New Federal Courthouse Nears Completion: Security Plan Studied District County Council Seat

The new Federal Courthouse in Greenbelt is expected to be "up and running" on August 1, according to General Services Administration (GSA) Project Director Harry Debes. "It's been hard to maintain the timetable," he said, citing the barch winter weather the harsh winter weather and the delay in construction of water and sewer lines. Obtaining adequate funding courthouse security guards has also proved frus-

Located adjacent to Capital Of-fice Park (COP) north of Cherrywood Lane near Edmonston Road (Kenilworth Avenue), the facility is situated on a 9.3 acre tract. The property, originally part of the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC), was annexed by the city in 1993. The courthouse, not yet officially named, will house the Southern Division of the U.S. District Court of the District of Maryland. The facility, a satellite of the Federal (Garmatz) Courthouse in Baltimore,, will serve Prince Georges, Montgomery, Calvert, Charles and St. Mary's counties. About 85% of the \$35 million, 180,000 square foot building is complete, including the golden buff limestone trim, scenic circular roof and a parking garage. Construction started in

Differences in the roles that GSA and COP would play in bringing water and sewer lines to the new courthouse led to a delay in construction. During early discussions about the proposed courthouse, it was reported that Capital Office Park and General Services Admanistration would cooperate in bringing sewer and water lines to the north side of Cherrywood Lane where the courthouse is sited and where two or three additional COP office buildings are planned. To connect water and sewer lines to the courthouse from those existing, it was necessary to run the lines through COP property

According to Debes, "both parties saw the merit of working in a cooperative spirit . . . We thought we had an understanding that COP would provide a free easement for the lines which GSA would construct and accommodate COP's future building flow."

Developer Richard Perkins as-erted: "We cooperated fully with GSA from the beginning to assure they have a right-of-way. They got what they needed. . . We have given legal and engineering assistance at greater expense than the money being reimbursed by GSA for the easement."

Diane Lucci, design manager for the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission's (WSSC) Project Development Division told the. News Review that WSSC finally negotiated "a right-of-way agreement with the property owners . . . and that the total job costs . payment for the right-ofway and costs of the construction . . . will be paid for by GSA." Lucci noted, "We could not contract the job until the right-ofway was released."

Courthouse Security

U.S. Marshal Scott A. Sewell is seeking additional funds for hiring more courthouse security guards to adequately protect the new courthouse. Unless the budget is expanded for this purpose, Sewell says he will recommend to the judges that the opening of the courthouse be delayed.

Eighteen guards are needed to provide 24 hour security. Five guards, Sewell notes, will be shifted to the new facility from the Rockville and Hyattsville courthouses. Both will close when when the new federal building

Sewell, who oversees a staff of 69 deputy marshals and court security officers in Baltimore, told the News Review that he is re-See COURTHOUSE, page 9, c. 3


Three Judges Assigned To New Courthouse

When the federal courthouse opens in Greenbelt, cases will be brought before three judges. Already confirmed by the U.S. Senate are Deborah K. Chasanow and Peter J. Messite, Both, along with Alex Williams, were recommended for the federal bench by Senator Paul S. Sarbanes and later nominated formally by President Clinton, Williams' nomination has not yet been brought before the Senate.

The trio reside in suburban Maryland. Chasanow, 45, a U.S. magistrate judge since 1987, had previously served for eight years in the Maryland attorney general's office where she became chief of its criminal appeals division. Her husband. Howard, raised in Greenbelt, is a judge on the Maryland Court of Special Appeals. The couple reside in College Park.

A judge for about eight years, Messite sits on the bench in Montgomery County Circuit Court. A former Peace Corps

Gil Weidenfeld to Seek 4th

Former Greenbelt Mayor Gil Weidenfeld announced this week his candidacy for the Fourth Councilmanic District of Prince Georges County. Weidenfeld, a Democrat, is seeking the county council seat held by Richard Castaldi, who is now a candidate for county executive. The district includes Bowie, Greenbelt, Glenn Dale, Mitchellville and portions of Lanham and Seabrook.

Before stepping down in 1993, Weidenfeld served 22 years on the Greenbelt City Council, 15 of those as mayor. He was active in three city membership organizations during this time. At the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG), an organization of Washington area governments, he served as a member of the Board of Directors from 1975 to 1993 and as its chairman in 1986-87. In 1993 COG awarded Weidenfeld its "Medal of Honor for Leadership," the only Prince Georgian ever to receive this recognition.

Weidenfeld was also an active member of the Prince Georges County Municipal Association and served as its president in 1976-77. He was recognized as the "Out-standing Municipal Official" by the association in 1977.

In 1984 Weidenfeld chaired the association's Tax Differential Committee which negotiated with with County Executive Parris Glendening a process for reducing county tax rates in munici-palities in order to recognize the fact that municipalities, not the County, were providing some of the county's services. For Green-belt, a 50 cent reduction in the county tax rate was obtained.

Weidenfeld was also active in the National League of Cities and served on its Transportation and Communication Policy Committee from 1978 to 1993.

Retired

Recently retired from the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, Weidenfeld had most recently served as Director of the Office of Public Affairs, a senior management position. He holds degrees in both engineering and

Dolls in America

Dolls have had an important role in the social lives of people since prehistoric times, primarily as playthings for children. In America, before and after Europeans arrived as settlers, dolls were handmade and were oneof-a-kind, fashioned from readily available or discarded materials. As manufactured toys began to make their appearance, imported dolls quickly monopo-lized the American doll market. The most famous doll-makers of the 18th Century were European-German, English and French. Their dolls were made of wood, metal, wax and china. Since breakable materials were fragile, it was common to make only the head, hands and feet out of china, bisque or composition ma-



Greenbelt Gardener's Tips

by Rosie Rhubarb

As we enter the mid-spring season, the flowering trees and shrubs continue to display wonderful swaths of color around the city. Walking in Roosevelt Center Mall or driving along Hanover Parkway is like going through a tunnel of white flowers now that the Bradford Pears are blooming. And any day now the crabapple trees will bloom. And especially beautiful are the line of them along Ridge Road. To see them and smell them is a

One of our most beautiful flow-

ering native trees, the shadbush, is now in bloom. The delicate white blossoms on these small trees can be seen around the city in plantings, (such as the underpass near Hillside Road), and in parks (Schrom Hills Park, the Lake Park, Parcel 1, and the 72 acre tract).

An especially nice display of them is along Crescent Road in the Lake Park.

Some call it by its Latin name, amelanchier, and some call it juneberry. for when the berries ripen. It is also called shadbush or shadblow because it blooms

at the same time that the shad migrate into our local streams and rivers to spawn. If you can stand all the bones the delicious taste of this fish is a real spring-

The shadbush is just one of the most obvious of the spring blooming wildflowers. Many native wildflowers bloom in April before the leaves on the trees are fully grown. Unfortunately there are few wildflowers growing in our parks. Lock closely, especially in the stream valleys and you may see a few.

You can plant wildflowers in a tree shaded yard. For a few weeks in the spring they can brighten up the shady spots in which all too few flowers can thrive. Please buy, don't collect wildflowers from the wild. Not only is it an environmental no-no to take plants from our parks. but collected plants are very hard to transplant successfully.

As I've said before, spring flowering bulbs can also brighten up the shady yard, as well as the sunny yard. The late blooming daffodils are now coming into bloom. Many varieties have several flowers on one stalk and are very fragrant. Two very

fragrant ones are 'Geranium''. white petals with orange cup, and "Thalia", all white-

The classic shape, fruity smell, and wide variety of colors make the tulip a spring garden staple. And they are easy to coordinate with other flowers to provide a gorgeous display, such as in the median strip on Southway.

Tulips have two drawbacks, however, most only give big, beautiful flowers one year and squirrels love to eat them.

luctant to assign some of the Balltimore courthouse guards to Greenbelt. He fears it will 'compromise the security of the judges" and would result in switching to a 12 hour a day security and using electronic security for the other half of the day.

Jesse Jacobs, press secretary for Congressman Steny Hoyer, said that Hoyer "is well aware of these concerns and has raised the issue with Congressman Neil Smith, the chair of the Commerce, Justice, State and Judiciary Committee. We are working to come to a resolution of this problem so that the courthouse has adequate security staffing."

In the meantime representatives of the U.S. Marshal's office, Greenbelt Police Department and U.S. Park Police have been meeting monthly. A memorandum of understanding is being drawn up to designate which department will be called upon in the event of a crime in the parking lot, larceny, or assaults or if a major incident occurs inside the count-

Sewell said his staff in Baltimore confiscates at least one weapon a week from persons entering the building. He noted also that letters threatening a judge or prosecutor arrive about once a month and "in early January, security officers took a knife with 7-inch blade from a claims adjustor on his way to a con-ference with a judge." More recently, officers seized a loaded .22 caliber revolver from a 16 year-old girl.

Couthouse Location

The battle for a federal courthouse in the Prince Georges/ Montgomery area has spanned about 17 years. Originally the effort was to create a separate completely autonomous southern district with the Baltimore courthouse serving the northern district. That focus changed over the years. Thus, the newly created southern district court is not a separate entity. The chief judge and chief clerk of

of the court will continue to be located in the Baltimore courthouse.

In 1987 Representative Steny H. Hoyer (D-Md), who played a significant role in creating the Southern Division, introduced legislation to establish a southern branch of the Baltimore court. Moved through the Senate by Senators Paul Sarbanes and Barbara Mikulski, the measure was approved by Congress in 1988. The legislation stipulated that the new court would be located in Prince Georges County within five miles of the Montgomery County border and that it would be used for federal criminal and civil cases originating in the five counties comprising the southern division of the U. S. District Court of Maryland.

Among the major sites studied were properties located in Hyattsville, Laurel and two on BA-RC land. BARC's Cherrywood Lane/Edmonston Road tract was considered most desirable because of its accessibility to the Beltway, major highways, the Greenbelt Metro and access to Montgomery County.

(Continued from page one) volunteer, he has presided over some of Montgomery County's most publicized trials.

Williams is Prince Georges County's State's Attorney and chief prosecutor. Fred Millhiser, legislative counsel for Senator Sarbanes, observed that the senator and president "fully support Williams' nomination," which is pending and will be heard before the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Millhiser pointed out that judicial appointments do not specify where judges will sit. This function, he noted, is the responsibility of the management division of the court.

Joseph Haas, clerk of the court in Baltimore's federal court, told the News Review that both Chasanow and Messite "have come aboard and are in chambers in Baltimore and trying cases." He noted that his office will remain in the Baltimore facility, the northern division of the U.S. District Court of the District of Maryland.

Haas was dubious that the new courthouse would be operational on August 1, although he expected the structure to be completed and furniture brought in by that date. The official opening, he thought, would be after Labor Day.

"This project," he said is an example of the way government has done a marvelous job."

Staffing

Haas observed that there would be "very little new hiring" employees. The Probation Office and staff now located in Prince Georges Plaza and the Rockville Bankruptcy Court, will be shifted to the new courthouse. Some personnel will also come from other offices where there has been downsizing, such as in the District of Columbia's Bankruptcy

The new courthouse will house seven courtrooms (District, Bankruptcy and Magistrate Courts) and space for U.S. attorneys, trustees, marshals, GSA concessions and a satellite office for the incumbent Congressman.

However, the Public Defender's office and staff will not be located in the courthouse but in a nearby office building. "Nat-tionally." Haas said, "defense lawyers and prosecutors are not housed in the same court."
