Four Incumbents File for Council Election; Zugby, Roberts Challenge

Six Greenbelters will be competing for five council seats in the upcoming city council election on November 5. The latest candidates to file were incumbents Thomas X. White and Edward V.J. Putens and challengers Rodney Roberts and Robert C. Zugby.

Also running are Mayor Gil Weidenfeld and Councilmember Antoinette Toni Bram. This week Councilmember Joseph Isaacs announced that he will not be a candidate (see letter).

White Biography

White has lived in Greenbelt for the past 32 years, residing at 8 Woodland Way with his wife, Helen, and family for the last 25 years.

A native Washingtonian, he was educated in the parochial school system there, graduating from Gonzaga College High School in 1953. After attending Georgetown University for one year, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and served for five years as a Medical Corpsman.

In 1959 he enrolled at the University of Maryland, moving with his family to Greenbelt. In 1962 he earned a B.S. degree in microbiology and has worked for almost 30 years in the field of medical products. For the past 15 years he has been employed by the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association, where he is Associate Vice President for Manufacturing and Quality Control.

White began his active community service in 1962 when he served with the Greenbelt Jay-Cees, the Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt, and various committees and elective offices in Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI). He served on the GHI Audit Committee for three years, the GHI Board of Directors for four years, and served as treasurer of GHI during 1973-74. He was one of the founders of the Greenbelt Save Our Community Committee (SOCC). SOCC was instrumental in preventing the location of a planned three-school complex on Parcel 1 west of the Baltimore - Washington Parkway.

White was first elected to the City Council in 1973 and has served nine terms. While on the council he participates in county, regional, state, and national organizations dealing with municipal affairs. His current leadership activities include:

Secretary, Prince Georges Democratic Central Committee; member, Environmental Policy Committee, Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (MWCOC); member, Maryland Municipal League (MML) Board of Directors; member, MML Executive Committee; and member, MML Communications Committee.

Other memberships include:

National League of Cities Advisory Council; Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Policy Committee of the National League of Cities; Mary-

land General Assembly Joint Commission on Federal/State/Local Relations; and alternate member, MML Legislative Committee.

During the past year White was appointed by the General Services Administration as part of its "Art in Architecture Program" to serve on the Advisory Panel coordinating arrangements for art features in the design stage of the proposed U.S. Federal District Court Building on Cherrywood Lane. White also was appointed to the GHI Finance Committee this past year.

White is a member of Greenbelt American Legion Post No. 136, Citizens for Greenbelt, and the Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative. He is a charter member and former president of the Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt Democratic Club. He was appointed by council to serve on the Board of Greenbelt Access Television (GATE), an organization formed to promote community access on cable television. An avid Redskins fan, White has worked as a Redskins usher for the past 32 years. In 1988, he retired from the U.S. Naval Reserve after 34 years of service.

Dear Fellow Greenbelters:

With a very heavy heart, I announce that I will not seek reelection to City Council in November. The rigors associated with my new post as chief executive officer of the National Health Council have been enormously time-consuming and I see no let-up in sight any time soon. Believing firmly that family must always come first, I will not permit the growing strains of juggling my professional career and public service to reduce the quality of our home life.

I love this city and its people, however, so my decision was emotion-filled. I am very proud of my three terms on Council and what has been accomplished. In 1985, I first ran and won while serving as co-chair of Citizens for the Bond Issue. During my tenure on City Council, Greenbelt has, among many other things, acquired more than 270 acres of open space, constructed a new police station, refurbished the outdoor pool and built a state-of-the-art indoor pool, revitalized the Roosevelt Center, and begun the development of a new 42-acre Greenbelt East park (which I regret did not get underway sooner).

I believe Council has done well these past six years and, quite frankly, has never worked more effectively together than now. This was reflected well in our successful efforts to drastically reduce our current budget without significant service cutbacks and by our exemplary selection of a new City Manager. Preparing for Metro's arrival, developing our new Community Center, and confronting growing public safety, environmental, and traffic pressures in and around the city all lie ahead. I will miss greatly being at the forefront

of this activity.

To the many of you who have been so helpful in the past and so encouraging about my reelection, I appreciate deeply your continued support and know you will respect my decision. To all Greenbelters, thanks so very much for the honor and privilege of serving you. The experience has been richly rewarding. Perhaps someday I'll be asking for your vote again. Until then, however, I'll be working from the sidelines to do what I can to keep Greenbelt great.







A Fun Evening With "Heaven"

Nobody is going to believe the plot of the current play, "Heaven Can Wait," presented by the Greenbelt Arts Center. But that's all right. Even the classical theorist Aristotle excused comedy from having to adhere to the rules of probability. If you accept the play's premise that a soul is taken off prematurely to what might be called the heavenly sorting station, and that the folks up there have to find some way to rectify the error, then you're in for an evening's fun.

As Joe Pendleton, a New Jersey prize fighter, erstwhile saxophone player, and pilot of small planes, David Wilson pulls us into the early frustrations for this homeless soul whose urgent need is to find an unoccupied body. When he accepts temporarily a wealthy but sickly banker's situation, Joe's obsession with bodily conditioning (complete with punching bag, exercise bike, and weight-lifting equipment in the living room and plenty of workouts by the indefatigable Wilson) nonplusses the banker's wife (played by Rachel Spaght) and her oily lover (John D. DiMeo), who thought they had successfully murdered her husband. From his role as banker, Joe works to clean up an unethical financial deal while simultaneously preparing for a championship fight.

In this latter role he calls on his former fight manager, Max Levene, played brilliantly by Bill Fedorshik, whose body language, voice, and choices of clothing suggest that he must have had a very close real-life acquaint-

ance with the business. Interchanges between Max and Joe constitute some of the liveliest moments in the play.

Other strong roles are carried by Jack Goldklang as Mr. Jordan and Judith Holland as Messenger 7013, two of the heavenly intermediaries, and by Norma Ozur and Lynda Earle in small walkons as housekeeper and maid. Hope Cullen's role as love interest for Joe is less successful; the electricity was somehow missing between these two.

The Arts Center group must be commended for the creative


way they have learned to handle the stage limitations of the Capitol College auditorium. While a comfortable seating space for the audience, the auditorium lacks both a stage curtain and much backstage room. In this production, which at the beginning requires a large cast of recently departed souls to take their heavenly assignments, director Marie Tousignant had them seat themselves in the front rows of a roped-off area at one side, from which they could walk forward one by one as their names were called. Was there a hidden message — that they were drawn from among ourselves?

The play continues for two more weekends, September 27, 28 and a matinee on the 29 and October 4 and 5. Capitol College is easy to reach. It's just off the Baltimore-Washington Parkway at the Powdermill Road exit. Turn left and then take the first turn to the right along a wooded road paralleling the Parkway.
