Special GHI Meeting Jan. 7 Considers Cap on Fee Hikes

For the second year in a row, the members of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) are being asked to turn out on a weekend afternoon to choose whether or not there should be an increase in monthly charges for their homes. The meeting, scheduled for January 7 at 2 p.m. at Greenbelt Elementary School, is the result of a petition by Sherry Garten bearing the signatures of more than fifty members. Actually, two petitions will be on the agenda, one to keep membership fees for 1995 at or below 1994 fees, and the other to limit increases in membership fees for 1996, 1997, and 1998 to what is required to cover projected tax increases. (see box)

Unlike last year, the Board of Directors has taken a unanimous position opposing the petitions. The budget adopted by the board, also unanimously, provided a 2.4% increase in expenditures, but only increased member fees an average of 1.6%. That increase, however, is not evenly spread, and frame homes fees have been increased by 2.8%, masonry homes decreased by 1.1% and the larger homes increased by 2.2%.

The bulk of the expenditure increases are due to increases in projected property tax payments and maintenance and improvements. Since the board has no control over property taxes, it can be expected that if the members decide to hold the line on fee increases, the board will have to cut back on maintenance of the homes.

Differences from Last Year

This year's meeting will differ from last year's in a number of ways. There will be a new chair. Carole Levin was elected to the position of GHI President by the board on December 15, when Al Freas resigned from the presidency. Freas continues as a member of the board. Also, the board decided not to sit on the stage of the auditorium, but instead to be down on the floor with all the other members, signifying that they, too, are just members of the cooperative. Only the president is to be on the

To keep costs down, volunteers instead of GHI employees, will be responsible for setting up the meeting. Of particular note will be the absence of any paid legal counsel. That does not mean that GHI employees will not be required to be there. Because the manager and department heads are paid fixed salaries, they will be expected to attend. There will also be a paid recording secretary and a parliamentarian.

Another change is the budget process that preceded this year's of the current board not to tie budget adoption. Although Gretchen Overdurff was present at last year's special meeting, she had not yet assumed the duties of General Manager. This budget is the first one present-

ed under her direction. The budget process this time included seven budget presentation sessions between September 22 and November 10 before the formal budget presentation and membership hearing on November 15. Although these added meetings were to get membership input on the budget at an early stage in the process, few members participated.

The wording of the petition for the current budget is different, also. Last year, Garten's petition called for keeping expenditures at or below the total members' charge for 1993, \$5,-938,605. That motion was amended at the meeting to keep the member charges at the same rate as the previous year. That change reduced the impact of the budget cut from \$900,000 to \$236,000. If the members adopt this year's motion and the board complies with it, the board will have to cut its adopted budget by \$97,479.

At last year's meeting, President Freas created controversy by ruling, based on the advice of GHI's attorney, that Garten's motion was out of order since the GHI bylaws indicate that the board has the responsiblity to approve the budget. Any recommendation of the special meeting membership would be nonbinding on the board. While many disagreed with the ruling, no one challenged it. After the meeting, the individual board members declared their intent to comply with the member wishes and went on to revise the budget.

This year, Levin again raised the question of the propriety of the motion to be considered at the special meeting relating to the current budget. She wanted the board to go on record as considering the membership vote binding. While some members supported her in considering the vote binding, others, and in particular GHI Treasurer Vonda Henry, felt that it was the duty of the current board not to tie the hands of future boards. Hencontrary to her fiduciary responnot take a position on the matter.

Motions Proposed At Special Meeting

That the 1995 membership fee be kept at or below the total 1994 membership fees.

That—for 1996, 1997, and 1998—any increase in the membership fee be limited to what is required to cover projected tax increases.

New Postal Rates

The New Year is here, and with it a rise in postal rates, attested to by lines that stretched outside the Greenbelt Post Office this week. A first-class letter now costs 32c for the first ounce, up from 29c, and postcards are up a penny to 20c. International rates remain the same, but may change later this year.

Two nondenominated "G-series" stamps are on sale at post offices nationwide. These "make-up" stamps will be used to support the new postage rates.

The "G" stamp is the temporary 32c stamp, and the one featuring a dove is worth 3c and can be used to supplement old 29c stamps.

International mail regulations require that all postage must bear a numeric indication of value. Therefore, "G-series" non-denominational stamps are limited to use within the United States.

The new, temporary stamps are available in sheets, booklets, and coils.

Greenbelters Contemplating Tricentennial Participation

Greenbelt's unique place in the history of housing and city planning could be featured in Prince Georges County's celebration of the 300th year of its founding if the city's unofficial historian could have her way. That is the suggestion offered recently by Betty Allen, who has been designated by the Greenbelt City Council to represent the city on the Municipalities Subcommittee of the Tricentennial Committee. Founded on April 23, 1696, Prince Georges County will mark the occasion of its third century with a year-long festival during 1996.

Before her retirement, Allen was curator of the Tugwell Room, the repository for the city's history in the Greenbelt Library. She has also been active with the Greenbelt Museum and was centrally involved in Greenbelt's own 50th anniversary celebration in 1987. The Municipalities Subcommittee, she reports, has been meeting almost monthly to brainstorm ideas for 1996. Most committee members—represent tives from other jurisdictions—have been active in community involvements; several serve on town councils.

Tricentennial Organizations

The subcommittee was set up by the official Tricentennial Celebration Committee, which was created by Executive Order in September 1993. Chaired by Joyce McDonald, former president of the Prince Georges County Historical Society, it was appointed by then County Executive Parris Glendening and the former Prince Georges County Council. One member represents each concilmanic district.

Two other County committees have since come into being-the

Tricentenial Citizens Committee, primarily a group of volunteers representing various interests and organizations, and the Tricentennial Trust Committee, the financial arm for the celebration, which has been set up to receive and disburse funds on behalf of the other two groups.

The Citizens Committee has also inaugurated Club 300, a special fund set up to provide financial resources for initial organizational and administrative costs. Membership in Club 300 is automatic with a gift of \$300. For information on participating, call W. C. ("Bud") Dutton, convener of the Citizens Committee at (301) 627-6722.

What's to Celebrate?

According to Allen, Prince Georges County offers much which is worthy of commemoration. It is home to many historical houses and sites. Among its towns and cities are those as diverse as Bladensburg, born in the 18th century, and Greenbelt created in the 20th. County citizens are involved with a multitude of artistic organizations. The county also offers religious and cultural diversity and abundant natural resources.

The subcommittee on which she serves has been gearing up to undertake a specific project relating to the municipalities within the county-a large collage of historic photographs from as many communities as possible. Greenbelt should be well on the way to participation in this project, since photographarchives from the which recorded the contsruction and earliest years of Greenbelt, were extensively researched in preparation for the 50th anniversary volume, "Greenbelt: History of a Town, 1937-1987.

Projects underway by other committees and subcommittees include: a costume ball, a county bike tour, a Prince Georges cookbook, a Heritage building, a bibliography of resources concerning the county, and a Celebration of Faith book listing county houses of worship with brief historical data. Greenbelter Virginia Beauchamp is developing a bibliography of archival resources of women's organizations; she also serves on a subcommittee planning a variety of publications. Already representatives of the Museum and of the Greenbelt Arts Center are beginning to talk about develop-See PLAY, page 5, col. 5

Reject GHI Petitions

GHI members need to turn out and be heard at the special membership meeting to be held this Saturday, January 7, at the Greenbelt Elementary School at 2 p.m. Those who don't will let others make decisions that could affect the value of their homes and members' ability to sell them. At issue is how much GHI should spend for managing the cooperative and maintaining its 1,600 homes. Motions to be considered would limit member charges to the same level for the current year as for last year, and prohibit any increases in the following three years except to pay for tax increases.

We believe both petitions should be rejected. Member charges pay the cost of properly maintaining members' homes and common areas. They also pay for property taxes, building insurance and repayment of the rehabilitation loans. The latter costs are beyond GHI's control. Maintenance is the only large budget item within the Board's control. Most GHI homes are now over 50 years old and maintenance needs are increasing, not decreasing.

It may be possible for GHI to operate more efficiently and accomplish more with less. However, the proponents of the motions to be considered at the meeting have failed to show where cuts can be effectively made without hurting maintenance, although they had plenty of opportunity to do so at the nine meetings of the GHI board at which the budget was presented and discussed.

This year, the GHI board, managers and staff have produced a budget that funds needed improvements with only small fee increases.

We urge GHI members to support their actions and reject the two petitions to be considered at the special meeting

Correction

Sherry Garten has informed the News Review that one of the figures was in error in her letter of last week on the Greenbelt Homes budget. The percent of the total increase in monthly charges ascribed to the larger homes should have read 1.6, not 0.4

Look at Dollars

This is in response to Sherry Garten's letter in the Dec. 29 News Review. She certainly came up with an impressive list of percentages! However, percentages alone can be deceiving. I believe that it far more informative and useful to look at actual dollars.

Fifty-three GHI members signed the petition regarding the 1995 budget, 51 of them (and no others) also signed the second petition calling on us to exclude projected tex increases from consideration in 1996-1998. Let's look at the 1995 budget in the latter terms.

Total member charges in the 1994 budget, exclusive of real estate taxes came to \$4,336,115. Total member charges in the 1995 budget, again exlusive of real estate taxes, come to \$4,343,916. That is an increase from 1994 to 1995 of \$7,801. or in Ms Gartens, 0.18%—yes, you read it right, 18 one hundreths of one percent! For this we need a Special Membership Meeting?

A \$7,801 increase exclusive of real estate taxes! Is that terrible as the petitioners would have us believe, or is that, as I contend, a remarkable achievement on the part of your Board and our Staff? Take a close look at the

information the Board included in the Meeting Notice. Notice the economies that were achieved. Notice how the Board was able to restore cuts made in 1994, and to also add new necessary items to the total tune of \$123,300 Yet the net budget increase exclusive of real estate taxes is only \$7,801!

I urge the Membership to vote resoundingly to defeat both of the ill-conceived motions proposed!

One final thought — the following appeared in the "Dear Abby" column in the 12/24/94 issue of the Prince George's Journal:

"Worth Remembering: Our ideals, laws and customs should be based on the proposition that each generation in turn becomes the custodian rather than the absolute owner of our resources—and each generation has the obligation to pass this inheritance to the future. —Allen Whitman"

I would submit that we are but the present custodians of GHI, and whether each of us is here for the short term or the long term, we, each and everyone of us, have a cooperative obligation to pass on to future members this wonderful resource called GHI. We can only do that by properly funding present and future maintenance and improvements! After all, as I have so often heard people say,, this is a Cooperative. We each bought into it with that understanding. Let is act in that spirit!

Let us vote to properly maintain and improve our great community. Let us vote to "Just Say No" to the petitioners! They just don't get it! urday's special meeting and vote down these petitions so that management and the Board can get on with their jeb of running your co-op.

The Outcome Is Garbage

I'm writing to point out some of the less factual parts of last week's latter by Ms. Garten that started off "Here are the facts!" A lot of numbers were thrown around in reference to the GHI budget that just aren't correct.

In administration payroll, appears she is comparing this year's projected expenses next year's budgeted payroll to get her percentage increase of 4.3'.. This gives the impression that payroll there is increasing in excess of the board's set limit of 4%. In fact last year's adminstration staff cost around \$22,000 less than was budgeted that year. It quite likely will cost less than budgeted this year as well. If comparisons are made, they should be between Budgeted 94 and Budgeted 95, or Actual 94 and Actual 95. Anything else is comparing apples to oranges and the outcome is garbage. Administration payroll actually decreaes around \$1,000 between the 94 budget and the 95 budget.

She also makes comparisons of maintenance payroll that make it appear it is also increasing in excess of 4%. In fact, if you add all maintenance payroll categories - the Regular Maintenance payroll, Maintenance Improvements payroll, Vehicle Maintenance payroll Fee for Service payroll, payroll for work done for GDC (GHI's apartments), and maintenance replacements and improvements work done out of funds in reserves- you find out that the increase in payroll from Budgeted 94 and Budgeted 95 is only about 1.7%. If Administration paroll is added to this, the increase in total payroll for the Co-op from Budget 94 to Budgat 95 is only 1.01%.

Members need to understand that the primary increases in the budget that can be cut by the Board are also things sorely needed by the Co-op. The big percentage increases in the budget are for tree trimming, bath tub reglazing, sewer main replacement, and parking lot resurfacing. This is all contract work. In addition, a little over \$20,000 will be spent to begin removing abandoned fuel storage tanks. These tanks are considered an environmental risk by banks and so reduce the Coop's ability to borrow money if needed.

The budget is a very complicated document. It is very easy to pick and compare different elements and distort the overall picture of it. In the past several years there has been a large change in the people on the GHI Board, they are responsive to members' desires to keep costs as low as possible. Members who put their votes and trust in the Board members elected need to show up at Saturday's special meeting and vote down these petitions so that management and the Board can your co-op.




