We Ask Candidates to Respond **To 5 Questions on City Issues**

The News Review has once by civic organizations. again posed to city council candidates a series of questions that relate to issues we believe are of general interest to Greenbelt voters. In this issue, we list the questions we have asked. In the next five issues, we will publish, unedited, the answers received from the candidates. However, we will limit answers to 150 words or less. If an answer exceeds that number, we will cut it off at precisely that limit. Nor will we publish personal attacks against any other candidate.

This series of questions and answers is one of several ways in which this paper will provide voters with information about all six candidates. We are also publishing their biographies as provided. We will also cover and report on

Questions

1. What is your vision for Greenbelt in the coming years? What do you most want to accomplish as a city councilmember? (For the October 2 issue.)

2. What public safety issues do you see as needing attention by the city? As a city councilmember, how would you deal with these issues? (For October 9 issue.)

3. Although private contractors remove refuse and recyclable materials from most apartments. townhomes and condominiums, the city provides this service for a fee to most free-standing and GHI homes. The city also operates a drop-off recycling center at Buddy Attick Park. The city candidates night events sponsored council has approved a number of

changes to city service in order to save on expenses and avoid raising fees, including reducing refuse collection to once a week beginning in October. Are you satisfied with the way refuse and recyclables are now collected in Greenbelt? If not, what would you change? (For October 16 issue.)

Council has modified a 4. few streets to accommodate bicycle lanes and to slow traffic by employing traffic calming devices, including speed bumps. Do you agree with the changes made? What other steps, if any, would you propose to protect pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists? (For October 23 issue.)

5. Is further action needed to protect the woodlands of Parcels 1 and 2 now owned by the city? If so, what? (For October 31 issue.)

City's Founding Brought

"'FILENE BACKS COOP-ERATIVE AT GREENBELT.' Reaching for my paper, as I set out for my job in Washington on the morning of September 2, 1937, I saw the headline set in bold type right in the center of

page 1 "All summer this particular page of the Washington Post had been devoted to Japanese attacks on China, the Spanish Civil War, the Scottsboro case. the Nazi jailing of Pastor Neimoller, the search for Amelia Earhart, Russian arrests and liquidations, and Hitler's latest mouthings ... Perhaps hope had once more found the front page."

These are the opening paragraphs of George A. Warner's "Greenbelt, the Cooperative Community," a history of the city's founding which was published in 1954. The hope he refers to must have been in the hearts of the pioneers as they moved into their brand new homes in the brand new planned community. The young families, after registration, interviews, and selection by special committee, continued to move into the project from October of 1937 until December 1938. The Warners chose the corner unit at 13-H Ridge Road and moved in on April 30, 1938.

Many members of those families and their descendants will gather for a Pioneer Family Reunion Luncheon at American Legion Post 136 on Saturday, October 18. Sponsored by the 60th Anniversary Committee, this is the only event of the weekend-long celebration which is by invitation only. Bob Sommers is the chairman who has coordinated all the invitations and arrangements. At present more than 250 people have made reservations and are looking forward to renewing their friendships of sixty years. Some have not seen each other since the reunion luncheon for the 50th Anniversary in 1987. Others see each other often as they still live in Greenbelt or near enough to attend Greenbelt High School (now Greenbelt Middle School) class reunions or Labor Day Festivals. Some grew up here, went all through school together, married, had children, and have watched their grandchildren play on all the same playgrounds and ballfields. In the midst of the Great Depression, one mother wrote, "We are in the process of creating homes ... Only in our fondest and most youthful dreams have we imagined such a chance. What will we make of it?"

Election of Council

The five candidates each receiving at least 40 percent of the total number of votes cast and highest number of votes cast will be elected. If fewer than five candidates receive at least 40 percent of votes cast, a run off election will be held on Tuesday, November 11. Twice as many as there are positions to be filled will be submitted to the voters. In more than 20 years this has not been necessary.

Greenbelt does not have provisions for election of the mayor or mayor pro tem by the electorate. At the organizational meeting on the Monday following the election (Monday, November 10) the newly elected council will elect the mayor and mayor pro tem. Traditionally, the new council has elected the highest vote getter to be mayor and second highest vote getter to be mayor protem for the ensuing two-year term.

POLICE BLOTTER

Based on Information Released by the Greenbelt Police Department

Two assaults occurred on September 12 on Springhill Lane. A youth was assaulted while waiting for the school bus in the morning and investigation is underway to identify the suspects involved. Late in the evening, a youth leaving the variety store on Springhill Lane was accosted by six youths who beat the victim with their fists after he refused to respond to their questions. The victim fled and was taken to the hospital by his father where he was treated for a laceration to his lip. Investigation is under way to identify the suspects.

A woman walking near the intersection of Springhill Drive and Edmonston Road around 8:15 p.m. on Sept. 17 was approached by a man who pushed a handgun into her side. The suspect asked where the victim's cousin was and when she responded that she did not know, the suspect threatened the victim and her family if he discovered that the victim was lying. The suspect, described as a black male in his twenties, 5'7" heavy build, wearing a white tshirt, blue jeans and sneakers, with his hair in a "cornrow" style, released the victim and fled on foot toward Edmonston Road.

A resident was the victim of an armed robbery on September 17 in the 9000 block of Breezewood Terrace. The victim was approached by a man as she walked to her building coming from the playground area. He brandished a knife and asked the victim for her money. The victim handed over her money and then fled into her apartment. The suspect fled on foot. He is described as a black male, 18 to 23 years of age, 6', thin build, wearing all black including a black skull cap and black parachute pants.

Two Greenbelt youths, stopped by an officer in the 6100 block of Springhill Dr. on September

13, were questioned when one of them matched the description of a youth who ran from an officer earlier that evening. When the youths were asked if they had any contraband, one removed a small semi-automatic pistol from his pocket and the second was found in possession of tobacco. Both suspects were arrested and the youth carrying a handgun without a license was charged as an adult. Both were released to family members pending trial.

While on bike patrol in the 9300 block of Edmonston Rd., an officer arrested at the playground four Greenbelt youths, 13 to 17 years old, who smelled of marijuana. Also, 19.9 grams of marijuana was located in the area of the youths. An unidentified youth ran from the scene and eluded the police. The youths (all from Greenbelt) were arrested and released to their families pending action by the Juvenile Justice System.

A burglary was reported on September 18 in the 100 block of Westway. It is unknown how entry was gained. A cellular telephone was taken. Suspects entered the Nail Art Inc. at Beltway Plaza by unknown means on September 14 and took an air brush compressor, spray guns and several valves.

Officers responded to a call September 14 from a residence in the 6000 block of Springhill Dr. for a report of a suspect who, after an argument with the victim, kicked the door of the victim's apartment open and threw a glass figurine striking the victim in the head. The suspect, a resident of Springhill Dr. was arrested, charged with burglary and held on \$5,000 bond pending trial.

A vandalism was reported in the 100 block of Centerway. Although nothing was taken, a suspect cracked the window of the store.

The suspect has been charged with malicious destruction and released to the custody of school administrators pending action by the Juvenile Justice System. A nonresident male was arrested on Kenilworth Ave. for driving while intoxicated and possession of suspected cocaine. He was held on \$2,500 bond pending trial.

Officers responded to a residence in the 7400 block of Morrison Dr. for a report of a domestic assault. Both parties involved, had assaulted one another. They, were arrested and charged with assault and are on release pending trial.

A group of youths loitering in front of the shopping center on Springhill Lane on September 12 were asked by a bicycle patrol officer to move on. All complied except one Greenbelt youth who became loud and used profanity and racial slurs. The youth once again refused the officer's request to move on. He was arrested, charged with disorderly conduct and released to a family member pending action by the Juvenile Justice System.

A nonresident woman has been arrested and charged with theft and forgery for the September 10 theft of a wallet. Two Baltimore residents, who dined at Jaspers Restaurant and then tried to pay with a stolen credit card, were arrested and charged. Investigation revealed that the suspects were in possession of a handgun and stolen property. An unattended purse was reported stolen at the Holiday Inn on September 14. A boy's 20" Pacific Hammer bi-

cycle was reported stolen from a hallway in the 7900 block of Mandan Rd. The bicycle was unsecured and unattended.








Refuge Celebrates Wildlife Week


