Council Moves Ahead With Traffic Light On Hanover Parkway and Ora Glen Drive

Council heard requests at its November 13 meeting from citizens for a traffic light at Hanover Parkway and conduits for ball field lights in Schrom Hills Park. Council agreed to the transfer of the lake park concession to new owners.

Greenbelt East Traffic

Sheldon Goldberg, a resident. of Windsor Green, asked council for a progress report on the promised traffic light at Hanover Parkway and Ora Glen Drive. A traffis signal warrant analysis last summer showed that the intersection failed to meet acceptable standards and warranted a traffic light. At that time, a 90-day review period (to see if the Commerce Center's impact requires them to fund the light) was scheduled. Following that review, city staff would hire a firm to perform the engineering design on the light. The 90 days are long past, said Goldberg. What has happened to the city's commitment to quick action?

While city council had directed staff to hire an engineering firm to design the light, the city has no money for installation of the light, explained city Planning and Development Coordinator Celia Wilson. It will be spring before the occupancy rate at Commerce Center reaches the threshold level at which its impact on the intersection, and responsibility for funding the light, can be determined. Staff had made a decision not to spend money on design of a light which will "then sit on a shelf," said Wilson.

Bram suggested that the city could find the money to install the light now and be reimbursed by the Commerce Center later. White noted, however, that Commerce Center may not. in fact, be responsible for funding the light. He suggested that tenant and neighbor complaints about traffic may be sufficient motivation.

The cost of construction of the light would be approximately \$60,000 to \$65,000. Wilson noted that one of the proposals for design ran to about 20 percent of the construction cost, rather than the expected 10 percent.

Giese announced that there is about \$20,000 available, left over from a special assessment, that could be used for design. Since council had moved that the light be designed at a previous meeting, no motion was taken, but staff was directed to proceed with the engineering design of the light.

Survey

In a related issue, the results of the Frankfort Drive survey were reported. The State Highway Administration had determined that a light is not war-

ranted at the Frankfort/Greenbelt Road intersection. SHA suggested that the danger of exiting from Frankfort Drive onto Greenbelt Road could be alleviated by making Frankfort a one-way street, allowing traffic to turn in at Greenbelt Road only. SHA sought Greenbelt input and city staff had conducted a survey of the residents on the local streets. Of 241 surveys mailed, 154 (or 64 percent) were

Of those responding, 65 percent opposed making Frankfort Drive one-way inbound, Restricting traffic flow at that inter-section would only make traffic worse at other intersections, already clogged. Many maintained, despite the survey cover letter stating no light was possible, that a traffic light is needed at the intersection.

White, noting the large response and the number of suggestions received for alleviating the traffic problem, suggested that an open work session be scheduled to evaluate other options. The results of the survey will also be forwarded to SHA.

Schrom Hill Lights

Council accepted a petition from Nancy Boardman, a mem-ber of the board of directors of the National Capital Soccer League and supporter of the Greenbelt Boys and Girls Club. The petition asks that the conduits for lights for the soccer/ football field at Schrom Hills Park be installed during initial development of the park.

The lights will do good for the children, she urged, encouraging physical fitness, sportsmanship and healthy habits, and would do little, if any, harm to the neighborhood. Boardman spoke of her unavailing efforts to find a safe, lighted field for the children to practice on in the evening during the fall. Weidenfeld reported on a field

trip taken by the council to see directional lights designed to prevent spillover from the fields into neighboring homes. The trip was inconclusive, he noted, since the example they saw did not represent the state of the art and, in fact, the lights were not aimed properly. He said that while the council is seriously considering lights for the fields, there is no funding available for laying of the conduit.

City Manager James Giese concurred, saying that park de-velopment is taking more than was expected and that there are no funds for lights in park funds or capital projects

GEAC Hears Update On Traffic, Greenspring

The October 4 meeting of the Greenbelt East Advisory Coalition (GEAC) featured updates on a variety of topics that had been raised with the State Highway Administration (SHA), City Council and the Advisory Planning Board (APB). A letter from Creston Mills, SHA District 4 Engineer, concerned a number of traffic issues on Greenbelt Road between Hanover Parkway and Mandan Road.

Greenbelt Road Traffic

In his letter, Mills said that SHA will install a flashing yellow light on Greenbelt Road at Frankfort Drive, for the entrance Eleanor Roosevelt High School. The light will be timed for school hours and special school events. The design for the light will proceed "shortly" and installation "shortly after

Mills' letter also raised the possibility of making Frankfort Drive a one-way street. The SHA proposal would allow only cars travelling east on Greenbelt Road to turn onto Frankfort. The median would be closed off to prevent cars travelling west on Greenbelt Road from turning left onto Frankfort. The city recently conducted a survey on the proposal among affected residents. The SHA plans to improve signage and street lighting at Frankfort Also, further speed studies are planned along Greenbelt Road, for both peak and non-peak hours.

Greenspring

James Foy, GEAC Chair shared with the other board members the most recent plans for Greenspring, the Richmond America single-family development on Hanover Parkway, which had been discussed at a recent APB meeting. A difference of opinion had arisen concerning the planned trails. A Park and Planning study called for a narrow strip of wooded land along the western edge of the property (referred to as "the spine") to be part of the perimeter trail. In the plans, the spine is shown as a buffer between the development and its western neighbors -a church and the Lanham Boys and Girls Club on Good Luck Road.

GEAC discused whether other suitable paths for the trail could be found, such as easements between houses linking the interior roads, which are primarily cul-de-sacs. Which would be less intrusive, a trail through the

CHARGES DROPPED IN GHI BREAKIN

According to State's Attorney spokeswoman Alexis Revis-Yeoman, "the office of the State's Attorney has declined to prosecute Wayne Allen Keys because the case had not been reviewed by this office with the arresting officer." 

What Will It Take? To the Editor:

Twisted metal, broken glass and death. Is that what it will take before a stoplight is installed at the intersection of Greenbelt Road and Lakecrest Drive? Maybe a 10-car pileup and multiple deaths? Maybe a lawsuit as a result of one of these accidents? On October 31, I saw what I think is becoming a much too popular scene at this intersection; another accident.

Someone decided it would be a great idea to build beautiful townhouses and office condominiums on an available parcel of land. Did anyone take into account the traffic congestion on an unusual street pattern? The road leading to the American Legion (and the new office condominiums) is perpendicular to Lakecrest Drive just before the stop sign on Lakecrest Drive. This is a particularly tricky spot under light traffic. Because people are not always paying attention to the basic rules of traffic (such as, who has the right of way), one has to pay special attention at this intersection. With the onslaught of a new residential and professional development, increased traffic and congestion is inevitable.

I have had some near misses at this treacherous intersection. It is nearly impossible to turn left onto Greenbelt Road during busy hours, and crossing the road to go to church is like playing a game of "Frogger". If you can make it across the street without getting hit, you get another try. Turning left onto Lakecrest from Greenbelt Road isn't much better, especially if someone is trying to turn left onto Greenbelt Road. People forget that the vehicle on the main thoroughfare has the right of way and try to "sneak" out in front of them. I am very afraid that one day this transportation planner's nightmare is going to get out of control and the situation with which I started my letter will come to fruition.

I'd like to see the City Council and Mayor support a petition to the state to get a traffic light installed at this intersection. If it is in progress, HUR-RAY! If not let's do something about it as citizens of this city.

easements between houses? GEAC voted to support retention of the spine as buffer. However, since five votes needed for a quorum and only four of the member organizations were represented, no further action could be taken.

Other City Issues

Sheldon Goldberg reported on discussions at recent city council meetings he had attended, including the hearing on the Steiner property, still scheduled for December 3, the progress of the traffic light for Hanover Parkway and Ora Glen Road (on hold) and possible changes in city election procedures in light of the change to universal registration. (All voters registered at the county level for rational, state and county elections are now eligible to vote in city elections without registering separately.)

Among the possibilities that council had raised and GEAC also discussed were direct election of the mayor, enlarging the size of the council and changing from two-year to four-year terms. Campaign expenses are expected to increase dramatically with universal registration, since nearly three times the number of voters will now be eligible to vote in city elections. If the council term were lengthened, candidates would have to incur campaign expenses less

Suggested at the GEAC meeting was some form of districting within the city. Costs could also be reduced if candidates only had to campaign in one section of the city. In addition, it was suggested that more candidates would run if they were not required to sway voters in all parts of the city but could represent their own neighborhood.

The November meeting was cancelled due to a scheduling conflict with one of the member associations. The next meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, December 6, at Hunting Ridge Community Center.

Frankfort Drive Survey Results In: Not One-Way

Residents and community groups have contacted city, State Highway Administration and other officials seeking ways to improve safety at the intersection of Greenbelt Road and Frankfort Drive. One of the proposals was to change Frankfort Drive to a one-way street inbound from Greenbelt Road to Morrison Drive. In October, the city sent out 241 surveys to residents of the five streets most affected by the change.

As of November 8, 154 surveys had been returned, a response rate of 64 percent. Respondents rejected the one-way proposal, with 65 percent opposed. Broken down by resident addresses, the responses are as follows:

Morrison Drive, 32 Yes, 51 No; Frankfort Place, 1 Yes, 5 No; Frankfort Court, 3 Yes, No; Jacobs Way, 12 Yes, 24 No; and Emily's Way, 6 Yes, 16 No; for totals of 54 Yes and 100

In the cover letter to the survey form, City Manager James Giese said that a traffic signal at the intersection does not appear possible. Nevertheless, 28 respondents said that what is needed is a traffic signal. number of respondents said that the letter did not tell them why a traffic signal would not be possible.

In rejecting the one-way option, nearly a dozen respondents said that the proposed solution would just exacerbate traffic problems on Hanover Parkway and Mandan Road. Another 10 said that the Hanover Parkway and Ora Glen Drive intersection

A number of other suggestions were made for the intersection, including restrictions on left turns to and from Greenbelt Road, no U-turn at the intersection, a flashing yellow light at the intersection, trimming trees at the

JOE'S TIPS OF THE WEEK

Hello Again ! As we start to get used to the cold weather and we get the windshield scraper out of the glove compartment to scrape the frost off the windshield we have a habit of letting the vehicle warm up a bit before sitting down on the cold hard pilots seat. Although it is not recommended to let your vehicle stand idling for long periods of time, we have to face the truth we all do it from time to time. The worst damage during this procedure is not in the internal structure of the engine but in the exhaust system where rot holes appear on the tops of the components and they cannot be visibly detected from the ground. With the cold weather we have a tendency to keep the windows rolled up to keep in the heat! What I have seen recently is shocking rot holes in the uppermost areas of the exhaust system. The vehicle has to be raised to feel the tops of these components for corrosion. Due to the muffling and insulation shields on the body components we tend not to hear any exhaust noises. Carbon monoxide gases are ODORLESS AND COLORLESS AND WILL MAKE YOU SICK!! IF NOT KILL YOU!! This is important because if these gases get into the passenger compartment, you must remember that adults have a stronger immunity to these types of gases than children. Keep this in mind if you don't feel good or the kids get sick, and I don't mean motion sickness, after a commute in your vehicle. Next time you get your vehicle serviced request an on top of the exhaust system inspection. What you find might surprise you and might make you feel better,




