## Consuella "Connie" Harris **Human Resources Officer**

"Striking" is an easy word to apply to the City's new Human Resources Officer, Connie Harris, an elegant mid-life woman of 5'9" whose handsome gold jewelry matches her styled hair.

Her striking exterior may be partly the natural expression of a deep interior appreciation for beauty and creativity in all their forms because this is a complex person with special human resources of her own-someone reserved and exceedingly thoughtful, someone quietly determined to live an interesting life and accomplish interesting personal goals. One of those goals is to publish a novel some day because, she says, "I like the writer part of me." A play she wrote was performed as part of the county's Bicentennial celebration, and she's the author of two other plays as well.

A Washington native, 22-year resident of Greenbelt and member of the Co-op, Connie Harris became Human Resources Officer on December 15, 1998. Earlier, she had done volunteer mediation for the City. "It's exciting working here," she says. "I get an opportunity to see the dedication and hard work of the employees in Greenbelt, and I'm impressed with the services that are avail-Actually, some of the

reasons I've remained a longterm Greenbelt resident are the library, the Community Center, the schools, and the police.

"What does a Human Resources Officer do? Connie Harris says, "Among other things, I oversee recruitment, training, classification, benefits and so on. . . the whole array of human resources services supporting department heads and employees. dents of Greenbelt."

She worked for Prince George's County for 20 years, first in personnel, then as a manager in the Department of Corrections, and then in the Human Refations Commission. She has also been a consultant.

One of five children and a graduate of Eastern High School in northeast D.C., Connie Harris started out as a clerk-typist with C & P Telephone Company. When she married, she and her husband moved to Cleveland, where she got her first exposure

### General Government Up 3.5%

With Fiscal Year 2000 (FY2000) expenditures of \$1.2 million, the general government account is the fifth largest category in City Manager Michael McLaughlin's budget proposal, accounting for 8.2% of total expenditures. This account includes the city council, the city manager's office, the community promotion office, the finance office and the city solicitor. McLaughlin's budget proposal calls for a 3.5 percent increase over fiscal year 99 (which ends June 30) expenditures.

Perhaps the biggest story, from a budget perspective, are two items not shown in the budget totals. The cost of the city's retirement benefits could change depending on the eventual recommendations of a city study group looking at ways to improve those

benefits. In addition, McLaughlin told council at a March 29 worksession that he is beginning to feel that his decision when selected as city manager not to fill the assistant city manager position needs to be revisited. He said immediate issues are filling most of his time, leaving him little time for long term planning. McLaughlin was quick to respond "Sure," when Mayor Judith Davis asked him if council could add that as an "unmet need."

expenses related to the five-member city council are expected to

total \$67,300 in FY2000, up 3.9 percent from the current year's budget (and 6.2 percent from estimated FY99 expenditures). Councilmember Edward Putens asked McLaughlin to compare council's salaries (\$5,000 for councilmembers, \$6,000 for the mayor) with those paid by other cities of comparable size. Council salaries have been at their current level since July 1990. Because council cannot change its salary during the term, increases are generally approved in an elec-The salaries, benefits and other tion year to take effect when the new council is sworn in.

### **Public Hearing Wednesday** On New Local Bus Service

Getting around the city and to the Greenbelt Metro station is about to become easier. The county plans to start four new bus routes this year that will run through the city every 15, 30 or 40 minutes. The public is invited to come and comment about the proposed bus routes at a public hearing on Wednesday, April 14 at 7 p.m. in the Municipal Building. These new routes are designed to complement, not replace, existing Metro bus routes. The bus fare will be 75 cents for most people and 35 cents for the elderly and disabled.

Two of the new routes travel through Greenbelt East, three of the routes travel through the central part of the city, and one travels between Beltway Plaza and the federal court house through Springhill Lake.

At the public hearing there will be a sign-up sheet for those interested in speaking. Speakers will be recognized for five minutes in the order in which they signed up. An interpreter for the hearing impaired will be available upon request by calling 301-883-5656 or TDD 1-800-735-2258.

There will be a five working day comment period following the meeting. Comments submitted will receive the same consideration as comments made during the hearing. #### **Bus Routes**

The county has proposed that new bus routes be added in the areas that need more transit services. The Greenbelt routes are being added as a part of this plan. Smaller buses will be used. Metrobus service will not be reduced but some rerouting of both county and Metro buses could occur. Two new routes (11 and 14) could come on line this spring and the 15 and 15M routes in fiscal year 2000, which begins July 1.

### **Wrench Inventor Studies Lunar Fire Suppression**

What do wrenches, robots, and fire protection have in common? If you answered Brian Roberts, you would have the correct answer.

Roberts, 29, of Greenbelt, invented the ratchetless wrench that NASA recently sent into space to be tested. His next

wrench work and what makes it special? A standard wrench has two sets of teeth that come together and grip. Working with Mike Wade and John Vranish, his NASA fellowship advisor, Roberts invented a wrench with rollers in grooves instead of teeth. The rollers lock in place when reversed and do not get stuck.

#### Historic District: Unique Opportunity

GHI has been given a unique opportunity to strengthen and preserve the design and character of original Greenbelt and GHI by voting for Historic District designation at the end of April. GHI was founded in the 1950s after its first residents came to the community in the 1930s. These original residents and subsequent GHI founders are now aging and will not be with us as long as we would like. A wealth of historical knowledge about our community will be lost with them. Let's not let the historic character of our community go with them. Historic District designation would preserve what makes GHI unique.

The designation is not meant to stop the clock and keep us frozen in time. It is designed to recognize the significance of our planned community - the inner walkways, common areas, greenbelt, the courts, overpasses, and all the other features that make our community pedestrian and family friendly. While preserving these features, it allows us to grow with and embrace modern needs and technologies. It adopts our own rules and regulations as spelled out in the Member Handbook, which includes additions to our homes.

Some opponents of the Historic District say that they don't want more regulations. The added level of regulation imposed by Historic District designation is minimal. Think of what GHI would look like if there were no rules and regulations. Everyone could do potentially whatever they want to their homes and yards, creating a hodgepodge of sheds, fences, additions, and other "improvements" that could turn old Greenbelt into a transient rental community. Historic District designation would give us more power to prevent this and protect the historic characteristics that make our community unique and special.

Historic District designation would also give GHI and Greenbelt as a whole more power to advocate our desires for smart growth and planning in and around Greenbelt to fight the adverse development that is constantly knocking at our door.

Finally, Historic District designation would help give us the financial means through legally entitled tax credits and other mechanisms to maintain our aging homes and infrastructure to today's standards and those of tomorrow.

#### Communications Gap

As of March 24, for 17 weeks now, readers of the Washington Post's Prince George's weekly section have had to read these words instead of a City of Greenbelt crime report: "The Greenbelt Police Department did not provide a crime report for this week's Prince George's Extra. For more information, call 301-474-7200."

There seems to be a failure to communicate here between

the City of Greenbelt, the Washington Post, and the people of Greenbelt. This problem can be solved with awareness about antiquated methods of media/community communications. If the Washington Post would like this information, it is accessible and open to the public over the Greenbelt Police web page - or would be if this information was being properly updated. Today is March 30 - the Greenbelt Police Weekly Report on the Greenbelt Citizen Connection web page is as of March 12. Yes, we do have a failure to communicate here, in more ways than one:

All people have the right to know about crime in their community. Not everyone wants to read about it, but some do want to know, whether it is through the Prince George's Journal, the Greenbelt News Review, the Washington Post, or the Greenbelt Police web page. Some people may use the Post, but not the Greenbelt News Review; therefore, all possible mediums that can be used should be used and updated regularly - no exceptions. If the same resources of communication are not provided in a timely fashion for all media methods, there is bias and therefore censorship. That undermines working together for an informed commu-

I feel the City Council should turn their focus to making sure the people of Greenbelt have the best access possible to community information. The people deserve to have this information presented to them in a timely and effective fashion, through all media methods readily available. The City of Greenbelt should not depend on such reasoning as "The Post's police report on Greenbelt is too long. They're making us look like we have more crime than other cities in Prince George's County!" Reasoning such as this should not influence decision making for the good of a community. The city should review this issue. By updating community information systems regularly and improving methods of community media and public communications, more services and resources can be provided to the people of Greenbelt.

At this point, I would like to compliment the Greenbelt web page. It is a very informative system of information about the city of Greenbelt, available to the public. Yet it should be understood that "state of the art" technology is here today and gone tomorrow. Constant improvements must be made. Therefore public web pages such as the city's should be redesigned, improved and updated regularly. This is another opportunity for the city to continually improve community communications to the public—not suppress or censor information that should be available to the public equally, through all media methods available.

#### Companies to Refund Membership Fees

Attorney General J. Joseph Curran, Jr. announced March 18 that his Consumer Protection Division has ordered the operators of a vacation membership club, known as Interlink Travel Network, Inc., to refund millions of dollars to former customers who joined the club but did not receive many of the services Interlink promised. Under the order, the customers, which may number in the thousands, may be entitled to a full refund of their membership fees - estimated at approximately \$3,000 on average per customer.

An Administrative Law Judge concluded that promises, made by Interlink Travel Network, Inc., Eagle Rental, Inc., and L&M Marketing, Inc., as well as the principals of all three companies, Margaret Porterfield and John Lyon, Jr., were false. The Consumer Protection division subsequently found that the three companies, Porterfield and Lyon had committed unfair or deceptive trade practices in the selling of vacation club memberships.

The order requires Interlink, Eagle Rental, L&M Marketing, Porterfield and Lyon to refund all of the membership payments they collected from club members, which is likely to total millions of dollars. The defendants must also cease all illegal practices and pay a \$2,078,000 civil penalty.



#### Call In Unemployment Insurance Claims

Persons who need to file for unemployment insurance benefits now will be able to do so in the convenience of their homes. The Maryland Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (DLLR) Wheaton office is offering telephone services for unemployment insurance activities.

Residents in Prince George's County will be able to use the new telephone service. Claimants will have the choice of applying for benefits either in person or by telephone during the following hours: in person, 8 -10 a.m., Monday through Friday; and by telephone (301-929-4350), noon - 3 p.m., Monday through

Effective May 3, the Wheaton office will discontinue offering the in person hours to file a claim for unemployment insurance benefits. All claims will be taken by telephone, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. In addition to filing claims for unemployment insurance, all scheduled appointments (with the exception of appeal hearings) will be conducted by telephone also. Individuals and those who need to file unemployment insurance claims are advised that Monday is often the busiest day for claims filing; they are encouraged to call Tuesday through Thursday to minimize delays.



to municipal government by working for the City of East Cleveland. "After my husband was transferred back here with the Secret Service-the White House police-I stayed home for a while with my daughter, Stephanie.

"Then I went to work for the Prince George's CETA program, and I was really blessed both through having mentors and being given the opportunity to start a career with the County. I continued working for Prince George's County," she says, "first in personnel, and then for 13 years as a manager in the Department of Corrections, and finally, for the Human Relations Commission. Among the programs I managed were the County's Work Release program and its Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) program."

Connie Harris lost a baby to SIDS, and eventually she and her husband were divorced. Her other child, daughter Stephanie, is a graduate of Eleanor Roosevelt High School who lives in Landover and is the mother of five. Harris says, "I think one of the reasons I really like Greenbelt is that years ago when my daughter was growing up, we used to go sit by the lake in the afternoons.'

"In 1989," she continues, "I realized that even though I had worked my way up through independent study, training and experience, I needed to get a degree. So I entered a program of Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. Through testing and evaluation of my years of experience as a manager, I was able to use experiential learning for college credits in their master's program, which I finished in 1991. It was hard. Every Saturday I endured a two-and-a-half hour drive each way, and I had one class per week locally as well." She got a Master's in Human Services degree this way.

Harris is on the lookout for an agent to handle her novel. It's 565 pages long, and is about surrogate mothers and children born as a result of surrogate parenting. She talks with fondness both about writing and the creative process. In addition to loving writing, "I love the water," she says. "I can't swim, but I still love the water, and also I love fishing and camping. I love being with my friends and traveling, although I haven't done much of it for a while."



### **Indian Creek Yields Lots** Of "Treasures" at Clean-Up

by Barbara Young

A pile of rubber tires, two shopping carts and a gas stove were among items removed from Indian Creek during the stream clean-up held after a CCRIC press conference on the overcast, chilly Saturday morning of March 27 at the courthouse on Cherrywood Lane. CCRIC -Citizens to Conserve and Restore Indian Creek -- was formed in February by residents of Greenbelt, College Park, Berwyn Heights and other watershed communities to prevent further destruction of Indian Creek at the 240-acre Greenbelt Metro station site where a massive building project is under consideration.

#### Advisors Introduced

The press conference and stream clean-up drew about 40 participants as well as press. The group's chair, Kate Spencer, introduced staff attorney Jeff Nelson and student attorney Sandra Franco of Georgetown Law Center's Institute for Public Representation, which has agreed to advise and work with CCRIC.

In addition to Nelson and Franco, participants also included three council persons from the City of College Park and its Mayor, Michael Jacobs; two staff persons from the Environmental Department of nearby WMATA (Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority), and representatives of the Audubon Naturalist Society and Eyes of Paint Branch organization. Several Cub Scouts also helped. CCRIC's Zelda Bell organized and led the stream clean-up effort; Joyce Pierce instructed the group on safety mea-

#### Wetlands Restoration

In literature the group distributed, CCRIC's Spencer pointed out that "Damage to wetlands around the world is being reversed using careful, state-of-theart restoration methods.

"The Indian Creek floodplain could be a showcase laboratory for reclaiming mines (a dominant land use in the area), restoring habitat for native plant and animal species, and educating the public about improving urban stream water quality.... The historic wetland, irreplaceable ecosystem and



#### Higher Ed Tax Credit for 1998 Filers

New higher education tax credits could almost have parents of college students looking forward to April 15. The 1998 tax year is the first year that the Hope and Lifetime Learning tax credits proposed by the President - which directly reduce the amount of federal income tax owed - are available to help families meet the cost of post-secondary education, whether for a bachelor's degree, graduate or professional study, or vocational or job-related training.

A Hope tax credit of up to \$1,500 can be claimed for two years for each student in a family who is enrolled in higher education at least half-time at an eligible educational institution and who has not yet completed his or her first two years of

The Lifetime Learning tax credit picks up where Hope leaves off it's available for vocational, college, graduate and professional students, and adults who want to upgrade their job skills or acquire new ones or pursue another course of study. For 1998, tax filers can claim a Lifetime Learning credit up to \$1,000 - 20 percent of the first \$5,000.

To take advantage of the Hope and Lifetime Learning tax credits, taxpayers must complete and submit IRS From 8863 with their federal tax returns. #### LYME DISEASE

The history of Lyme Disease goes back to 1974 to the little town of Old Lyme in Connecticut. The discovery of this disease is a fascinating story, but we cannot go into it in this short essay.

The germ of Lyme disease has spread all over the world now. It is a spirochete, and it is carried by the deer tick. It strikes all races, genders, and age groups. Most cases occur in the summer, when people are exposed to ticks.

Symptoms: Lyme disease is a great imitator. Don't blame your doctor if he/she does not come up with the correct diagnosis the first time. History of a tick bite is helpful, but seldom available. The ticks are so small that they can be missed easily. Incubation period is from three days to one month. The first sign of the disease in about 90% of cases is a huge, spreading, red, round rash called ECM (erythema chronicum migrans), with the mark of a tick bite at the center. Secondary circles may appear all over the body. The rash lasts from two to twelve months, it may grow steadily, or may come and go. The tick may be still embedded in the skin, in which case it should be removed with a steady pull with a pair of tweezers. If the tick is removed within 48 hours, the chances of transmitting the disease is negligible—even if the tick has it.

Often when the rash appears the patient will have a "viral syndrome": fatigue, fever and chills, muscle and joint pains, poor appetite, nausea and vomiting, liver, spleen and lymph node enlargement, and other flu-like symptoms. Unlike flu, this disease is not transmitted to the rest of the family. Often this disease is misdiagnosed as infectious mononucleosis.

Weeks or months later the rush may reappear with more serious symptoms; joints may swell and be painful. A misdiagnosis of Juvenile Rheumatoid Arthritis is not uncommon. Neurologic symptoms may develop: headache, involuntary movements, eye problems, mental problems, weakness of muscles, clumsiness, and paralysis. These may be short-lived, or last a long time. Heart involvement can occur; irregularities in rate, and rhythm. These also can last for a variable length of time, and can be confused with other diseases.

Diagnosis is extremely difficult. Laboratory tests are very unreliable

Treatment consists of antibiotics, but there is no agreement on which one, for how long and by what route they are to be given. Complications may be treated with anti-inflammatories and corticosteroids.

Prevention is also controversial. Most doctors recommend that children with tick bites should be only observed. Some doctors suggest that if the tick is known to be a deer tick, if it was imbedded longer than two days, and the area is highly endemic for Lyme disease, the child should be given a two-week course of some antibiotic. The best prevention is avoidance. In the woods wear a long-sleeved shirt, and long pants and boots. Check yourself and your child for ticks and remove them cautiously with tweezers. Do not squash them.

In early 1999 the FDA has released a Lyme disease vaccine (brand name LYMHrix manufactured by Smith, Kline, Beecham). It may be given to people aged 15 through 70 years. It is too early to tell how well it works, and how safe it is.

Outlook: Most children recover completely within a few days. Pregnant women may deliver defective or stillborn babies in spite of antibiotics.

Finally, let me emphasize that Lyme disease is rare. Most ticks are not deer ticks, and most deer ticks do not carry the Lyme disease germ. An antibiotic prescription after every tick bite is not recommended.

Also remember that there is another dangerous disease spread by a tick: Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever-but that is another

The new 11 route, running between Beltway Plaza, the Greenbelt Metro Station and Capital Office Park, would provide more service to Springhill Lake. It would run weekdays from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m., every 15 minutes during peak hours and every 30 minutes during off-peak hours.

The proposed bus route 14 would run between the Greenbelt Metro station and the central part of the city. For the first time public transportation would serve the Boxwood Village, Lakewood and the Lakeside neighborhoods. It would run on weekdays from 6

a.m. to 7 p.m. every 20 minutes at peak times and every 40 minutes non-peak.

The proposed routes 15 and 15M are similar routes. Both go from Cipriano Square Shopping Center through the same route in Greenbelt East and ultimately to the Greenbelt Metro station. During rush hours the 15 route will provide the most direct route to the Greenbelt Metro station that Greenbelt East residents have yet had via public transport. It will run weekdays from 6 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. and 3 to 7 p.m. every 30 minutes. The 15M route will run week days from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. every 30 minutes. It loops extensively through the core of




### Electronic Filing Is the Way to Go

#### **Healthcare Denials** Can Now Be Appealed

Attorney General J. Joseph Curran, Jr. wants Marylanders to know that a new state law gives them assistance in appealing decisions made by their HMO or health plan to deny them health care claims or authorization for

The Appeals and Grievances Law, which took effect January 1, requires insurance carriers to alert patients whose claims have been denied on the basis of medical necessity that they can seek help from the Attorney General's Health Advocacy Unit by calling toll-free 1-877-261-8807, Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"This new law is one of the most consumer-friendly in the country," said Attorney General Curran, "Patients who need medical treatment can now get explicit answers from their health plans about why their coverage has been denied, and they have a strong ally in appealing those denials."

Consumers should know: (1) If an HMO or health plan denies coverage for treatment because it determines that the treatment is not medically necessary or appropriate, it must inform the patient in writing of its adverse decision. With that written decision it must give details of its internal grievance process and the toll-free number of the Health Advocacy Unit. (2) If the denial of coverage involves a medical emergency, people should call the Maryland Insurance Administration at 1-800-492-6116 for assistance. That agency will render a decision within 24 hours in emergency cases: (3) In all other cases, if a person decides to appeal the decision, call the Health Advocacy Unit and it will gather information from the patient, doctor and the health plan, to encourage the plan to reverse its decision. If this mediation approach is unsuccessful, the Health Advocacy Unit will help the patient or the doctor - file a formal appeal with the plan's internal grievance process. (4) If a person is not satisfied with the plan's grievance decision, the Health Advocacy Unit will offer assistance in filing a complaint with the Maryland Insurance Administration. That agency will have medical experts assist in reviewing the decision by the health plan and, if

#### **Deceptive Sweepstake Agrees to Settlement**

Curran, Jr. has announced that Maryland and 29 other states have filed by the 30 states, of which entered into a settlement with Direct American Marketers, Inc. (DAMI) to resolve charges it deceived consumers into thinking they would win significant prizes by calling a 900 number —when in fact they won next to nothing. According to the charges, DAMI sent out mailings encouraging consumers to call a 900 telephone number to claim their prizes. But after being charged on average \$30 per call, the prizes turned out to be either \$1 or nothing at all.

The DAMI sweepstakes mailings were also sent out under a number of different "company" names, including ACG Independent Judging Organization, Audit Control Bureau, and Equity Disbursement Group. Some consumers, not realizing they were dealing with the same company, made five or more calls to the 900 numbers, losing \$150 or more.

Curran stated that Maryland law prohibits any promotion that requires consumers to pay money or submit to a sales presentation in order to claim a prize.

DAMI stopped mailing the prize solicitations to consumers in August 1997 and filed bankruptcy in California. Under the settlement approved by the bankruptcy appropriate, it will overturn the health plan's decision. files. Many of these companies simply pocket the payments and never pay the creditors. There are also new, illegal schemes that promise to create an identity for you through "file segregation." This is a federal crime.

#### Character Education

Wexler reported on progress on the Character Education program in the ERHS cluster of schools. The cluster is trying to get out to the community the message of character education. ERHS has hoped to have a meeting on the issue with Lt. Governor Kathleen Kennedy Townsend as speaker. Since each community has its own program in character education, the committee has requested Wexler to obtain written documentation on the cluster's plan, which they plan to discuss at the next meeting. ACE has already been rewarding good character, someone said, through its annual student awards.

#### Odyssey of the Mind

Former ACE member Clement Lau attended the meeting to request ACE support for the Odyssey of the Mind program in which several schools participate. State legislation is pending to provide limited funding for the project and Lau hoped for support from Greenbelt for this legislation. ACE chair, Leta Mach, indicated that time is too short for the committee to study the issue and forward a recommendation to the city council for their review. Moreover, she commented that the committee usually takes a stand on issues that more directly affect all Greenbelt students. However, a number of members approve of the cooperation and skills taught by the Odyssey of the Mind program and will individually lend their support to the legislation.

The issue of the Odyssey of the Mind program led to a general discussion about special activities that may be found in some schools and not in others. Sometimes a lack of time and knowledge on the part of parents and teachers may keep a school from participating. The committee discussed canvassing the Greenbelt schools to see what special programs each is involved

#### Henderson: Raise **Teacher Salaries**

Jim Henderson, Greenbelt's representative to the Prince George's County School Board, spoke to members of the Gray Panthers at their February 13 meeting.

Henderson reiterated his strong commitment to public education. He indicated that he was unhappy with the state decision to add financial managers to oversee board activities, as his background is in financial management and he is already on the board. Henderson stated that increasing teacher salaries is critical since many teachers start in the county but after two years move to other counties where salaries are as much as \$10,000 higher than here.

Janet Parker, the convener (chair) of the Gray Panthers, posed a question to Henderson about the education of homeless children within the county. She is concerned about the general education process for these children as well as the opportunities for talented and gifted activities for this group of students. Parker commented that "every child has a right to an education" and that only through a

quality education will homeless children be able to become useful members of society. Henderson did not have detailed information on the education of homeless children but indicated that he will investigate the matter.

The Gray Panthers is an age, race, and gender-neutral activist group dedicated to education and other issues such as health care for all and jobs with justice.

#### Administration

Administration represents 28 percent of the general government account. McLaughlin proposes expenditures of \$344,000 for FY2000, down 2.6 percent from the current fiscal year. Two decreases reflecting an accounting change and employee turnover were partially offset by an increase in other operating ex-

#### Finance

The finance and administrative services account represents 44 percent of general government expenditures. McLaughlin has proposed increasing expenditures in this area by 7.5 percent over the current year's budget (7.9 percent over estimated expenditures). Apparently printing the budget document has become a budget buster, causing an overage in the "other services" line item.

Although the total number of employees in this department will not change, the mix will. An executive secretary position has been deleted, and a human resources specialist has been added. Total personnel expenses for finance and administrative services are proposed to increase 6.9 percent over the FY99 budgeted

#### **Public Information**

This account represents 8 percent of general government expenditures. FY2000 expenditures are proposed to increase 4.2 percent over the FY99 budget amount. FY99 expenditures are exceeding that budget, so the FY2000 proposal represents a 7.4 percent decrease from estimated FY99 expenditures.

During the next two or three years Roberts plans to build a space robot which can be controlled from Earth. The robot will have hands and fingers called end effectors. Roberts hopes his robot will become part of the astronauts' tool box to accomplish tasks in space.

Currently Roberts spends his weekends as a volunteer fireman at the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department. He would like to combine his interests in space and fire fighting to find effective ways of suppressing fires in outer space.

#### Education

Roberts' interest in rockets began when he was a boy in Canfield, Ohio. He particularly enjoyed the rockets set off on the fourth of July. As a senior in high school in 1988, he wrote a term paper on rockets after seeing a film of the 1986 explosion of the Challenger spacecraft.

When he needed spending money as a freshman at Case Western Reserve, he took a parttime job with the Air Force working with batteries. He worked summers as a NASA intern and spent a year and a half in a cooperative education program with NASA in Belgium and at Los Alamos in New Mexico.

In July 1997 Roberts received a three-year fellowship in the Graduate Students Researchers Program. His base for study is the Neutral Buoyance Research Facility at the University of Maryland, where he is working
