Volunteers Complete 58 Years Publishing Greenbelt's Newspaper

Small, yes. Amateurish—well that's a matter of opinion. Old-fashioned—sure, if by that is meant dedication to facts, an avoidance of sensationalism, and a certain concern for the feelings of our citizens in their times of trouble. Sometimes warmly supported and sometimes vehemently attacked, but always central to the life of the community. We're talking, of course, about the **Greenbelt News Review**, which is now celebrating its 58th year of continuous publication.

The paper is unique—the longest-running, all-volunteer, co-operative weekly newspaper in the United States—and has been featured in numerous books and television programs, as well as graduate theses and other student papers on Greenbelt, planned towns, and the cooperative movement. Some of these researchers have focused on the paper's four-year, David- and-Goliath struggle against a \$2,000,000 libel suit in which the paper was finally vindicated by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1970. The **News Review** decision struck a blow for freedom of the press, and the case is still studied and quoted as a significant legal precedent.

In a town of many co-ops, the **News Review** is the oldest. Originally a letter-sized mimeographed publication consisting of sixteen pages, then titled the **Greenbelt Cooperator**, the pa-

per began publication on November 24, 1937—six weeks after the first families had occupied their homes.

For those who have wondered how the paper gets out each week, the staff is largely volunteer (or, at least, minimally paid) and, in the Greenbelt tradition, organized as a labor co-operative. The paper is unconnected with the city government, the other cooperatives in the city, or with Greenbelt Homes, Inc. The paper gratefully accepts support from any segment of the community—from the city in the form of city advertising from GHI, in cooperate ads and in housing for its operations; and from the citizens when the financial pinch gets too tight. However, it is essentially self-supporting.

The paper lives by its advertising revenues, which cover all normal operations.

History

The early pioneers recognized the immediate need for a news medium to keep people informed of local events and to provide a forum for the exchange of views. They laid down the principles that still guide the actions of the present **News Review**—a non-partisan, non-profit cooperative endeavor, whose aims are to print the news accurately and fairly and to respect the Greenbelt "good neighbor" philosophy of life.

Office Space

In January 1938 the federal government (which owned Greenbelt at that time) made space available at the town commercial center, free of cost, and also loaned much-needed furniture, typewriters, and office equipment. The paper moved its office four times before coming to rest in the present basement office at 15 Parkway.

With the withdrawal of the federal government from town, Greenbelt Homes, Inc., through its wholly owned subsidiary, Greenbelt Development Corporation, continued the Federal policy of providing free office space with the paper reimbursing the corporation for out-of-pocket expenses.

Call it dingy or call it quaint, the venerable office-painted pumpkin orange in a rare, long-ago spasm of redecorating—features a wall filled with electric meters and a ceiling ornamented with iron pipes, shut-off valves, and festoons of wiring. No two pieces of furniture match.

Next month the **News Review** expects to move to a fresh, new above-ground space in the Greenbelt Community Center (formerly the Center School), and a decorating committee has been working all summer to plan for the new digs. Come visit, after the move. You won't recognize the place.

Women to Lead Council, Historic First for City

"This is a good council," said Mayor Antoinette Bram. "For some reason the chemistry is there." She was speaking both of the outgoing 30th Greenbelt City Council and of the identical 31st Council, which held its charter meeting on November 13.

Because all of the incumbents for council were returned to office, the meeting provided no new faces, but rather an opportunity for councilmembers to reflect on the recent election and the city's future.

As was expected, the top vote-getter, Bram, was re-elected mayor by the council, while the second in number of votes, J Davis, was elected mayor pro-tem. Previous Mayor Pro-Tem Edward Putens served as temporary chairman during the election of the mayor—a two-minute position which he said he enjoyed so much that he was tempted to "stretch the time out."

Bram began by thanking the voters who participated on "a dreary, rainy election day." She commented that "you don't find in Greenbelt to any extent dirty elections," a matter which she thought was worthy of note.

The second-term mayor described how six-year-old Greenbelter Bradley Burt, when he heard of Bram's re-election, asked his father, "Do men get to be mayor?"

Davis, who is a teacher, said that when her class heard that she had been elected, they "very gleefully" asked, "Does that mean you're not our

teacher anymore?" She asked citizens to provide their suggestions to council on how to handle upcoming issues, and added, "We can make a difference and we can be committed to community."

Like the other councilmembers, Thomas X. White thanked those close to home, saying that "a large part of (a councilmember's commitment) is derived from his family." White concluded, "I look forward to the next two years and onward to the millenium."

Echoing Bram, Putens thanked the voters for coming to the polls, saying, "If you don't vote, you're allowing this city to be administered and controlled by the few." On the eve of the federal shutdown due to budget cutbacks, Putens said, "That's what's going to happen to the state and the county and it's going to happen to us down the road." Putens also complimented candidate Valerie L. Siegel for her challenge to the council.

Rodney Roberts said that he was "very proud" of the previous council and hoped that "we can continue to work together during the next two years."

The councilmembers' oaths were administered by outgoing Mayor Bram, while Bram's new oath as mayor was administered by Circuit Court Clerk Vivian Jenkins. The meeting ended with a shuffling of seats as councilmembers changed to their new chairs. Said Davis as she took her place to the right of Bram, "I guess this means that I get to officially make the coffee now."

Greenbrook Lake Stalled Again, This Time by Too Soft Soil

Although progress is being made, the Greenbrook Lake Stormwater Management Facility project is behind schedule due to the unusual soil conditions encountered during the excavation of the pond. A report by Greg Smoot, Project Inspector for Greenman-Pedersen, Inc., the city's consulting engineers, said that an in-depth study of the soil conditions is needed to determine the best way to "dewater" the area. The study should be completed later this month. Once a procedure is approved by the county, excavation of the pond can continue. The excavation and grading should be completed this year.

The problem with the soil,

according to Greenbelt's Director of Planning Celia Wilson, is that the soils have remained wet and unstable. They are unable to support excavation equipment. The study will determine if the soils can be dewatered or if special padding will be needed to support the equipment.

As a stormwater management facility, the pond, which is located on the east side of Hanover Parkway at the north end of Schrom Hills Park, will control surface water runoff by temporarily storing water collected from heavy rainfalls and allowing it to drain off slowly, thereby helping to prevent downstream flooding. Originally planned as a five acre lake, it had to be scaled back to reduce the impact on wetlands. The final plan calls for a 1.3 acre pond with a paved maintenance trail along its south side and a boardwalk crossing the narrow, east end of the pond. City officials hope to connect the maintenance path to other park paths at a future date and to provide a path on the north side

of the lake.

The construction work was awarded to the Driggs Corporation for a contract amount of \$410,300. According to Wilson, revisions to the original contract caused by onsite conditions will increase costs about \$30,000. Although the city is managing the project, Prince Georges County will pay for all costs.

Construction of the maintenance path and landscaping probably cannot be done before winter sets in. As of November 2, the contractor had completed 30% of the work. An existing 24" pipe has been located and opened up to ensure drainage out of the stormwater management facility during construction. New piping has been installed to provide overflow drainage from the pond during storms. A core trench has been completed along with grading for a new emergency spillway. The maintenance path area has been cleared and grubbed (roots and stumps removed).

Twenty years ago, when they began, the program was the first adult care facility in Prince Georges County and one of the first few in the state. It was known then as the University Fellowship.

Michelle Cordova, director,

shares responsibilities of the Center with Meredith Goodman, program coordinator, a full-time nurse, part-time social worker and activity staff. Currently they are looking for an administrative assistant to work part-time. For every six participants there is one staff person. Five part-time van drivers, all retired persons, drive the Center's two vans. A third van is expected soon.

New Facility

The Center is open Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. These hours are designed to cover the needs of working families. Facilities include several offices, a nurse's station, a health room, three large activity rooms, several private quiet rooms for resting, a kitchen and six bathrooms.

GAC's Holiday Show Is WGRN's "Who's Scrooge?"

A sequel to Steve Blais' "War of the Worlds" is now in rehearsal at the Greenbelt Arts Center. Blais' first original play, written especially for GAC, was set in 1939 and introduced the fictitious Greenbelt radio station WGRN. Now he has written a second play, set in 1942, in which many of the same fictitious actors and staff at WGRN produce a customized version of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol."

WGRN is plagued by troubles in its attempt to mount a Christmas production, not the least of which is a little thing going on over in Europe called World War II. One by one, almost every man in the production is called to serve his country in the war against fascism, leaving a radio studio full of broadcasting's version of Rosie-the-Riveters. The stalwart women carry on as best they can, playing the male roles themselves, and doing the work of absent radio and sound-effects technicians.

A major challenge facing WGRN in 1942 is finding an actor who is not joining the

army who can play the all-important role of Ebenezer Scrooge. Thus, Steve Blais' title for his second play about Greenbelt's radio station-that-might-have-been is "Who's Scrooge?"

Typically, life has been imitating art during rehearsals of "Who's Scrooge?" The Director (playwright Steve Blais) has been called away on business trips several times, leaving his producer/Assistant Director, Virginia Zanner, to conduct rehearsals. Various cast members are compelled by professional and other obligations to miss rehearsals, especially in light of the rehearsal period's spanning the Thanksgiving holiday. But if history is any teacher, GAC will succeed in launching a wonderfully hilarious show, just as WGRN manages to produce a deeply moving "Christmas Carol."

"Who's Scrooge?" will be performed at the Greenbelt Arts Center, next to the Post Office in Roosevelt Center, on December 1, 2, 3, 8, and 9. Call the theater at 441-8770 for ticket reservations or information.

Hidden Stories Women's History

Ronald G. Colton Dies; Past GHI General Manager

Ronald G. Colton, of Columbia, Md., died suddenly on November 19. He was 45 years old.

Colton had served as general manager of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., (GHI) from September 1984 to June 1993. During those years he lived on Lakecrest Drive and was a member of the city's Advisory Planning Board.

Margaret Hogensen, who served as president of GHI while Colton was manager, remembers that he "improved the maintenance department and strengthened the organizational structure of the housing co-operative."

"He was an excellent manager and always had GHI's best interest at heart," said Al Freas, who was president at the time Colton left GHI.

Joan Krob, Director of Member Services, recalls that Colton was "an outstanding manager and an excellent negotiator."

Sign-Up for GIVES This week in Church

Over the Thanksgiving weekend, the Greenbelt Intergenerational Volunteer Exchange Service, GIVES, is conducting a membership drive in the city's churches and congregations. Starting at the Thanksgiving Interfaith Service on Wednesday, November 22 at Mishkan Torah Synagogue at 7:30 p.m., membership materials will be available at services through Sunday, November 26.

GIVES is a pool of volunteer caregivers and care receivers who assist others, primarily the elderly disabled and homebound, with transportation to medical visits, yard chores, grocery shopping, and other necessities. Anyone may join. Care credits are earned for every hour of service and may be used for services, saved for the future, or donated to others. This enables those who are care receivers only to stay active with a negative balance. Groups such as churches, civic and service organizations may affiliate with GIVES so that the computer searches for a match within the group when a request for service is made.

The Rev. Booker T. Hughes and Rabbi Saul I. Grife, who are members of the GIVES board of directors, have assisted with this project. Information is available from Janet Parker, chairperson, at 474-6668, or Pat Unger publicity chair, at 474-1914.

After leaving GHI, Colton joined the Enterprise Foundation as program director. Funded initially by the Rouse Corporation, the Enterprise Foundation is dedicated to increasing the supply and quality of low income housing throughout the country. Prior to his years at GHI, Colton was Deputy Director for Development for Wesley Housing Corporation in Baltimore. He also served as Executive Director of Neighborhood Housing Services of Baltimore and worked for the Prince Georges County Department of Program Planning and Economic Development.

Colton received a BA degree in Sociology, summa cum laude, from the University of Pittsburgh and an MA degree in Urban Planning and Management from the University of Maryland.

Colton is survived by his wife Kathleen and daughter Carilyn; his mother Sonia Colton; a grandmother Anna Pleskovitch; two brothers Richard and Gary, and a sister Linda Herman.

A memorial service was held Wednesday at Witzke Funeral Home in Columbia. Interment was private. The family suggests that friends who wish may contribute to the charity of their choice.



breakfasts and snacks for participants. Overlea Caterers fixes a hot meal every noon.

Licensed for 47 participants, the Center currently averages about 38. An interview/screening process is held where potential participants meet with the director and social worker to show their need for adult day care and to establish if they and the center would be a good fit. Cordova shared that "at present ten percent of the participants are in wheelchairs and ten percent use canes or walkers. The youngest participant is 46 and the oldest 97."

Payment for day care is arranged through various sources: private pay, Medicaid (not Medicare), a contract with the Veterans Administration for three days a week, and a state grant based on a sliding scale of income, disability and other criteria. The Center has a contract with Rehab Services for individual speech therapy and physical and occupation therapy. These therapies, which must be requested by a doctor, are paid for individually.

Activities

"CenterPieces," the Center's newsletter, offers a daily schedule, with descriptions of planned trips and special events. A few of the daily activities include exercises, Bible study, art appreciation, cognitive and expressive groups, bingo, baking, current events, sensory stimulation and walks and talks. The nurse offers a health chat every week and shopping trips and beauty shop trips are regulars.

Participants celebrate everything seasonal, including Sadie Hawkins Day. They even celebrate a "Pamper Yourself" day.

Fundraising for the Center is

carried out through yard sales and bake sales. The last bake sale, which was held at the Giant, was the idea of the participants, Cordova said. They "took ownership" of the project, she indicated.

Jean Levi, a participant at the Center, did her own fundraising through a letter writing campaign. She wrote letters to family and friends, put a tea bag in the envelope along with a poem asking all to have a cup of tea, think about the adult day care center and send a donation. She brought in as much support as any other fundraiser.

Now Levi is heading up a Thanksgiving drive by collecting canned food to be donated to a local charity. "Jean is the one who gets others excited about the campaign," said Cordova.

Cordova shared news about another participant, Mary Bower. Last year Bower made personalized Christmas cards to send to the Day Care Center families and friends. When Mary was asked if she liked the Center, she responded, "Yes and I love the people in it."

Center Needs

The Center has several needs. Volunteers on a regular or occasional basis, or a one-time visit to share a talent or event are needed. They will be welcomed and appreciated. Giant Food register receipts are also being collected in order to win activity supplies.

The Adult Day Care Center entrance to the Community Center is distinguished by a red canopy. It is located on the rear of the building facing the Youth Center. Join them on November 29 for their Grand Opening Celebration.

Free Delivery

An important development in the history of the newspaper was the decision to deliver the Cooperator free of charge to every home in town, beginning with the issue of September 7, 1939.

The policy of free distribution remained unchanged except for an unsuccessful effort to go to a subscription basis in 1943. Successive boards of directors have considered that the most important thing is to get the paper to each household in the city.

As We Are

Although some readers may recall when the News Review had only two pages, the standard size today is 12 and may be as large as 28 pages. The deciding factor each week is the number of inches of advertising which determines the number of pages that can be paid for.

At present 10,500 free copies of the News Review are distributed weekly to homes in Greenbelt, including Springhill Lake, Greenbriar, Greenbrook, Greenwood Village, Windsor Green, Green Spring, Hunting Ridge, Belle Point and to Greenbelt office buildings and shopping centers.

New Look

This summer the paper joined the 1990's when it moved to a cold type—computerized process at Chesapeake Printing in Beltsville. It was a heart-wrenching decision to leave Allen Printing Service. Three generations of the Allen family have printed the Cooperator and News Review since the mimeograph was given up. But the paper looks good. We've returned to the longer page which allows more space for stories and larger photos. We've even added green but haven't yet found just the right shade.

Staff

There have been 39 changes in editorship during the paper's

58 years. For the last 23 years, the position has been held by Mary Lou Williamson. There are now 73 staff members, most of whom have joined the paper as their contribution to their community's activities.

An innovation begun 15 years ago, augmenting the staff through an agreement with the Departments of English and Journalism of the University of Maryland to accept placement of student interns, is being continued to the News Review's advantage.

Students have participated in the regular work of writing and editing copy for this paper. The program is sponsored by the Alfred M. Skolnik Memorial Fund. This fund also provides for a yearly \$100 Savings Bond to be awarded to an outstanding Eleanor Roosevelt High School graduate interested in the field of writing.

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POLICE BLOTTER

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
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
