Former Mayor Reflects on Past Accomplishments, Future Prospects

Gil Weidenfeld, private citizen, is a little lost these days. After 22 years on the Greenbelt City Council, 14 of them as mayor, he misses the meetings he attended at least three nights a week, the urgent telephone calls from citizens, the strategy sessions where he was a key player. He is proud of his role in purchasing parkland, building a new school and constructing an indoor swimming pool.

Having decided not to run for another term on the city council, Weidenfeld is looking at the county council as the most likely place in which to immerse his political energies. While he has not formally announced his intentions, he has given every indication of his desire to run.

The passage of term limits in the 1993 general election means that Greenbelt's (and Bowie's) current representative, Richard Castaldi cannot continue on the County Council. Castaldi, has already announced his desire to seek the job of County Executive.

Weidenfeld sees himself as part of a field of newcomers with opportunities for change in a political scene that has been somewhat stagnant for the past 10 years. At least six county council members and a county executive will be elected for the first time. "We will need strong leadership," he asserts. Citing a long record of achievements, he views himself as experienced in local government, knowledgeable about the issues and an effective consensus builder.

County Issues

Weidenfeld ticks off the critical issues he perceives as facing the county: combating crime, improving education, controlling growth and what he calls "polishing up Prince Georges County's image."

"We need more effective ways to achieve safer streets," he declares earnestly. "We need more police and more crime prevention programs. More people are concerned now about crime because it's not just in someone else's community any more."

When queried as to the cost of more police, he indicates that federal grants are available which will support community policing, a program he supports.

"The image of the county is perceived by the school system," Weidenfeld maintains. "We have fallen behind in State performance standards. We need to look at our schools and improve the performance of students through outreach programs that bring in the private sector to work with the schools," he remarks.

Using Greenbelt as his example, Weidenfeld indicates that he would favor controlled growth,

"Public facilities must be available before development starts. We also need to seek more amenities from developers." He favors night meetings of the county council to make the county government more accessible to the citizens.

Science Leadership

In spite of vigorous image campaigns conducted by county officials over the past 20 years, Weidenfeld feels that Prince Georges County is viewed as a jurisdiction with a high crime rate and poor schools. He seeks to present a more positive picture of the county by emphasizing the high tech industries that have located here, and promoting the county as the home of science and technology centers. He points to the Beltsville Agricultural Center, NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center, the Science Center in Bowie, Bowie State and the University of Maryland as outstanding facilities not matched elsewhere.

Looking back on his political life, he smiles at the parochial interests that caused him to first run for the city council in Sep-

tember 1971. "I wanted a community center for Springhill Lake," he says. "I lived there at the time, and there were no recreation facilities. Plus, there was a major highway dividing the city that made it difficult for Springhill Lake residents to use the recreation facilities in the core of Greenbelt."

As he and others elected from Springhill Lake achieved their goal, Weidenfeld found that he enjoyed being on the city council. He also developed a broader range of interests. He supported the development of senior citizen housing, and views the construction of Green Ridge House as one of his highest achievements. "Green Ridge House is a model for the State and I feel real good about it," he affirms.

He lost only one battle, he says, while on the city council, and that was the first referendum, in the 1970s, on construction of the indoor swimming pool. Two decades later, the indoor pool is a reality in which he feels enormous pride.

On Roosevelt Center Parking Patience Begets Satisfaction

Work on the reconstruction of the parking lots at Roosevelt Center has been severely disrupted by the recent bad weather, but "if people will be patient, I think everyone will be satisfied," according to Celia Wilson, Greenbelt's Director of Planning and Development. Only a few more weeks of work remain, and the job is still slated for completion by spring, although Wilson stated that no exact date can be given at this point because of the uncertainty of weather conditions for the remainder of the winter.

At present, construction of new curbs, gutters, and planting areas has been completed in the north and west parking lots, and crews are at work on the final lot behind the Co-op. When they have finished, the last phase—repaving—will begin. Portions of bad pavement will be removed and replaced (more than originally planned, because of damage caused by recent sub-zero weather). Areas still in good condition will be resurfaced. When the job is done, the lots will have been completely covered with a new asphalt coating.

More Parking Spaces

The renovation will result in 409 parking spaces, 13 more than the 396 available before. There will be a row for compact cars. Although the overall area has not increased, "more efficient use of space," according to Wilson, yielded the additional slots as well as extra green space.

Traffic on some of the aisles will be one-way and on others two-way. Cars will be parked at a 90 degree angle to the curb, instead of diagonally as before. This will give drivers the option of approaching in two directions, where signs indicate that this is permitted. Wilson commented, "The lot logically moves in certain ways, and we don't think people will have difficulty getting used to the new patterns."

Wilson foresaw no change, in the number of Post Office vehicles in the lower parking lot, commenting that it is a public lot and residents and those conducting business in the center have a right to use it. The city has no plans to restrict the use of the lot. The drive-in mailbox will be restored, when the work is completed.

Landscaping

Parking aisles have been separated by new islands of landscaping that are wide enough so that flowering trees can flourish without being stunted. Under the direction of city horticulturist Bill Phalen, crape myrtle have been planted, to bloom in the

summer. Rows of stepping stones, placed at frequent intervals, will help keep the soil from being trampled. Each island has an irrigation system; the flexible black piping that now protrudes will be cut off at ground level.

The entire parking lot renovation project will cost less than a million dollars. Funded entirely by non-city sources, it will be paid for jointly by a federal Community Development Block Grant and George Christacos, the owner of Roosevelt Center.

GBC Identifies Priorities

On Sunday, February 6, 12 members of the Greenbelt Bicycle Coalition (GBC) met for a special work session to review transportation improvement projects under consideration by city council for implementation in the coming year. The coalition identified 10 priority projects. Two were selected from a list of over 40 compiled by city staff. The other eight originated with GBC. Selections were based on GBC's mission statement which calls for a more bicycle friendly Greenbelt.

The GBC's draft recommendations are listed in priority order: (1) Provide wide curb lanes on Hanover Parkway from Schrom Hills Park to Good Luck Road when the road is reconstructed for development; (2) conduct a feasibility study for a Greenbelt Road overpass to the high school; (3) Repave and extend pavement on six foot shoulders on Crescent Road and mark for bike lanes; (4) Widen the trail to at least 10 feet from the State Highway Administration driveway to the Capitol Office Park service road; (5) Conduct a feasibility study for the safe crossing at Kenilworth Avenue; (6) Stripe Cherrywood Lane for bicycle lanes from Ivy Lane to Metro Drive; (7) Extend bicycle path from Northway ball fields to NASA interchange of Baltimore-Washington Parkway and coordinate with NASA and National Park Service to complete trail to Goddard; (8) Install bike route signage for a cross Greenbelt bike route; (9) Upgrade bicycle parking facilities; and (10) Install a sidewalk on the east side of Southway from Ridge to Greenbelt Road.

The finalized list of transportation improvement projects will be voted upon by the full GBC membership at its regular meeting, February 28, at the Greenbelt Police Station.

Center School Controversy

The biggest controversy during his tenure in office was the renovation of Center School as opposed to building a new school in the north end of town. "This issue caused splits in families and differences between friends," he says. "It was one of those issues where no one was right or wrong, but rather it was which decision served the community's interest more," he reflected. In the end, the community voted to build a new school and turn Center School into a community center. Weidenfeld regrets that he is no longer on the city council as it shapes the final conversion of Center School into a community center.

He is proud of his role in renovating the Roosevelt Center and building the new police station. He enjoyed the project's association with the city's celebration of the 50th Anniversary in 1987, which he describes as a high point.

Weidenfeld praises the work of the city councils over the years. He views the former councils as generally harmonious, reflecting the continuity that prevailed from year to year. With never more than one new council member elected at any particular time, that new person generally went along with the prevailing positions, he said.

He describes the personality differences and divergent viewpoints as healthy. "Some issues get personal, but over the years, most city councils worked well," he states that after the final vote, the dissenting council members, usually came together to support the decisions of the majority.

Weidenfeld would like to see more involvement in city issues by Greenbelt East and Springhill Lake residents. He thinks the new community center and the indoor pool will draw these diverse communities together. "I want to bring others into the city. I want them to feel enthusiastic, to serve on advisory boards and community organizations."

Greenbelt Is Great

"We have a caring community, and a high level of service," he continues. "I haven't found any place as great as Greenbelt." Even people who disagree with on issues do so out of strong feelings of service to the community," he adds.

From caring about one part of town's having its own recreation center, he has moved toward a view of the city not unlike that of its creator, Franklin De'ano Roosevelt. In 1936 Roosevelt said, "I have seen the blueprints for this project and have been greatly interested, but the actual sight itself exceeds anything I ever dreamed of."

Being legally blind, I am dependent on the kindness of others to assist me with everyday tasks that so many people take for granted. Some of these things include reading, typing, cleaning, shopping, and sometimes even walking, because I am unable to see oncoming cars, curbs, and steps.

People like myself are very grateful for the opportunities that these organizations offer, which enable me to live more independently. The Greenbelt volunteers not only provide their services, but they also help by working with the community in education, by offering the GED program. This helps people get their lives back on track and gives them a chance to earn a high school diploma.

I spoke with Joanna Gimble, who is in charge of education, and I explained that I am legally blind and was taking a correspondence course to receive my high school diploma. I requested that a volunteer come to my home and assist me in reading. Even though my situation was different they were able to meet my needs.

Their sincere interest and support surprised and moved me. I do not know if it was because I am legally blind and I was determined to do this, or if it was just the determination itself. The volunteers came to my home to read and on occasion to teach me, when I was challenged by a tough subject like math. The volunteers are made up of retired persons, high school and college students, some of whom are volunteering for credits for a class. I found it very rewarding to see Greenbelt students doing this type of work. There are many bad things that you hear about teenagers these days and instead we need to turn that around and give credit to the good ones that work in Greenbelt as volunteers. The retired people that want to give back to their community after having already reared a family, are truly the unsung

heroes of our city

To say I appreciate the efforts of Joanna and her staff seems like such a little word. They have enabled me to be hired as an employee and to receive my high school diploma

Although they did not receive money, they did get a feeling of knowing that they had helped another human being and a sense of doing a good thing. It is all about a feeling of love for the community and helping out others because some day that person may be you.

Impose Fees

The taxpayers of Prince Georges County recently suffered a defeat in the Maryland House of Delegates when the County Delegation rejected legislation to impose impact fees on new development to pay for new schools. This legislation, which I proposed and State Senator Leo Green sponsored, would require payment of a fee for each new house built to provide money to educate the children moving into each home.

Without the legislation, the burden falls on all the taxpayers living in the County. Without the legislation, more of our limited resources will go to building schools instead of to educating our children.

Two years ago, the County Delegation to the legislature rejected legislation to permit the WSSC to impose impact fees on development. During the following year, citizens of this County let their Senators and Delegates know how unhappy they were about having to pay for improvements to serve new develop-

ments. They got our message and we got a bill passed permitting those fees, although not to the extent that we wanted.

I urge all taxpayers to join me in getting the legislation passed requiring developments to pay for the new schools needed to serve them. We don't need this extra cost added to our already-too-high tax burden. With your help, we can get this legislation (PG 418 and PG 419) reconsidered. 




The hour-long programs are free and open to all women in the community, who are encouraged to get to know each other before the talks.







Winter Thingamabobs

by David Morse

Another day, another pratfall. That's the winter of '93-94. But if you don't want to take it lying down you might want to try strap-on ice cleats. They afford markedly better traction in icy conditions. When you're looking for them, though, better let your fingers do the walking—most local outdoor outfitters sold out their stocks weeks ago, and distributors and manufacturers are back-ordered to the hilt. Below are a few of the kinds available, along with some other items of interest.

—Covell Ice Walker 'Hook-on' cleats. Preferred by senior citizens, says the manufacturer, because they are designed to go on easily with gloved or arthritic hands. Both Covell ice cleats are "instep crampons"; they go on around the instep and under the space left by the heel of the shoe or boot.

—Covell Ice Walker "Quick Clip" cleats. Features a pop-in, pop-out "quick-release" buckle (the same kind as is used on backpacks) that is quick and easy to use, and able to function

in conditions of extreme cold, according to the manufacturer. Covell ice cleats are available from the Mature Wisdom Catalog (1-800-691-9222).

—Pop-out Ice-tip Cane. Sharp point retracts easily when not needed. Foam grip, wrist strap for holding or hanging. Bronze aluminum. Adjusts from 30-39 inches. Also available from the Mature Wisdom catalog. (See above).

—Weissenfels Shoe Spikes. Five carbide-tipped stainless-steel studs attach under the ball of the foot by rubber strap around heel. Adjustable to all shoe and boot types, including women's high heels. Available from Lab Safety Supply, Inc. (1-800-356-0783).

And for those who say, "The heck with it. I'm not going out 'til Spring!":

—Leather bookweight. 8 1/4" long leather strip with lead weights stitched into each end. For gripping paperbacks without the gripping. The answer for folks who like to read while eating, knitting, sleeping... Available from the Vermont Country Store (1-802-362-2400 — toll call).

Police Blotter

pects were charged as adults and are being held on \$75,000 bond pending trial.

During a traffic stop in the area of Cherrywood Lane and Cherrywood Court, the driver advised the officer that there was a handgun in the car. A loaded .380 semi-automatic was recovered. The driver, a 24 year old resident male was arrested and charged with transporting a handgun.

On Monday, January 31, around 8 p.m., an attempted breaking and entering was reported by a woman who saw a youth standing in front of a neighbor's window. When the witness yelled out to him, he fled the area on foot. Investigation revealed that the window had been pried in an attempt to gain entry.

While on routine patrol on Sunday, January 30, at about 11:30 a.m. an officer observed a vehicle parked in the 7400 block of Greenbelt Road with two children, age 13 months, unattended in the vehicle. When the father of the children, a 33 year old resident male, returned to the vehicle he was arrested and charged with leaving a child unattended. He was released on citation pending trial.

On Saturday, January 29, around 8 p.m. officers investigating a 911 hang-up in the 7100 block of Matthew Street, found two children, ages 7 and 8, unattended. A relative was called to take custody of the children. The father of the children, who said he had gone to the doctor's, was arrested and charged with leaving a child unattended. He was released on citation pending trial.

Officers arrested two nonresident youths for theft after responding to a report that some-

one had parked a vehicle in a parking lot in the 7700 block of Hanover Parkway, then walked to Eleanor Roosevelt High School. A computer check revealed that the 1992 Honda Accord had been reported stolen. The youths were arrested when they returned to the vehicle. One youth was transported to Juvenile Services in Upper Marlboro, the other was released to a guardian pending trial.

On January 29 around 9:30 p.m. two nonresident adults were arrested following a traffic stop when a computer check revealed that the temporary VA registration plates on their car had been reported stolen.

Cash was reported stolen from an unsecured office in the 6300 block of Ivy Lane on January 28.




