Lake Gets Go-Ahead Again; **Bike Route Policy Approved**

by Diane Oberg Council tried once again, at its January 23 regular meeting, to move forward with the construction of Greenbrook Lake, approving the latest site plan. In other actions, council adopted a new bicycle policy, authorized city participation in a county tricentennial project and agreed to the renovation of a portion of the community center for office space for city staff.

Greenbrook Lake

Council approved the final site plan for Greenbrook Lake, to be constructed adjacent to Schrom Hills Park. The plan envisions a 1.3 acre lake and development of the property will disurb less than 5,000 square feet of wetlands (within Army Corps of Engineers guidelines). The project has been delayed for years as Wetlands restrictions became increasingly tighter. Construction of the lake is

is supposed to be paid for by Prince Georges County. The city is concerned that if the project is not sent to bid during the current fiscal year, the county may withhold funding. Bicycle Issues On behalf of council, Mayor

Antoinette Bram accepted a cer-tificate of achievement from the Washington Area Bicyclists Association for the city's actions towards becoming a bicycle friendly community.

Later in the meeting, council approved the Bicycle Task Force's recommendations for a city policy on future bicycle routes on city streets. This calls for the city to evaluate all existing city arterial streets for possible designation as bicycle routes, and to install bike lanes where feasible. In addition, the city agrees to retain bike lanes when roads are improved and, when that is not possible, to ensure that the road remains as bicycle friendly as possible. Community Center

Council, on a 4-1 vote with Rodney Roberts opposed, approved staff's recommendation that a portion of the community center building be renovated as office space for the Department of Planning and Community Development. According to Deputy City Manager Michael McLaughlin, plans for the center had always allocated most of this space for city offices. One area had been designated for storage of costumes and props for the Arts Center. However, he said that those plans were made before the Arts Center moved into its current space in Roosevelt Center.

Development of this area of the building had been deferred, to reduce the renovation costs. However, in examining ways to reduce future budget costs, staff concluded that moving the community development staff from leased space to the community center would save money in the long term. In the short term, community center costs will be increased by approximately \$42,-000 to be financed from the capital projects fund.

In approving the change, council required that the city be treated like other tenants and assessed rent in the center. Roberts opposed use of any of the center for city offices, saying that is not the purpose of the community center.

Other Actions

Council approved joining a photographic display of the municipalities as part of the county's tricentennial celebration, if the other large municipalities join in. The cost of the project is es-timated at \$10,000, to be divided among the participants in proportion to their total tax base. Greenbelt's share would be \$1,260.

Council approved a protest of the new state sentencing guidelines, to be sent jointly with College Park, New Carrollton and Berwyn Heights. The new guidelines would significantly reduce the recommended sentences for serious crimes. Council already has concerns under the old guidelines about the treatment of suspects and the sentences meted out for recent crimes in the city.

Advisory Groups

Council made the following additional appointments: Arts Advisory Committee - Judith Holland; and Park and Recreation Advisory Board - David Hilliard.

Second Trial on Hold

Rico Young, one of three ouths indicted for offenses youths which allegedly led up to the murder of a Greenbelt boy last May, may not go to trial after all. After a separate trial resulted in the acquittal of one defendant on all charges, Beverly Woodard, chief of criminal trials for the State's Attorney's Office, requested a continuance from Circuit Court Judge Steven I. Platt on Feb. 3.

'We have to consider the fact that the codefendant accused of being an accessory after the fact was acquitted," she told the judge. A jury acquitted Nicholas Terrebrood Feb. 2 of being an accessory after the fact to murder and transporting a handgun after Judge Platt dismissed other charges earlier in the trial. Terrebrood's codefendant, Jarreau Newton, was convicted of second degree murder and use of a handgun in a crime of violence. (Details will be published next week.)

Young's attorney complained that the delay was due to the State's Attorney's having fired the prosecutor in the cases,



A Review

"Whose Mind Is It Anyway."

A woman lying prostrate on the ground being spoken to by a man in a dialect she can't understand. "What happened, where am I?" are the questions she asks." Why can't I understand you?" And we spend the rest of the play trying to find out. Ostensibly Susan Gannet (played by Sheila Marie Crossley) stepped on a rake. But is that enough to explain her symptoms? Perhaps, or is it more seriously the onset of schizophrenia?

Enjoyable and presented with lots of energy, "A Woman in Mind" is a fine evening of entertainment now being offered by the Greenbelt Arts Center. This clever and witty play by British playwright Alan Ayckbourne takes place in England and doesn't lose its interest from beginning to end. Sheila Marie Crossley is convincing as the charming woman who is just not getting what she wants or feels she deserves from life. She vacillates between loyalty and commîtment to her real family and her deep inner desire for the fantasy family, who are able to love her in a way she really wants.

It is the fantasy family who come up with the adjectives to describe her husband, Gerald (Stephan Cox): "smug, self-satisfied and conceited." Gerald is zealously involved in his work. which includes writing what Susan considers a long and boring treatise, "a history of the parish since 1386." At the end of the play the two families, worlds, come together and run out of her control, doing what they want, not what she wants, as the char-

The doctor, Bill Windsor (Steve Newman), who was especially charming and amusing, tripping over the frog and such and struggling with his doctor's bag, is

already on the scene even before we meet the two "families": the fantasy family that loves her unconditionally and will do whatever she wants, at least at first, and her real family with whom she has "problems" or "issues." When the real husband, Gerald, appears in ministers' robes, we have our first inkling of what those problems might consist of. And we find out that her real son, Rick (Lloyd Rawley), has joined a sect and has refused to speak to them for two years, we have even more insight. Gerald and his sister Muriel (Debbie Kozak), who lives with them and seems to have a very difficult time making her way around Susan's kitchen, appear dressed in black, possibly symbolic of the darkness they represent to Susan. Lucy (Jeannette Connors), dres-

sed in a cute little tennis dress, later in floral regalia, and lastly

in a wedding gown, represents the daughter Susan always wished she could have and whom she somehow imagines she would have done better with than with Jeannette does a great Rick. job as the perky, loyal daughter. Susan also hallucinates an ideal husband, Andy (Andy Hait), and loyal brother, Tony (Keith Brown), described as "tall, fair, and goodlooking in a rather weak sort of way." The brother tends to "take care of things" for Susan that she might not have the nerve to do herself. At one point he enters with a gun over one shoulder and a mysterious heavy-looking bag. This entrance occurs simultaneously with the disappearance of the neighbor's annoying dog.

A finely selected cast does a good job of bringing Ayckbourne's work to the Greenbelt Arts scene. A simple garden set is enough to provide the backdrop, with just one stone frog and a few rose trellises. The scene changes little, making it an ideal selection for the small stage.

Costumes were well done, generally appropriate and wellfitting, but I had to wonder about Andy's hat in the wedding scene, and Dr. Bill's pants seemed a mite tight at the end there. Lighting and sound during the storm scene could have been a bit more dramatic, to heighten the fact that they were all supposed to be getting soaking wet in the garden. There were a few significant oversights in the Playbill, such as no information about the playwright (I was curious about him and possibly I was not the only one), and some rather obvious typos, which might have been caught with a single proofreading, but you know, working out the kinks is what community theater is all about.

Overall, thumbs up to this new production. It's worth the ticket admission. For the cost of renting two home videos, you get to see real live human beings.





An armed robbery in the wooded area between the Greenbelt Middle School and Breezewood Dr. was reported to have occurred around 9 a.m. on Feb. 1. Apparently a student en route to school was accosted by two teenagers, one of whom was armed with a knife, and robbed of his money. Both teenagers are described as male, black, about 15 years old, 5'7", with black hair, brown eyes, wearing black jeans and black leather jackets. One of them was described to have a heavy build, and the other had a thin build, knit hat, and a knife. On Saturday, Jan. 28, a bur-
