Council Seeks To Protect Woodlands "In Perpetuity"

and Planning Commission and the National Park Service. However, Councilmember Rodney Roberts worried that a future council could eliminate these provisions by repaying the funding. While all five councilmembers agree that the land should not be developed, they are searching for a way to make their commitments more permanent. Any laws passed by council can be changed by a future council.

Permanent Restriction

Hruby explained that an environmental easement is a restriction that landowners may voluntarily put upon their land, usually in return for a tax break, that permanently limits the use of the land. Few governments have granted environmental easements, as they would not benefit from the tax break provisions. However, she reported that the Maryland Environmental Trust encourages donations by governments.

Generally, a property owner would donate the easement to an organization such as the Maryland Environmental Trust, often in partnership with a more local organization. The trust organizations then have the right and responsibility to enforce the easement. They generally inspect the property, at least once a year, to ensure compliance with the easement. The easement becomes part of the property records, and is binding upon future owners.

Future Changes?

Mayor Antoinette Bram asked what would happen if the city were to grant an easement to the state-funded Maryland Environmental Trust, then find that a future state administration changed the organization's approach or stopped funding it. Hruby noted that the restriction would be part of the deed, and said that the mayor's concern is "another reason" for having two organization involved-it is unlikely that both would fail.

Roberts, who has called for creating a woodlands preserve on

Community Center Darkroom to Open

With a decision by the Greenbelt City Council to approve a two-year agreement with A. P. Bowling & Associates, Inc., under Paul Bowling, photographer, the Greenbelt Community Center will offer a new facility for the use and pleasure of Greenbelters and residents of nearby communities. This will be a photographic darkroom, to be known as the Community Darkroom, that will be located on the second floor of the building near the frame shop and museum office.

According to the terms of the agreement, Bowling will invest \$6,050 in equipment and materials to operate the facility. The city, for its part, expects to invest from \$600 to \$800 to make the space ready, especially by hooking up the sink and correcting some lighting problems. The city will also

furnish utilities and general building maintenance support.

As rental, Bowling has agreed to pay the city 5% of gross income from rental of the space. Both by-the-hour and yearly fees will be charged, which are projected to raise a minimum of \$2500 annually for the city. The facility will thus operate in a manner similar to the pottery studio, which is already in use within the Community Center.

Program Plans

The program to be offered is intended to provide comprehensive darkroom experiences for persons with all levels of skills and ability. It will be overseen by a supervisory committee composed of the Community Center Supervisor, a member of the Greenbelt Photography Club, and an employee of the darkroom. Classes and workshop times under trained teachers will be set up to provide maximum use of the facility.

The agreement calls for the provision of black and white development services. These will be made available for individual use, both on a walk-in and pre-scheduled basis, when classes are not in session. Bowling & Associates will be responsible for keeping equipment regularly cleaned and maintained and for supplying fresh chemicals and other photographic materials.

The new facility is expected to become operational by the end of June. In the meantime workers are readying the space, setting up an interior wall, and putting in lights and a counter.

City Notes

The Horticulture Crew began fencing trees at the Lake Park to prevent beaver damage. This will be done on the North Shore in the lawn areas and on the South Shore where there is only a narrow strip of trees between the lake path and the

Trash and commercial refuse were collected, litter cleaned from City streets and parks and playgrounds and ballfields maintained. Damaged trees and yard debris resulting from Wednesday night's storm were removed. Newly planted trees were watered, flower beds weeded and grass cutting con-

Police cars and Public Works' trucks were serviced and repaired plus the Recycling Coordinator's vehicle was painted. Also the Recreation Department's vans were readied for the summer camp season. Lastly, the Recycling Center was cleaned every day.

Jennifer Foley attended a COG Recycling Meeting on Waste Flow in the Mid-Atlantic

On Wednesday, June 25, 10.71 tons of mixed paper and 3.3 tons of co-mingled cans and bottles were recycled. This resulted in a \$690 savings to the City of the landfill tipping fees.

Parcels 1 and 2, and who has investigated conservation easements, added that if a trust fails, enforcement of the easement is transferred to another organization.

In response to a question from Bram, Hruby said that an easement cannot be taken back by the property owner. However, under some circumstances an easement can be amended if the property owner can prove that circumstances have changed. However, she said, a trust will generally not consider an amendment unless there will be a net increase in the amount granted the easement, Hruby noted, that whatever occurs on the land must be in keeping with the easement agreement. Thus, property owners must carefully look into their future needs before granting an ease-

Other Options?

Bram and Councilmember Thomas White were interested in pursuing whether council had other options to protect the land in perpetuity. Bram in particular was doubtful that other levels of government would continue to support strict conservation principles. White expressed a desire to fully investigate the city's own options.

Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Wilson suggested that there may be some ways that the city could prevent private development, such as by creating a land-locked parcel (without access to roadways), but that such steps would not protect the land if a future council wished to develop some of the property for its recreational value. Later, Councilmember Judith Davis noted that in its discussions of the property, council has not heard from representatives of the groups that would like to see additional ballfields in the city. Past councils had planned to develop several ballfields in part of the area

under consideration for the easement.

Councilmember Edward Putens was willing to explore options other than the easement, so long as council did not lose sight of the objective. We do not know what will happen in the future, he said, sometimes the city is "its own worst en-

All five councilmembers voiced support for protecting the land "in perpetuity." The next steps include an investigation by the city's planning and legal staffs of possible alternatives and a meeting with representatives of the Maryland Environmental Trust.

Greenbelt Landmark Quiz Answer

In Tugwell's mind, there were to be 3,000 greenbelt towns, all built outside urban centers characterized by stable employment trends and all separated from one another by belts of green. The greenbelts of each town ultimately would join to form continuous permanent open spaces around cities, thus preventing the "string development" that was characterizcurrent growth. Greenbelt towns were seen as the answer to congested, unsanitary slums; poor farming practices and inadequate markets; and mass-produced, bleak subdivisions being erected by private developers outside major cities.







As usual, however, petitions and requests are not acted upon at the time they are made. Mayor Bram assured Hinostroza that the request would be carefully considered.

School System Lists Registration Rules

The Prince George's County Public School System recently released registration procedures for the enrollment of non-United States citizens, and for language minority United States citizens.

All foreign-born students, pre-kindergarten through grade 12, and Evening High School students, who are in the following categories, are required to enroll through the International Student Guidance Office before being admitted to their local schools:

 all students who are not United States citizens;

o all United States citizens whose primary language is not English; and

 all students whose transcripts are from a foreign country.

The family (or school personnel assisting the family) should call the International Student Guidance Office at 301-445-8460 to schedule an appointment before going to that office. This procedure will ensure that the family has all the necessary documents to register. The International Student Guidance Office will provide students with any other necessary registration papers.

Students already enrolled in the Prince George's County Public School System may transfer from one school to another school within the County without going through the International Student Guidance Office. If the student is enrolled in the ESOL Program, the original school should call the ESOL office at 301-445-8450, with the new address, for the name of the appropriate transfer school.

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

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

CRAB Bids Mecum Adieu


