New USDA Beltsville Complex Color-coded, Employee Friendly

New employees arriving at the Beltsville Office Facility of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on Sunnyside Ave. will have help in getting acquainted with the building complex and its surrounding environment with a specially prepared brochure, "Welcome & Orientation." This color-coded aid introduces the 450 employees currently on-site, plus the other 150 expected by this fall, to the shortest routes between the various amenities and other features within and outside the five-building complex.

Among these are a child care center, a medical services unit, a nursing mothers' room, a full-service credit union, a gift and card shop, a full-service cafeteria and a landscaped courtyard. Eventually a physical fitness center and a telecommuting center are also expected to open.

Transportation Guidelines

How to reach the facility is also described in the brochure, which refers to on-site parking and frequent shuttle service from the Greenbelt Metro station. Shuttles will run every 15 minutes during rush hours; every 20 minutes otherwise.

But if one is driving, only one exit from the Capital Beltway is shown on the map provided in the brochure—exit 23, or Kenilworth Ave. Although U.S. 1 appears on the map, its exit from the Beltway is neither marked nor numbered. Thus, through this omis-

sion, employees are implicitly directed to use the Edmonston Rd.-Sunnyside Ave. route that Greenbelt residents have warned will become a major bottleneck.

Nevertheless, the brochure clearly stresses the use of public transportation. Not only is a Metro system map included but a full description of the

Shuttles will run every 15 minutes during rush hours.

Green Line rush hour short-cut that bypasses the Fort Totten station is presented as well.

And for those times when sudden emergencies occur that would leave workers stranded when they had arrived by public transportation, a "Guaranteed Ride Home" provision, offered by the Commuter Connections program of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments, is fully explained. Up to four such rides a year are offered to cover personal emergencies or unscheduled overtime assignments, with the cost of such rides reimbursed.

Eight pages in the book, however, which list area businesses such as auto repair, gas stations, banks, beauty salons, dry cleaners, pharmacies and restaurants, imply that workers have arrived by automobile. With one exception, all businesses listed direct the workers to Beltsville, mostly along U.S. 1. The one Greenbelt listing, under the category Shopping Center, is the Beltway Plaza.

BARC Hosts Public Meeting on Cleanup

A public meeting will be held on June 25 at the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC) concerning cleanup actions over the last few years related to BARC's "Superfund" status. The meeting will take place at 7 p.m. in the auditorium of Building 003, 10300 Baltimore Ave., Beltsville.

Since the listing of BARC as a "Superfund" site in 1994 on the National Priorities List, various actions have been taken to deal with past environmental contamination. Among these has been an exhaustive study to identify specifically all locations that may have been subjected to environmental contamination. From this study, a list of sites needing additional investigation was established. In addition, cleanup of surface debris has already taken place at several sites on BARC.

BARC has been working with the Environmental Protection Agency to ensure respon-

sible environmental cleanup, and both agencies have recently signed a Federal Facility Agreement to provide structured guidelines for continuing work. There is no imminent threat to the environment or to people working at or living near the research center from suspected or known environmental contamination at BARC, based on current information.

Maps of the Buildings

Getting around inside the five-building campus has been made easier with color coding. The four office buildings, aligned to form the two parallel sides of an H, with the one-story entrance forming the cross bar, have connecting corridors. Thus it is possible to walk through the entire complex without venturing out of doors. Within the buildings, the particular colored background of signs tells the walkers which building they are in. Building 1 is gold, 2 is blue, 3 is green and 4 is burgundy.

The buildings enclose a central landscaped courtyard, visible from the entrance lobby, the cafeteria seating space, and office windows. Benches and paved walkways enhance the area.

Since smoking is not allowed within any of the buildings, nor within 15 feet of any entrance, six smoking areas equipped with ash receptacles are made available within the courtyard.

Employees on Site

Of the current group of 450 employees, some have been reassigned from the Inspector General's office in Riverdale, from the Agricultural Research Service in Capital Office Park and Building 5 in the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC). Another contingent will be coming by this fall from leased space in Capital Office Park in Greenbelt. Eventually the Natural Resource Conservation Service, currently located in the main USDA building in downtown Washington, will also be reassigned to the Beltsville facility.

All told, some 1200 or 1300 employees, including cafeteria workers, childcare and medical staff, and physical fitness supervisors, are expected to work there. USDA and BARC employees will be eligible to enroll their children in the childcare facility.

Greenbelt Astronomy Club Schedules Event

The Greenbelt Astronomy Club will hold another of its regular seasonal public star parties on Saturday, June 13, at the Northway ballfields. Telescopes of the club members will be available for viewing the moon, open star clusters, double stars, and other sky objects. Admission is free and everyone is welcome to attend. Observing will begin at 9 p.m. and continue until 10:30 p.m. This event will only be held if the sky is clear.

The next meeting of the Greenbelt Astronomy Club will be on Thursday, June 25, at the H.B. Owens Science Center and begins at 7:30 p.m. Membership in the club is open to anyone who is interested in astronomy.

Train Hits Building At Local Metro Yard

The failure of a Metro train to stop while being parked in the Greenbelt Maintenance Yard just north of the Greenbelt Metro Station resulted in the train crashing into the second floor of a yard building after knocking over the yellow, metal bumping post at the end of the track. The 59-year-old operator, whose name was not immediately released, was not seriously injured, but was taken to Laurel Regional Hospital for treatment. Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) officials were quick to point out that the accident occurred while the train was being operated manually and without the safety controls that are used when trains are operating carrying passengers.

According to WMATA, the accident occurred at 9:24 a.m. on Monday, June 8, after the train had completed morning rush-hour service and while it was being stored in the terminal yard. After knocking over the bumper at the end of the tracks, the front of the car was lifted upward, knocking out windows in vacant offices on the second floor of the brick operations building as well as damaging train windows and couplings between cars.

Legion and Legislators Feted on Greenbelt Day

At the 1998 Greenbelt Day celebration at the American Legion on Sunday, June 7, the Mayor Judith Davis, on behalf of the city council, recognized the Greenbelt American Legion "family of members" for their activities including hosting the annual Greenbelt Day Family Picnic, sponsoring the 60th Anniversary Greenbelt Pioneer Luncheon Celebration, providing funds to support city academic achievement programs, annually recognizing and presenting the city police and fire fighter of the year awards and holding the annual Memorial Day and Veterans Day ceremonies at Roosevelt Center.

Replicas of the Mother and Child statue were presented to Senator Leo Green, Delegates Joan Pitkin, Mary Conroy and James Hubbard and to County Councilmember Audrey Scott for their work in representing Greenbelt in the state and county governments. Specific actions of the senator and delegates included obtaining grant funds toward the cost of replacing the windows in the Community Center and of renovating the fire house, passing legislation providing limited planning and zoning authority to municipalities, and supporting other legislation of interest to the city.

WMATA is investigating the incident. It will focus on whether the proper procedures were followed and what was the exact cause of the incident. According to Kevin Lyons, Metro safety officer, trains are only operated in manual mode within rail yards, and at speeds under 15 miles per hour. "We want to reassure our passengers that the incident occurred in an environment — a rail yard — which is totally separate from where we operate passenger service on the mainline."

Following Metro policy, the operator, a 25-year employee, was tested for drugs and alcohol use after the crash. The results have not yet been released.

Besides the Metro investigation, the accident is being investigated by the National Transportation Safety Board which sent two investigators to the accident scene. Also, a Tri-State Oversight Commission, established following a 1996 collision that killed a train operator in Shady Grove, will look into the accident. This commission was necessary, because no single state has oversight powers over WMATA, which operates in two states and the District of Columbia.

Scott was recognized for her role in increasing the "tax differential," which reduces residents' county property taxes to offset the cost of services provided by the city, in getting county approval for expanded planning and zoning authority for Greenbelt, allocating grant funds to city programs and supporting the city's efforts to improve the planning and development process for Greenbelt West.

Two-Part Solution

I'd like to suggest the following two-part solution to meet the need for more parking space at Green Ridge House.

1. Construct an additional 17 parking spaces on the Green Ridge House side of Ridge Road and 2. Supply a five passenger hybrid-electric car for residents' use when such cars become available in late 1998 or early 1999.

Presently there are eight parallel parking spaces on Ridge Road in front of the 20 Court and nine in front of our building. Each space could be expanded into the lot six feet, and the sidewalk moved back into the lot, and two diagonal spaces could be made from each parallel space. A fifteen mile per hour speed limit should be established for Ridge Road between Southway and Gardenway.

Advantages: a.) Entering and leaving driver's side of car much safer than if car were parked parallel in street; b.) Much easier to park car diagonally than parallel; c.) Diagonal parking working well on Centerway; e.) Entrance to building would still be from the front — safer, and would avoid creating additional principal entrance in rear; f.) Would avoid the environmental, economic and aesthetic desecration created in accessing and creating a rear parking lot; g.) Would be much better for visitors and tradesmen than a rear parking lot.

Toyota is now selling a five passenger hybrid-electric car in Japan for about \$17,000 and expects to be selling it in the USA by the end of this year. If the city were to supply one from the Green Ridge House budget for the use of our residents, a committee of the Residents' Association could maintain and operate it by charging and collecting a per/mile fee for its use. This car averages 66 miles per gallon in city driving.

Advantages: a.) Residents with driving permits need not own their own cars; saving much, much money; b.) Greenbelt

CARES would be able to supply volunteer drivers for residents who cannot drive cars and do not have cars of their own; c.) Would be valuing transportation more than parking; d.) With experience from operations and newer developments in electric cars we could increase the number of Green Ridge House owned vehicles if the need increased or residents found them better than having their own cars.

I firmly believe most of the residents who are advocating the rear parking lot would much rather park in front of the building, than to have to go around to the rear to park their car. They would feel more secure too.

Tax Deadline June 15 for Estimated Taxes

Another tax deadline is fast approaching. June 15 is the deadline for filing the second installment of estimated taxes. Estimated tax payments are the government's pay-as-you-go plan that requires taxpayers to pay tax as they earn or receive income during the year. How do people know if they owe estimated taxes?

The Maryland Association of CPAs explains that, generally, people will owe such tax if they have income that is not subject to withholding. This includes self-employment earnings, investment income includ-

ing interest, dividends and capital gains, alimony payments, pension and IRA distributions, and unemployment benefits. However, people are exempt from making estimated tax payments if they owed no taxes for the previous year.

In addition, for 1998, there is no underpayment penalty if people owe less than \$1,000 after subtracting the withholding tax paid. To arrange interviews with local CPAs on these topics or any financial, business or accounting issue, contact Elise Braase or Deana Mary at MACPA at 1-800-782-2036.

Samuel Maryn

Greenbelt Pioneer Samuel Maryn, 94, died of congestive heart failure on June 5, 1998, at his son's home in Boynton Beach, Florida.

Born in the Ukraine in what was then czarist Russia, he came to this country as a child in 1913 and settled in Chicago.

Mr. Maryn and his family were among the first residents in Greenbelt, moving in on November 16, 1937. He was assistant editor of the Cooperator (original name of the News Review) in the late 1930s. He was also active in the Greenbelt Consumer Co-op.

He received a law degree from what is now Catholic University. Mr. Maryn had a 15-year career as an auditor with the General Accounting Office in Washington. He retired in 1960 after 15 years in the fiscal systems accounting department at the Veteran's Administration.

In retirement he lived in Tucson, Chicago and West Palm Beach, FL.

His wife, Bertha Maryn, died in 1984.

Survivors include two children, Marilyn (Masha) Spiegel of Kensington and Dr. David Maryn of Boynton Beach, six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Sunday, June 7, at Danzansky-Goldberg Memorial Chapels, Inc. Interment was in King David Memorial Gardens.

Lion, Witch and Wardrobe A Lively Youth Production

Fidgety children excitedly lined the stage of the Greenbelt Arts Center in anticipation of viewing the Youth Players' performance of "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe" on June 7. The youngsters sat on the floor to accommodate a capacity house, and the lively audience was not disappointed.

In this C.S. Lewis classic, Edmund (Maxwell Albinson), Susan (Marika Ets), Lucy (Emily Finkelstein), and Peter (David Thibodeaux) ended up in the fictitious land of Narnia by entering, of all things, a wardrobe. These school-age actors were impressive in their ability to learn and deliver their lines for the two-hour show.

Fifth grader Jesse Crowley, who sang beautifully in "Bye Bye Birdie," played a helpful Mr. Beaver. He, along with his industrious wife, Mrs. Beaver, portrayed with skill by 11th grader Jessica Baker, guided this family of siblings to safety. An unexpected addendum to the story was the appearance of Mr. and Mrs. Beaver's offspring dressed in a miniature beaver outfit. The six-month-old Mikayla Mervine was darling and extremely cooperative in this role.

Edmund departed from this group to see the White Witch (Heather Norden), who promised him tasty morsels during a prior visit. The Witch, the witch's dwarf (Shaine Siegel), and the witch's chief guard (Karen Murillo), who held him captive, were a dynamic team. Eleventh grader Norden was a delightful, demanding, and deceitful witch, and she was gorgeous. She wore a white gown and silver crown, pony tail band, and shoes. Even her nail polish and eye shadow were silver.

The witch's dwarf, the tiny second-grader Siegel, was heavy-handed with the prisoner and

quick of tongue, too. Murillo, who is in the 10th grade, was recruited as a substitute just two days before the performance. She was dressed in camouflage and delivered her lines with "attitude" and with authority.

Despite the fierceness of these three, the fearless lion, Aslan (Peter Eichman) saved the day for Peter and the timid Tumnus, the Faun (Mike Matthews), who befriended Lucy. Tenth grader Eichman, who had a stately stage presence, played the lion with enough confidence to be a Starfleet Captain and, my, what a mighty roar. This was truly an interactive production. During moments of quietness, the questions of curious children in the audience pierced the air. The audience booed and hissed when the witch and her followers came on stage, and giggles erupted when the dying witch's guard crawled between rows, over the audience's feet, and off stage. The audience also laughed when Mrs. Beaver and a forest animal

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

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
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Wedding Reenactment At Surratt House
