units, the project seemed to fit right in with the concept of early Greenbelt. Trees had been left in many places, an inner walkway system, swimming pools, a small shopping center, and playground areas gave it much the same look and feeling of independence found in old Greenbelt. The visitors commented on its attractiveness.

SHA INSTALLING LIGHT ON KENILWORTH AT I-95

Work has begun on improvements to the Kenilworth Avenue /Capital Beltway interchange. The work should be completed this fall.

A signal will be installed at the ramp from southbound (inner loop) I-95 to Kenilworth Avenue. The portion of the ramp near the intersection and the crossover will be widened to accommodate two lanes of left-hand turning traffic. In addition, the new signal will be interconnected to existing signals at Kenilworth Avenue at the northbound I-95 ramp, and at Kenilworth Avenue and Crescent Road.

Traffic at I-95 will be affected for several nights during construction while conduit connecting the signals is run along the Kenilworth Avenue bridge. Two lanes of traffic will be closed between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.


Lane closures are also likely on the inner loop ramp to Kenilworth Avenue, and on Kenilworth Avenue, when the widening occurs and the signal is installed.

Longtime Greenbelt resident Ruth Anne Bowman died Tuesday, August 14 at Washington Hospital Center of a massive heart attack. Ruth would have been 77 on September 4.

The Bowmans moved to Greenbelt in 1944. She and her husband, Bruce, of 53 years raised their three children in the green belt of Greenbelt, the woods at the end of Laurel Hill. They were active in many Greenbelt organizations and activities.

A graduate of Antioch College in Ohio as was Bruce, Ruth majored in child development. They were married on her graduation day. She taught nursery school in Greenbelt and later was a kindergarten teacher at North End School for 14 years, when kindergartens were cooperatives and later when they were incorporated into the Prince Georges County School system.

As a long-time resident, Ruth was interviewed for the oral history project in connection with the city's 50th anniversary celebration in 1987. Responding to the question, "What aspect of your life in Greenbelt meant the most to you?", Ruth said: "Oh, my teaching, no question. I just got so much satisfaction working with children, seeing them grow, develop and change. Oh, that was the most wonderful thing that happened to me." She went on to comment about the half-day schedule with the kindergarten which made it possible for her to look after her own family's needs as well. Her interests included the PTA, Girl Scouts and the Greenbelt Health Association, of which she was a board member.

Ruth is survived by her husband, Bruce; son, Peter, and his wife, Rose, of Houston; daughters Sandra of Seattle and Barbara of Bloomington, Illinois; and granddaughter Joysong.

A memorial service will be held at Cedar Lane Unitarian Church, 9601 Cedar Lane in Bethesda on Sunday, August 26 at 3 p.m.






