NPS Plans for Reclamation Of Old Sand and Gravel Area

Years of environmental degradation caused by a long-ago sand and gravel operation on the Jaeger tract may be mended at last. That is the good news contained in a recent report by National Capital Parks-East. The report includes an environmental assessment and description of a proposed project to reclaim the site.

The Jaeger tract, now a parcel within Greenbelt Park, lies east of Kenilworth Avenue and south of the Westchester Park development. It is accessed by a dirt road paralleling Kenilworth just outside the formal entrance gate to Westchester Park.

For some time the Jaeger tract was targeted for commercial use. But in exchange for other land near Suitland Parkway, this parcel was acquired by the National Park Service (NPS) for Greenbelt Park, which is under its jurisdic-

Reclamation of the site places the Jaeger tract within an NPS initiative, in conjunction with the Environmental Protection Agency, other federal agencies and state governments, to rehabilitate the Chesapeake Bay. Currently erosion from the Jaeger tract runs into Still Creek within the park, then into the Northeast Branch of the Anacostia River, the Potomac, and finally the Bay.

During the 1980s, when the

tersection was under construction, excavated material from the roadbuilding operation was hauled to and dumped on the Jaeger tract. At that time a temporary sediment pond was created near the base of the pile of fill in an effort to control erosion. Yet despite

these attempts, erosion gullies developed, which carried sediment to Still Creek.

Present Conditions

Currently the site consists of about 10 acres. Its soil is poor, with low organic content, variable pH, and areas with high levels of soluble salts. According to the report, these conditions have made it impossible to establish a "uniform and robust vegetative cover." Thus "large rills and gullies" have been created.

This circumstance places the tract within restrictions of the Clean Water Act, to which NPS adheres. Under this policy, NPS must "restore, maintain, or enhance the quality of all surface Greenbelt Rd.-Kenilworth Ave. in- and ground waters within the

parks." In addition, in the case of Greenbelt Park, it must follow guidelines relating to the Chesapeake Bay clean-up initiative.

The eventual goal for the Jaeger Tract is to encourage revegetation of the land and its return to forest. Thereafter it would remain "a natural zone," the report

Natural History

The park itself lies mostly within the Patapsco Geologic Formation, whose soils are relatively impermeable. Thus occasional wet meadows are interspersed among the forest cover. Within all park streams, the report says, "a rare and unusual plant fossil," Cycadoidea marylandica, can be

The range of this cycad is thought to be extremely limitedfrom about 56.7 kilometers from College Park to about 12.1 kilometers northeast of Baltimore, and within a width of about 13.3 kilometers. This range includes portions of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway and the city of Greenbelt. Fewer than 200 fossil pieces have been found; among them is a petrified trunk fragment in Greenbelt Park.

Unusual plant species in the park include poison sumac, sweetbay magnolia, checkerberry, wintergreen, and groundpine. Laurel thickets are found there, as well as a patch of ladyslipper See GREENBELT PARK, page 2

Plans for Golden Triangle Examined by City Council

On February 19, the county Planning Board is expected to review a proposed site plan for the 16-acre undeveloped portion of the Golden Triangle tract. The plan calls for a 165,000 square foot office building (which could later be expanded to 250,000 square feet), a 140 unit, three-story extended stay hotel and provision for the future addition of two restaurants. At its January 26 regular meeting, after extended discussion, the Greenbelt City Council recommended approval of the plans subject to several conditions. The Golden Triangle is the parcel of land between Greenbelt Road, Kenilworth Avenue and the Beltway. Several office buildings, TGI Fridays and Capitol Cadillac are already located elsewhere on the Golden Tri-

Dario Agnolutto, representing the developer, agreed with most of the recommended conditions. These included entering into a formal sign agreement with the city, granting the city the right to review and approve all signs to ensure minimal visibility from

the lake, and agreeing to encourage primary tenant NYLCare to implement ridership programs to encourage carpooling and other steps to reduce the traffic generated by the development.

One condition sought by the city was not granted. The developer actually has longstanding approval to construct a more dense development on the site (up to roughly 912,000 square feet of office space could legally be constructed). The city sought to have the developer waive the right to add additional development beyond that presented (other than the possible expansion of the NYLCare facility). Agnolutto assured council that the company has no plans to more densely develop the site. However, he said that he could not waive the development rights and still obtain financing for the project. Banks would see such a waiver as reducing the value of the property if they should have to foreclose and would not approve the loan. However, he pointed out that any plans for future changes or redevelopment of the property would have to go See TRIANGLE, page 5

Council Opposes Rezoning Parks as Open Space by Diane Oberg At its January 26 regular

meeting, the Greenbelt City Council unanimously agreed that a new county zoning category, Reserved Open Space, should not be applied to any city parkland

This new category permits less density than any other zoning category. According to Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Craze, the new category was designed to protect agricultural and open space lands by limiting the permitted uses and increasing the minimum lot size for residential development to 20 acres per lot. Council has been looking for ways to protect the woodlands on the city parkland between Ridge Road and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. While Craze noted that the new zoning category is "the most restrictive" category available, it (like cell zoning categories, including open space) would permit use of the land by a public body for public purposes and so would not prevent the city from, for example, developing the land for recreational uses.

City Solicitor Robert Manzi voiced concern that rezoning the land might affect the city's bond rating and requested time to investigate that issue. However, in the end, council decided to ask that no Greenbelt land be rezoned to the new category.

One of the most vocal councilmembers was Rodney Roberts. He argued that a "No Development" category is needed.

He suggested that the new category could backfire, permitting developers to obtain properties at a reduced cost, based upon the very limited development potential, then after a brief wait, get the property rezoned to a much higher density. He reminded council how 300 acres purchased by the county for open space was quickly rezoned to permit construction of the Landover football stadium. "I am not interested in rezoning any city property," he said. Instead, he is seeking other ways to protect the woodlands.

White agreed that the new category would not protect municipal property. However, that was not its purpose. He said the law was directed toward large parcels of government land such as the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center and Greenbelt Park. Homes, Inc. (GHI) board meeting on January 22 learned that members may find the annual ritual of preparing income tax returns a bit more taxing this year when they discover that the amount of the real estate taxes they may individually deduct for 1997 could be as much as 50% less than in the past. The good news is that the deduction for taxes for calendar year 1998 will be greater, and 1999 and 2000 will reflect actual deductions.

This change has come about because the appeal of the co-op's property taxes, filed in 1995, has finally been settled, resulting in a tax savings of nearly one million dollars for the six years 1995 through 2000.

Although GHI initially won its 1995 appeal to lower the assessed value of GHI's real property from \$94 million to \$70 million, the state appealed that decision. Meanwhile Prince George's County refunded excess taxes paid for 1995 and 1996, and billed for 1997, based on the \$70 million assessment. In July 1997, attorneys for both sides ne2000. This necessitated yet another adjustment in taxes paid for 1995 through 1997, which the IRS requires be done on a cash, instead of an accrual basis. This is what caused the lower deduction for 1997.

Study of Heating Options

No, another "rehab" similar to what was done in the 1980s is not coming, even though the board unanimously approved authorizing staff to request proposals from professional engineers to conduct a heating alternatives study. This includes domestic hot water, and when applicable, air-conditioning options for each alternative.

In another five to eight years, the failure rate for the electric resistance baseboard heaters installed in the early 1980s will begin to go up, according to staff architect Jay Freedman. The pro-

posed study will analyze options for the different types of homes and focus on several factors. These include costs for installation, estimated energy use and future maintenance, the payback period, and operating and installation advantages and disadvantages. The potential for disruption in the home and complexity of installation are also being

Director Betty Deitch noted that block homes have higher ceilings than brick homes. Upon her insistence that "it takes more heat because there is more air." engineers will be asked to consider the extra volume of block homes. They will also be asked to describe how much space each option will require.

Six engineering firms are reportedly interested in giving proposals, which will be due February 27.

orchids, and a peat bog.

Three alternatives have been prepared for study in the reclamation of the Jaeger tract. The first-a no-action choice-is considered not viable because of the continuing degradation and erosion of the site. "If no action is taken to remedy the water quality and quantity issues...," the report states, "and unless the site 'heals' itself to a greater degree, the NPS may not meet its regulatory and policy responsibilities."

Alternative B would modify and improve existing structures. For example, the existing pond would be re-designed as a stormwater detention structure to accommodate the once-a-year 24hour storm event. New drainage pipes would be installed and a diversion ditch regraded to control surface run-off. The outlet would be buried pipes discharging into the pond, where silt would be allowed to settle out.

Because the soils presently in place vary greatly, and some are "highly erodible," top dressing would be required, with additions of lime, fertilizer, and organic material. A vegetative cover consisting of native species would then be introduced. Following this operation, the site would be managed as a natural area, although "appropriate trails, overlooks, or interpretive waysides" could be included.

Preferred Alternative

Designers for National Capital Parks-East prefer Alternative C, which though at first more disruptive, would return the site more nearly to its original configuration. This alternative would increase the size of the operation at least two-fold and require introduction of about 150,000 yards of new fill soil. This material would have to be "trucked in, placed, compacted, graded, stabilized, and revegetated."

Correction

Contrary to what our headline suggested, when the new four-building USDA office complex opens in February, only about 100 employees will be included in the first phase of occupancy. The complex will eventually house 1,300 employees.





The report estimates that about 10,000 truck "visits" would be required in addition to the necessary graders and other vehicles. All vehicles would have to share ingress and egress with those belonging to residents of Westchester Park during the construction period.

Until the newly created ridge had had time to revegetate, this new and visible "higher ground" would appear barren, although vegetative ground covers would be introduced "quickly and properly." The design, however, would disallow the use of "invasive species."

An informational meeting concerning these proposals was held with the Westchester Park Civic Association on January 14.

At a meeting in the Greenbelt Community Center scheduled for Saturday, February 7 at 10 a.m. to noon, GIVES will discuss proposed new services.



through the same approval process as this plan, giving the city the opportunity to raise their concerns with the county authorities.

The vote to recommend approval was 3-2 with Councilmembers Rodney Roberts and Alan Turnbull opposed. While Roberts' opposition was expected, based upon the comments he made during the course of the lengthy council discussion, Turnbull's vote took his colleagues by surprise. He explained his vote as follows: "Seeing that the motion was going to pass, I don't feel the need to be with the majority on it." He agreed that the proposed development was within the county's zoning requirements and thought that the city needed to show that it could be trusted with the expanded planning and zoning authority it is seeking. However, he expressed displeasure with the codes and regulations in place and said that he "would see a very different land use strategy taken up by the city in the future."

Celia Craze, director of Planning and Community Development told council that the developer had modified the plans to meet the concerns of city staff and the Advisory Planning Board (APB). Additional landscaping was placed in the parking lot, picnic tables and a trail were added to the grounds, changes were made to improve pedestrian safety in the lot and the number of parking spaces was reduced. Agnolutto told council that NYLCare, which currently is located in Greenbelt East, wanted five parking places per 1,000 square feet of office space. The original site plan submitted to the city provided 4.7 spaces. The current plan has just 4.58 spaces per 1,000 square feet less than the 4.65 the tenant finds inadequate in its current location, even with the construction of 60 spaces below the building. He said that unless NYLCare expands to 250,000 square feet, a parking garage is not economically feasible. City Solicitor Robert Manzi suggested that the parking will be one of the most effective barriers to additional development. While county code only requires four spaces per 1,000 square feet, he said that most office users want 5/1,000 because they have found 4/ 1,000 to be inadequate, as in some of the other office parks in the city where some very creative parking can be found during peak periods.

Tree Removal

One of council's concerns was the fact that most existing trees will be removed from the property. There currently are large oak trees on the site. The located between trees Kenilworth Avenue and the fence bordering the property will remain. However, these are mostly pine trees, and are lower than the trees to be cleared. The net effect, argued Roberts will be the loss of the most significant trees and poor screening of the property.

Ironically, some of the changes requested by the APB increased the tree loss. The development was shifted north to provide the landscaping and

pedestrian features sought by the city. Roberts pressed Agnolutto repeatedly about possible changes to preserve trees on the site. However, John Bassert, the landscape architect for the project noted that the large root systems of mature oaks makes it impossible to clear around existing trees. Agnolutto said that they could not provide the interior landscaping wanted by the city, the parking needed by the tenant and make the changes needed to preserve additional trees on the site. Roberts, in particular, remained unconvinced.

Only the NYLCare building is being submitted for site plan approval. Specific plans for the extended stay hotel will be presented later, and will be sent to the city for review and comment. Agnolutto noted that one of the reasons an extended stay hotel is proposed is that they were told that the city did not believe that additional standard were needed. Councilmember Thomas White asked for some assurance that the developer would not later switch to an alternate use. Agnolutto replied that the company is in final discussions with a prospective tenant. However, if those negotiations are not successful other possibilities may be considered.

Sight Lines

In response to the APB, the company examined sight lines from Buddy Attic Park. The NYLCare building will sit higher than the tallest existing buildings. However, he said that from the lake shore the ex-

isting buildings will be more visible, while the new building will be more visible from the parking lot. Any expansion of the NYLCare building will be via an addition, not by adding additional floors, he assured council.

Stormwater

Another concern was whether stormwater runoff would increase into Indian Springs, a city park to the rear of the property. Bassert said that legally they are required to limit runoff to the amount prior to development. This will be done underground using an stormwater system that will route the water to the existing swale. It will also be treated to remove contaminants. Runoff from the front of the lot will flow to the existing ponds. Bassert said that the stormwater management plan for the development has been approved. Council directed that the city's engineer review the stormwater management plan.

History

White recounted the history of the site, from its creation by the construction of the Beltway, through proposals for a shopping center and an autopark, and the razing of "every tree on the parcel" by a previous developer, to the construction of the buildings now on the site and finally to this proposal. He called the current plan the culmination of a concept plan dating back to 1975. no development, "if we had our druthers," he told Agnolutto that a good job has been done here." Therefore, he was supporting the motion to approve the development.

Mayor Judith Davis expressed confidence that the developer is "a group with whom we can work." In the end, Davis, Councilmember Edward Putens and White voted for approval, while Turnbull and Roberts voted nay.

Councilmember Alan Turnbull suggested that the new category would deflate the value of the properties, which may make it possible for county, municipal or other jurisdictions to acquire the property. Roberts countered that the new category may make it easier for the federal or state government to "excess" properties, as community protests may be less than if higher density development were immediately permitted.

With the uncertainties revealed by the council's discussion, the councilmembers took no position on the proposed rezoning of the properties identified by the county and voted solely to decline to have any Greenbelt properties rezoned.

The councilmembers directed the public works staff to consider changing the seating in the shelters from the front to back seating

According to Pfc. Marty Parker, "Motor vehicle injury is one of the leading killers of children more than one year of age."

Parker asks parents to make sure that children age 12 and under always ride buckled up or in properly installed child safety seats in the back seats." Rearfacing child seats should never be placed in the front of a motor vehicle equipped with a passenger air bag.

"Not all injuries happen inside vehicles. Nearly one-third of all children between the ages of five and nine years who are killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes are pedestrians. Almost one-fourth

The Greenbelt Police Depart- of the traffic fatalities were pesaid Pfc. Parker.

According to the Greenbelt Police Department, bicycle crashes are one of the most frequent causes of injury-related deaths among the children. Seventy to 80 percent of the crashes involved head injuries.

In addition, police ask parents to teach children the rules for safe walking and biking. Adults must teach children to look both ways, walk not run, use crosswalks when crossing the street, and take extra care when exiting school buses.

higher than eight inches. The board decided for the time being to let the resales inspection process handle yard encroachment beyond the 75-foot boundary limit.

In phase one, members will have 30 days to correct violations, but in phase two, no more than five working days. Considerable time was spent debating whether 30 days was too long and five days too short in the case of tall grass. Two temporary workers will be hired at the end of May to cut lawns and perform other grounds chores for a fee-for-service charge. The charge will be \$20 per man per hour, with a minimum charge of \$20.

An answering machine will be set up to accept calls and questions year-round. Maintenance staff will undergo training so that they may report flagrant violations to the coordinator. Members will likewise be encouraged to report problem areas.

The board noted that this program gets better each year. Directors Susan Ready and Bill

Phelan both suggested that GHI needs to inspect and maintain common areas.

Forest Conservation Management

President and Woodlands Committee Chair Keith Jahoda passed the gavel to Vice President Julia Eichhorst so he could present a new Forest Stewardship Plan and Forest Conservation Management Agreement (FCMA), which was subsequently adopted 9-0.

Participation in an approved FCMA with an approved Stewardship Plan obligates GHI to follow the plan for five years and to submit to regular inspections by the Maryland regional forester. This entitles GHI to a tax benefit by assessing the acreage covered by the plan at an agricultural rate. The tax savings are estimated to be about \$60,000 annually.

The Stewardship Plan reflects values widely held by the community and does not require thinning or clear-cuts. It relies on volunteers to accomplish management activities such as plant, animal and bird surveys, conducting clean-ups, and inspecting for trail erosion. Volunteers will come from the community and also be

sought from the Department of Botany at the University of Maryland and the Roosevelt High School Ecology Club.




