Local Elementary Students Help Others Resolve Conflicts

The Conflict Management Training Program was implemented at Greenbelt Elementary School during the past year. The Foundation For Peace assisted staff and After School personnel in teaching conflict resolution skills to all After School participants. Classroom teachers were also involved.

Training sessions were led by Paulette Watkins, Educational Instructional Assistant; Letitia Morton and Lois Martin, Counselors; Joe Brown, After School coordinator; and Kelly Baird, After School program assistant. The Conflict managers worked together to prepare a video tape which explains their function.

The following description of the program was written by Greenbelter Jeanette Savage, a sixth grade student who has served as a conflict manager.

Conflict managing is a program made to help the children better understand their conflicts with each other.

Conflict managing can't be done by just anyone. It has to be someone who the school thinks can be a leader and a positive role model.

Conflict managers must undergo many weeks of training. They are trained for many situations. The conflict managers know when a problem is out of their control. They work hard during the training sessions to develop an understanding of what problems they can handle. They practice the procedure over and over. The conflict managers know when a problem occurs that they: Introduce themselves.

Then they ask the students if they want to solve the problem. If no the conflict managers tell the people involved the alternative. A school authority must be involved if the answer is still no.

If yes, the conflict manager gives them the four rules for conflict resolution. 1. No interrupting. 2. No name calling. 3. Be honest. 4. Agree to solve the problem.

The conflict manager then asks

one of the people involved with the conflict what happened. After listening to what he/she says, the conflict manager repeats it, making sure they understand. The conflict manager then asked the person how he/she feels about the problem. Then the conflict manager asks the other person the same question. The same procedure is done with everyone. The conflict manager then asks the people one by one what they could do to resolve the problem. When everyone comes to an agreement, the problem is solved. Each student is asked what they could do differently if the problem occurs again. The children are told to keep what happened to themselves so that rumors won't get started and to tell their friends the problem is solved.

When the weeks of being trained are over, the conflict managers go out and do their job, which is to help keep school grounds safe for everyone. Managers work together as teams and give a report to the vice principal.

Bike Theft Scheme At Springhill Lake

Expensive bicycles are being stolen from second-floor balconies at Springhill Lake Apartments, says Greenbelt Police Department spokesman Officer George Mathews. Since June 19, the department has received four such reports.

The method of operation appears to be somewhat unusual, he said. Because of tire track markings near the theft sites, police theorize that the perpetrator or perpetrators are backing a vehicle across the lawn right up to the apartment building and possibly using it as a steppingstone to the balcony.

Service Exchange Project Discussed at Workshop

Both state Del. Joan Pitkin and city Mayor Toni Bram attended the Service Exchange Information Workshop held on Saturday, June 4 and sponsored by the city's Senior Citizens Advisory Committee. Chair Marjorie Bergemann presided at the two-hour meeting which involved 30 individuals and representatives of religious, service, and civic organizations.

The purpose of the workshop was to answer two questions: Does Greenbelt need such a program? and What specific factors should be incorporated into the design of its structure so that it would flourish?

In such an exchange, a pool of volunteers responds to requests for simple services (transportation, yard care, grocery shopping, etc.) from the homebound or seniors in need of assistance. These volunteers then receive a time credit for each hour given. Credits may be used in exchange for services, banked for the future, or donated to others.

Eleanor Baker, a VISTA worker with the area-wide Cooperative Caring Network, explained the features of that program which Greenbelt could join as a member organization. Questions and comments from many of the participants indicated that an intergenerational approach seems well suited to the city's population and varying needs.

Other topics such as funding, management, the recruitment and the training of volunteers were explored. Those in attendance agreed to meet again in mid-September, giving time to inform and poll members of their organizations and neighborhoods. A survey questionnaire is being distributed to measure both need and interest.

Bus Service The Best Ever

Bus service has increased in the central part of Greenbelt since the opening of the Greenbelt Metro station six months ago. Buses run earlier in the morning, later at night and more frequently. Three rather than two bus routes now travel through this part of the city and a large section has more than twice the bus service previously enjoyed. This means that getting around the city by bus is easier than ever. And the Greenbelt Metro station is just a short bus ride away.

The buses travel the same routes through the central part of the city that they have for years. They travel two loops - two bus routes travel one large loop east of Southway and one route travels on one small loop west of Southway with all routes traveling along Southway.

R 12, T15/16/17

Most of the central part of the city is served by two bus routes, that travel the same streets. They follow the old T16 route and are the R12 and the T15/16/17 (designated T15 or T17 during rush hour and T16 during non-rush hours).

Traveling to the Greenbelt Metro station the buses come into this part of the city on Southway, turn right onto Crescent Road, right onto Gardenway, and left onto Ridge Road. They travel all the way up Ridge Road to within a stone's throw of the new elementary school, turn left onto Laurel Hill Road and then onto Hillside Road. At the intersection of Hillside with Crescent Road they turn right onto Crescent Road and out to Kenilworth Avenue.



Quick Travel

Travel times to the metro system are much quicker than they have ever been and some residents can get to the Greenbelt Metro station by bus as fast as they could drive there. Before the Greenbelt Metro station was opened travel by bus to a metro station usually meant a 40 to 60 minute trek. The handful of morning commuter buses were the only fast way to get to a metro station.

Now people catching the R12 bus on Laurel Hill, Hillside, or Crescent Roads are getting to the Greenbelt Metro station nearly as fast as if they drove, since the bus takes the same route a car driver would take. The T15/16/17 takes longer because it goes by way of Beltway Plaza, but at least this bus offers a back-up option people never had before.

Heading in the other direction, both buses pass Greenway Center, parts of Greenbelt East and go to the New Carrollton Metro Station. Here again where one lives and where one is going can

The R12 then goes through Capital Office Park and then to the Greenbelt Metro station. The T15/16/17 goes to Beltway Plaza, then to the Greenbelt Metro station. So people can pick where they would like to go.

The two routes together give people much more service than ever before. Now the two buses together mean buses twice an hour during non-rush hours and several buses an hour during rush hours. For example during morning rush hours buses pass the Roosevelt Center Mall heading towards the Greenbelt Metro station (at the bus stand at the corner of Crescent and Gardenway in front of 54 Cres-

make a difference in which bus is best to take.

The T15/16/17 goes right up to Doctor's Hospital entrance, but it is a long trip. The R12 is a shorter trip, but one would have to get off on Good Luck Road and walk up to the hospital through the parking lot.

The R12 is a much faster trip to the New Carrollton Metro station. The T15/16/17 goes to NASA and east on Greenbelt Road.

Limit Drop-offs? Did Their Job

The Drop-Off Center in Buddy Attick Park remains on the cutting edge of recycling. However, all Greenbelters now have curbside recycling or on-site recycling opportunities. This begs the question: should the Drop-Off Center continue to collect recyclables (glass, plastic, metal containers and newspapers) already collected at the curb? Naturally, the center will continue to receive material not included in the curbside collection (cardboard/paperboard, "mixed paper," telephone books and white office paper).

A short history shows that the drop-off center began collecting newspapers nearly 24 years ago. Glass and aluminum collection was later added to the drop-off area. In 1989, using roll-off containers, the city added plastic bottles and corrugated cardboard to its collection.

The County-run residential curbside recycling program began in March 1991. The county started with the collection from single family homes, GHI and townhouses but was not prepared to handle "multi-family" dwellings like Greenbriar condominiums until recently. The county Office of Recycling has now brought all residential units on-line for recycling. Apartment owners are required by law to provide recycling opportunities for their residents and are now doing so.

All this recycling progress brings to mind the important question—should the city continue to provide for the collection of these duplicated materials of glass, plastic, metal, aluminum and newspaper?

Council Considers Cyclist Concerns

Last September a group of cyclists known as the Greenbelt Bicycle Coalition (GBC) petitioned City Council with 400 plus signatures to provide bicycle lanes to the Greenbelt Metro station. As a result Greenbelt became the only city in Maryland with paved and striped bicycle lanes. Mayor Antoinette Bram described the group as "highly organized and intelligent."

At its first worksession with city council on Wednesday, June 15, GBC was armed with an agenda that included concerns about Metro, Bike-To-Work Day, Greenbelt Road construction and Crescent Road shoulders.

Council asked GBC's unofficial

spokesperson, Bill Clarke, to recap the petition which requested the following improvements on roads leading to the Greenbelt Metro Station: bicycle lanes on Ivy Lane and Cherrywood Lane, paved shoulders on Crescent Road, safe means of crossing Kenilworth Ave., and bicycle-related traffic signs on Ivy, Cherrywood and Kenilworth.

Discussions focused on the Bicycle Task Force, a nine member committee which council formed in response to the petition. Clarke estimated that \$13,000 would be needed to pave four foot shoulders on Crescent Road. GBC hopes the shoulders will be paved by Labor Day in order to celebrate the petition's anniversary.

Disappointed

GBC expressed disappointment with Metro. Despite seven meetings with its bicycle coordinator, Sharon Lee Johnson, GBC noted that little has been accomplished to help make Metro more bicycle-friendly. The location of the bicycle racks are not close enough to the entrance to safeguard against vandalism. Bicycle lockers have not yet been made accessible.

In other topics, discussion centered on using Transportation Control Measure (TMC) money for additional bike racks, lanes, and sidewalks. Council has agreed to meet with GBC after the next Task Force meeting scheduled for July 13. Council member J Davis, liaison to the Task Force, will voice GBC concerns.

The next GBC meeting is Monday, June 27 at 7:30 p.m. in the Greenbelt Police Station. Persons interested in joining are welcome.

Greenbelt Celebrates Bike to Work Day

Despite relatively cool temperatures and a brisk wind, 18 bicyclists participated in Greenbelt's first Bike to Work Day celebration. The Greenbelt Bicycle Coalition (GBC) organized a free breakfast in Roosevelt Center for bicycle commuters. Bagels and orange juice were donated by Safeway, coffee by the 7-11, and fruit bars by Giant.

Bicyclists stopped by the GBC table from 6:30 to 9 a.m. on their way to work in order to support commuting by bicycle. While most of those who stopped by were from Greenbelt, Maureen paused in the Center on her 8-mile commute from Bowie to the University of Maryland. Other destinations included the Greenbelt Metro Station, Goddard Space Flight Center, Hyattsville, Lanham, Beltsville, and downtown D.C. Other distances ranged from two to 15 miles.

In addition to the bicyclists, Greenbelt Councilmember Judith "J" Davis and County Councilman Richard Castaldi visited the GBC table. In recognition of Greenbelt Bike to Work Day, Castaldi read a proclamation from the County Council, which he presented to GBC. This proclamation joins that from the city, which declared May 17, 1994 "Greenbelt Bike to Work Day," and which was presented by Mayor Antoinette Bram to GBC during the May 9 City Council meeting.

Parker is Appointee For Conference on Aging

Gray Panther Janet Parker, convener of the Greenbelt group, has been selected by the Gray Panthers National Board as appointee to the White House Conference on Aging Committee. Parker will represent the Gray Panthers' point of view that any problem this country has is intergenerational, as Gray Panthers share concerns about health and the health of children and grandchildren.

It is the mission of the Gray Panthers to bring together the generations and the commonalities people share, creating a better world in which to age. The main goal of the White House Conference on Aging Committee is to develop recommendations on aging policy for the next decade.

Greenbelt Wins Recycling Award

The City of Greenbelt was rated the top recycler in its class among county municipalities for the third quarter of this year, according to a letter from County Executive Parris Glendening. The city's participation rate was 79%, which was highest in Group One (cities with more than 1500 homes).

Said Glendening, "Residents from the City of Greenbelt contributed significantly toward the county's overall recycling goals and are responsible for our continued leadership in the state."

Eminent scientist Bertram Donn will talk to the Greenbelt Astronomy club about the 23 comets that will crash into the planet Jupiter between July 16 and July 23. Dr. Donn is a retired comet expert who worked at the Goddard Space Flight Center for many years, and is partly responsible for the understanding of how comets are put together and how they break apart. 





(Continued from page one) Metro station, the University of Maryland and points west and eventually to Wheaton Plaza. Residents of Lakeside Drive, University Square, Charlestowne Village, and Greenbelt Homes Inc. in the areas around South-


way, Westway and the hill above Westway are served by this bus. It is a quick bus, travelling from its start near the Roosevelt Center Mall to the Greenbelt Metro station in 15 minutes. Heading out of Greenbelt the C2 runs on Crescent Road, Westway, Lakeside Drive and Lakecrest Drive. Coming

into Greenbelt it travels on Ridge Road instead of Crescent Road.

Veteran bus riders will realize this is the same as the old F6 bus route, but with a lot more service. The C2 bus runs every half hour six days a week including Saturday.

Residents from one part of the city can transfer to a bus from another part of the city at the Greenbelt Metro station or at Beltway Plaza, (see separate box). The best aid for deciding which bus is best is the bus schedules for the three buses that travel through Greenbelt, C2, R12, T15/16/17 and the four others that come to the Greenbelt Metro station: R3, 83, 87, 89. These offer people travel options throughout the area.

Schedules are available at the Greenbelt library, bottom of the stairs in a metal rack, and from Metro 202-637-7000.





Library Goes Batty

Anyone who hasn't been up close and personal to a bat lately might like to come to the Greenbelt branch library on Wednesday, June 29, at 7:30 p.m. for "Real Mammals Fly," a talk by Nina Fascione, who will bring two small friends with her. Part of the library's summer program for children, the event is open to families and singles of all ages, and is being brought to the library through a grant from Friends of the Greenbelt Library.

Fascione, an anthropologist focusing on conservation anthropology, will describe the various kinds of bats, the myths and superstitions that have developed about them, and then go on to talk about what bats are really like. What do they eat—or don't eat? Where do they live and how far do they roam and when? How are they helpful to humans?

Ankh and Giza, two Egyptian fruit bats, will be visiting. With

wing spans of about two feet, the bats seem tiny when at rest.

The program will be held in the library meeting room on the lower level. Fascione plans to leave plenty of time for questions and up-close observation. She will also share titles of her favorite books on bats.

Busily at work on a Master's thesis entitled "Culture and Conservation: An Exhibit Design for the Phoenix Zoo," Fascione has an impressive resume. She has worked at various zoos over the years, most recently at the Philadelphia zoo. She has been involved with breeding programs for endangered species and has participated in numerous research studies on animals.

Fascione has been lecturing on bats for about six years, and is known as the Bat Lady, and is co-chair of the AAZPA Chiropteran Advisory Group which surveys North American zoos in order to aid in regional strategic planning for bat collections. A research assistant at the Wildlife Habitat Enhancement Council in Silver Spring, she works on environmental research and education materials.

"Discover Nature" Program For Kids

Pauvent Environmental Science Center will offer a series of environmental education programs for children. The "Discover Nature" program will feature hands-on activities that will allow children to become more aware of the natural world. The program topics will include birds, mammals, wetlands, pond, forest and meadow ecology, and human effects on the environment.

Programs for children ages 5-7 will be held Mondays from 9 - 10 a.m., ages 8-10 on Mondays from 10:30 - noon and ages 11-13 on Wednesdays 9 - 11:30 a.m. The program will run from June 27 to August 17 (no programs will be held the week of July 4). Programs will be held at the Visitor Contact Station (off Rt. 198 near Rt. 32). Pre-registration is required, call 410-674-3304. Children who complete all seven programs will be given a certificate at the last class.





Rabies Alert

During May, six animals in Prince Georges County tested positive for Rabies. Rabies is a virus which is almost always fatal if immediate medical treatment is not sought. Two people are undergoing post-exposure rabies treatment because of possible exposure to the virus by handling their dog immediately after it had contact with one of the rabid animals.

A rabid fox was found in the 7800 block of Old Muirkirk Road, Beltsville on May 26 and two rabid raccoons were found in Upper Marlboro.

The Health Department is charged to protect the citizens of Prince Georges County against the fatal disease rabies. Please assist the department by taking the following steps to reduce chances of being exposed.

1. Call the Police Department immediately and file a report if bitten or scratched by a wild or domestic animal.
2. Avoid contact with any wild/stray animals and animals not familiar with. Warn children not to play with these animals.
3. Make sure family dogs and cats have up-to-date rabies vaccinations. Take the dog or cat to the veterinarian for a rabies vaccination. Dogs and cats may be immunized at three months of age and, by Maryland state law, must be vaccinated at four months of age. The first shot a dog or cat receives is good for only one year. After receiving the second shot, the vaccination is good for three years. County fines begin at \$100 for unvaccinated dogs or cats.
4. Pet owners beware: If an unvaccinated cat or dog is exposed to a rabid/suspect rabid animal or has a wound from an unknown source, the law requires that the animal be euthanized (humanely put to sleep) or put in strict isolation for six months. Veterinarians are required to report such exposures to the Health Department. Keep animal's rabies vaccination up-to-date at all times.
5. Confine pets to home or yard. Do not allow pets to roam freely through the neighborhood.
6. Notify the Animal Control Facility at (301) 499-8300 if a pet has had contact with a wild or domestic animal. Also notify the Animal Control Facility of any sick/stray animals in the neighborhood.
