### EPA-USDA Enter Agreement For Clean-up of BARC Wastes

On March 7 Congressman Steny Hoyer joined Tim Fields, director of the Superfund program of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Dr. Phyllis Johnson, director of the 6600-acre Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC), to announce the signing of a cooperative agreement, the Federal Facility Agreement (FFA), between the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the EPA. This inter-agency agreement sets guidelines under which environmental cleanup at BARC will be managed.

The announcement was made at a press conference held behind the new USDA office complex on Sunnyside Ave. near the CSX railroad tracks.

The agreement identifies 94 areas at BARC requiring investigation and that may need cleanup, including several landfills and disposal areas at the facility. EPA will neither carry out nor pay for the BARC cleanup. Instead USDA will take entire responsibility for the operation, subject to EPA oversight.

"I am a firm believer in the notion that the polluter should pay for cleanups," said Hoyer. "Across the state and nation," he added, "the Superfund program requires responsible parties to pay for these cleanups, and the result is that the taxpayers have saved almost \$80 million in Maryland alone."

He noted that the agreement is a "roadmap for BARC and EPA. It clearly spells out complete environmental standards, deadlines that must be met, and financial commitments that will protect the health and environment of the citizens of Prince George's County."

In their respective speeches at the press conference, both Hoyer and Johnson used a lower figure than that contained in the agreement. Apparently the original list of areas of potential environmental concern had numbered 166; but following a study of historical records and aerial photos, this list had been pared down to 59 that still require study.

This number is confirmed in a February 1998 fact sheet published by the USDA Agricultural Research Service (ARS), which also states that this "is not a determination that these 59 sites will require cleanup; only that more sampling is needed to determine if contamination is present."

Field work has begun at five sites and ARS expects to have results by July 1998. Planning for screening at other sites is also underway to comply with EPA regulations.

Past History

ARS first conducted an environmental assessment of BARC in 1991. After reviewing historical records, employee interviews and site visits, 44 potential areas of concern were identified. Of these sites, 16 needed further study. In February 1993, EPA identified an additional 48 potential areas of concern after reviewing historical aerial photographs. Then, on May 31, 1994, BARC was listed on EPA's National Priorities List (Superfund).

According to the ARS fact sheet, "the listing was based on contamination identified by ARS on a four-acre site where biodegradable material such as tree limbs and grass clippings, construction rubble such as concrete, glassware and general refuse were disposed from 1940 to 1975."

Metro Site Cleanup

This material, including transformer casings and lab wastes, was removed in 1994 as part of a transfer of land from BARC to the Washington Metropolitan Transit Authority for use as the Metrorail service yards at the end of the Green Line.

About 67,000 cubic yards of debris and surrounding soil were removed from the four-acre site. Lead levels were high enough to be disposed of as hazardous waste, the ARS fact sheet states.

### Students with Disabilities Learn about Tech Careers

Visually impaired, deaf, learning disabled, and multi-handicapped Eleanor Roosevelt High School students are preparing for professions in science, mathematics, engineering, and technology-related fields through summer internships, field trips, and training.

These high school students are participants in HIGH SCHOOL/HIGH TECH. This is a community-based partnership between students, families, schools, and businesses, giving high school students with disabilities early career exposure.

"I think the program is phenomenal," said Martha Pugh, EleanorRoosevelt teacher of the hearing impaired. "It builds self-confidence and self-esteem." Pugh has served as a summer job coach and now is the school's liai-

son for the program.

During internships last summer, students edited rocket battery blue-prints at NASA/Goddard Space Flight Center, revised internet documents at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and conducted wetland research at the Patuxent Research Institute. Other companies that offer the five-to-sixweek paid internships include the Beltsville Agriculture Research Center, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, and the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The program also provides 37 activities including computer workshops throughout the school year, beginning in October and ending in May, to enhance awareness of careers in high technology areas, said Louise Meyer, HIGH SCHOOL/HIGH TECH program coordinator.

HIGH SCHOOL/HIGH TECH

is in its sixth year of providing free services to eligible students and their families in 12 Prince George's and Montgomery County schools. The program is supported by grants from NASA, the Bechtel Corporation, the Federal Transit Administration, the National Weather Service, the National Marine Fisheries Service, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, CTA, Inc., the Prince George's Private Industry Council, the Prince George's County United Way, Inc., and the United Cerebral Palsy of Prince George's and Montgomery Counties, Inc. ### Auditor Praises GHI Financial Status; Dish Issue Unresolved

At the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. Board of Directors meeting on Thursday, April 9, issues discussed included the 1997 audit, repair contracts, a member request for a satellite dish exception, and a new shed policy.

1997 Audit

Accountant Joey Jones presented the 1997 audit. He thanked the board and the staff for their excellent work. There is an "absence of crisis conditions," he said, which drew laughter. Jones continued that, while GHI is in good financial condition at present, big repair bills and capital spending loom in the future. These will have to be monitored carefully, he warned, but for the next two years, at least, there should be no trouble. Jones expressed the opinion that the one per cent reserves held against uncollectables was probably adequate for the present, but should also be carefully monitored.

General Manager Gretchen Overdurff reported that the staff is checking on the 66 members who have outstanding loans, 17 of which are over \$10,000.

GHI rehab loans are being paid off at a good rate. The HUD loan will be paid off in the year 2000. The CRESTAR loan

will be paid off in 2001, and the NCB loan will be paid off in

The reduced property tax rate will save members about one million dollars over the years 1995 - 2000.

For 1997, predicted revenues were within 4% and predicted expenditures were within 2%, which Jones described as "having a good handle on income and expenses."

GHI had a positive cash flow of \$400,000 for 1997. This money may be used to fund extra projects or to pay down GHI liabilities. Jones again praised GHI's financial management.

There are an estimated \$26 - 27 million in future repair and replacement costs, which is much more than is contained in current GHI reserves. Jones recommended that the reserve study be an ongoing project and kept up to date.

Board member Susan Ready was pleased that there were no surprises in the audit. She praised the work of Jones, Overdurff, and GHI finance director Paul Sinner.

No Soap on Dish

GHI member Ken Ebisawa finds himself in a "Catch-22." He cannot both comply with Prince George's County and City of Greenbelt permit requirements and have a Primestar satellite dish installed in his yard.

Briefly, Ebisawa wants a dish, asks GHI permission, which he gets, provided, among other things that the contractor, Primestar, obtain the required building permits (county and city) and electrical permits (county and city). Primestar refuses to obtain such permits, which the county requires, and the city follows county policy. Primestar apparently contends that the requirement for such permits is not enforceable, and in any case the requirement is outside FCC rules. (The News Review called Primestar to confirm their policy but was unable to reach anyone who could answer our questions.)

Primestar comes to install Ebisawa's dish and asks for access to Ebisawa's basement to make the necessary ground connection. Ebisawa asks GHI to unlock the basement. GHI asks if Ebisawa and/or the contractor have the necessary four (4) permits. Ebisawa replies no. GHI refuses to unlock the basement. Primestar leaves, leaving Ebisawa dishless.

#### **CPR Classes To Be** Held at Roosevelt

**Doctors Community Hospital** will join forces with the Prince George's County Fire Department and the county public schools to host the Eleventh Annual CPR Awareness Day on Saturday, April 18, at Eleanor Roosevelt High School on Hanover Parkway. The purpose of this annual event is to save lives through educating community members on the skill of CPR. Last year at this event, over 1,200 community members were trained. Cardiopulmonary resuscitation, when begun by a trained bystander within the first four minutes of cardiac arrest, can increase a victim's chance of survival four times greater than by someone calling 911 alone.

Training sessions begin every half hour from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and are offered free to the public. Sessions will last approximately three hours and will include information on heart disease, risk factors, signs and signals of a heart attack, mouth-tomouth breathing, one person adult CPR, and care for a conscious or unconscious choking victim. Classes will follow the guidelines of the American Heart Association.

CPR Awareness Day is open to both adults and children over 12, and all are encouraged to attend. Pre-registration is not required but large groups and organizations are asked to phone so that information can be provided to make this an enjoyable day and to allow their group to stay together. #### Life and Its Value Explorations Talk

On Friday, April 24, Explorations Unlimited will present "The Nature of Life, Its Value and Its Bearing on Contemporary Issues." The presenter is Dr. Marcos Columbini, Professor of Biology, University of Maryland. Dr. Columbini's research is in the area of membrane biophysics with a focus on proteins that transport molecules and ions across biological membranes. He has nearly 100 publications in this area of scientific research. He was a co-discoverer of a membrane channel-forming protein called VDAC. This protein, found in all animals, plants and fungi, is believed to regulate energy production by an organelle within cells called the mitochondrion. Dr. Colombini's research is aimed at understanding how this and similiar proteins function as molecular machines, for example, how VDAC responds to and is controlled by voltage and cellular constituents.

In his upcoming lecture, Dr. Columbini will focus on what constitutes life, why life is valuable, and how to think rationally about controversial life-and-death issues. He will examine these issues from a scientific perspective and challenge the audience to reexamine the reasons for their opinions.



#### Nursery School Children Prepare Passover Seder

"Why is there a table cloth on the table?" "Why are the snack tables pushed together?" "Why do we have those pretty flowers on the table?" "Do we really have to eat that nasty stuff, or can we just smell it?" "Why can't we eat now?"

At the Passover seder, it is important to make changes from the normal mealtime routines so the children will notice and ask, "Why is this night different?"

Initial preparations for the Passover celebration at Mishkan Torah Nursery School began in mid-February, on the Tu B'Shevat, Jewish Arbor Day or the Birthday for Trees. It was a busy day for planting-orange seeds, yet to sprout, strawberry plants and sugar snap peas for our outdoor garden; and, most important, parsley seeds, one cup per person. The children watered, watched and waited.

Soon signs of spring were all around-new flowers, new green shoots, warmer days-reminders that Passover would be here soon. Passover celebrates the Exodus, the hurried departure of the Hebrew slaves from wicked Pharaoh in Egypt, and the beginning of their history as a free and independent people. The story is retold and reenacted through many symbolic rituals at the Passover seder feast.

The morning of the "model seder" at school, the children worked almost as hard as slaves cutting apples (and tasting), chopping (and tasting) and mixing (and tasting) to make charoset, a sweet apple-nut-cinnamon mixture reminiscent of the clay bricks made by the Hebrew slaves. Un-

like slaves, when the work was done, the excited children were free to relax around the fancy decorated table. On each chair was a new, hand-made pillow to lean on, symbolizing freedom. In unison, each child plucked a fresh sprig of parsley, a symbol of new life in springtime, from his own cup and dipped it in salt water, a reminder of the slaves' tears. There were no tears on the faces of these proud parsley growers, unless from smelling the strong, nasty horseradish (bitter like slavery)-which no one

Tests are still being conducted, it further indicates, to determine "the extent, if any, and source of ground water and surface water contamination."

Looking east across the tracks behind them, Hoyer, Johnson, and Fields all spoke with pride about these cleanup actions at the Metro service yard site.

Hoyer also observed that more than 140 truckloads of miscellaneous waste materials had been removed as well from other BARC sites. He expressed satisfaction that any areas found to be environmentally damaged would be "reclaimed and restored."

His remarks, however, were interrupted by a more than 100car freight train rumbling behind him. When the decibel level dropped enough that he could continue, he quipped, with a twinkle in his eye, "I'm convinced this train is either early or late. My opponents will spare no expense to undercut my press conference."

Superfund Program

Fields spoke about work that has gone on nationally with the Superfund program. In the first 12 years of its existence, for example, 155 sites were cleaned up; in the last five years, 350. Maryland has 18 sites on EPA's National Priorities List. On three, the work is completed and about 83 per cent of the remaining sites are undergoing environmental

Johnson, who came to BARC a year and a half ago as its director, noted that since her arrival surface debris had been cleared from 24 sites, with one biodegradable site fully cleaned up. When these sites were used for collection of pesticides, solvents, municipal waste, etc.," Dr. Johnson said, the work followed procedures that were then legal.

"As environmental rules and regulations were amended," she went on, "we discontinued the practices. This is why the sites have been identified as potential areas of concern."

#### BARC Leadership

Johnson particularly praised several BARC researchers in improving the environment. She singled out Dr. Rufus Chaney of the Environmental Chemistry Laboratory as a world-renowned expert in the removal of lead and heavy metals from soil.

Two nutrient management specialists have also instituted a plan limiting the amount of fertilizer applied, she noted, thus reducing the possibility of nutrient run-off into the Anacostia watershed. "We are the largest Federal facility on this watershed," she added, "and we want to be good stewards of the land."

Johnson also said that several staff members serve on Anacostia Watershed committees and that BARC has developed a new bioengineering technique, which may become a national model, that is now being employed to stabilize erosion in a stream feeding into Little Paint Branch, a feeder stream to the Anacostia.

BARC is equally concerned about clean air issues, she said, primarily by installing a natural gas line in the eastern section of the facility to eliminate the use of fuel oil for heating.

Community Relations

According to the ARS fact sheet, a BARC Community Relations Plan has been drafted and approved by EPA which outlines steps for keeping the communities around BARC informed about environmental cleanup actions and ways in which the public may partici-

Ebisawa wants a dish, asks permission from GHI (for the second time) ... Catch-22.

At the April 9 meeting Ebisawa again returned to the GHI Board seeking to resolve the problem and get his dish.

Ebisawa maintains that neither the city nor the county have ever issued such permits for antennas and therefore that it is unreasonable that they should be required of him. He further maintains that it is not the usual practice in the antenna installation business to obtain permits. (He spoke with six contractors.)

Ebisawa maintains that he is being treated in an unfair and discriminatory way, since many others in GHI have antennas and dishes and have not been required to obtain the four permits. The rules should apply equally to all, Ebisawa maintains.

Ebisawa reports that Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Craze has never signed any such permits for the city. (Craze was unavailable for comment.)

The FCC rules forbid interference with the installation of antennas including dishes, except where there is a clear need for safety precautions. The permit requirements might qualify under this provision.

Other issues that may affect FCC antenna rules are GHI's possible status as an historic district, and GHI's status as a co-op.

GHI's main concerns are that, while they would like to grant Ebisawa's request for a dish, they also wish to avoid any possible liability by not contravening existing county law, regardless of whether that law may be in conflict with federal law. Some concern was expressed concerning possible county retaliation if GHI goes against the county.

Overdurff suggested that GHI could ask the FCC for a declaratory ruling on the permits. "There's no cost, and it's not a big deal," she said. The board agreed to request the declaratory ruling. Ebisawa said that, based on past examples, it would probably take about six months to get a ruling.

The issue was then tabled, leaving it as it was: GHI still requires permits to install antennas, including dishes until the FCC rules otherwise.

And Ken Ebisawa still has no satellite dish. He's thinking of buying a new car instead.

Roofs, Gutters, and Sheds

The board approved two contracts for 1998 frame home roof replacement, one with High Standard for 62 units for \$116,000 and one with Shiner Roofing for 63 units for \$110,000.

The Board had a first reading of a contract with Hall's Tree

Other issues that may affect Service, Inc. for gutter cleaning of antenna rules are GHI's not to exceed \$6,800.

New Shed Policy

The board approved a new shed policy, the chief provision of which is that metal sheds will no longer be permitted. Sheds of wood and vinyl (resin) are permitted.

Air Conditioners

In the past, GHI has had no policy on air conditioners. The board approved a new policy concerning them, which will be included in the 1998 GHI hand-book.

There was some discussion of landscaping for GHI signs but the bidders have not yet responded.

The board approved a \$100 donation to the David Craig Memorial Scholarship Fund, to be used to recognize an Eleanor Roosevelt High School senior by providing tuition assistance for continuing higher education.

Member Mat Amberg made an impassioned plea for GHI to minimize its rules and regulations, to quit wasting time on trivial matters, and to leave the members in peace.





### Baseball Drama "Fences" To Open Friday Night

"Anything short of the American corporate dream leaves many of us feeling unfulfilled," says Norman Grant, director of "Fences." The play, among other things, is about a very good baseball player, Troy, who never is accepted as a Major Leaguer or into the mainstream of American life. Troy is an ex-convict and ex-Negro League star who didn't quite have the "right stuff" to follow in Jackie Robinson's footsteps into the Major Leagues. (Willie Mays, who actually did play in the Negro Leagues, could have been drafted by the Boston Red Sox, but he too, was not perceived as someone who could put up with the racism he would face. Jackie Robinson, the graceful, classic athlete from UCLA and a veteran of World War II promised to refrain from responding to racist attitudes on the part of fans or players for a period of three years before Branch Rickey of the Brooklyn Dodgers signed him to a contract).

Grant sees this August Wilson play as making a more important point than whether or not an athlete had the right makeup to take on the competitive pressure of Major League baseball. It is that these people's lives demonstrate that even when the odds seem to be against you, you can still make a difference, at least in terms of one's family or community. Grant says he's "whimsical"in observing the play during a recent rehearsal. His father too was bitter and was tough on him. But like Troy, he ultimately was a responsible, good father. "And these people's lives, dealing with and striving to overcome obstacles, these people's lives do count." "Life can be brutal but their impact on others can be profound," adds the director. The director and the Greenbelt Arts Center hope that audiences will also feel the impact beginning this Friday evening, April 17 The play runs weekends through May 9. 
