## Glendening Proposes Billion County Budget Dollar Budget, Tax Hikes

Prince Georges County Executive Parris Glendening has submitted to the County Council the first billion dollar proposed county budget. The budget request of the Prince Georges Board of Education is fully funded in Glendening's budget and 55 police officers and 30 firefighters are proposed to be added to the present county forces. The bad news is that County residents will be paying higher taxes and the level of expenditure for many county services will be cut.

#### **County Budget Increased**

by James Giese On April 21, County Execu-tive Parris Glendening advised the County Council that he had revised the County budget following actions taken by the state legislature in the recently completed session. The budget will be increased by \$5.5 million to \$1,023,320,379. The added funds will be used to increase the size of the Police Department by another 25 officers bringing the total additions proposed to 80; to add 20 correctional officers; and to allocate \$2.5 million as an offset to lessen the impact on municipal taxpayers from reductions in the Municipal Tax Differential.

At this time no decision has been announced as to how the \$2.5 million will be used to relieve the impact of tax differential reductions. It is expected that the money will be utilized to reduce the amount of increase in the County property tax projected for many of the taxpayers residing in municipalities. The initial county budget had proposed a 14 cent tax rate increase for property within Greenbelt. The added funds in this supplemental budget could reduce the amount of that increase by as much as 9 cents. Glendening has clearly stated, however that this reduction in the proposed county tax rate is possible only if his proposal to increase the income tax surtax by 20% is authorized by the County Council.

At present, only budget summaries have been made available. The complete budget is expected to be available May 1. The County Council plans to adopt the budget on

> funding of APEX (a state determined funding formula based upon number of students) at an increase of \$29.7 million and a \$5 million increase in magnet

Glendening advises that 25 of the new police officers will be used to increase the county's Community Oriented Policing efforts. Even though the number of personnel will be increased, budgets for police and fire will be reduced over the current year's approved level by 5.1% and 7.1% respectively.

Except for debt service, deficit reduction (the county had an \$80 million deficit in FY1991 and had to temporarily borrow \$60 million) and education, county spending has been reduced by \$12.2 million. Even so, total county expenditures for its General Fund are budgeted at \$1,017.860,000, an increase over the current budget of 3.4%.

Reduced Work Force

Glendening notes that the county has had to reduce its work force by over 1300 persons and that employees had to give up pay increases over a two year period of \$20 million. They also suffered a 3.8% further loss of pay as a result of furloughs.

"Our County Government today is much different than years past," Glendening states. "We are a leaner organization. Working with our citizens and employees, we have taken the opportunity presented by this fiscal situation to reassess the mission of government, strengthen our operations and develop creative approaches to service delivery. The Proposed Budget . . . begins to move our County out of the economic chaos of the last year into a period when we can begin to stabilize govern-ment services."

After finishing the Walk, a shuttle will take walkers to Sandy Point State Park where they can participate in the Bayfest activities until 4 p.m. Shuttles will take them back to the parking areas.

The Walk will be cancelled in the event of inclement weather or high winds.

Parking Scofflaws Beware, You Might Get the Boot!!

Greenbelters have two months to get ready to participate in, or to avoid, the city's new enterprise to balance the budget by raising vehicular fines. On July 1 two new ordinances will go into effect that are expected to raise municipal revenues. Both were approved by the city council at a regular meeting on April 20.

In the past our readers have gotten by with a mere \$10 fine for a routine parking violation. They are herewith forewarned that after July 1 such fines will be doubled to \$20.

Even more worthy of notice will be the change for the fine charged for parking in a fire lane or adjacent to a fire hydrant. That was also only \$10; in the future it will cost \$50. City Manager Daniel Hobbs has predicted that this particular upping of parking fines will generate more than \$50.000 a year, a substantial increase in revenue to be used by the Police Department - presumably to hire more cops to place more tickets on vehicles violating the ordinance.

Forget to pay on time? That used to cost an additional \$5 after 10 days. Now the extra charge will be \$10 after 15 days, \$25 after 30 days.

Booting the Scofflaws

Of course a few scoundrels have always tried to get by without paying up at all. Under the second ordinance, also to go into effect on July 1, they may find themselves in a heap of trouble if their vehicle is found on a city street. The language of the ordinance is civilized: it states that the city "wishes to dis-

courage those operating automobiles in the city from withhold-ing payment" and that it "wishes to encourage those who receive parking tickets to pay those tickets as promptly as possible."

Some encouragement!

Any unattended vehicle parked on a city street which has re-ceived more than 10 parking violation notices may be "immo-bilized" by a "boot" — one of those ugly devices attached to a wheel that makes it impossible to drive away. To get the "boot" removed, the unfortunate owner must pay a special fee of \$35. But that's after all the unpaid fines and all the late fees have also been paid. That should be quite a help to the city's budget.

An ominous section is added to the end of the new ordinance on booting: "The City shall not be liable for any damage to the motor vehicle" by use of the boot, nor for any damage to the vehicle caused by "actions of the owner or any other person attempting to remove the device or operate such motor vehicle with such device attached."

Of course if all Greenbelt drivers turn virtuous after July 1, the city budget will run a deficit. It seems that either way some taxpayers are going to

## Not Open Forum

On behalf of the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., I wish to clarify the action taken to limit participation at the April 2 work session to members of the Board, Audit Committee, Ad Hoc Woodlands Committee. GHI management and Maryland Department of Natural Resources

The Ad Hoc Woodlands Committee has met often for nine months. These meetings were advertised and the general membership was invited to attend and participate. The objectives of the work session were to clarify some issues and to ameliorate any perceived breakdown of relations among the various groups. It was necessary that the issues of concern be resolved in order for the Ad Hoc Woodlands Committee and the Board to satisfy membership requirements by the time of the annual meeting on May 20.

At a Board meeting prior to the workshop, the Board decided to limit participation, realizing that, even with the limitation, the number of partci-pants could be about 25 persons. There was consensus that allowing others to ask questions or debate issues that had been addressed by the Ad Hoc Woodlands Committee over a ninemonth period could be counterproductive. This would have tied up valuable time with the invited guests.

In other words, the workshop was called in order that those responsible to the membership of GHI could resolve specific issues. It was not intended as an open forum.

## Unanimity Not Persuasive?

Last year, at the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. meeting, a member petition to grant a conservation easement on GHI-owned woodlands was tabled. This year the members will get to vote on the issue. During the intervening year, a Woodlands Committee was commissioned to study conservation easements, forestry, banking and creative writing, and report back to the Board.

In my (admittedly paranoid) view, the composition of the Committee was carefully regulated so as to represent diversity of opinion about the easement. It should therefore have been very persuasive to the GHI Board that the Woodlands Committee returned a unanimous recommendation to grant a conservation easement. It was not.

I think the Board is acting too provincially in recommending that members vote against the easement. They are claiming that future boards will be guided by strong attachment to the woods (so we needn't worry that the woods will fall) but that we shouldn't take away their options (one assumes: their options to cut down trees).

GHI members are stewards of more than a housing cooperative. As owners of 82.5 acres of forest, we are stewards of a piece of the planet in its elemental form. Please, fellow members, do the right thing. Vote for the



#### Sleepout to Focus **Help for Homeless**

At a recent meeting in the Greenbelt Library the Gray Panthers of Prince Georges County heard disturbing statistics concerning the homeless in the county. According to Mosi Harington of the Community Ministry of Prince Georges County, which takes calls of those needing emergency housing, for the year ending in June of 1991, 9,228 people needed shelter; 7.011 were turned away because of the lack of facilities. In the month of August it was impossible to accommodate 94% of the children needing shelter.

Harrington stated further: In the county there are no homeless advocacy services or lowincome organizations for housing with paid staff. The space available for families in the Prince Georges County Family Shelter has been cut from 17 to 12 families.

Prince Georges County has a budget of one billion dollars, of which one-tenth of one percent goes for sheltering the homeless.

On May 8 there will be a "sleep-out to call attention to the plight of the homeless and to raise money." Greenbelter Tony Pisano, a member of the Gray Panthers, has volunteered to participate in the "sleep-out." Individual Gray Panthers have pledged to support Pisano's endeavors.
