Comprehensive Report on Possible City Trails Is Heard by Council

A proposed plan of trails and trail improvements throughout the city was one of the main topics of discussion at the December 14 regular meeting of the Greenbelt City Council. Administrative Assistant Eric Berlin gave a presentation to council on the plan. Although council took no action it will most likely discuss the plan in more detail at a future work session.

A special joint subcommittee of the Advisory Planning Board (APB) and the Park and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB) has developed the plan, which has since been reviewed and approved by both APB and PRAB. In carrying out its task the subcommittee set twin goals: 1) identifying capital improvements necessary to complete a comprehensive citywide trail system and 2) devising a map of pedestrian and bicycle routes suitable for public distribution. Currently the subcommittee has four working maps, not yet sized for public distribution. The maps detail pedestrian trails, bicycle trails, recreation trails and transportation trails. The latter are described by Berlin as those designed to get to specific locations via the most direct route without regard to aesthetic features.

Despite the name, not all of the routes are truly trails. Sidewalks and major roads are also included. Berlin said that one issue was whether to designate routes such as Greenbelt Road, which are used by bicyclists but do not provide specific bike lanes or paths, on the bicycle trails map. During the discussion, Harriet Phelps asked for a bicycle path along Greenbelt Road.

Capital Projects

The subcommittee has identified 14 capital projects needed for the trail system. Berlin described these to council without assigning priorities. Many of the suggested paths, which would pass through private property, could not be completed without the property owners' approval.

The first group of projects would improve access to the Metro station. They include a path from Cherrywood Lane near Springhill Drive to the Metro station, an extension of the Indian Creek hiker-biker trail from 57th Avenue and Greenbelt Road to the Metro station. This trail extension would run outside the city limits. A third proposal would extend a hiker-biker trail from Ivy Lane towards the State Highway Administration entrance off Kenilworth Avenue.

In the core of Greenbelt, the subcommittee proposes a pedestrian path from Belle Point to Greenbelt Lake, improving a dirt path that originates in the Stream Valley Park from the

Hillside Road underpass to the GHI homes. Berlin notes that this path would provide an off-street route to the new elementary school.

The final project proposed for the city core is the perimeter trail. The subcommittee proposes "minimal" improvements to the existing path with the goal of creating a three to four foot wide dirt path that runs through Parcel 1, Parcel 2 and the 72-acre former school board property. The group also proposes considering tree blazes to mark the route.

Greenbelt East

In Greenbelt East, the subcommittee proposes several projects working towards implementing the "ring and spline" system of trails suggested several years ago in a Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission report. These include a path from Greenbriar Park to Greenbelt Road along the Eleanor Roosevelt High School property, a pedestrian connection from Greenbrook Drive to Schrom Hills Park and a hiker-biker connection from the south end of Mandan Road to Hanover Parkway. This path would run along a "Pepco right-of-way. Berlin noted that "Pepco is notoriously unwilling to allow trails in their right of way. . . ."

Other projects proposed for the eastern part of the city include a hiker-biker connection from the Lanham Boys and Girls Club property to Hanover Parkway, a path around whatever "kind of pond ends up" in Schrom Hills Park and pedestrian overpass over the Capital Beltway between Martin's Crosswinds and Greenbelt Park.

In sum, the plan proposes approximately five miles of new trails of various surfaces, including unpaved. Berlin said that "a very ballpark" estimate for the cost of all of the projects proposed, excluding the overpass, is \$300,000.

Conflict Points

The proposed pathways cross several major roads. The subcommittee identified several "major conflict points" that are "troublesome for pedestrian or cyclist users." Berlin's report states that the intersections of Crescent Road/Kenilworth Avenue, Ivy Lane/Cherrywood Lane, Frankfort Drive and Greenbelt Road, and Greenbelt Road and Cherrywood Lane, "require action to make them bicycle and/or pedestrian safe."

Councilmember Antoinette Bram urged that the plans for the Ivy Lane spur be based upon the installation of an overpass. Councilmember Rodney Roberts asked that the maps show an overpass over Greenbelt Road near Frankfort Drive. Doug Love suggested that it might be possible to install a pedestrian tunnel at Frankfort Drive at less cost than an overpass. The overpass is estimated to cost \$1

million, excluding land acquisition costs.

Parcel 1

Trails in the wooded city park comprising Parcels 1 and 2 and the 72-acre former school board property would be located in a potentially controversial area. The only trail currently shown there is the perimeter trail. Betsy Likowski requested that the maps show the existing set of trails. Without accurate maps, she said, many people are not willing to risk getting lost on the unmarked trails.

Roberts wanted the trails in this area left basically alone. Bram worried that if they were shown on the map, they would be overused.

Signs

Signage is another issue that will certainly be discussed in the future. Berlin said that the trails subcommittee wanted to keep signs to a minimum. Doug Love noted that park users have painted some trail blazes on trees and suggested that the city put up and maintain some "good blazes."

Flash

Greenbelt Center Elementary School has been named a Blue Ribbon School of Excellence by the United States Dept. of Education. This national school recognition was given to less than 200 schools nationwide.

Art Deco Chrome and Glass Exhibit Now at the Museum

The Friends of the Greenbelt Museum (FOGM) has organized an Art Deco Chrome and Glass exhibit now being displayed at the Museum, 10-B Crescent Road. In the 1930s household items made of chromium were "for the host and hostess with good taste and a keen sense of hospitality", remarked FOGM board member Morris Levitt.

The exhibit focuses on items that the discriminating host or hostess (including many early pioneer Greenbelt families) of the 1930s would display when company arrived. The exhibit features chromium serving trays, barware, electric coffee urns, ice bowls, and a roly-poly chrome punch bowl with six ruby glasses.

Although many people are familiar with the streamlined Art Deco designs in architecture as exhibited in the original Greenbelt brick and masonry homes and the Greenbelt Center Elementary School, household objects may be less well-known. Art Deco designs are characterized by simple geometric lines and bright colors.

Chromium and glass serving pieces became popular in the 1930s because of their low cost. With the repeal of prohibition, the modern host would serve

fancy mixed drinks using ice cubes from the new refrigerator and legal booze out of a bottle rather than a bathtub. The stylish hostess would serve coffee from the latest electric coffee urn. An advertisement in the June 1934 issue of *Good Housekeeping* magazine proclaimed that "Any bride will be truly grateful if you give her something in gleaming non-tarnishing chromium. These lovely things require no polishing and only a minimum of care to remain shining and lovely all her life."

FOGM gratefully acknowledges the loans from the private collections of Richard Kopley, Morris Levitt, Anne Meglis and Timothy Uber. The chrome and glass exhibit will be at the Museum until February 28, 1993. The Museum is open every Sunday, 1-5 p.m., and by appointment by calling 474-7951.

Fun at Goddard

On Sunday, December 27, 1 p.m. there will be a lecture at the Goddard Space Flight Visitor Center on the Sea-viewing Wide Field-of-View Sensor (SeaWiFS). The SeaWiFS will bring to the ocean science community an improved renewal of the ocean color, remote sensing capability lost when the Nimbus-7 Coastal Zone Color Scanner (CZOS) ceased operating in 1986. The goal of SeaWiFS, scheduled to launch in 1993, is to obtain valid ocean color data of the world's oceans for a five-year period and make that data available to researchers. Former astronaut, Dr. Mary Cleave, will also explain how Goddard will oversee the calibration and validation effort of the SeaWiFS sensor.

LIBRARY HOURS FOR HOLIDAYS

All branches and offices of the Prince Georges County Memorial Library System will be closed through Sunday, December 27, Friday, January 1 and Sunday January 3 as a money-saving measure to help offset budget deficits. Library career staff will be furloughed for one day without pay during this period.

"The December holiday season is one when, typically, fewer customers use the branches and circulation of materials is low," said library director William R. Gordon.

During this period, customers may return library materials to bookdrops located at most branch libraries.

Christmas Trees

"Citizens should remember that Christmas trees are very flammable, particularly if they have been cut several weeks prior to the Christmas holiday season. When choosing a tree, select one that is not shedding its needles—a clue that the tree is very dry and could present a fire hazard if placed in a home.

Christmas trees should only be kept indoors for a few weeks, as the trees will rapidly dry out due to the heat and low humidity in the home. Christmas trees should not be placed near furnace air vents, electric baseboard heaters or other heat producing appliances.



A new Astronomy Club will be starting on Wednesday, December 30 at the Greenbelt Library. The new club is for everyone and will try to meet everyone's needs, from basic classes in constellations through exciting observing projects.

Many people who do not work at the Goddard Space Flight Center have asked to join the Goddard Astronomy Club, but were turned away, since the club

meets inside Goddard at lunchtime during the week, and has its observatory behind locked gates at Goddard.

The Goddard amateur astronomers have been joining with other area astronomy clubs in the Mid Atlantic region of the Astronomical League for campouts and star parties in Pennsylvania and Virginia, and have been able to invite some of these groups to visit the Goddard Observatory, located inside the Goddard Optical Research Facility, GORF. But it is harder to get permission to bring in individual friends of members. A local club

would make joint projects easier to do.

There are those that love to watch the stars so much that they want to share their hobby with their friends and neighbors. Some local residents are considering donating a telescope to the city. One of their neighbors who is familiar with city programs pointed out to them the fact that the City does not have trained staff to make use of a telescope, and might just put it in a closet. But if there was a large and active group to support astronomical observing, it would be a lot easier to build an observatory for Greenbelt, and make that telescope available to everyone.

The new club members have a lot of decisions to make Wednesday night, such as what to name the club, whether to join the Astronomical League, and where to meet. But there has never been an astronomy club that has been better supported at its founding, and we expect to hear and see wonderful things from this group.

Jim Hage from nearby Lanham who also ran in the 1992 Olympic Marathon Trials won the 10 mile in 56:58. Donna Moore of Kensington won the women's 10 mile in 64:38. Kevin Wilkinson of Greenbelt was the first local finisher in the 10 mile.

WANTED - VOLUNTEERS TO SERVE ON NEW ADVISORY BOARD

The City of Greenbelt is seeking residents who would be interested in serving on its recently established Board of Appeals. The purpose of the Board is to hear appeals relating to Greenbelt's new code enforcement program which will become effective January 1st. The code enforcement program ensures that:

- All buildings and properties within the city are properly maintained, and the community is protected from decline due to neglect; occupancy permits will be issued for all rental dwelling units and non-residential premises; and
- building plans will be reviewed for compliance with city codes, property covenants, and agreements, and will be evaluated for impact on city streets, properties and public ways; building permits will be issued for all construction projects and additions.

There will be an inspection program conducted by the city to ensure compliance. If a violation is identified, a notice of violation will be issued. If not corrected within a given period, a fine will be levied. Any person affected by a notice or order issued in connection with code enforcement, may appeal to the City Manager. Any person affected by the decision of the City Manager may appeal that decision to the Board of Appeals within ten days. The Board will conduct a public hearing within twenty-one days, review the notice or order, and decide whether a waiver is to be granted. Members of existing advisory boards are not eligible for appointment. There will be a small remuneration for service on this board. 
