

Hearing on Proposed Trails Plan At Hunting Ridge on January 18

Next Tuesday, the Greenbelt City Council will take another step in the lengthy process of adopting a plan for pedestrian and bicycle trails by holding a public hearing on the proposed plan. The public hearing will be held at 8 p.m. at the Hunting Ridge Community Building.

The hearing will be videotaped for later broadcast. Although the council called for holding two public hearings on the subject, one in Greenbelt East and one in the core of Greenbelt, council agreed at its December 13 regular meeting to wait until after this hearing to decide whether

to hold a second. A joint subcommittee of the Advisory Planning Board and the Park and Recreation Advisory Board prepared the plan. Council first reviewed this plan at a work session in December 1992. The plan was not considered by council at a regular meeting until last December, when it agreed to hold the two public hearings. After the public hearings, council may change the plan proposal as it sees fit.

Even if adopted, there will be serious impediments to carrying out the plan. One is the city's tight budget situation. The other is that some trail proposals cross private property and therefore require owner support.

According to the plan report, the purpose of the Trails Plan is to promote the existing trails network as a transportation and recreation resource, and to provide guidance for the planning, design and construction of additions to the trails system and related support facilities. It is intended to provide direct and safe routes between and among all parts of the city, and in particular to public transportation, recreation, education and commercial facilities. It also is intended to provide safe, scenic and varied pedestrian and bicycle routes to provide recreational opportunities to people of all

ages and physical conditions, including persons with disabilities. **Overpasses**

Included for consideration are three locations for pedestrian/ bicycle overpasses. One would cross Greenbelt Road near Elea-nor Roosevelt High School at Frankfort Drive. The second overpass would cross Kenilworth Avenue near Crescent Road and Ivy Lane to provide better access

to Metro. Council has proposed joint funding of a feasibility study for those two overpasses, plus one crossing Greenbelt Road near Greenbelt Middle School. As a recent meeting with GEAC, Mayor Antoinette Bram reported that County Executive Parris Glendening has pledged \$4,000 in county funds to the study and that the Maryland State Highway Administration and the city would also participate. The Board of Education, however, refused to commit funds to the study and the city has yet to hear from he Town of Berwyn Heights, which would primarily benefit from an overpass at the Middle School.

Although not greatly discussed, a fourth overpass proposed in the plan would cross the Capital Beltway to connect Greenbelt East to Greenbelt Park. On the east side, the overpass would be located on city property next to the Greenbelt Holiday Inn at the end of Hanover Drive. On the west side a park trail would have to be constructed from the overpass to existing park trails.

Access to Metro

To be considered along with the trail plan proposals is a petition of the Greenbelt Bicycle Coalition for some specific access improvements to the Greenbelt Metro Station. The coalition seeks marked bicycle lanes on Cherrywood Lane and Ivy Lane west of Kenilworth Avenue, a See TRAILS, page 4

City to Receive Grant For Senior Center

The Maryland Office of Aging has submitted to the Board of Public Works for its approval authorization for a grant to the City of Greenbelt for \$287,950 according to State Senator Leo Green. If the board (the gover-nor, the comptroller and the treasurer of the state) gives its approval, which is expected, the city will use the grant for renovating a 2,776 square foot section of the old Center School for a senior activities center. The city will have to match the state funds.

The senior activities center will occupy a portion of the old school which is to be converted to a multi-purpose, multi-generational community center. This grant is one of several sought by the city to help finance the cost of renovation.

Two One Act Plays Given By Greenbelt Arts Center

Theater goers were treated to an evening of entertainment on Friday January 7, when the Greenbelt Arts Center presented two one-act plays: its own premier production of "Grave Situaton," written by Greenbelter Elizabeth Jordan; and Prince George's Little Theatre production of Anton Chekhov's "Drama. A Comedy."

"Grave Situation"

"Grave Situation presents a humorous look at various male stereotypes and their insensitive regard for women. Greenbelter Steven Cox plays the lead character, MacGregor Jones, a male chauvinist. The play opens with his camping out at his wife's grave (he's camping out because he doesn't have a home and he can't take care of himself since he depended so much on her).

He's also planning a birthday party for her (something he probably never did for her when she was alive since he's so cheap). Cox is believable as the insensitive husband because he infuses his character with so much exuberance you immediately sense his arrogance and overbearing nature, and realize his wife's death was probably a blessing because it meant freedom from him. Never is his personality more pronounced as when it is humorously contrasted with the meek nature of the female news reporter, Helen Thompson, nicely played by Jo Blais.

There are other male characters he meets that are as funny and chauvinistic as he, but none so much as the sexton, convincingly played by Bob Thompson, who steals the scene at the end when he talks about his wife's' suicide-she refused to accept his discipline, according to him.

Thompson"s character is every woman's nightmare, and at the same time he's entertaining because he's the male chauvinist you just love to hate. Thompson's

redneck accent sounds so authentic and convincing, that we realize we have all met up with this character in the real world

"Drama: A Comedy"

"Drama: A Comedy" centers upon two main characters: an aspiring female playwright and the experienced writer she opportunes to listen to her do a reading of her play.

With excellent direction by Tracy Collier, Rod Wiesinger and Elizabeth Beebe-Volz move with a fluency on stage that makes them feel right at home. They are not merely acting; they become the cultured and eccentric characters they portray, and so, are believable in their roles. The surprise ending of this play is hilarious.

Both plays will have their next and last performance in January 15 at 8 p.m. in the Greenbelt Arts Center's new theater, which is next door to the Post Office. To make reservations for these two plays, call the Greenbelt Arts Center at 441-8770.

GHI Board Passes Budget Without Raise in Charges

The Greenbelt Homes Inc. Board of Directors had only one topic — the 1994 budget — on its agenda at its special meeting on January 6. The Board moved expeditiously to adopt for first and second reading (with a suspension of normal rules) its 1994 budget of \$6,626,439. This \$6.6 million budget was \$236,000 lower than that originally planned for the year and reflects the membership's request that the board reduce the budget to a level which would not require an increase in members charges for 1994.

The grassroots move to reduce the 1994 budget culminated in a special membership meeting on December 6. After that meet-ing the Board and staff, at the Board's direction, looked for places to cut corners and reduce costs. The Board approved reductions in salary increases, personnel, new programs such as smoke detectors and court lighting, contract work such as tree trimming and bathtub reglazing, improvements such as parking lot resurfacing and underground sewer main replacement, and reductions in administrative expenses.

One item did generate some discussion at the meeting. Direc-Wayne Williams proposed tor that the washer drain replacement program be eliminated. He felt that the sense of the membership was that GHI not embark on new programs ,in an effort to reduce the budget. He proposed instead that the \$26,000 earmarked for this purpose be used to take care of a boiler room which he said constituted a safety hazard. Although several board members acknowledged

the need to make the boiler room safe, no others were willing to eliminate the washer drain program to do so. Board member Chuck Hess summed up that view by saying that the washer drain program should be a part of normal maintenance. Others said that they felt the matter had been settled and were unwilling to take it up again. They quickly voted to keep it in the budget.

Director John O'Boyle suggested another line of investigation. He and others felt that the entire benefits package for staff should be evaluated. This was the response to the issue of nealth insurance coverage. The consensus seemed to be that it was inappropriate to discuss a single component of the benefits package but that a comprehensive approach was required.

In a final comment before the budget was unanimously approved for second reading, Williams expressed the opinion that the revised 1994 budget was not n "honest" budget and reflected the desire to reach an arbitrary goal, as opposed to really addressing the cooperative's needs.

Letters to the Editor Alleviate **City Leaf Policy** Flooding

Environmental folly always costs the taxpayer more. About 25 years ago, a wet and mucky, wooded, and frequently flooded parcel was converted to a halfsized golf course by Springhill Lake. Subsequently, the City Council purchased that golf course.

The construction of the golf course altered a floodplain in the Indian Creek/Anacostia River watershed. Maintenance was expensive - even for a golf course-because the ground stubbornly remained damp. Now comes a County tax bill for the same parcel, and to create what? A wet and mucky, wooded floodplain (to paraphrase the Greenbelt News Review of January 6, 1994).

Sure, restore the floodplain to the Anacostia watershed so that ecological and human communities in the region can realize the belated benefits. Just stop mowing the parcel, and it will begin to serve its natural calling. No need to throw more public money at it; we have already paid for these errors. We have paid in more extensive Federal flood controls than would otherwise have been undertaken in Berwyn Heights and downstream-both predating and during the Metro Green Line construction.

However, righting a wrong at Springhill Lake in the Anacostia watershed will not also mitigate wetlands destruction at Schrom Hills, which is in the Western Branch/Patuxent River watershed. That will do nothing toward alleviating downstream flooding in the Patuxent watershed. History teaches: future restoration costs accrue if we ignore wetlands and floodplains. In environmental protection, as in many other human pursuits, it is more economical to do it right the first time.

The Council should reconsider and designate two acres in the Patuxent watershed for wetlands mitigation. Better to learn from history than to consign taxpayers to pay repeatedly for environmental folly. By the way, what is the City Council's stand on the proposal for a stadium in Laurel? Rhea Cohen

In his comments to the editor on December 23 clarifying the city's policy regarding leaf col-lection, the Director of Public Works wrote: "Had the resident had her leaves properly bagged as GHI requires, Public Works would have picked them up with our regular Wednesday special trash and yard waste collection." This statement tends to infer that the requirement that members of GHI bag their leaves is a policy established by the GHI board of directors.

In actuality, it was the City of Greenbelt's decision in 1988 to revise its policy on leaf collection to no longer permit GHI members to rake leaves to the curb. Although there were sev-eral factors that caused this policy change, the fact remains that it is the City that requires GHI members to bag their leaves, not GHI. GHI merely reinforces the City's policy in this regard to ensure that our members fully understand how they are to handle fallen leaves for disposal.



RESOLUTION TO PROHIBIT PARKING ON IVY LANE FROM KENILWORTH AVENUE TO CHERRYWOOD LANE, AND TO CREATE BICYCLE LANES ON IVY LANE FROM KENILWORTH AVENUE TO CHERRYWOOD LANE WHEREAS, on December 11, 1993, the terminus station of the

METRO Green Line opened in Greenbelt; WHEREAS, a MARC commuter rail service station is also

in operation at this station site; WHEREAS, the opening of the MARC and METRO station signals the extension of important mass transit options for the

citizens of Greenbelt and our neighbor communities;

WHEREAS, the City of Greenbelt believes that alternative transportation options must be explored, identified and encouraged as a means of reducing our societal reliance on single passenger automobile transportation;

WHEREAS, Greenbelt is a planned community which has always encouraged non-motorized transportation;

WHEREAS, the current system of roads, sidewalks, trails and paths discourages individuals attempting to reach the Greenbelt METRO station via foot or bicycle due to numerous physical impediments and unsafe conditions;

WHEREAS, an opportunity exists to improve bicycle access to the Greenbelt METRO station through the restriction of onstreet parking on Ivy Lane, between Kenilworth Avenue and Cherrywood Lane;

WHEREAS, the Capital Office Park, and adjoining development, was constructed in accordance with Prince George's County zoning regulations with respect to the provision of off-street parking for the use of tenants and visitors to the buildings within the office park;

WHEREAS, surveys of parking in the office park indicate that the off-street parking lots are under-utilized;

WHEREAS, it has been determined by the City Council that the prohibition of parking on Ivy Lane in the Capital Office Park will not result in an over burdening of the off-street parking facilities; and

Whereas, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interests of all individuals working and living in this community to provide for improved access to the Greenbelt METRO station; NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Greenbelt, MD that parking will be prohibited on IVY LANE from Kenilworth Avenue to Cherrywood Lane during all hours, and further, that bicycle lanes, designed and installed in accordance with appropriate engineering guidelines, shall also be installed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution shall become effective immediately upon its passage.



Trails Hearing Set

safe crossing of Kenilworth and paving both shoulders of Crescent between St. Hugh's and Kenilworth. The trails plan proposes use of sidewalks on Cherrywood Lane, and Ivy Lane and does not propose paving Crescent Road shoulders. (Note: council has already passed a resolution to construct bike lanes on Ivy Lane). The plan notes that a connecting path from the State Highway Administration en-trance opposite Crescent Road to sidewalks on a service road that connects to Ivy Lane has been constructed, and that the State Highway Administration is considering marking a crosswalk at Kenilworth and Crescent. For Crescent Road, the plan proposes a sidewalk extension along the north side between Ridge Road and Kenilworth.

The trails plan includes two other Metro access proposals. One is for the construction of a direct pedestrian/bicycle path across Indian Creek and adjacent flood plains on privately owned property. That two-tenths of a mile path would provide a direct route from Springhill Drive at Cherrywood Lane in Springhill Lake to the station. Currently, Springhill Lake residents must go some distance to the north to reach the access road and then head back to the south across the station parking lot to reach the station proper. The second proposal is to extend the Indian Creek hiker-biker trail through College Park and Berwyn Heights, which now ends at Greenbelt Road. northward to the Metro Station. The approximately one mile extension would have to cross private property in the Branchville industrial tract.

Controversial Trails

The perimeter trail was once a major concept plan of the city that was proposed to obtain a federal open space grant for the acquisition of land in Parcel 1. Although the grant and the land were obtained many years ago, the perimeter trail was never built. The proposed trail plan reduces the perimeter trail to a minimal improvement of existing foot trails with possibly tree blazes to mark the trail. According to the plan text, it is proposed that "staff and qualified community members" work together to put these trails on the map and determine the improvements needed to make them 'user friendly" to the casual observer.

Another trail opposed by some, is an extension to the paved trail that runs from Crescent Road at St. Hugh's through the Lakewood stream valley park and through an underpass to Hillside Road. The plan proposed extending the path northward across Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) propery to Ridge Road opposite the new Greenbelt Elementary School. City staff has recommended a council decision on whether or not the path needed and, if not, to delete 't from the plan, and if so, to seek an easement from GHI.

Central Greenbelt Trails

In central Greenbelt, several other trails are proposed. Two of them would connect the new Belle Pointe townhouse and commercial office development with the Greenbelt Lake trail. One would follow the existing WSSC right-of-way from the town-houses to the lake trail. The other would connect the northern-

most commercial office parking lot with the lake trail.

A dirt path through the buffer strip of parkland between Boxwood and Lakewood Subdivisions would be minimally improved to make the path easier to follow. A proposed new path would go from Hillside Road between the 9 and 11 courts to connect .o the existing stream valley trail between Lakewood and Woodland Hills subzdivision.

Greenbelt East Trails

Four other trail proposals are included for Greenbelt East. A path is proposed to run along the east (Greenwood Village) side of the Eleanor Roosevelt High School parking lot to connect the existing fitness trail in Greenbriar Park to Greenbelt Road. At the end of the existing sidewalk on the east side of Hanover Parkway south of Greenbrook Drive, a bicycle-pedestrian path is planned along the crest of the hillside beside Hanover Parkway in Schrom Hills Park. It will connect to existing park trails. A stairway is proposed between this trail and Hanover Farkway opposite the entrance to Hunting Ridge. A connecting path circling the proposed Greenbrook Lake also is proposed.

The last plan proposal is for a hiker-biker path to follow a Pepco right-of-way for a power line. This trail would extend from the end of Mandan Road to Hanover Parkway near Good Luck Road. The plan report notes that Pepco is "notoriously unwilling to allow trails in their right-of-way, and has so responded to previous inquiries."

How to Get There The Hunting Ridge Commun-ity Building is located in the heart of the Hunting Ridge Condominiums. To reach it, take Hanover Parkway south to the first entrance to Hunting Ridge
