

Year's Drama Production Plans

The Greenbelt Arts Center, which brings an array of performing arts to this city, has set its schedule for the 1991-1992 drama and music series. Beginning in September a dramatic or musical performance will be offered virtually each month in various locations in and around the Greenbelt community. The performances will be publicized throughout the city and the metropolitan area and season tickets will be offered as well as those for individual performances.

Organization

In developing its artistic program, the Arts Center has identified many opportunities for volunteers to take an active role in the arts program, to learn more about theater and its production, and to express their musical interests. Central to future plans for the Arts Center is the projected permanent home for its productions and performances, the "black box" theater, which is planned as part of the Greenbelt Community Center.

The Greenbelt Arts Center is guided by a Board of Directors, recently selected, and officers. These include Marie Tousignant, president; Virginia Zanner, vice president; Beatrix Whitehall, recording secretary; Frank Perlman, corresponding secretary; and Willard Larkin, treasurer. All members of the Greenbelt Arts Center are invited to periodic meetings to participate in program planning. Volunteers throughout the community are welcome to join in a wide variety of activities.

1991-1992 Drama Series

Mary Lou Fisher is season producer for the center's drama series. She is an experienced director, not only of Greenbelt productions. She has frequently directed NASA's MAD productions and those of other local theater groups. Fisher, one of the founders and developers of the Prince Georges Publick Playhouse is responsible for many aspects of its technical design. She welcomes newcomers to join in all aspects of the drama productions, emphasizing opportunities to learn about theater and to be part of a professional endeavor when involved in the drama series. volved in the drama series. She says, "We welcome experienced artistic and technical staff, but all we really require is interest. enthusiasm and some time—we will train and teach you all you need to know."

"Heaven Can Wait" is the first play of the 1991-1992 Drama Series. This touching comedy will be directed by veteran Marie Tousignant. Performances will be staged at the modern theater in nearby Capitol College. David Wilson is responsible for set design for this production. Performances are scheduled for the last two weekends in September and the first weekend in October. Greenbelters may be familier with the story of "Heaven Can Wait" from the movie starring Warren Beatty, Dyan Cannon and Julie Cristie or the earlier classic version, "Here Comes Mr. Jordan," with James Mason. Greenbelters cast in the production are Judy Holland as the messenger; John DeMeo as Tony; and David Wilson in a lead role as Joe Pen-delton and Mrs. Farnsworth. Others from Greenbelt involved in the production are Trix Whitehall, Frank Perlman, Tom Zan-ner, Gerry Schmerl, Jeannette Connor, and Virginia Zanner.

Greenbelt's Ben Rosenzweig Is 1991's Outstanding Citizen

The history of Greenbelt has been interwoven with the activities of the 1991 recipient of the Outstanding Citizen award since the very earliest days of this community —a connection that has existed right up to the present time. Whether the topic was housing, or financial backing, or providing a retail outlet, or enhancing a social organization—this citizen was involved. His name is Ben Rosenzweig, and practically everyone in town knows who he is. For Ben and his wife, Ethel, have lived in Greenbelt since 1938. All that time they have lived in the same house in the 4 Court of Crescent Rd., in the original A Block of the town development.

In announcing the name of the award recipient, Tom Renahan, chair of the committee to choose the Outstanding Citizen, read from the first issue of the Greenbelt Cooperator, the original name for the News Review, an often-quoted editorial entitled "We Pioneers." In the piece, writer Mary Van Cleve describes her fellow townspeople as "pioneers—of a new way of living. We are the sculptors," she wrote, "handling the clay of a new community."

Ben Rosenzweig was one of those pioneers, Renahan assured the crowd-one who early became active in working through cooperatives to solve community problems. For example, in the earliest times Rosenzweig worked as a staff member on the Cooperator. He was also a founding member of Greenbelt Consumer Services, developed by early settlers to provide a retail food store, gas station, and other services in town when Greenbelt was remote from any other city. He continued to serve on the board of GCS until 1984, when the cooperative gave up its grocery store.

He has also served in various ways in GHI through the years and was instrumental in the founding of the Greenbelt Credit Union, which provided loans to many town residents who, as World War II veterans, formed the housing cooperative in order to buy their homes from the federal government.

Always active in the Jewish community, Rosenzweig served several terms as president of what is now known as the Mishkan Torah congregation and helped in the physical labor of actually constructing the original building. He has also served since its beginning, in 1967, on the city's Community Relations Advisory Board. When his sons were young, he was active with the Boy Scouts.

Recently residents have noted his involvement in the committee on housing for the elderly, when he announced his interest through this paper's Letters-tothe-Editor columns.

As Renahan said in making the award, "Many have observed that his personal style is seldom quiet and never boring, and he See ROSENZWEIG, page 5, col. 3

Family Gift Honors

Charles Granofsky Jane E. Sweeney

Former Greenbelter Charles Granofsky, 78, died on August 30 after a long illness. He was the husband of former News Review editor Mary Granofsky. They left Greenbelt in the mid-1970's when they moved to New Carrollton.

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Granofsky was a violinist of some note. A scholarship student at Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore from 1927 to 1934, he graduated with a B.A. in music from the University of Maryland. Following a few years in the Baltimore Symphony in the 1930's and a few in the National Symphony, he joined the Air Force Band, where he performed as leader of the Strolling Strings. As a member of the Strolling Strings he traveled throughout the United States and Europe, often performing at the White House, especially during the Kennedy administration, where the group was a favorite of the First Lady. He also taught instrumental music in the Prince Georges County public school system and directed vocal choruses. Greenbelters will remember some of his solo peformances at civic and social events in the city.

At one time, Granofsky was concert master of the Prince Georges Philharmonic Orchestra.

A service was held on September 1 at Gasch's Funeral Home in Hyattsville. Following the formal service, nine of Granofsky's former colleagues from the Strolling Strings performed numbers, including the Barcarolle from "Tales of Hoffman" and "The Blue Danube Waltz." which he had arranged for the group. They concluded with one of his original compositions, "Fiddle Capers."

Granofsky is survived by his wife and two daughters from a former marriage, Persis Funk and Charlotte Hummon, two stepsons and two stepdaughters, five sisters, four brothers, 15 grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren. Interment services will be held at Arlington National Cemetery on Friday, September 6 at 10 a.m.

Bill Shields ran his career the very same way-as a caring neighbor who not only saw that the mail got where it belonged (at the expense of his knees and elbows) but also got to know the residents and helped them on many occasions. Some of my fondest memories are of helping him assist a Greenbelter in the evening or on the weekend with a stubborn appliance or some other fix-it or move-it chore. He also was an assistant Scoutmaster, Troop 229. Thank you for this opportunity to recognize Bill Shields as a Greenbelt Pioneer who truly 'carried the mail' as a parent, as a neighbor, and as a servant of the community.

Renahan Appointed to County **Human Relations Commision**

Greenbelter Tom Renahan has been appointed to the Prince Georges County Human Relations Commission by County Executive Parris Glendening on the recommendation of Prince Georges County Council chair Richard Castaldi. Renahan lives in the Hunting Ridge development and came to Greenbelt in 1983.

The Commission was formed in 1972 and, according to Executive Director William Welch, its purpose is to protect and defend civil rights in the county. The Commission has a mediation board consisting of 13 members and has enforcement powers. They hear complaints that are certified to them by the court system, when the participants agree to have the matter settled by the Board. "Once disputes are settled by the Board, the court will usually dismiss the case," says Welch.

Some of the issues covered include property rights, boundary disputes and domestic conflicts. The Commission also offers assistance in leadership development for various organizations in prejudice reduction, leadership, mediation and conflict resolution.

Police Blotter

GHI Board Reviews Contract Draft and Mortgage Lender

On August 8, the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) held the last of its monthly summer meetings. Topics on the agenda included the review of a draft new Mutual Ownership Contract, member requests to purchase the boiler rooms in their basements, and a request from a mortgage corporation to provide loans for GHI homes.

Mutual Ownership Contract GHI staff have been working with the corporation attorney to draft a proposed Mutual Ownership Contract which will bring the existing document into compliance with current practice and also result in a more readable understandable document. and The discussion by the board of this draft included editorial and substantive comments including the use in the contract of words such as 'rent' instead of payments, which was thought to be confusing. Sections of the contract that covered monthly payments, maintenance and occupancy also came under scrutiny.

In reviewing the document Board President Wayne Williams commented on the frequently held misconception that GHI payments were due on the tenth of the month, not the first. Payments are due on the first, but GHI has a 10-day grace period. The grace period does not begin on the tenth.

There was also a lively discussion on the occupancy regulations as specified in the contract. Questions arose on temporary visitors, such as foreign exchange students. General Manager Ron Colton indicated that this section had not been changed and that GHI members have a responsibility to obtain GHI's written approval when having a person, not on the occupant list, stay in their home for a period of greater tha. 45 days.

Boiler Rooms

Selected homes with base-

ments have a shared boiler room which has been unused since rehab. Two members with adjacent units on Crescent Road had applied to purchase the sections under their homes. The board had previously approved the sale of similar areas to other owners for the sum of \$200. One sale was approved outright. The other request was tabled due to a violation of minimum yard standards.

New Mortgage Lender

Arbor National Mortgage Corporation, a New York-based mortgage company with an office in Rockville, is requesting that GHI enter into a recognition agreement to provide loans. Arbor has reviewed GHI corporate documents and found them satisfactory, Arbor, however, has not been willing to meet one of GHI's requirements which is to provide a copy of their finan-cial statement. It was anticipated that a loan officer with the company would attend this meeting to respond to concerns. However, she was not present at

the meeting. Director Williams and other board members indicated that they were very interested in expanding the number of qualified sources of mortgages, but felt that GHI's requirements could not be overlooked. If something were to happen to a mortgage company, GHI would be affected even though the principal signer is

the member who purchased the house. Williams also indicated that Arbor is a privately-held corporation and such corporations are often unwilling to share financial statements. That does not mean that there is anything wrong with the company, but GHI does need to protect itself. The board requested management to continue to press for a financial statement and to look into other ways that their financial standing might be verified. Other Items

Each spring the National Co-operative Bank (NCB) conducts a nationwide scholarship contest in which high school seniors are encouraged to write essays on the cooperative form of business. The Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative (COOP) has requested that they and GHI jointly sponsor the program at Eleanor Roosevelt High School. The prize for the national winner is \$1500. Board member Donald Comis agreed to act as the advisor/liaison with the school. Williams thought that there would be more interest if there could be a local winner as well. Staff will check with the NCB to see if this can be worked out.

The Audit Committee presented a report at the meeting which included recommendations in a number of areas. They encouraged the board to work on a five-year plan, with priority given to the maintenance department. They also suggested in-vestigating the possibility of installing water-saving toilets; reinstating the exhaust fan program, or developing a new program for solving moisture problems; and providing refresher courses for all maintenance personnel.
