Council Holds Griping Session on Maryland Cable

The Greenbelt City Council demonstrated at its November 27 meeting that it continues to be dissatisfied with explanations offered by Maryland Cable for problems in television service.

Farrell D. Moseley, Technical Operation Manager of Maryland Cable, told council that his company is attempting to solve certain technical problems by improving its cable connectors and adding standby power supplies. On three occasions this fall, council has discussed power outage problems with view of the matter. Whenever he cable service.

Moseley said that if customers requested credit for their missed service, Maryland Cable would give a 24-hour credit, regardless of the amount of service missed that day. Gerald Madison, who has been keeping council up-to-date on his battles with Maryland Cable, disputed this statement, saying, "I have been denied credit on more than one occasion. I have been called a liar."

Councilmember Edward Putens, who has received calls from concerned Greenbelters, also reacted angrily to Moseley's contention that Maryland Cable has adequate policies to deal with such situations. Greenbelters, he said, "have been calling (Maryland Cable) and have not been getting any satisfactory answers. . . . I'm hearing of constant

problems of outages and constant problems of no satisfac-Putens suggested that Maryland Cable should automatically give credit to customers affected by blackouts, rather than wait to receive the customers' requests for credit.

Moseley replied that his company could not always identify which addresses were affected by the blackouts, but Putens pressed the issue. "Why do people have to request credit? You know there's a problem."

Madison agreed with Putens' called customer service representatives, he said, "there is never a mention of a credit unless you ask for it. If you're calling to mention a problem with service, why aren't you told that you can receive credit? It is never mentioned-'credit' is treated as a bad word."

Madison added that service representatives seemed uninterested in hearing about customers' cable problems, and he questioned the methods which Maryland Cable uses to rate calls in order of priority.

Moseley promised to provide the city with more information about this fall's power outages. "We're certainly interested in providing good service," he said, "so we're going to be responsive

Trails in Woods Alan Turnbull III expressed the concern of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI), that the city's moratorium on biking in the city-owned woodland was not being maintained. Turnbull said that GHI members had noticed that some of the signs indicating the moratorium were now missing, and he added that bikers had been observed in the woods. Turnbull asked that the signs be re-erected and that the city police patrol the woods regularly.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts echoed Turnbull's suggestion that the police bike patrol be sent to the woods. Roberts believed that this made more sense than sending a patrol car, since those police officers might be hampered in their pursuit of the bikers.

Council discussed making arrangements whereby the police could issue citations to bikers found on the woodland property which belongs to GHI.

Mayor Antoinette Bram suggested placing environmentally sensitive barriers along the trails which would block bikers but not walkers. However, Mayor Pro-Tem J Davis cautioned that the city's Park and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB) did not wish to add manmade structures to the woodlands. Roberts agreed, saying that bikers would simply start new trails.

Council referred the matter to PRAB and the city staff. See COUNCIL, page 2

A special meeting of the Greenbelt Homes Inc. Board of Directors was held on November 30. There were two major topics - the selection of a director to replace Vonda Henry who recently resigned and the formal reading of the 1996 budget. In addition there was a discussion of the City of Greenbelt Trails Master Plan.

New Director

At a recent GHI board meeting, GHI President Alan Turnbull announced the resignation of Vonda Henry. It was decided that each director would submit names of qualified people who expressed an interest in filling the vacancy until next May's annual meeting. Eleven names were submitted of which eight expressed an interest in filling the position. These eight were Marsha Barrett, Charles Braun, Rebecca Brune, Alan Freas, Joanne Guthrie, Steve Harper, Terri Rutledge, and Susan Wisler, Debbie Hartwick, Kris White, and Charles Wells had been nominated, but declined to be in the running. The bylaws indicate that a candidate must receive at least 50 percent of the votes to be elected. After the first ballot, Rutledge and Freas were the only two candidates with two votes each, but not 50 percent of the vote. After a second ballot, Rutledge was elected to the board. Rutledge has been active in GHI since moving to Greenbelt in 1986. She has been a member of the A&E, N&E, and Resales Committees.

1996 Budget

The proposed 1996 budget had its first reading. This budget reflects changes recommended at the meeting of November 20, including input from committees and members. As proposed now, the average increase in monthly payment for homeowners is 0.5 percent, down from a 2.8 percent increase proposed earlier in the budget planning process. This represents no increase for frame home owners, a 0.9 percent increase for owners of larger homes, and a 1.3 percent increase for masonry home owners. The first reading was approved with no discussion. The final reading is planned for December 7.

Trails Master Plan

The City of Greenbelt has provided GHI with its Trails Master Plan for comment. Board Member Keith Jahoda has been active in this process and summarized the activities over the last 3-4 years. During this period, citizens have identified areas that need improvement, but which require funds that the city does not have. The main areas are for overpasses and bicycle trails. It is easier for the city to apply for funds when a formal trail plan exists.

Board member Carole Levin felt that the City should have formally asked for GHI's approval, as it appears that GHI might have been 'left out of the formal loop.' The map is important for what is excluded as well as for what was included. The current map does not show the woods trail for bicycles. The city's legal advice was that it would not be to the city's advantage to show bike trails in the woods.

member Board Nat Shinderman wants to be sure that GHI cannot be held liable for accidents on the trails that cross GHI property. There was discussion of asking the city to cover liability for all of the trails. It should be easier for them to include it in their insurance, and a similar arrangement was made with the playgrounds on GHI property. Turnbull will draft a letter to the city giving GHI's support for the project, especially for overpasses, and will mention the liability issues, as well as a need for increased lighting of certain areas of the trails on GHI prop-

Staff Salary Ranges

The board reaffirmed the current staff salary ranges as being in effect for 1996. GHI staff had recommended that the salaries, which were last increased in 1993-94, be the subject of an indepth study. Upon findings of the study and upon evaluation of current job functions, the board will be in a better position to recommend changes in salary ranges.

Post Office to Offer Extra Holiday Hours

The Greenbelt Post Office will be operating on a special schedule for the holiday season from December 9 through 24. The Post Office will be open for business from 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. every Saturday until Christmas, There will also be Sunday hours December 10 and 17 (but not December 24) from noon to 4 p.m. Through December 22, weekday hours will be extended, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

County's Curfew Law Would **Apply to Greenbelt Youth**

Youth curfew legislation was unanimously approved by the Prince Georges County Council on November 22. The measure disobey nighttime restrictions - 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. on weeknights and 12 midnight to 5 a.m. on weekends - would be subject to fines of up to \$250. County Executive Wayne Curry is expected to sign the bill which will go into effect 45 days after Curry signs.

In passing the legislation that was sponsored by County Councilmember M. H. Jim Estepp, the county joins Washington D.C., Baltimore, Richmond, Frederick and Laurel in restricting the hours youths can be out on

According to Peter Lupo, chief of staff for Estepp, the new legislation will apply to the City of Greenbelt. He explained that a comprehensive educational and public relations program will be offered in all jurisdictions, including schools and police departments, prior to the kick-off of the

program. He stressed that the legislation will give police a preventive tool, one that will help police officers "move youths along."

On the county's books now is stipulates that parents, whose a curfew imposed in 1967 but children under 17 years of age rarely enforced. County adult-supervised activities. Councilmember Audrey E. Scott observed that one of the reasons the law is not enforced is that "our law enforcement agencies have to set priorities...things like curfews or loitering don't have the same priority some other crimes do." She was concerned about whether the county had the resources to implement the curfew. Scott opined that "our police are professionals and can be expected to use discretion in carrying out the law."

> Estepp and his colleagues view the curfew as an important additional tool for law enforcement, one that would protect youngsters and force parents to take more responsibility. The legislation prohibits young people under 17 from being in public places between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. on weeknights and between midnight and 5 a.m. on week-

ends. Exceptions would include youths who are traveling between work and home, accompanied by a parent or guardian or involved in constitutionally mandated events (political, religious) or

Youths violating the ordinance would not be arrested. A first offense carries a warning, a second a trip to the police station, where parents would be called to get their children and a \$50 fine imposed. A third offense carries a \$100 parental fine and further violations could total \$250. Business owners would also be subject to fines if they knowingly allow minors in their establishments during curfew hours.

Earlier this year Greenbelt initiated Operation Midnight, a voluntary program that encourages parents to sign an agreement giving the city police permission to stop their children if they are outdoors weekdays and weekends between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. and to take them home. The Greenbelt program does not carry monetary penal-

Youth Advisory Board **Reviews City Programs**

At a time when some believe that children should be seen and not heard, the city of Greenbelt has developed a board which gives youths a chance at community involvement. The Youth Advisory Board was established three years ago to create a forum for the discussion of issues concerning the youths of Greenbelt.

The board, which holds its monthly meetings at the Greenbelt Recreation Center, is active only during the school

"The main charge is that they (youths) are open to comment on any community topic such as health, violence, and crime," said Harry James, who has been the assistant director of recreation in the city for 23 years and the city liaison to the

Most recently, the board reviewed a draft of the Greenbelt Trails Plan, which is designed to place all bike paths, highway overpasses and hiking trails within the city, on a map.

"Some of the program is proposed trails," said James. "The youths reviewed it and gave input on what they wanted to know about."

Two months ago, the board began reviewing minutes of city council meetings to come up with subjects that apply to the youth. Any suggestions they come up with will go to city supervisors.

-City Treasurer Michael McLaughlin accepted two awards given to the city by the Government Finance Officers Association: the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for fiscal year 1994 and the Distinguished Budget Award for fiscal year 1995. 'Christmas Play "Scrooged"

Who's Scrooge? I can answer this question in one word after witnessing the Greenbelt Art Center's (GAC's) awkwardly packaged Christmas offering. Me.

In spite of all the key ingredients for a winning production - a concrete storyline, a cast of veteran players and a talented director - "Who's Scrooge" fell short. Accustomed to the professional performances under Director Steve Blais' guidance - I was disappointed by the numerous stilled and misspoken lines that befell the players' lips. And although I admire the attempt to assemble a cast of 25 on the GAC stage, preparation time and talent must go hand in hand.

Quality is not necessarily measured by quantity. Three hours plus with only a ten minute break was far too long even for a theater enthusiast like me. In fact, I found myself nodding off in the last 20

However, "Who's Scrooge" was not without redeeming qualities. Blais is clearly a creative and versatile dramatic artist who has demonstrated to the public his talent as an actor and director. In this play, he was able to create a parody of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" with a refreshing host of vibrant characters. These personalities ranged from the Cattrell Sisters, Jack Morgan (the most versatile radio voice), Steve Farmer (who stutters but not when acting) to David Matthews (handsome and debonair, just ask him).

A treat for diehard Greenbelters is setting the story at Greenbelt radio station WGRN. The time period is World War II where every man casted as Scrooge in the station's production of "A Christmas Carol" has the misfortune of being drafted. Paula Stevens, who could have started the entire feminist movement, is the only woman station manager in the country. The studio is under the trembling hand of. her accommodating niece.

The play is centered around Steven's manipulation of the station's radio stars, the staff and the owner of Cosmos Cola -a sponsor of questionable dealings. There is "a tiger can change its stripes" theme in the play which is reminiscent of the Grinch who Stole Christmas. Unfortunately - the acting was at best marginal despite the valiant efforts of the leads.
