Council Debates Tree Removal, Okays Community Center Cafe

The renovation and extension of the Community Center parking lots was once more an issue for debate at the Greenbelt City Council. At its September 11 meeting, council was given a chance to see the new landscaping plan for the parking lots, and to discuss whether the present trees need more protection.

City Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Wilson, unveiled the landscaping plan, which adds 50 trees, over 230 shrubs, and nearly 1800 perennials to the lots. Wilson said that the plan accomplished the goal of reintroducing shade trees into the parking lot. City Horticulturalist Bill Phelan added that the city was "going to put in fairly large trees" to replace those taken out.

Esther Webb was on hand at the meeting to praise the plan. Webb had presented a 150-signature petition at the July 10 meeting asking that greater care be taken during the work on the western parking lot, located behind the library.

At this month's meeting, Webb asked about the removal of two trees from the hill west of the Community Center, saying that she had received the impression at the July 10 meeting that no further trees would be taken down. She also said that she had found a large tree root lying on the ground next to a white oak in the lot.

City Manager Daniel G. Hobbs replied that he would check into the question of where the tree root came from, but that the two hill trees were removed in order to put in a storm drain. "There is no accidental taking down of trees," he stated.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts said that he had also received the impression that the city would not be taking down more trees. He told Hobbs, "I don't know what it takes to get through to staff that the citizens don't want any more trees coming down."

Hobbs countered by saying that he had stated at the July 10 meeting that additional trees would have to be removed.

GHI Woods Clean-up Planned for Sunday

The Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) Woodlands Committee is organizing a clean-up on Sunday, Sept. 24, from 2-4 p.m. GHI members and friends are invited to meet in front of 3 Court Plateau for a clean-up which will remove trash—from old appliances to yard waste—from the woods behind the odd side of the street. Call Keith Jahoda (345-1569) for information. If enough volunteers participate, the clean-up will extend to the even side of Plateau.

Since that time, he said, he had made the decision to save two of the trees scheduled for removal; another tree remains scheduled to be taken down. If the city decided to save this tree, he said, the storm drain would have to be rerouted at a cost of \$10,000. "Those are the type of decisions we have to make," he concluded.

Hobbs apologized to council for not notifying the members that the hill trees would be coming down. However, Mayor Antoinette Bram came to the city manager's defense, saying, "Mr. Hobbs has been our tree-hugger of the week."

New Deal Cafe

The Community Center was also discussed when Amy Hansen of the New Deal Cafe Committee described why her group's coffee house should be allowed to use the building on weekend evenings.

Cafe originally thought of opening their community business at the Roosevelt Center Mall in the old Mellon Bank building, but this space is no longer available. The members now propose using the Community Center's dining and kitchen areas on Friday and Saturday evenings. A dessert menu would be offered, along with live music and poetry readings.

City staff recommended that the cafe open on a trial basis, and council showed interest in the project. Councilmember Thomas X. White said, "This is very much in the tradition of Greenbelt. This is a cooperative that's being contemplated." The trial, he said, would "be a good way to see what the acceptance

would be in the community."

Councilmember Judith Davis, while supporting the idea, questioned whether the cafe might want to close earlier in order to avoid disturbing nearby residents. Presently, the cafe plans to close at midnight and clean up until 1 a.m.

Hansen replied that the cafe wants "to attract the after-the-movie crowd" and that "bands don't usually get going until ten o'clock." She believes that the Community Center is sufficiently far away from most houses that there will not be any disturbance.

Davis said that her concern was with people lingering outside after the cafe was closed. "Residents are very patient up to one point and midnight seems to be that point," she said.

Roberts pointed out that the Community Center will be open to artists 24 hours a day. "Having this cafe open up till 12 a.m. will give them a place to go to," he said. "If there is some problem with noise complaints then we can deal with it" at a later time.

Council referred the matter over to the Community Center Task Force. Bram concluded the discussion by telling Hansen, "I certainly hope you will have some good chocolate."

Surplus Food to Be Distributed by City

On Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 27 and 28, the City of Greenbelt will distribute surplus food as part of the Prince Georges County Surplus Food Program. Butter, macaroni, peaches, peanut butter, pears, potato flakes, spaghetti, and tomatoes will be available for all eligible persons. Food may be picked up on either day from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the municipal building, 25 Crescent Road.

Eligibility requirements are: (1) Independence Card; (2) Medicaid Card; (3) Maryland Emergency Assistance; or (4) an income that is lower than \$11,040 for one person, \$14,760 for two people, \$18,480 for three people or \$22,200 for four people.

Five Incumbents to Run For Reelection to Council

Rodney Roberts

Rodney Roberts, 37 years old, is a lifetime Greenbelt resident. Growing up at 2-G Research Road and 3 Orange Court, he was active in sports with the Greenbelt Boys and Girls Club. Rodney currently resides at 10-M Plateau Place with his wife, Yoni.

Roberts works for Allstate Facilities Management, Inc. as a shop manager and mechanic/welder. In his spare time, he enjoys carpentry, woodworking, sports, boating, hiking, camping, nature and aerial photography.

Roberts has been active in Greenbelt politics for the past eight years and was elected to the Greenbelt City Council in 1991. He has been the Council liaison to the Youth Advisory Committee since its inception in 1992 and is a member of the Council of Governments Transportation Planning Board. Roberts was featured in a WRC news program about transportation issues because of his outspoken opposition to the road expansions associated with the Disney Themepark proposal in Virginia.

Thomas X. White

White has lived in Greenbelt for the past thirty-six years, residing at 8 Woodland Way with his

wife, Helen and family for the last twenty-eight years. He grew up in Northeast Washington, was educated in the parochial school system here through graduation from Gonzaga College High School in 1953. After attending Georgetown University for one year, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and served for five years as a Medical Corpsman.

In 1959, White enrolled at the University of Maryland, and moved with his family to Greenbelt. In 1962, he earned a BS degree in Microbiology and has worked for the past 33 years in the field of medical technology. For the past nineteen years he has worked for the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America where he is Associate Vice President, Manufacturing and Quality Control.

White began his active community service in 1962 when he served with the Greenbelt JayCees, the Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt, and various committees and elective offices in the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) cooperative. He served on the GHI Audit Committee for three

Serious Drawbacks

All suggested changes to Roosevelt Center have two serious drawbacks that the people of Greenbelt need to consider:

1. Moving the steps leading to the back parking lot away from the Co-op wall, especially moving them to the far left next to the medical building, lessens the safety now afforded by wall lights and the presence of people in a direct line with the theater, Co-op and Greenbelt Arts Center.

2. The plans include as many or more trees as tall and dense as the present ones; these trees now hide the Center's businesses—especially the theater's weekly-changing marquee advertising—from being easily seen through the already thick screen of trees between Centerway and Crescent Road. Low, open-branched trees (and less of them) can provide shade but not threaten businesses, which must be seen to be patronized. Roosevelt Center is a collection of businesses with competition east and west of the original core of the city.

Senate Subcommittee Restores NASA Funds

Congressman Steny Hoyer (MD-5) said he was cautiously pleased with the actions of the Senate Subcommittee which restored critically needed funds for Goddard's "Mission to Planet Earth" program.

He thanked Senator Barbara Mikulski, the ranking member of the Subcommittee, who worked diligently to maintain current funding levels for this program.

Hoyer cautioned, however, that the bill must still go to the full Senate, then to a Conference Committee, then back to each House and finally to the President before it becomes law.

In July, the House Subcommittee voted to close the Goddard Space Flight Center and move the operations to California. Hoyer, working with the entire Maryland Congressional delegation, worked closely in a bipartisan effort to delete that language and keep Goddard open.

TO THE CITIZENS OF GREENBELT

I am writing to officially announce my candidacy for re-election to the Greenbelt City Council. When I was first elected four years ago, I had already been active in Greenbelt politics for several years. I had no illusions about the difficulties I would face in achieving my goals. A good example is the police bicycle patrol program. In my 1991 campaign, I promised to work with our police to fight our increasing crime problem by introducing "community based policing" which would include a bicycle patrol program. It took four years of perseverance and hard work, but I can proudly say

that Greenbelt now has a highly pro-active community policing policy, including a great bicycle patrol program. It is making a difference! Other goals of mine include continually improving our City's recreational facilities and preserving and protecting our remaining woodlands and open spaces, including the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center. These goals can not be achieved overnight; they require an ongoing commitment. I promise that as long as I have the support of you, the citizens of Greenbelt, I will never give up the fight.

POLICE BLOTTER

Home Improvement License Not Required for GHI Work

At the September 14, Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) Board of Directors' meeting, Alan Freas reported that Greenbelt Homes, Inc. is not required to obtain a Maryland Home Improvement Contractor's (MHIC) license for GHI's "Fee for Service" program. Additionally, the status of the Request for Proposal (RFP) to obtain a contractor to develop, assemble, and submit the National Historic Landmark (NHL) designation request for GHI to the National Park Service was reviewed, and the status of the "Yard Inspection Program" was presented.

Fee for Service

Previously, a member questioned whether GHI needed an MHIC license for the Fee for Service program. Freas reported the Attorney General's office has determined the Fee for Service program does not require an MHIC license because Greenbelt Homes, Inc. is the legal owner of the cooperative's property. Since GHI's employees are performing the work under the "Fee for Service" requests, a contractor's license is not required. GHI, as owner, does not need a contractor's license when its em-

ployees work on its own property.

Unlike home improvement businesses that perform work under contracts with individual homeowners, GHI has a direct interest in the value of its property, including the proper performance of work on cooperative homes. If a member has a dispute with GHI, under the "Fee for Service" program, that member will always be able to locate GHI. Also, a forum to present grievances to GHI's management is available. The state MHIC license was not intended to protect members of a cooperative who are its partial owners; therefore, an MHIC license is not applicable to GHI.

Historic Landmark Status

The GHI board reviewed the status of its National Historic Landmark designation request. Board member Betty Dietch presented a motion for the Board of Directors to authorize GHI to commit funds for, develop a RFP, and open the RFP for bid so a contractor can be obtained to develop, submit, and oversee the process to obtain the National Historic Landmark status.

In a recent development, Prince Georges County has committed the services of Howard Berger on

a full time basis to facilitate GHI's request to obtain NHL status.

Substandard Window Replacement

Board members approved a proposal by a member to share the cost of window replacement due to substandard windows being installed prior to the member's acceptance of the perpetual use agreement and the occupants moving into the unit of concern.

Yard Inspections

General Manager Gretchen Overdurf reported that as of Sept. 14, 1002 yards have been inspected, 717 first time deficiencies were iden-

tified, and 130 deficiencies have been satisfactorily corrected. It was also reported that the external paint condition on many houses was found to be unsatisfactory.

GHI has cited ivy plants growing up the side of a home as being in violation with yard standards. The recently revised Minimum Use and Maintenance Standards contain a

regulation which prohibits ivy and creeping vegetation from growing on housing unit walls and foundations. A member was cited and requested an exception to the rule. The GHI board voted to allow the ivy to remain in place until the unit is painted or sold, whichever event occurs first.





Lecture and Tests On Prostate Cancer

On Tuesday, September 26, at 5:30 p.m. Doctors Community Hospital and the Greenbelt Cancer Treatment Center will host a free lecture for the community on prostate cancer detection and treatment.
