## City Council Hears Citizen Views On Greenbelt East Traffic Signal

Road improvements in Greenbelt East, planned or desired, were a major topic of conversation at the October 28 regular meeting of the Greenbelt City Council. Council heard an update on planned improvements to Hanover Parkway and went on record supporting a traffic signal at the intersection of Greenbelt Road and Frankfort Drive.

### Frankfort Drive

By unanimous vote, council went on record supporting a fully functioning traffic light at the intersection of Greenbelt Road and Frankfort Drive and lowering the speed limit on Greenbelt Road. As an interim step, they opposed closing the Greenbelt Road median at the intersection but supported installation of a signal that would operate only during the periods crossing guards are on duty and which would be operated by those guards.

Residents, Greenbelt East homeowner associations and the staff and Parent-Teacher-Student Association (PTSA) of Eleanor Roosevelt High School have been arguing for some time for a traffic signal at the intersection of Frankfort Drive and Greenbelt Road. This road is located at the crest of a hill opposite the Greenbelt Road exit from Eleanor Roosevelt High School.

These groups cite concerns about both pedestrian and vehicular safety at this intersection. By all accounts, traffic in the area generally exceeds the 45 m.p.h. speed limit. The lack of shoulders also makes police enforcement difficult. Even right turns into or out of Frankfort can be difficult because of heavy traffic, with no safe area to slow or accelerate.


At an October 15 meeting sponsored by the Windsor Green Homeowners Association, State Highway Administration officials offered to install a signal to be operated by the crossing guards. While those present at the meeting welcomed this offer, they opposed the SHA's insistence that the light could only be installed if the median were closed.

### Signal Positions

Afterwards School Representative Suzanne Plogman took the issue to the county School Board, which, on October 17, voted unanimously to support installation of a traffic signal and reducing the speed limit in the area.

Citing advice from the school system's safety officer, Plogman also opposed closing the median. She said that she would continue to fight for a fully functioning light.

Leta Mach, vice president of the Roosevelt PTSA, said that her organization holds that a



fully functioning light is a necessity but as an interim measure, supports a crossing guard-operated light. The group also wants a reduction in speed and the median to remain open.

David Lychenheim, president of the Windsor Green Homeowners Association, presented the board's position that the city should pursue a crossing guard-operated light and despite county budget cuts, the continued stationing of crossing guards at the intersection. The board members opposed closing the median at Frankfort and plan to continue working for a fully functioning light. Other actions supported by the board include a midweek traffic study of the Frankfort Drive intersection, a count of the pedestrians crossing Greenbelt Road at Hanover Parkway, creation of a full-width right lane on Greenbelt Road between Hanover Parkway and Cipriano Road and reduction of the speed limit in the area to 40 mph.

### Hanover Parkway Influence

Debra Smith of the Windsor Green Board brought up an additional consideration. The city expects work to begin soon on a third left turn lane from Hanover Parkway onto Greenbelt Road. According to Director of Planning and Development Celia Wilson, when this lane is created, the break in the Hanover Parkway median between Safeway and Commerce Center I will be closed to provide enough "stacking room" for vehicles waiting at the light. Wilson said that the light was required under the county's adequate public facilities requirements for the construction of Green Spring.

Smith was concerned that with the closing of the Hanover Parkway median, more traffic would be diverted up Ora Glen Drive. A light at Frankfort Drive would permit many drivers currently using Ora Glen to use Greenbelt Road instead.

### Speeding

One complaint frequently heard from citizens and homeowners associations is the con-

stant speeding in that area of Greenbelt Road. The SHA, which opposes lowering the speed limit, presented studies showing that the previous reduction from 50 to 45 mph had no effect on average speeds.

While the city police emphasize their concern about the problem, they say that enforcement is made difficult by the lack of a safe area in which to pull over and ticket violators. City Manager Daniel G. Hobbs said that the city has ordered a screen size radar display. This screen will be placed on top of a patrol car. When the officer "shoots" a driver with the radar gun, the driver's speed will register on the screen. He said that this action will leave "a clear message" that drivers are being monitored. He acknowledged, however, that the city will still need to follow up with some form of enforcement.

Council members Edward Putens and Thomas X. White were impatient with the argument that the lack of shoulders prevents police from pulling over violators. Putens noted that police in the District of Columbia stop motorists in the traffic lanes.

### Ora Glen Light

There is slightly happier news about the light at the intersection of Hanover Parkway and Ora Glen Drive. During the summer the city installed a light at that intersection but has been unable to construct the left turn lane and complete the remaining work until Pepco moved a utility pole. Hobbs said that Pepco had missed its deadline several times.

Since the council meeting, Pepco has finally completed this work and the left turn lane has been constructed. Wilson told the News Review that she expects the light to be operational on flasher within one month.

Once the work is complete, the State Highway Administration will activate the light. For the first few weeks, the light will flash, to alert drivers to the presence of the new signal.

## Farewell to Isaacs Closes His Last Council Meeting

The Greenbelt City Council faced its last regular council meeting of the current term with the knowledge that, unlike other recent years, there would be at least one new face at the table the next time council assembled. As is its custom, council took a few minutes at the end of the session so each member could reflect back on the two-year term just ending.

David Lychenheim beat council to the punch, rising during petitions and requests to thank Joseph Isaacs for his time and effort on council. Because of the demands of work and family, Isaacs did not run for reelection.

Isaacs looked back at six "mostly wonderful" years during which the citizens demonstrated again and again their tremendous dedication to the city. He noted that his experience and growth in the council position contributed, "in no small way," to his becoming chief executive of his association, the job which makes it impossible for him to continue on council.

All the council members praised Isaacs and expressed sadness that he would no longer serve on council. Council member Antoinette M. Bram predicted that he would "be back somewhere politically" in the future.

Other common themes sounded by most or all council members were praise for the city staff, including those who recently retired and those who have filled their shoes, and praise for the way that council has pulled together during the last two years, despite, in Bram's phrase, "some shouting matches."

### Pool Petition

Carol Price presented a petition with 500 names calling for council to keep all lap lanes in the new pool open for the public between 6 and 8 a.m. She was concerned about the recent agreement giving the Greenbelt swim team expanded use of the pool and about the plans of the Roosevelt swim team for morning practices. She said that "those of us who paid for this facility should have more time to use it."

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld suggested that council refer the pe-

tition to staff, asking them to work out a compromise on this issue and to develop a general policy statement covering pool usage. Bram favored hiring a consultant with experience in pool scheduling, but found little support.

Aquatics Supervisor George Rogala explained that the Roosevelt swim team will practice in four lanes from 6 to 7:30 a.m. from Monday through Friday beginning November 15. Three lanes will remain open for public lap swimming. He also noted that the pool staff has been recording pool usage. The highest morning usage is at 6:30 a.m. when an average of 5.25 people are in the pool.

### City Manager's Award

City Manager Daniel G. Hobbs presented Kenny Hall with a City Manager's Award in recognition of Hall's service as Acting Public Works Director from George Smith's resignation in January 1990 until the recent hiring of Carl Hirsch.

### Fire Equipment

Under the consent agenda, council approved the release of the \$93,105 set aside in the budgets for fiscal years 1991 and 1992 for fire equipment purchases. The funds will be used, along with fire department funds, to pay off loans on previous equipment purchases.

### Legislation

Council cleaned its legislative slate, passing several ordinances under a suspension of the rules that normally require first and second readings in separate council meetings. The ordinances approved:

Increase the distance poll workers must stay from the poll entrance to 300 feet, up from the old 100 foot limit. This ordinance implemented the decision approved at the July council meeting and passed by the same 4-1 vote with Weidenfeld opposed.

Advanced the repaving of Hanover Parkway from Greenbelt Road to Ora Glen Drive to this year from next year to permit the city to "piggy back" on a county bid. By this action, the Hanover Parkway project and the resurfacing of Research Road from 9 Court to the Agricultural Center can be accomplished for 25 percent less than the amount budgeted.

### Courthouse Site

Under the consent agenda, council accepted a petition from the General Services Administration for the city to annex the federal courthouse site at the corner of Cherrywood Lane and Edmonston Road (Kenilworth Avenue).

# GHI Board Wraps Up Budget and Related Issues

The regular bimonthly Thursday meeting of Greenbelt Homes Inc. (GHI) on Nov. 7 was unbelievably fast paced. The excused absences of four of the nine-member board of directors may have helped hurry things along. Vice president Ray McCawley presided.

The approved process for the GHI annual budget for 1992, which began several months ago, is nearing an end; after almost a year, county approval for a landfill to cover an unauthorized dump behind GHI headquarters appears to be near; and the Woodlands Committee has nearly completed its investigation of how best to manage woodlands owned by GHI. In other actions the board approved the 1992 budget for its apartment houses and continued work on the proposed contract for sewer repair. The board also voted to move the management of the retirement plan for GHI employees to a bank headquartered in Maryland.

### GDC Budget

A GHI subsidiary, Greenbelt Development Corp. (GDC), owns two apartment buildings on Parkway. The 1992 budget for GDC, as presented by Ronald Colton, the general manager, was adopted unanimously by the board. Income and expenses balanced out at about \$300,000.

Apartment rents will be upped about five percent. Garage rents will be increased to \$23 per month for vehicles and \$63 month for storage.

### Sewer Replacement

The second reading of the proposed replacement of failing sewer lines included several revisions. The storm sewer in the 11 Court of Ridge Road was included, as well as the fire hydrant at the end of Hamilton Place near GHI headquarters.

During the meeting it was learned that this is the only fireplug owned by GHI. Appar-

ently all the others were turned over by the federal government to the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission when the government got out of the housing business. The hydrant needs cut-off valves so that when it is necessary to shut it off for repairs, neighboring GHI housing units will not be deprived of water. New shut-offs will be included under the sewer replacement contract with J and M Utilities, at a total cost of \$28,240.

### 401(k) Plan Moved

In 1990 GHI began an employee retirement plan pursuant to Section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code. Sovran Bank, which set up the plan, has administered it since then. However, GHI has not been happy with the timeliness of Sovran's service since Sovran merged with an out-of-state bank some months ago. Colton said: "We suspect that this is due to staffing cutbacks which are promoted as one of the benefits of bank mergers."

The board voted unanimously to authorize Colton to switch the 401(k) plan to the Citizens Bank of Maryland. Colton reported that the deal with Citizens was very attractive. Administrative costs will be cut in half. Reports to GHI employees will be made quarterly instead of semi-annually, as with Sovran. Moreover, Citizens has four different investment funds, Sovran only three.

### N & E Committee

The Nominations and Election (N&E) Committee expenses for 1991 are projected to reach \$3,044. The report was prepared at the request of board member Margaret Hogensen, who asked for a breakdown of legal expenses for last May's annual meeting. The manager's memorandum showed that these expenses totaled \$1,432.50, or almost half the budget of the N & E Committee. Other expenses included election banners, \$220; printing of candidates' biographies in the News Review, \$378; notices of the annual meeting in the News Review, \$482.

Board members McCawley and

Donald Comis praised Susan Walker and the committee members for their role in publicizing the annual meeting. They felt that the N & E Committee banners and other publicity played an important role in the large turnout of GHI members at the annual membership meeting in May.

### Standard and Poors

In view of the current downward trend in interest rates, Colton is positioning GHI so that it can take advantage of lower rates by refinancing its loans. To this end, Colton invited representatives of Standard and Poors to examine GHI financial accounts and make a walking tour of the property. The representatives were impressed with the reserve program for unexpected financial outlays. They gave GHI a tentative AA rating. To get a AAA rating, GHI would have to "have an oil well," explained Colton. The visitors asked why all of the block homes were not getting vinyl siding.

### Winding Down

After listening to five different presentations of the 1992 budget over the past three months, the board unanimously adopted a first reading of the manager's proposed operating budget for 1992 in the amount of \$6,473,026. The budget raises members' charges an average of 5.5 percent.

The grading permit to cover the dump behind GHI headquarters is expected this month from county authorities. Plans call for a three-foot-thick clay cap over the dump. To avoid polluting nearby streams the plans call for a rock-filled pit, 120 feet long by 35 feet wide and 7 feet deep, to hold runoff water. The area will be planted with seedling trees at the rate of 1,000 per acre.

The Woodlands Committee is nearing the end of its investigation of how best to manage the 82.5 acres of forest that GHI owns. Alan Freas, board member and chairman of the committee, requested board advice on getting legal opinion on several items in the environmental easement.

### Other

There is no money in the budget to clean the vinyl siding on frame homes this winter. Since most of the cost is labor, GHI prefers to wait until next summer when student labor is available. In the meantime, GHI will make available a ladder, a water swirl brush, and a bottle of cleaner free of charge to interested frame home owners.


