Council/WSSC Official Discuss 96" Water Line

One step was taken toward improving communication between the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) and the city of Greenbelt when WSSC chief operating officer Michael J. Crean came in person to the regular city council meeting on June 16. His appearance followed a stiff note to WSSC from Mayor Antoinette Bram, dated May 16, claiming that the city had not been notified ahead of time of their work to repair the 96" water line through Greenbelt's corporate limits. The city's first awareness of the project, her letter charged, was the discovery of a fenced-off area at the intersection of Hanover Parkway and Hanover Drive.

In a letter of reply on June 3, Crean noted, however, that WSSC had tried to contact the city's Planning Director, Celia Wilson, the previous fall about plans for this work and that at that time they had been referred

by her office to Public Works Director Carl Hirsch.

In January 1997 the WSSC project manager had spoken with Hirsch and "explained the project, its scope, and potential impacts," Crean's letter said, adding that Hirsch had asked only "that notification be given 48 hours in advance of construction"—which in fact had been supplied.

WSSC carries out new water and sewer construction as well as both planned and emergency maintenance within the city, the letter pointed out. "My intent," Crean continued, "is to ensure that all work within the City is done in a manner that meets the City's expectations...." In fact, the city's letter had come as "a shock to WSSC," he said in person at the meeting.

Council Response

Speaking on behalf of the city, councilmember Thomas X. White told Crean that "the basic issue is lack of communication." There are over 20,000 residents in

Greenbelt, he pointed out, and "there should be a partnership between governments." He called the carrying out of the original Project 80—that is, the excavation for and construction of the 96" main—"in-your-face, with little or no notice." The city was also often distressed when street paving projects just completed were suddenly torn up immediately afterward by WSSC.

Mayor pro tem Judith Davis agreed. "Council and staff were caught unawares," she said, referring to the water main project. "They want to see the plans; the city planner wants to see them."

Debbie Dempsey Awarded Maalox Heroism Prize

This is an amazing story. Ever hear of the One-Minute Maalox Award? Funny, right? Wrong! And if you think you've never heard of it, wrong again—at least if you read the November 7, 1996, issue of the Greenbelt New Review.

Greenbelter Debbie Dempsey read that issue. When she saw the article, she thought, "Why don't I apply?" The award had been established to recognize "Ten of America's fastest-acting heroes." And Debbie, a Prince George's County emergency dispatch aide, had saved a woman's life in 1982.

On Tuesday, May 6, at a ceremony in the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City, Debbie Dempsey received her award for heroism: \$5,000 and a commemorative plaque, as well as a \$1,000 donation to her favorite charity.

Multi-vehicle Accident

One day in 1982, Dempsey had been driving home from a miniature golf game with her

husband, a police officer. While driving on the Capital Beltway, they suddenly came upon a multi-vehicle accident—a truck with a mangled small car practically beneath its trailer.

Dempsey pulled a man from the driver's seat. Then she shook the woman who had been sitting beside him. "Her head flopped toward me, and at that moment I realized she was dying," said Dempsey. "The trailer's rear had smashed through the windshield, and the woman's face had slammed against it full force. The gaping split down the middle of her face exposed her nasal passages."

Dempsey yelled to her husband to call for the police helicopter. Then, with the aid of an off-duty nurse who had squeezed into the back seat and "literally held the woman's head together," Dempsey managed "to do a version of CPR that no first-aid textbook will probably ever address."

Dempsey thought the woman was dead but refused to give up.

GIVES Elects New Board at Meeting

Greenbelt Intergenerational Volunteer Exchange service (GIVES) held its annual membership meeting on June 7, in the Greenbelt Community Center multipurpose room. GIVES elected officers, adopted a bylaw amendment and overviewed past and future directions of the two-year-old organization.

Elections

Past chairperson Janet Jacobs-Parker conducted the election of the new executive board of directors, at large and honorary members. Elected by acclamation were John Taylor for chairperson, J Davis for vice chairperson, Janet Jacobs-Parker for secretary, Robert Terrell for treasurer and Lu Price for publicity.

Bylaw Change

In order to qualify for a federal IRS nonprofit status, GIVES bylaws were amended. More updates will follow as Pat Unger proceeds with this important application.

Overview

Farrell Didio from the group's parent body, the Cooperative Caring Network (CCN), spoke on re-

gional and metropolitan networks similar to GIVES. The 37 other volunteer cooperatives in the Washington, D.C. area are united under the auspices of CCN, which is sponsored by the United Seniors Health Cooperative with offices on H Street in Washington.

It is the "care credit" which distinguishes a cooperative network from other volunteer agencies, emphasized Didio. Providing assistance to each other through a community based network was a salient theme of her presentation. She concluded by recalling that it is the bond which develops between donor and recipient that is of primary concern in the service exchange.

Outgoing chairperson Janet Parker spoke of the personal satisfaction she has experienced during her tenure. She personally thanked individual members for their support and encouragement. She will continue on the board as secretary.

And then the nurse felt a pulse! The victim sustained severe injuries, but survived. Dempsey said, "The story might have ended here, but it didn't."

Three years later she happened to be the dispatcher handling an incoming call from a woman who wanted a copy of an accident report in 1982. "I thought to myself 'this couldn't be...'" Then I asked her name." Sure enough—quite by chance, she turned out to be the woman whose life Dempsey had saved.

Notification of the Award

When Dempsey first submitted her entry, she placed the letter of acknowledgement she received into a closet and forgot about it. In January, 1997, she happened to clean out the closet, found the papers, and wondered if someone had won the award. Five minutes later the telephone rang, informing Dempsey that she was one of the winners. She had forgotten the amount of the prize, or perhaps never noticed it. "I said what did I win" They told me, and I said, "Wow."

Dempsey and the woman she saved have become friends, and call each other from time to time to say hello. At Dempsey's invitation, the victim joined her at the awards ceremony. "She is an amazing woman," says Dempsey, "with a terrific sense of humor, although she is still undergoing surgery for her injuries."

How did the incident affect the prizewinner? "It increased my awareness of how life can be snuffed out. It made me feel that God was watching over me, and over her. Everything just fell into place I can't explain it."

Dempsey will be contributing the \$1,000 charity award to Heroes, Inc., an organization that supports the families of police officers and fire-fighters who have been killed in the line of duty.

Debbie Dempsey has lived in

Greenbelt since 1990. She moved here because she wanted a house and GHI was the only place she could afford.



The city was also concerned, she said, that WSSC standards in patching up roads and sidewalks after repairs were lower than the city's own standards.

Water Main Project

Crean described the current status of the water main project as consisting of two segments—one under renovation in the Ardwick-Ardmore area, the other in the vicinity of the dog park in Greenbelt East. In August WSSC expects to advertise a contract involving another Greenbelt segment, this one in Attick Park.

That section will involve a strip 25 feet wide running close to the city's maintenance building and following the swale up over the hill. The work area will be entirely below the dam, Crean said.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts disputed Crean's term "renovation," calling it a "mischaracterization." "It's a reconstruction, not a renovation," he said.

Crean explained that the prestressed concrete pipe used for the water main was "defective"—that similar problems were occur-

ring across the nation with this kind of pipe. It will be lined with a carbon steel pipe half-an-inch thick. "It's a rehabilitation," he said.

WSSC Standards

As for the issue of standards of reconstruction of street and sidewalk paving that had been raised by council, Crean indicated that much of their work responds to emergency situations and that temporary patches are then applied. WSSC has only one contractor available for final repairs, he said; in addition, asphalt is not available in the winter, which may also delay final repairs.

In response to Davis' concern that Attick Park be left in a condition as good as WSSC had found it in, Crean said that they "will do whatever is necessary to fix it."

City Manager Mike McLaughlin indicated that they were hoping to set up a meeting involving the project manager, Celia Wilson, and WSSC staff to work out issues concerning street

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

Greenbelt Fourth Graders Begin Banking at School

The Greenbelt Elementary branch of Riggs National Bank opened for business on Tuesday, May 20 at Greenbelt Elementary School. Several fourth graders participated in the opening day with deposits of over \$100. Representatives from the Greenbelt branch of Riggs Bank and from the bank's Washington headquarters joined in the opening celebration.

Riggs National Bank, the Greenbelt branch, chose Greenbelt Elementary School to participate in the Save for America program. They made an initial deposit of \$1.00 for each child.

This school based savings program will be run by PTA representatives and volunteers. Sponsored by the U.S. Departments of Education and the Treasury, the Save for America program will give students the opportunity to open and maintain a savings account while at school. Students will learn the principles of saving, how to manage money, and the importance of investing money. The program demonstrates that young people can learn thrift and responsibility. A volunteer program, Save for America is helping to educate young people in the importance of saving and will help create better informed adults who will be capable of making sound money decisions in the future.

An integrated component of the students study of economics, children actually go to the Greenbelt Elementary Riggs branch on Bank Day — Tuesday — to make their deposits. Students keep records of their transactions in their school savings register (on a computer disc) to encourage use of math skills. They will receive an account statement monthly. Each child must have a valid social security number in order to participate.

Only deposits are made at school. However, both withdrawals and deposits may be made at the Greenbelt Riggs branch at 7300 Hanover Parkway.

When asked why they were saving the money, the fourth graders had various reasons. Some were saving for college while others were saving for a new car or a new home for their families.



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


