County Begins Negotiations to Buy 209-Acre Glenn Dale Hospital Site

by Virginia Beauchamp Although the Glenn Dale Hospital site off Route 450 stands outside Greenbelt's jurisdiction, city officials have long been interested in what might become of this 209-acre facility. Standing on prime property in a rapid-ly developing area, the hospital and grounds could have become a target for private developers interested in highrise apartments or commercial space and thus increasing exponentially the volume of traffic along Greenbelt Rd. Alternatively, since they were owned by the District of Columbia, the hospital grounds could have been used for a prison facility or even a landfill site.

Now these possibilities seem less likely. By an act of the Prince Georges County Council on August 30, tentatively approving a \$3.9 million purchase price set by appraisers Lipman, Frizzell & Mitchell, the county has directed its staff to begin negotiations to purchase the property and to keep it primarily in green space. This outcome was made public at a press conference called by County Executive Parris Glendening, which was also attended by Congressman Steny Hoyer and Council Chairperson Jo Ann Bell.

Open Green Space "Glenn Dale citizens and the County have been concerned about the fate of this property for years," Glendening said. "We are putting the destiny of these 209 acres in the hands of the citizens and the county and that is a positive breakthrough for the future of the surrounding communities and the entire jurisdiction."

County Councilman Richard astaldi, who represents the Castaldi, city of Glenn Dale as well as Bowie and Greenbelt, agreed. "The proposal to retain open space in Glenn Dale is considerably more pleasing than any alternatives and certainly would lend relief to traffic congestion along the Route 450 corridor." he said.

Glendening said he expects to schedule a public hearing during the month of October to solicit citizen input on future plans for the property. "Glenn Dale is in need of an open space area," Glendening said, "and this site would be appropriate."

History of Site

The jurisdictional history of the Glenn Dale site is long and complicated and Congressman Hoyer played a major role in sorting it out. Built originally sanitarium for children with tuberculosis, which in the era before antibiotics usually required several years of bedrest to effect a cure, the hospital was constructed on property deeded to the United States in 1930 for a District of Colum-

bia project. Authorization to use the site for a hospital came through an act of Congress. The last patient was treated in 1972 and the hospital was closed.

In 1983, when the District of Columbia tried to lease the property, the federal government suit, claiming that the District could not control the property, since it was no longer being used for its original purpose. Nevertheless, both the U.S. District Court and the U.S. Court of Appeals agreed with the District that it could control the property, even though title was held by the United States.

In 1987 Rep. Hoyer described the Catch-22 situation in which the property then existed: "The federal government holds title, but has been found by the courts to have no right to control the property. The District controls the property and could lease it, if a lessor could be found. The District does not, however, have the right to sell it. Prince Georges County has an obvious interest in the Glenn Dale site, but no right to determine the disposition of it." Bill Allows Sale

In order to clear up these ambiguities, Hoyer introduced a bill conveying title of the land from the federal government to the District of Columbia. Following passage of the bill by both houses of Congress, President

In order to effect a sale of the property from the District to Prince Georges County, a complicated formula was worked out by means of which D.C. Mayor Marion Barry and Glendening each selected an appraiser. Following their independent collection of data, the two appraisers would then select a third appraiser, who would set the price for the property based on information gathered by the other two. At the time the possibility seemed unlikely that the county itself could become the purchaser.

Interviewed in 1988, Castaldi expressed doubt that the county itself could get the property. Although some developers re-portedly are still also interested in obtaining it, the likelihood now that they can succeed seems a little dimmer.

Police Seek Help In Halting Thefts

by Mary Lou Williamson The rash of break-ins in the Greenbelt Homes area has continued this week and spread to new areas, Cpl. David Buerger, Greenbelt Police Department spokesman told the News Review early Tuesday morning. Police are requesting citizens' help, he said. First, take precautions. Keep doors and windows locked and purses and cash out of sight. Second, be on the lookout and report any suspicious activity to police at 474-7200.

Most incidents this week have occurred at night and only a purse or other "quick take" valuable was taken. In half the cases an unlocked door or window provided easy access. One intruder was confronted by the resident returning home. The description is of a white man, age unknown, 6 ft. tall, husky, black hair and wearing a plaid or flannel shirt, blue jeans and light-colored gloves. The intruder fled, having taken only a can of beer from the dining room table.

Eight incidents occurred in four days from September 28 through October 1 — three on Ridge Road and one each on Lakeside Drive, Hedgewood Drive, Crescent Road, Mample-wood Court and Westway (University Square Apartments).

largest heist was m during the day at the Hedgewood Drive home. The thief broke a window to gain entry and then took jewelry eash, a complete stereo system, VCR, two color TVs, and a computer with printer and modem,

Stereo equipment was taken also from one of the Ridge Road break-ins.

Victims were at home asleep in most cases. One victim told police he had heard a small crash downstairs, but thought it was the family cat.

GSA to Build Courthouse **Just Outside City Limits**

The General Services Aministration (GSA) recently announced plans for the construction of a new federal court house on the fringe of the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC) across from the Capital Office Park. The facility, officially called the southern division of the U.S. District Court of Maryland, will be situated on an 8.5 acre tract immediately north of Cherrywood Lane near Edmonston Road. The property is northeast of the planned Metro

GSA expects to contract with an architectural firm to design the 115,000 square foot courthouse, which will serve Prince Georges, Montgomery, Calvert, Charles and St. Mary's counties. The design and site plans will then be sent to the National Capital Planning Commission, the agency charged with reviewing structures built on federal property, The Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission is also expected to review the plans. The \$21.9 million project is scheduled for completion in late 1993 when the Greenbelt Metro line is expected to become operational.
A Donated Site

In selecting the land for the courthouse, GSA advertised for donated sites located close to major highways in heavily populated northern Prince Georges County within five miles of Montgomery County, Among the many responses were properties located in Hyattsville, Laurel and two on BARC land. Rejected because it was too visible and would intrude into the major center of BARC was a tract on Route 1. The Cherrywood Lane/ Edmonston Road site was considered most desirable because of its accessibility to the Beltway, major highways, Metro and Montgomery County. Possibly factored in was the proposed improvement of Kenilworth Avewhich would eventually hook up with the proposed Inter-County Connector that is designed to run from Montgomery County to Route 1 near Muirkirk Road. (At the present time the ICC is stalled on the drawing boards because of controversy over the highway's route in Montgomery County). GSA notes that although a

preliminary analysis of the selected site did not show an impact on wetlands or disturb drainage patterns, an Environmental Impact Assessment will be conducted. Apparently an act of Congress will be needed to give the land, which has not been declared surplus, to GSA.

Seven Courtrooms

According to Chief Clerk Joseph A. Haas of the Baltimore Federal Court, the new federal courthouse will house seven courtrooms-a large ceremonial courtroom and two standard-size courtrooms for judges, plus smaller courtrooms for two magistrates and two bankruptcy judges. He noted that the new court, a "full service facility," will have space for a supporting staff of clerks, marshals, prosecutors, probation officers and

Long Battle

The battle for a federal courthouse in the Prince Georges County/Montgomery County area spanned about 17 years. Originally the effort was to create a separate, completely autonomous southern district with the Baltimore courthouse serving the northern district. That focus changed over the years. Thus, the newly created southern district court is not a separate entity. The chief judge and chief clerk will continue to be located in the Baltimore courthouse.

In 1987 Representative Steny H. Hoyer (D-Md.) introduced legislation to establish a south-ern branch of the Baltimore court. The measure approved by Congress in 1988, stipulated that the new court would be located in Prince Georges County within five miles of the Montgomery County border and that it would be used for federal criminal and civil cases originating in the five counties comprising the south-ern division of the U.S. District Court of Maryland. Up to 30 percent of the cases tried in Baltimore are from the Washington area.

Persons may register directly at the Board of Supervisors of Elections, 14701 Governor Oden Bowie Drive, Suite 101, Upper Marlboro from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. on any weekday.

Registration will take place this Saturday at any Giant Food supermarket from 9 a.m. to 5

A citizen residing in Maryland who will be 18 years old by November 6 and who is not disqualified by a criminal record or under guardianship for mental disability is eligible to vote.

Voter registration is permanent as long as an individual continues to live at the same address and does not fail to vote in five years.

Mailing early will give us extra time to arrange transportation, and the leeway will be especially welcome this year."

The Postal Service issues holiday mailing deadlines every year for letters and parcels headed overseas.

Surface and air mailing deadlines for military personnel stationed abroad generally range from mid-October through No-vember, For mail sent to U.S. addresses, there is no deadline. but Ford recommends getting cards and parcels on their way early in December.




