Work continues to improve the water quality and health of Greenbelt Lake. The silt pond at the southern end of the lake has recently been dredged and enlarged. And engineering designs are being prepared for stream bank stabilization for the stream in the east end of the "Buddy" Attick Lake Park.

The forebay (silt pond) at the south end of the lake, near Charlestowne North, was dredged and enlarged in early June. A gabion weir was built to force sediments to settle out as the water flows out of the pond and in towards the lake. The weir looks like "rocks in a basket," according to the city's Director of Planning and Development Celia Wilson.
According to Wilson there will

always be standing water in the silt pond. Over 1,300 wetland plants will be planted at the water's edge and the rest of the bank will be seeded. The city's Horticulturist, Bill Phelan, will be planting additional plants in the autumn. "I don't said Wilson. East Stream think this will be an eyesore,"

The next project for improving the water quality in the lake is stream bank stabilization and habitat creation for amphibious animals along the stream that flows from Braden Field and along the east trail in the lake

There is erosion along the stream, said Wilson, and the intent is to stabilize the stream bank without it looking engineered. Currently there are slabs of broken concrete along part of the stream banks. They were placed there by the city several

The concrete slabs are working as an erosion barrier, said Wilson. The city has planted plants that are covering the

The first work will be done on the stream banks not stabilized. The engineers are evaluating all the options, including keeping the concrete and cover-ing the slabs with more aggressive plantings, said Wilson.

The city has hired Dames &

Moore to do the engineering work. This is the same firm that evaluated the water quality problems of and solutions for the lake several years ago.

The city has received about \$105,000 in grants for this project-\$30,000 from the state and \$75,000 from the Environmental Protection Agency. The city must match \$30,166 with city funds, which will be used to pay for the engineering work. The city's intent is to spread the money as far as possible and do as much as possible, said Wil-

The erosion problem is caused by a high volume of water rushing against unstabilized banks, explained Wilson. The pipe under the road by St. Hugh's school, near the east entrance of the lake park, concentrates the water and created the problem, she continued.

Unhealthy Lake
These projects "are part of an ongoing process to keep the lake healthy." said Wilson. Several years ago the lake was found to be full of sediments and possessing a high level of nutrients. The sediment was making the lake shallower and the nutrients were causing algae and water weeds to flourish. Part of the work to clean up the lake was to enlarge the silt pond at the east end of the lake and dredge the lake near the peninsula. This has decreased the amount of sediment and nutrients coming into the lake.

Activity in the central part of Greenbelt, most of which drains into Greenbelt Lake, affects the water quality of the lake. Sediment from such sources as construction projects or erosion and nutrients from such sources as excess lawn fertilizer and dog feces eventually ind their way into Greenbelt Lake.

The ceremony will take place at 8 p.m. at the Buddy Attick Lake-Park bandstand during the Greenbelt Concert Band's intermission. Emory Harman will serve as master of ceremonies. (In the event of rain, the festivities will be rescheduled for the next available clear night.)

Traditional patriotic selections will be played at 7 p.m. by the concert band conducted by John DelHomme, At dusk, the band will play Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture" to signal the start of this year's brilliant fireworks display. City employees Kenny Hall and Jimmy Kiefline will supervise the pyrotechnic show. According to Hall \$7,250 was spent on the fireworks.

The Greenbelt Police Department wants all residents to have a safe and happy holiday. Wherever possible, residents should walk to the Lake-Park, If walking is not possible, parking will be available on Lastner Lane, Ivy Lane, the shoulder of Crescent Road and the section of Ridge Road near the police station. Police Officer George Mathews cautions walkers to be care-ful because of the high volume of vehicular traffic. He notes that it is illegal and dangerous for individuals to shoot off fireworks and that laws banning them will be enforced.

New Contracts Seek to Tie School, Center Designs

As the redevolpment of the Roosevelt Center gains momentum, the Greenbelt City Council, following recommendations by the city staff, authorized two new contracts at the June 10 regular council meeting. The first would extend a present contract with Macris, Hendrick and Witmer/ Trace Associates, who were hired to provide engineering and landscape architecture for redesigning the Center parking lots, to include work on adjacent land.

The design plan, drawn up by the parking lots near the mulandscape architecture consult- nicipal building and the Coop supermarket from a north-south relocation of traffic islands in to an east-west orientation. Be-

port, "the master plan ideals should be extended to the school, and the engineering for the Roosevelt Center parking lots should consider ways to join the school and the center."

With that idea in mind, council agreed to extend the contract with the Macris firm to include site engineering for the adjacent school property. These additional services, which would cost \$9,300, would be paid for from the Capital Improvements reserves. Redesign of the municipal parking lots is being funded through a federal Community Development Block Grant,

Topographic Survey

The second contract authorized by council would go to A Morton Thomas and Associate, Inc. (AMT), which carried out a topographic survey in 1987 of the Roosevelt Center, the surrounding parking lots, and the park land extending north to the tennis courts. Recently the survey has been upgraded to reflect the changes to Center-

Because of the firm's familiarity with the area and their access to existing data resources. the city staff have recommended AMT as "the logical firm" to carry out a further survey to design site improvements (parking, storm drainage, and walkways) related to the Center School renovation. The cost for this additional survey would be \$5,760

Sidewalk Reconstruction

A third item at the meeting also related to the Roosevelt Center renovation, the city's certification of final costs of \$26, 123 for construction of sidewalk improvements on Centerway.

Based on an agreement between the owners, George and Lisa Christacos, and the city. which was signed in July 1979, the owners, whose property line extends three feet out from the buildings on both sides of the mall, would pay for all sidewalk improvements down to the curb

Asbestos Removal Begins at School

The removal of asbestos from long-vacant North End School is This work must be underway. completed before the structure can be demolished and a new Greenbelt Elementary School constructed. The contractor, Horizon Environment, Inc. of Pennsylvania, expects the process will take about 30 days. Asbestos warning signs were posted on June 12.

The initial step involves the re-moval of all friable asbestos which is described as "asbestos containing material which, when dry, may be crumbled, pulverized or reduced to powder by hand pressure. It is only when this material is damaged or deteriorated that asbestos poses a threat." Asbestos removel as a State requirement prior to demolishing an existing structure. Demolition of the North End School building is expected to take place by the end of the year. A combination demolition-construction bid will be advertised in August and awarded in October.

Construction of the new elementary school is scheduled for completion in December 1993, with students occupying the building in January 1994.



Police Blotter
