

Festival Offers Eating, Competing, Parading, Serenading, Pets & Bingo

The 1991 Greenbelt Labor Day Festival runs from August 30 through September 2 and brings a wide array of entertainers, carnival rides, games, contests, shows, exhibits and exotic and popular foods to the Center of Greenbelt for the enjoyment of all. This is the 37th Labor Day Festival, which is run by an allvolunteer committee to promote community spirit and involvement. The Festival draws not only current Greenbelt residents but hundreds of former Greenbelters, neighbors and visitors from throughout the area. A full schedule of Festival activities is shown in the four-page program apppearing in this issue only of the News Review. (Please save.)

Entertainment The 1991 Festival features non-stop entertainment on the Festival stage and highlights a talented variety of performers of all types. Headlining the show on Friday evening, August 30, are the Jello Boys, an Annapolisbased rock band, popular throughout the mid-Atlantic region "for their informal and unpretentious style, their eclectic choice of original and cover tunes, their superb musicianship and gentle irreverence." The Jello Boys play clubs in the Annapolis area, and are featured performers in Georgetown clubs. They are known for their sets flowing freely from rock & roll to reggae, rhythm & blues to swing, and classic psychedelic.

Christian the Magician and his expanded group of entertainers, known as Christian and Company, have entertained the Labor Day Festival crowds for many years. His high-spirited and dramatic-magical tricks amaze and delight his audiences each year.

D.C. Motors does a virtual history of rock & roll in its performances. Mixing comedy bits and audience participation, D. C. Motors creates the sounds of Elvis and the Boss and everything in between.

The musical sounds and styles of the 50s and 60s will be alive on the Festival stage, Saturday afternoon, August 31.

Don Mullins offers a unique, versatile and energetic performance in one of the oldest forms of entertainment—mime. He will be roving and performing through the carnival area to give festival-goers a chance to see this act up close and personal.

Rock & roll turns to blue grass when the Sprouts of Grass take the stage to present old-time traditional and original string band and blue grass music. Closing out Saturday's entertainment is Patricia Lynn and Timberline, playing country music with a kick. A seasoned and talented vocalist, she has been performing around this area for 10 years.

Grandsons of the Pioneers combine a comprehensive knowledge of musical history with technical skill and the whole is indeed greater than the sum of its parts. The Grandsons of the Pioneers may not be direct kin to Roy Rogers' western swing band, the Sons of the Pioneers, but they are definitely related in spirit. This band steps on the stage to begin the entertainment Sunday, September 1.

They are followed by Pandemonium Brass, which performs as a traditional brass quintet, but can also deviate from the traditional quintet instrumentation because each member plays several brass instruments. Among the styles of music represented in the repertoire are classical. baroque, ragtime, jazz, popular, contemporary, sacred and spiritual.

Registration Deadline Nears For Nov. 5 Council Election

On Tuesday, November 5, the citizens of Greenbelt will elect the five members of the City Council who will represent them for the next two years. Greenbelt citizens who want to be nominated for City Council, sign a petition for someone to run for council, and/or plan to vote in the election must be registered with Prince Georges County. This is the first year of universal voter registration for Greenbelt. The city no longer maintains a separate voter registration file for people who want to vote in city elections.

In addition to electing five council members, voters will be asked, in an advisory question, whether they favor increasing the council terms to four years. Such a change, if approved by voters and enacted by council, would not take effect until the 1993 election. Voter Registration

Registering to vote is the first step to qualify as a voter-to run for office or to vote for a candidate in the November 5 regular election. Although the county Board of Elections will handle all registrations, registration forms may be picked up during regular office hours at the city offices, 25 Crescent Road (Municipal Building), or at the Greenbelt Library, 11 Crescent Road. Voters may also call the Board of Elections at 627-2814 to request that a form be sent by mail. In addition, there will be a registrar at the Labor Day Festival. All completed forms must be received by the Board of Elections by October 7. **Voter** Qualification

Requirements

In order to vote in Greenbelt, and to be registered with Prince Georges County, one must be a citizen of the United States of America; at least 18 years of age as of November 5, 1991; domiciled within the corporate limits of the city of Greenbelt as of the date of registration; not convicted more than once of an infamous crime and not currently under a sentence imposed pursuant to a conviction of an infamous crime (direct questions to the election office, 952-3270); and not under guardianship for mental disability. Candidacy for Council

Any qualified voter of the city wishing to run for council may do so by obtaining from the city clerk and filing the following forms:

1. Nomination Petition — This form requires the signature of at least 50 qualified voters of the city, and must be signed by the circulator of the petition and notarized. The signatures should give the petitioners' proper name e.g., Mary Doe, not Mrs. John Doe and address.

2. Acceptance of Nomination— This form notes that the nominee agrees to serve, if elected. It must be filed along with the nomination petition.

3. Financial Disclosure Statement—This form lists business entities and real estate interests held by the nominee and family, and sources of specified

income or debt. The statement covers the period January 1, 1990 thru June 30, 1991. Candidates who had previously filed a statement for calendar year 1990 will be required to file a supplemental report for the period of January 1 thru June 30, 1991. The financial disclosure statement must also be notarized.

For the first time this year residents must be registered with Prince Georges County in order to vote in the city election. City Clerk Dorothy Lauber has discovered there are more than 800 residents who were registered with the city, but not with the county. Those residents must now register with the county if they wish to vote for the Greenbelt city council.

The deadline for filing to be a candidate in the November 5 regular election is Monday, September 23, at 5 p.m.

The City Clerk verifies that nomination petitions meet the requirements of the city charter. A drawing will be held by the Board of Elections in the City Offices on Tuesday, September 24 at 7:30 p.m. to determine the order in which the candidates' names shall be placed on the ballot. This meeting is open to the public; candidates, their families, supporters, and interested citizens may attend to witness the draw.

Candidates are also required to file a notarized interim report of campaign contributions no later than noon, October 18; and a final campaign contribution report must be filed no later than 5 p.m. Monday, November 11. This report shall list the name, address, and amount contributed of every contributor, other than the candidate or a member of his or her family, who has contributed more than \$25.00 in furtherance of the candidate's nomination and election.

Absentee Voting

In addition to coming to the News Review's basement office at 15 Parkway (deadline 10 p.m. Tuesdays), contributors may make use of the drop box in the Co-op supermarket (on the post near the rear door, deadline 6 p.m. Tuesdays), or mail the material (Box 68, Greenbelt, 20768, deadline Tuesday's mail). Materials should not be left under the door or through the mail slot at the Parkway location - they may be overlooked or lost.

Materials not received by the staff by Tuesday evening deadline will not be included in that week's paper. Anyone announcing a Thursday, Friday or Saturday event should submit the notice in time for the previous week's edition, since many readers do not receive their papers until Friday. All relevant dates should be included in the article. Price information may not be included, but the contributor may wish to indicate that the event is free or that there is a fee.

All materials submitted are subject to editing. In general, issues and events not involving or affecting Greenbelt or Greenbelters will not be printed. However, potential con-tributors may wish to consult a member of the editorial staff (see masthead) for clarification on borderline cases.

Due to space constraints, articles may not always be included in the News Review the week they are submitted, and occasionally it may be necessary to shorten an article in order to include it. Contributors can aid the staff, and their article's chances for timely inclusion, by placing the most important information in the first part of the article.

Obituaries, weddings and engagements are treated as separate articles and should be submitted as described above.

In addition to articles, everyone is invited and encouraged to submit announcements of births, graduations, honors, awards and other similar events to the "Our Neighbors" column. This information may be submitted by the

procedures above, or by calling Linda Savaryn at 474-5285. In short, the Greenbelt News Review is a community newspaper in the fullest sense of the word, published for the community by the community. The more people contribute to the News Review, the better it can serve the community's needs.

(Continued from page ione) the city may vote by absentee ballots. The first day to apply and vote by absentee ballot will Wednesday. October 16. (Please watch for city ads.)

Election of Council The five candidates each receiving at least 40 percent of the total number of votes cast and the highest number of votes cast will be elected. If fewer than five candidates receive at least 40 percent of votes cast, a run-off election will be held on Tuesday, November 12. Twice as many names of unsuccessful candidates

as there are positions to be filled will be submitted to the voters. In more than 20 years this has not been necessary.

Greenbelt does not have provisions for election of the mayor or mayor pro tem by the electorate. At the organization meeting on the Monday following the election (Monday, November 11) the newly elected council will elect the mayor and mayor pro tem. Traditionally, the new council has elected the highest vote getter to be mayor, and the second highest vote getter to be the mayor pro tem for the ensuing two-year term.

IRS Hosts Seminar On Electronic Taxes

Free seminars for tax preparers interested in participating in the electronic filing program during the upcoming tax filing season will be given by the Internal Revenue Service on August 29, at the Greenbelt Mar-riott Hotel. The seminars will be held at 10 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.

Tax preparers who participate in the electronic filing program are able to successfully transmit tax return data directly to the IRS over telephone lines from their computers. IRS acknowledgement that the return has been received is issued within two days of transmission.

Taxpayers who file electronic-ally receive refunds in about three weeks. Those who choose Direct Deposit receive it even sooner. This is much faster than the six to eight weeks it normally takes to get a refund check when people file a paper tax return.





Expansion of NASA Facility To Be Reviewed by Council

The proposed expansion of the Goddard Space Flight Center (GSFC) is on the city council's Monday, August 26 agenda in response to the National Capital Planning Commission (NCPC) which is seeking comments on the revised master plan for GSFC.

Manager Daniel G. Hobbs, after a briefing at GSFC on August 16, Planning and Development Director Celia Wilson noted that "The June 1991 revision is primarily related to GSFC's new involvement in the Earth Observing System Program (EOS) and related facilities improvements." NCPC is scheduled to act on September 5.

On the drawing boards are plans for a new campus on the east side of Soil Conservation Road, north of Greenbelt Road. The campus will house two buildings. The first, a 192.000

In a memorandum to City square - foot computer / office building (Earth Observing System Data Information System-EOSDIS), is programmed for "first occupancy" in fiscal year 1992, with full operation scheduled in fiscal year 1996. About 1,000 new employees are expected to be housed in this building, Wilson said, "with 500 working during the prime shift (8 a.m .-5 p.m.)"

> The second major buildingthe Earth System Science Building (ESSB)-will be located adjacent to the EOSDIS facility. Approximately 1000 current employees at Goddard will be housed in this new facility.

Wilson said that because of existing traffic congestion problems, "particularly those relating to traffic movement at the main gate," Goddard is considering the possibility of "closing the main gate to incoming traffic and relocating the main gate to Soil Conservation Road." The road would then be closed to through traffic. Another proposal is the "creation of a ring road to link the east campus to the main campus."

The parks crew maintained ballfields and playgrounds and continued work on the new bus shelter at the center.


The horticulturist's crew continued work on landscaping the City Office building. They maintained flower beds and trees around the city.

He is a member of the Maryland Bar, The District of Columbia Bar and the United States Supreme Court Bar.





GEAC Considers Options After Sunrise Ruling

Sheldon Goldberg of Windsor Green will take over as chair of the Greenbelt East Advisory Coalition (GEAC) from the departing James Foy, who will be moving out of Greenbelt. Goldberg was elected by acclamation at the August 1 meeting of GEAC at Greenbriar. Tim Sechrist of Greenbrook Estates was elected to fill the vice chair slot made vacant by Goldberg's election as chair.

Goldberg will take the gavel at the next meeting of GEAC on September 5 at 7:30 p.m. at Hunting Ridge.

Sunrise Appeal

Since the meeting was the first since Circuit Court Judge Jacob Levin lifted the Sunrise stop work order, GEAC spent much of its meeting discussing the implications of the ruling. Would Sunrise Development move immediately to construct the 467-unit twin apartment buildings? Would the county appeal the ruling to the Maryland Special Court of Appeals, to force compliance with the May

1990 Sectional Map Amendment's lower density zoning?

At that time County Council Chairperson Richard Castaldi and County Executive Parris Glendening had not reached a decision on whether to press the appeal, which could cost the county approximately \$60,000 in legal fees. Since the appeal must be filed with the court within 30 days of the judge's decision, issued on July 9, there would not be time for GEAC to take a position, have it approved by the member associations and communicate it to Castaldi and Glendening. asked if it would be helpful for individual homeowners and associations that could meet and take a position quickly to call Castaldi and Glendening and urge them to appeal. "Definitely," said Foye. group discussed various The possibilities for the future of the site, most of them contingent on the county appealing. Goldberg stated his belief that "we could win it on appeal" and get the current zoning, R-18-C, which calls for lower density condominiums.

Roy Dahl noted that the developer had asked in early February for the city and GEAC's support for a proposal for basically the same density buildings as condominiums rather than apartments. The proposal had included contributions for parkland development and some

traffic improvements as inducements. This proposal, rejected at the time, would be preferable to the high density apartments without the sweeteners.

Is the appeal winnable? Dahl asked. Given the judge's decision, would it not be practical to consider negotiating with the developer? Perhaps a high rise condo more dense than the R-18-C zoning would allow but less than the R-10 would be feasible. The appeal could provide leverage for bargaining with the developer for, at least, condos rather than apartments. Appeal and Win

"Density is the issue," Goldberg reiterated. If the developer wins the appeal he won't bother with condominiums and their complicated legal regime; rentals are easier to deal with. As evidence for this statement, Goldberg cited the statements of the developers at the February meeting.

Schilling noted that Ed GEAC has taken a position for low density, low rise development on the Sunrise Property. He also noted that the rental market is glutted throughout the Washington area and in Greenbelt, and wondered how soon Sunrise would really be built. "I believe we could win it on appeal." he said, "and get the current zoning-low density condos."

The consensus of the meeting was to put as much pressure as possible on the county officials to appeal the decision.

Fire-Retardant Plywood Goldberg shared a newspaper

article on progress toward set-tlement of the class action suits on fire-retardant plywood (FRP). The material, used in the roofs, is susceptible to a fungal-like growth that can cause structural damage if not detected early and treated. Many of the eastern developments, including Windsor Green, Green-brook Village and Greenbrook Estates, share this nationwide problem.


parties in the nationwide class-According to the article, the action suit against builders have gone to a mediator and reached a tentative agreement. There is hope of setting up a nationwide program for reimbursement to homeowners of their costs.

However, Sarah Cohn, Greenbrook Village's coordinator on this issue, said she had talked to the law firm involved and that the article was premature. The parties are still early in the process of negotiating.

Cohn reminded everyone that some builders may assume responsibility, or have it imposed, for replacement of roofs damaged by FRP. Homeowners should save receipts for all of their associated costs, including for inspections, testing and repair.

Dorothy Pyles, Greenbriar's gracious hostess, provided a farewell cake for Foy, who was toasted and wished well. Amid general accolades, Schilling characterized the last couple of years under Foy's leadership as GEAC's most productive years, noting such accomplishments as the Ora Glen light.

WIC Funds Increased

The Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene announced that the state's WIC (Women, Infants and Children) Program will be able to increase enrollment by nearly 20 percent thanks to \$630,000 in supplemen-tal funds received from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

These funds will be used to increase the number of pregnant women, infants and children receiving program benefits by approximately 10,000 between now and September 30.

The WIC Program provides supplemental foods such as infant formula, milk, juice, eggs and cereal to pregnant women, infants and children through their fifth birthday who have a low income (less than \$24,790 a year for a family of four) and who have a medical/nutritional need.


