Annexation Stirs Hornets Nest

To the west of Greenbelt, a proposal is pending to build a \$1 billion mixed-use complex on the Greenbelt Metro Station property and the adjacent A. H. Smith properties. This complex is to include a 1.2 million square-foot upscale regional shopping mall, a 395,000 square-foot hotel and conference center, 270 housing units and one million square feet of office space. It would have significant impact upon area roads and adjacent wetlands. Yet, to date, the proposal has stirred little citizen interest or action.

To the north of Greenbelt, the new Department of Agriculture office complex built on Beltsville Agricultural Research Center open space is resulting in increased traffic flow on area roads. Road improvements are planned that will affect sensitive wetlands. Again, there has been little citizen action relating to this development, although the Greenbelt City Council has taken an active role.

To the east, a major expansion of the Goddard Space Flight Center is taking place. New construction has eliminated much open space and is causing increased traffic loads upon area roads. There has been almost no citizen or council interest in this development.

But on the south side of the

city, a small, 31-home subdivision known as Parkside has stirred up a hornet's nest of citizen activists. These activists fought the development of the property by its owners beginning in 1994 and are now fighting the efforts of the subdivision's new residents to become a part of the city. Having lost the battle to defeat annexation before the city council by a three to two vote, Parkside opponents are now busy circulating petitions to put the issue before voters at a citywide referendum.

Background

The land now called Parkside, which consists of only 7.7 acres, is located on the north side of Good Luck Road and is bordered by Greenbelt Park on three sides. It originally was designated for purchase by the federal government for the Greenbelt project. However, the government failed to buy it and several other parcels on the fringe of Greenbelt before the appropriations to buy land elapsed. If the government had bought this parcel in the 1930's, the land most certainly would have become a part of Greenbelt Park, as the southern portion of the city was retained for a regional park of the National Park Service.

For over 25 years, the federal government could have tried again to buy this enclave of land

and a much larger parcel of land off Edmonston-Kenilworth Avenue known as the Jaeger tract. However, it made no effort to do so. Then in the early sixties, the Jaeger tract was zoned for high-rise apartments and townhouses over the active opposition of the city, including an unsuccessful appeal to the highest court in Maryland. Afterwards, the Westchester Park apartments and townhomes were built.

Development

Still the Parkside parcel remained undisturbed, and for another 30 years the National Park Service could have tried to buy the land, but did not. It was only after the property was subdivided and land clearance begun that Greenbelters took an active interest in how Parkside was developed. Then, a small group, led by citizen activist Jean Snyder, tried unsuccessfully to prevent the development from taking place. Snyder's group was concerned with the impact caused by clearing the land, by water runoff from it and by people living within the confines of the park and taking away the wilderness feel for a large section of the park.

Eventually construction was completed, and the new owners moved into the 31 large homes. The typical home consists of a

Proposed Busing Changes Coming

With the recent settlement of the school desegregation suit, Vaughns, et. al. and NAACP v. Board of Education of Prince Georges County, et al., all parties agreed to a Memorandum of Understanding to change the future of the Prince Georges County school system. The Accountability-Based Comprehensive Plan for the Prince George's County Public Schools in Support of the Memorandum of Understanding contains detailed information about plans for each public school in the county.

Although a number of changes are planned regarding quality of education and school construction, among other issues, no area is of more concern to residents that the decrease in court-order school busing. According to the report describing the comprehensive plan, no busing changes are anticipated for Greenbelt area schools this year. However, by November 30, 1998, each cluster of schools will be assigned a School Improvement Specialist whose role will be to provide assistance with development of school improvements plans and monitoring progress among other activities.

The plan also details proposed changes for each school as students are reassigned to new schools or to schools closer to

their neighborhoods. All reassignments and boundary changes will be subject to the School Board's policies and procedures including public hearings.

Greenbelt's Schools

Eleanor Roosevelt High School has a capacity for 2,291 students and last year had 3,111 students for 136% capacity. Changes should be made there in two years, i.e., the school year starting in Fall 2000. At that time, almost 500 students living in Lanham and Dodge Park will be reassigned to Duval High School. In addition, another 300 Science and Technology students will move to the newly opened Ardmore Area High School. With continued growth in the student population in the Greenbelt area, ERHS is expected to be at 99% capacity in 2000 and at 104% capacity in 2002.

Greenbelt Middle School had 871 students last year, 109% of it 864 student capacity. No changes are expected at this school until 2001 when approximately 250 students from Palmer Park, Cheverly, Beaver Heights, and Kentland will be relocated to the new Hill Road Middle School. In addition, renovations or additions affecting 208 seats are expected to be completed in 2003.

Greenbelt Elementary school was at 122% capacity last year

with 695 students instead of the 569-student capacity. In 2000, 226 students will move to John Carroll Elementary, reducing the enrollment to approximately 90% capacity. No other changes are anticipated at this school.

Springhill Lake Elementary School

For Springhill Lake Elementary School, a number of changes are anticipated starting with a six room, 150 seat addition for this school year. As of last school year, there were eight temporary buildings at the school. In 2000, about 110 students will transfer out of Springhill Lake; those from Carmody Hills will be moving to Oakcrest Elementary and those students from Fairmont

Celebrating Greenbelt's Co-operative Spirit

We join with the other Greenbelt cooperatives in celebrating the month of October as National Cooperatives Month. Last Sunday, GHI sponsored a well-attended picnic to celebrate National Cooperatives Month. In this issue of the paper, Greenbelt co-ops are sponsoring a two-page ad to give our readers background information on each of the city's co-ops. This coming Sunday, there will be a video about co-ops shown at the New Deal Cafe during Sunday Brunch. Later, an open house will be held featuring co-op homes being offered for sale to prospective new residents.

The planners of the model town of Greenbelt planned more than just the buildings; our town was a social experiment as well. One of the ideas promoted with the new residents of Greenbelt, our Pioneers, was the establishment of community-run businesses and organizations—co-ops. Although most people are not aware of it, the News Review is published by the Greenbelt Cooperative Publishing Association, Inc. Dating back to November, 1937, we are the oldest cooperative in Greenbelt.

With start-up money provided by a foundation created by Boston department store magnate Edward Filene, the pioneers organized a cooperative to run all the stores in the new commercial center, now Roosevelt Center. That cooperative became Greenbelt Consumer Services, now succeeded by Greenbelt Consumers Cooperative, the operator of our Co-op Supermarket. Other early cooperatives that continue are the Greenbelt Federal Credit Union and the Greenbelt Cooperative Nursery School.

Not all Greenbelt cooperatives date back to the town's early days, as residents have continued to create new ones. When the federal government decided to sell off Greenbelt and its homes, the residents banded together to form a new cooperative that succeeded in acquiring most of the original government housing. That co-op is now known as GHI, Greenbelt Homes, Inc.

More recently, two new cooperatives have joined our ranks—the New Deal Cafe and greenbelt.com.

In Greenbelt, the cooperative spirit continues to be alive and well.

A Visit to Parkside

Having signed the petition that opponents of the Parkside annexation are circulating, I was feeling a bit guilty because I had not followed the issue closely nor had I seen the Parkside development.

So tonight I decided to take a look. The first thing I noticed was a large Parkside development on the right (south) side of Good Luck Road — much larger than 31 houses. Then a little further down, a small sister (or "notch") development appeared on the left, proudly proclaiming itself Parkside of Greenbelt.

I pulled in, drove around and emerged unimpressed with the development itself: the typical oversized house on an undersized lot, and many houses had four cars in the driveway. As we exited, I spotted a sign indicating that the Parkside of Greenbelt residents had a meeting that night — at Parkdale High School (in Riverdale) across the street.

But it was my daughter whom I must credit with noticing the prominent sign (nearly on the property of the first house in the so-called "Parkside of Greenbelt" development): Welcome to Riverdale.

I truly believe these folks could not have been misled by a developer or a real estate agent — the bulk of the Parkside development is across the street and clearly in Riverdale, and the so-called Parkside of Greenbelt notch development of 31 homes is in spitting distance of the Riverdale sign. So I suspect this was all wishful thinking on their part, and it's too bad for them. But an old Latin expression, *Caveat Emptor* (let the buyer beware), should have given them pause before they signed that 30-year mortgage.

If you're still undecided on this issue, Greenbelt residents, try it yourself. Drive down Kenilworth to Good Luck Road, make a left, and look on the left for the "Parkside of Greenbelt" sign. I certainly didn't feel like I was in Greenbelt, but maybe

you will!

Enough said.

I am sorry that your Greenbelt elected officials and staffs do their jobs and demonstrate what a good choice the Greenbelt residents made in electing and hiring them and for how good they really are.

I apologize for loving my home and not wailing about how we were "tricked" into buying in the beautiful Greenbelt/Parkside community. It is unfortunate that Parkside is surrounded on three sides by the City of Greenbelt and does not want to move the whole community into the City of Riverdale, across the street and down the way. It is too bad Greenbelt had to annex Greenbelt East and make all those wonderful people, stores and homes into "Greenbelters." It was thought-

less of us to potentially reduce the value of some Greenbelt property by becoming a part of Greenbelt, whose average home price is 10% to 20% less than the average priced home in Parkside.

I am sorry the increase in my taxes will result in excess revenues for the City of Greenbelt for several years (after all services are deducted) by Parkside becoming part of Greenbelt. It is unfortunate that Parkside was built with building standards which included full fire sprinklers, water saver toilets, energy efficient fixtures, furnaces and air conditioning units, high "E" value insulation, and current county, state and federal building standards.

I am sorry Mr. Dupree offended some of you with his reference to "snobs." The American Heritage Dictionary defines a snob as, "A person who is convinced of and flaunts his social superiority; a person who despises his inferiors and whose condescension arises from social or intellectual pretension." Webster's synonym for snob is elitist, egotist and pretender. And, finally, for those Greenbelters who have seen fit to think and verbalize it, I apologize for our color — I know there was a time when people of color could not purchase or live in Greenbelt.

Your Rights!

In last week's News Review, some Parkside residents submitted a letter asking Greenbelt voters not to sign the annexation referendum petition.

Signing the referendum petition is your democratic right, a right that the Parkside residents are asking you not to exercise.

The referendum petition provides an opportunity for Greenbelt voters to exercise their best judgment about the annexation. The petition is the vehicle for Greenbelt voters to make a choice; it is not "no" to the annexation, but it is saying "yes" to our right to provide input to this decision making process. As it now stands, the city council has decided to annex Parkside. The vote to annex by the city council on September 28 was only 18 days after the public hearing. By signing the petition, you are allowing enough time for a thorough analysis of the issue. Whatever your opinion is about the annexation, please do not throw away your right.

basement and two stories with a built-in two-car garage and backs up to wooded parkland. They are similar in style to the newest single family homes being built in Greenbelt at Greensprings off Hanover Parkway. Most of the homes are on a single street, Crest Park Drive, with a few located on two small cul de sacs, Camillo Court and Magnolia Hill Lane.

Crest Park Drive extends northward from Good Luck Road down a hill, ending near the property limits. At the end of the street a storm water retention pond, built by the developer, is now owned and maintained by the county. The entrance to Parkdale High School is a short distance further east on Good Luck Road.

According to the owners, many of them thought that their new homes were within the city limits—the development was promoted as Parkside at Greenbelt. Greenbelt Park is within the city limits, as is all of the property initially purchased by the federal government for the Greenbelt Project. Since the Parkside land was never purchased by the government, it is not in Greenbelt. When the residents of the subdivision found out that they were not eligible to receive city services or benefits, they petitioned for annexation, even though they understood that their taxes would be greater.

The annexation petition, submitted to the council on March 3, bore the signatures of 64% of the property owners and 78% of the registered voters in Parkside. The council held a required public hearing on September 10 after giving notice of it for four weeks in a row in this and another newspaper. Two and one-half weeks later, on September 28, the city council voted for the annexation.

Issues

City Manager McLaughlin and the city staff recommended against the annexation largely because the subdivision is isolated from the remainder of the developed portions of the city. Parkside is 3.4 miles from the city's Public Works Building

and 2 miles from the nearest residential area served by the city, Greensprings. However, McLaughlin felt that the inconvenience and extra time required to service Parkside was not significant enough to require any increase in the size of the city work force needed to provide city services to the annexed area. In fact, Planning and Community Development Director Celia Craze calculated that Parkside would yield \$15,269 more in revenues than the estimated expenditures of the city to provide services.

Many people who oppose the annexation have cited the city manager recommendations as the reason for opposition to annexation. Those now circulating the petition also claim that the council acted too quickly, that citizens needed more time to learn and think about the issue. Another argument is that the voters should make the decision, not the city council.

Resentment

While these all may be valid reasons for seeking a voter referendum, another reason seems to be the driving force for those who are most strongly opposed to this little subdivision becoming part of the city. That reason is objection to the property having been developed in the first place and resentment to those new homeowners

who chose to buy homesites that, opponents feel, had spoiled public parklands.

A leading opponent, Doug Love, describes the Parkside residents as being like "Californians, moving into earthquake zones with no cares, or like smokers that ignore the risks to their health . . . They see nothing wrong in living inside a National Park." Snyder, leader of the opposition to the original development, wrote to the city council that "I have been disheartened about the failure to stop the development altogether, and have only been able to wish it could disappear."

Proponent Bill Dupree, a Greenbelt resident, accuses the opponents as "tree huggers" who wanted Parkside to be "another tree farm," but since they lost their bid to do so, "they have held open attacks on the poor souls who want to share the great things that make Greenbelt special."

Other concerns raised by opponents have been the condition of the stormwater pond, the stability of the soil and stabilization of the hillside, and substandard street construction. City staff has responded that the county has accepted the pond for maintenance; an engineering firm, Hillis-Carnes Engineering Associates, Inc., has found the site soils to be very competent for support of foundations and

new fills; and that, upon inspection by the city, there do not appear to be any outstanding deficiencies in street construction that will cause the city significant expense in the near future. One opponent, Robert J. Lewis, has expressed concern that the number of homes wired with alarm systems will cause the police to waste excessive time responding to false alarm calls.

Enthusiasm

At first it appeared that the city council would be unanimously opposed to the annexation. Apparently what swayed the majority of council to change their minds was the enthusiasm of Parkside residents for annexation to the city and their interest in becoming active members of the community. William D. Hueston summed up these feelings in a letter to the council. "You have many reasons to be proud of the city you represent and reasons to wonder about the future," he said. "The residents of Parkside share your appreciation of both the Greenbelt heritage and the green belt that surrounds it. In fact, we feel that

we are your guardians of the southern part."

A large contingent of Parkside residents attended the public hearing and the council meeting at which the annexation ordinance was adopted as well as many opponents. When it came time to vote, it was hard for the members of council to say "no" to the Parkside, a group of people who looked like Greenbelters, acted like Greenbelters, liked Greenbelters, and wanted to become a part of Greenbelt. Even the opponents, who opposed annexing the land, made it clear that they would welcome the participation of Parkside in community affairs—but not as members of the community.

Purpose/Mission: Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative is a nonprofit locally owned, member-controlled business established to provide consumer services. The co-op's primary purpose is to operate a supermarket and pharmacy in the Roosevelt Center of historic Greenbelt.

Non-members are welcome to shop at the co-op, however all patrons are encouraged to join because membership has many benefits. Membership provides an opportunity to share in the direction and earnings of the business. Members receive patronage refunds - a portion of the co-op's earnings, after expenses, which are distributed to members based on the amount of their purchases. Annually, based on the cooperative's earnings, the Board of Directors determines the percentage of member purchases which will be patronage refunds. Because the surplus is distributed to members in proportion to their use of the co-op's services, it is important that members give their member numbers when making purchases. Craze Cites Node as Planning Issue

Celia Craze, director of Planning and Community Development for the city, sent a memo on September 30 to members of the Greenbelt Metro Area Sector Planning Team to clarify an issue involving Springhill Lake that had moved into the foreground during the charrette process. In the course of the first charrette, her memo points out, one of two teams working with land use concepts recommended some kind of node at the intersection of Cherrywood Lane and Springhill Drive.

This node was to provide an "active, pedestrian-friendly, visual and functional" link between the Metro site and the adjacent residential community conducive to pedestrian movement between the two spaces. Following discussion in the second charrette and its translation into a land use design concept by the Park and Planning staff, this node later appeared as a mixed commercial/residential zone.

Since Springhill Lake already had a commercial area at the intersection of Springhill Drive and Springhill Lane, Mayor Judith Davis had suggested extending the node toward this existing commercial center to strengthen that center.

However, the city opposes development along the west side of Cherrywood Lane, which could affect environmentally sensitive lands. As Craze's memo notes: "There is no commercial development along the Cherrywood Lane corridor between Breezewood Drive and the Beltway" nor has a need for further commercial development been demonstrated. It would instead "change the character of the corridor," her memo says.

"We envision a functional, visual node which is a plaza/gateway" at the Cherrywood/Springhill Drive location, Craze concludes.

Charrette #4 will be held on Saturday, October 24 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Administration Building for the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission on Kenilworth Avenue between Paint Branch Parkway and River Road. In this charrette, the Sector Planning Group will look again at the Illustrative Land Use Plan for the WMATA and adjacent A. H. Smith properties and the surrounding neighborhoods. They will work toward consensus on the Land Use Plan and the desired intensity of development to occur at those sites.

Judye Hering spoke with students in a health education class at the University of Maryland about community health and education issues, internship programs and CARES' vocations educational program on October 7.

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

Heights will go to Seat Pleasant Elementary. At the same time, about 80 students who live in Springhill Lake Apartments and in Berwyn will transfer from Oakcrest Elementary to Springhill Lake Elementary. The school which is at 102% percent of capacity this year due to the addition of the six classrooms which reduced the capacity from 128%, will be at 100% capacity in 2000 when the student shifts are completed.

Residents from Berwyn Heights have been hoping to reopen Berwyn Elementary School. Since this has not yet been approved, that school was not listed on the official list of schools. If Berwyn is reopened, it could affect students currently at Springhill Lake Elementary.

Magnolia Elementary School is currently at 140% of capacity with almost 700 students. In 1999 approximately 100 students from Glenarden Apartments will be transferred to Kenmoor Elementary, reducing the school population to 591 students which is still 120% of capacity.
