GEAC Considers Overpass, Lake, Code Enforcement

The current status of a new Greenbelt city ordinance that would amend the city building code was discussed at the November 5 meeting of the Greenbelt East Advisory Committee (GEAC). Also discussed was City Council reaction to the committee's concern over the progress of development of Greenbrook Lake communicated at an October 27 special meeting, and solutions for the troublesome Frankfort Drive/Greenbelt Road intersection. City Councilmember Edward Putens was in attendance at the meeting.

Code Enforcement According to Putens, the city is revising a city ordinance that would regulate building, housing, property maintenance and occupancy, and fees and penalties related to buildings and dwellings within the city. The ordinance was first proposed at a September 15 city council meeting and drew opposition from homeowners and commercial developers alike who saw the measure as expensive, redundant to current regulations and discouraging to development. To respond to community concerns the city scheduled two special sessions to hear residents' and developers' comments separately. Putens said the revisions are expected to become effective on January 1,

GEAC chairman Timothy Sechrist described a scenario under the proposed ordinance of how city residents would obtain permission to build a deck. First homeowners would get permission from their homeowner's association; then they would obtain a permit from the County in Upper Marlboro. The County permit fee would be at least \$25 and obtaining permit approval could take from one day to up to six months, according to the Prince Georges County Office of Permits. Finally the homeowner would be required to obtain a permit from the city at a flat fee of \$15 plus \$3 per \$1,000 of the value of the work to be performed. Approval would take approximately two to three days

Seniors Address Concerns At Successful Open Forum

Near perfect weather, an excellent cookout lunch in the pleasant picnic area of Schrom Hills Park and a large turnout all conspired to make the third annual Open Forum a great success. These forums, sponsored by the Greenbelt Senior Citizen's Advisory Committee (SSAC) are designed to gather information from our older population about their needs, problems and desires, as well as to afford an opportunity to socialize with friends and neighbors.

While Pat McAndrew, the newest member of the committee, grilled hot dogs and hamburgers, Betty Timer, committee chair, conducted the business of the forum. After reviewing the activities of the committee since the last forum, she asked for comments and suggestions from the audience. In general, the remarks fell into several categories, the largest of which deait with outdoor pedestrian safety. Skateboards and bicycles in the Roosevelt Center - which Councilman Tom White noted are illegal in that area-are hazardous to all walkers and especially so to older, sometimes frailer Harvey Nichols stated that he had been hit by a bicycle in the center and that there is also a problem at the lake where bikers often ride too fast-Alberta Tomkins complained that she had fallen walking on uneven sidewalks and that it was especially bad at night when the lighting is inadequate. (She mentioned the stretch of Crescent Road from Hillside to Eastway as a problem area.)

Crossing the street at Southway and Crescent Roads often pits pedestrians against motorists. Pearl Siegel noted that there are no crosswalks on Crescent Road and Janet Parker added that the law stating that cars must yield to pedestrians at crosswalks is often ignored; she suggested that "Yield to Pedestrian" signs be installed. It was also suggested that a yellow flashing light be installed at the Crescent - Southway intersection. Another pedestrian problem exists at the Safeway to Exxon Station crossing at Greenway, according to Mary Ellen Welsh, a new resident of Greenbelt East. She suggested that a stop sign be installed at the Safeway entrance.

GHI Area

The Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) area has some specific outdoor safety problems with lighting in the 33 Court of Ridge Road, in the parking lots and inner walkways, particularly at 56 and 36 Crescent Road. Eli Crupain suggested tha low lampposts lining the inner walkways would afford better lighting and also be quite attractive. "Lighting is a general problem through-

Co-op's Income Drops; Vote Rejects Senior Housing Loan

Some 75 members attended the Annual Meeting of the Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative (GCC) in the Greenbelt Library on Saturday, October 31. Updates on the service station and supermarket were overshadowed by the lively discussion and the close vote related to a loan for a proposed senior-housing facility.

The Senior Housing Committee expects to review an appraisal on the targeted property in late November. The specific site was not revealed, but Jim Cassels stated that units would sell in the \$30,000-\$85,000 range with \$300-\$350 in monthly co-op fees. The 54 members of the senior-housing committee, headed by Cassels, requested that GCC's membership authorize its Board of Directors to lend up to \$50,000 for one year at 6% interest to a to-be-formed housing co-op. By a 29-24 vote, Co-op members rejected the request. The rejection reflected the absence of details regarding the project, plus concerns about conflicts of interest, since members of GCC's Board are members of the senior housing committee-There were also questions about GCC's legal right to make this

Two incumbents — Tom Lanmons and Joe Timer — were reelected to the Board of Directors for 3-year terms.

Income Down

Treasurer Joe Timer noted that the Co-op had operating profits of \$21.449 on sales of \$7.9 million for the 1992 fiscal year ended July 31, 1992. Income was 82 percent below that for the previous year. Based on total income of \$41,802, the Co-op declared a patronage refund of \$25,862, which represents 0.53 percent of member purchases during the year. The cash portion has been raised to 75 percent (up from 50 percent) of the total refund and refunds will be mailed to members in early December.

Sales to members represented 64 percent of total sales. There was extensive discussion regarding encouraging members to record their purchases at both facilities. Recording the member number means that a given purchase will increase the member's patronage refund, and it will also reduce Co-op's income taxes. (Co-op pays income taxes only on sales to non-members).

Both the Service Station Manager, Dave Meadows, and the Supermarket Manager, Bob Davis, were recognized by the membership for their high-quality goods and services and for their accessibility and responsiveness. Both businesses operate in highly competitive markets with razor-thin margins.

1992 Loss

Dave Meadows reported that the service station lost \$20,891 in FY92. A key reason for the loss was the rapid write-off of the new tanks installed in late 1990. Accounting standards require that this expenditure be amortized over the life of the lease; the station's lease expires in 1984. Generally, Co-op's gas is 1 or 2 cents cheaper than its three competitors. Meadows stated the Co-op's Board planned a special brain-storming session in November to consider ways of generating additional income. Supermarket

Manager Bob Davis reported that the supermarket had income of \$32,957, 65 percent below the previous year. This performance mirrored that of others in the industry. It also reflected the current economy, increased competition and the problems associated with growing demands on an over-burdened parking lot. Early indications for the current year suggest improved results, but not dramatic improvements. The store will continue to focus on modernizing its operations. An impromptu discussion occured on the merits of introducing scanning equipment. While many members supported this approach, some were hesitant to drop price-marking of each item. See CO-OP, page 2

For Openers

Summer has ended. School has started. Our son has gone to meet the world beyond our house. The other night as I lay awake worrying and wondering about him, I thought about my own childhood peeling away years one by one, teacher by teacher. As I recalled faces and remembered names, I realized that attached to many were turning points in my life. Lying there, I began to concentrate on my days in second grade, and to understand what one teacher did for me as I never had be-

Discovery was a daily occur-rence in Miss Hope's room. We made butter and cheese. We performed short plays about stories we read. Miss Hope showed us paintings then dressed us and posed us in tableaux like the paintings. One afternoon she had our class to her house for tea. Trusting 20 second graders with her tea cup collection, Miss Hope gave us an experience I was reliving decades later. Miss Hope was near retirement when she taught us. Is that why she knew how to grab life and give it to her students? I'm still using what she gave me every time I go inside an art gallery or out for tea.

Some "thank yous" take years to say, or even recognize. And then in the middle of a sleepless night a teacher's name comes up. The significance of a field trip, a research paper, a science experiment or a simple compliment comes to light. Suddenly and finally, the pieces of one's life fit together better than before. And it's because a teacher looked us in the eye, smiled, and opened the door.





Dan Lowery of Greenwood Village addressed the cost of enforcement. Other members agreed on the importance of assessing the potential legal and inspection cost of bringing homeowners and developers into compliance.

Greenbrook Lake

On October 27 GEAC members met with members of the Greenbelt City Council to discuss the progress of developing Greenbrook Lake. The city council has agreed to act on a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers proposal to cut down dead trees, plant new trees and drain the site. The Corps is responsible for protection of non-tidal wetlands but there have been questions from some residents represented by GEAC as to whether the proposed site is a wetland. A permit will have to be filed to make

a final determination. GEAC voted to request that the city refrain from acting on those proposals until after a permi has been filed. In fact the attendees seemed unsure as to when it was determined that the Corps of Engineers should become involved in the project.

Also mentioned was concern about the cost for a project which specifically benefits Greenbelt East. Recent voter statistics show Greenbelt East comprises approximately one-third of all registered voters in Greenbelt.

Frankfort Drive

GEAC discussed having city officials examine cost estimates of constructing an overpass at Frankfort Drive as an alternative to closing the median on Greenbelt Road. Windsor Green's Sheldon Goldberg suggested that since an overpass is also being requested near Greenbelt Middle School that perhaps the city could save money by constructing two overpasses at the same time.

WHEREAS, the signatories to this memorandum of understanding are committed to implementing a joint solution which will achieve a significant level of outdated telephone directory recycling in the Washington region; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, that the City shall participate in a joint agreement with other Metropolitan Washington Council of Government jurisdictions to collect and deliver to central processing site(s) outdated copies of "The One Book", which Donnelley will transport and arrange to have recycled.

Star Party at Northway

Saturday evening, Nov. 14, 7-11 p.m., the mighty telescopes will again rise in Northway Field, known far and wide as the location of the darkest skies and lowest horizons in Greenbelt.

In the past this has been the site of many interesting observations by the many astronomers who observe the heavens from here; Pluto was observed passing a star two years ago the exploding star in the constellation Cygnus was observed repeatedly by a local astronomer who proved that this was no ordinary exploding star, and this was also the site of the cosmic Battle of the Unitrons, reported in this paper a few years back, in which the oldest and newest Unitron telescopes were pitted against each other, and both won.

This time, the Northway observers are setting up their telescopes for you. Now Dwayne can discover craters on the moon. Susie can see Saturn for the first time, and Mike can be mesmerized by Mars. Many exciting double stars will be visible, and if the parkway lights do not interfere, some wonderful deepsky objects such as the great Globular Clusters, the awesome Open Clusters, the pretty Planetary Nebulae and the great Galaxies will be seen.

Future light interference is 'n fact the reason for this program. Plans to light ballfields at Northway will cause tremendous problems for the many astronomers assembling here, and also for those who have never seen the Milky Way before. This may be the last place in Greenbelt where our own galaxy can be seen in the night sky. Everyone is welcome to come and take one last look. Of course, the Milky Way will always be there, just above the glare of the many city lights being placed all around this area. Lights on the ballfields will take this final view away from us. Some astronomers have also noticed that there are a few of the harmless but beautiful Giant Cecropia Moths in this area, and these moths would be confused when out looking for friends by lights in the air. They will probably disappear from these woods, as they have from most of the rest of Greenbelt,

This star party is being sponsored by the Committee to Save the Green Belt the Goddard Astronomy Club, and the International Dark Sky Association, all of which are interested in preserving this small piece of dark sky in the Balwash region. Doug Caprette, long-time noted amateur astronomer from Ohio and user of the new Lageos Satellite, will give a talk on what we can see in the sky on the night of the 14th. This date is

It is hoped that an electric generator will provide power for the automatically driven telescopes but will not provide lights. Many different kinds of telescopes will be available for you to look through, including the straight-through refracting telescopes on their tall tripods, the optically folded reflecting telescopes in their shorter tubes, and the ingenious combination telescopes, which use both lenses and mirrors to gather light from the heavens.

Everyone who comes out to Northway on November 14 is encouraged to either arrive before dark, or drive with just parking lights after the last hill before the ballfields. Drive straight in and park in the area that once held the leaf pilesfacing away from the ballfields. This will keep headlights from glaring on the telescopes set up in the flat fields to the right. If you bring a flashlight, cover the lens with red cellophane or paper. Red light does not affect night vision, and is preferred by astronomers who need to read their star charts in the dark. Come and enjoy the universe from Northway Fields!





out the city" according to Mary Hoover who cited both sides of Crescent at the 56 Court as particularly troublesome. Another area of concern is overgrown hedges on the sides of walkways which need to be trimmed, according to Nick Pergola.

Transportation

Transportation can be a real problem for those without cars or those who wish to minimize driving. The "Greenbelt Connection" bus is a boon but could be greatly improved by better maintenance and upkeep. Pearl Siegel complained that the "vans are not kept clean, and that gassing up should be done before the trip." "Greenbelt East needs better bus service on Saturday and Sunday and needs the connector service to the rail system in New Carrollton," said Mary Ellen Welsh, who has found it difficult to travel at times when the buses weren't running.

More Benches

Everyone wanted more benches placed all around the city which would allow people to rest and also to congregate and socialize. The need for a year-round Senior Center in the new Community Building and the desire for a Food and Friendship program there was emphasized. More trash cans, better trash removal and clean-up of graffiti were also requested.

Helen Geller spoke about the desire of the SSAC to establish

a Service Bank in the city in which volunteers earn credits for the services they perform. These credits may be redeemed for services when and if needed, or donated to another person. There are dozens of services which may be performed, such as help with transportation, grocery shopping, yard work, bookkeeping etc. There are many Service Banks throughout the country; the closest one is in Washington, D.C. Many of the participants at the forum expressed interest in the concept and the committee will pursue it further.

Programs

Betty Timer mentioned the series of informative programs sponsored by the committee called "Not for Seniors Only" which have covered such topics as arthritis, financial advice, foot care and emergency response systems. There will be a new series this year which will be announced in the News Review. She also told the group that citizen support is needed for the Community Center. Esther Webb, concerned about meeting places until the center opens, mentioned that the Library is now charging for meeting rooms.

Timer closed by thanking everyone for coming and acknowledging the merchants and others who had contributed the food to the event: Co-op, Giant and Safeway food stores; Beijing, Jaspers and Greenbelt Carry-Out restaurants; the City of Greenbelt and the Senior Citizen's Advisory Committee which provided the desserts.

Budget, Scholarship, Historic Study Before GHI Board

The stage was set for the approval of the budget for Greenbelt Homes Incorporated (GHI) and of a \$1,000 scholarship at the Board of Directors meeting on November 5.

A board meeting of the Green-belt Development Corporation (GDC), a wholly-owned subsidiary, preceeded the GHI meeting. The GDC's proposed budget for 1993 passed with one amendment. Director Chuck Hess asked that rentals for garages used for storage be raised from \$63 to \$65 a month. GDC's 1993 budget is \$312,018. Ronald Colton, GDC Manager, stated that GDC ". . . was doing much better in 1992

than expected. We will end up in the black." GHI's board quickly approved three items: (1) a request for purchase of a six-inch seamless gutter machine, (2) a request for the purchase of a portion of boiler room beneath 9-E Ridge Road to be used for storage, and (3) membership for three new owners. A contract for storm sewer repair and replacement was read for the first time. This work will be done at 13, 16, 18, 25, 33, 39, and 65 Ridge Road, 60 Crescent, 2 Gardenway, 5 Eastway, and 12 Hillside.

Budget

The first reading of the Manager's Proposed Budget for 1993 occurred with minor changes. Replacement reserve funds were found to be sufficient in the frame homes and the larger homes, thus proposed increases in monthly charges could be reduced slightly. The Finance Committee recommended that the budgeted amount for bathtub reglazing be deferred until FY 1994. More information was needed before funds can be allocated

Manager Ron Colton presented the Board with four possible analyses of the impact on GHI of the assessment cap recently passed by the County Council. All scenarios yielded savings which ranged from \$4,000 to \$31,000. The Board decided not to amend the 1993 Budget because of the assessment cap, since definitive amounts were not available at this time.
