GHI Member Forums Precede Vote on Historic District

William Shakespeare once wrote, "To be or not to be, that is the question." So it is with Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) residents who will have to decide whether to support becoming a Prince George's County Historic District this month. Residents can get information to help them decide at two identical forums.

The first will be on Saturday, April 17, at the American Legion Hall #136, 6900 Greenbelt Road at 1 p.m. The second will be on Thursday, April 22, at 7:30 p.m. at the same location. Residents can arrange transportation to the hall by calling GHI at 301-474-4161 and leaving their names with the receptionist. The first half-hour of the forum will be devoted to an informal roundtable to give members an opportunity to ask questions of staff from the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission Historic Preservation Section and members of GHI's former Ad Hoc Historical District Study Committee. Then, the former committee members will give background on the issue and Howard Berger of the commission will render an overview. Susan Braselton and Bob Neuman, GHI preservation consultants, will give a detailed explanation of what historic district designation would mean to Greenbelt residents. At the end of the forum, participants will be able to ask questions and state their views.

For those who miss these forums, a videotape of the April 17 meeting will be available for review at GHI. Additionally, Greenbelt Channel B-10 will tape

the Thursday forum and air it on allow the historic district program Tuesday, April 27, and Thursday, to regulate proposed additions and April 29, beginning at 6 p.m.

Residents interested in obtaining further information on the forums may call the GHI Historic District Hotline at 301-474-4161, extension 141.

"I think people should come whether they think county historic district designation is a good idea or not," said GHI President Keith Jahoda. "People will learn something about GHI and architecture.

After the first forum, GHI will mail ballots to its members. Between April 20 and 30, members will vote via mail ballot on whether to pursue becoming a county historic district. The 1997 draft Potential Greenbelt Historic District Design Guidelines formulated by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission in conjunction with GHI sets forth specific steps for this process. If a clear majority of the residents are in support of the proposed district, the Greenbelt city council could formally request evaluation of a proposed historical district by the commission. Upon receiving such a request, the commission would then hold a public hearing and solicit formal responses from the city and other involved parties. The commission's decision can be appealed within 30 days to the County Council.

But what will the members be voting on? The GHI Ad Hoc Historic District Study Committee explained the county historic district designation in a 1997 report to the GHI Board of Directors. It stated that the designation would

modifications to existing buildings, thus protecting the historic integrity of Greenbelt. The regulations would come with a set of financial incentives, encouraging property owners to invest in maintenance and changes that fit in with the historic context of the city. Alterations that meet the historic district guidelines would be approved by the county's Historic Preservation Commission staff, but those proposals not in accord with the guidelines would be referred to the planning commission for review at its monthly meetings. This stage would add three to four weeks waiting time for members wishing to renovate their homes, according to the committee.

The historic district designation program would be carried out as outlined below:

Design Guidelines

These guidelines would serve basically the same purpose as the present GHI Member Handbook and would focus on preserving the exterior character of the homes. The GHI committee worked closely with the historical preservation section of the commission to tailor the guidelines to relate specifically to Greenbelt. The program would grandfather in any existing additions and exterior changes.

Tax Credits for the Cooperative

GHI would be eligible for a 10 percent property tax credit for approved rehabilitation work under this program. Using the 1996 annual GHI budget, the committee estimated a refund of \$70,000 See HISTORIC, page 5

Rental Fee Hike Proposed To Fund Inspector for SHL

Whether to finance a new inspector to focus on the Springhill Lake apartments by raising the rental license fees was one of the issues discussed at the budget worksession on Thursday, April 1 for the Department of Planning and Community Development. The Greenbelt City Council also heard an update on zoning issues including the possibility that every property owner under the historic district, including the city, would be subject to county oversight, and a recommendation that the city assume full building code authority.

The proposed budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2000 for planning is \$178,500. This is less than the estimated expenditures this fiscal year of \$187,800. That difference reflects less money allocated to hiring consultants for the review of the Greenbelt Station and U.S. Department of Agriculture projects (\$30,000 versus \$43,000).

The proposed Community Development budget for FY2000 is \$334,700. The increase over the \$288,900 estimated spent in the

current fiscal year is due to the proposal to hire an inspector for Springhill Lake and to spend \$17,000 to replace the office computers, which are failing. Expenditures are estimated to be more than matched by revenues if council agrees to increase the license and permit fees. Total Community Development revenues are \$355,900.

Apartments

The planning and development department inspects apartment units throughout the city. In the smaller apartment complexes every unit is inspected, but in Springhill Lake only one ninth of the units are inspected each fiscal year. Last year 317 were inspected, however all the common areas and buildings are inspected every year.

The department proposes creating a new inspector position and having that person work full time in Springhill Lake until the department feels comfortable with the situation there. Then the inspector would work in other places, too. Director of Planning and Development Celia See BUDGET page 8



A few months back when I read of the proposed Local Bus Route

In the April 8 profile of Human Resources Officer Connie Harris, the word "media" appeared incorrectly, instead of mediation."

The correct sentence describing Ms. Harris' work is, "I also coordinate the community's Mediation Services program, in which a group of volunteers provides free mediation services to #14 making a regular run down Lakeside Drive, I was upset. I am still upset. Always an issue at Lakeside Citizens Association meetings is the dissatisfaction with people using our neighborhood street as a shortcut through town and the frequent occurrences of speeding. (And it has been noted that the speeders also include county and commercial vehicles.) "For the first time public trans-

portation would serve the Boxwood Village, Lakewood and Lakeside neighborhoods." Service from 6 a.m to 7 p.m., every 20 minutes during peak hours. (News Review 4/18/99) Speaking for myself - I'll tell the County Dept. of Transportation "Thanks but, no thanks!"

Why? Because

1. Lakeside Drive is a curved street, which has parking on one side. The curve reduces visibility. It has no sidewalks. Residents, adults and children, walk down the side of the street. A bus running during "peak hours" means a bus on the streets during the time kids are walking to and from school. Our current traffic can be a problem, we don't need to add a bus to the mix. Not even a "small bus."

2. Because there is parking on one side, cars encountering each other on the street have to be careful in passing to avoid an accident, especially where the curve is the most severe. Add a little speed to one or both of these vehicles and it can be a near miss. Increasing the frequency of traffic with the size and presence of a bus is sure to make matters worse.

3. For safety reasons Lakeside has been committed to keeping its neighborhood street from being considered a "thoroughfare." Becoming part of a public bus route endorses the "thoroughfare" mind set and the problems it brings.

4. And my most selfish reason. Mine is one of several of the older homes that lack duct work for central air conditioning. Consequently the only way to air and cool my home is from open windows. I do object to being subjected to the fumes and sounds of a shuttle bus running past my house weekdays every 20 to 40 minutes from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

I urge other Lakeside residents to speak up for their neighborhood. Unless of course, you're waiting for this shuttle bus to take you to that wonderful upscale Metroland Mall. But that is another issue.


and additions under local historic district designation, if enacted. (This committee unanimously recommended pursuit of local historic district status.) We ensured that historic district designation would not prevent members from building additions and otherwise improving their homes to suit their needs. One issue that we (the committee) barely touched upon in our three-year effort is the question of how becoming an historic district impacts property values and whether such designation generally brings with it economic benefits for the community affected. Recently I came upon two

state reports - from Virginia and Georgia - about the economic impact of historic preservation activity on residential and commercial areas. Both states found that historic preservation efforts have a positive impact on local economies and that property values improved. In the cities of Richmond, Fredericksburg and Staunton, Virginia, for example, property values of residential properties located in their respective historic districts appreciated. In one of Staunton's four historic districts, where the average value of houses ranged from \$51,500 to \$64,700, it was noted that housing remained affordable while at the same time rewarding homeowners there with faster rates of appreciation than owners of non-historic houses. Significantly, "...Local real estate markets show no discernable trend toward singling out designated landmarks as less desirable than similar undesignated properties,' declared the Virginia report.

Equally important, however, both Virginia and Georgia acknowledge the intangible benefits of historic preservation: enhanced quality of life and a renewed "sense of place" for local residents, and a greater awareness and improved image of these historic communities throughout the state. In Greenbelt's case, these intangibles already exist. We all benefit from the strong sense of community cohesiveness that has persisted for more than 60 years. To my mind, by becoming a local historic district, these attributes are further enhanced and so too, our property values.

The News Review (Jan. 14) described a police report that two men robbed a man on Cherrywood Terrace on January 1. "One of the men asked the victim if he was from India. When the victim said he was, the man said, according to police, 'Get out of here. You don't belong here."' Have the metropolitan papers reported this or looked into it?

The elite media bombard us with stories of "hate crimes," usually far away. The featured victims are homosexuals or, sometimes, blacks. When two hard-working Indian immigrants were murdered brutally near us, in a Camp Springs donut shop, no reports, columnist or politician spoke of hate crimes. When a homosexual was murdered in Wyoming, liberal politicians, Hollywood stars and press agents flocked on the Mall to demand "hate crimes" legislation favoring homosexuals. This shows why some of us old-line idealists who marched with Martin Luther King feel that the civil-rights movement has lost its way and modern liberalism is morally bankrupt. Do we have the courage to speak against bigotry in our own communities?

The News Review reported this incident because an editor read the crime report and recognized that a hate crime in Greenbelt is news. Nevertheless it went almost unnoticed. We shouldn't give the elite media an excuse to ignore such things by withholding the crime reports. We want the truth known as widely as possible. Where's our sense of outrage?

Both meetings will feature informal roundtable sessions where members can ask questions of county historic preservation staff and of GHI Ad-Hoc Historic District Committee members, followed by informative presentations and more time for questions.

I served for three years on the GHI committee that helped draft the proposed guidelines that would direct GHI maintenance The public is invited to attend the rededication ceremony of "Al's Place," the commemorative sculpture bench created to honor Albert Herling, on Saturday, April 24, at 11 a.m., on the lawn in front of the Greenbelt library. "Al's Place" was commissioned by the Prince George's Arts Council in 1997 in recognition of Albert Herling's lifelong commitment and extraordinary contributions to the arts community in the county. 





to \$80,000 from GHI's real property taxes. The committee also discovered the potential for GHI to be eligible retroactively for tax credits up to five years.

Over the long run, the committee cited that while the tax credit program will save GHI money, there may be requirements in the guidelines that will increase the cost of future maintenance projects.

Tax Credits

Tax credits would not be limited to GHI as a whole. Individual members who build approved additions within the guidelines would qualify for a 10 percent property tax credit. The tax credit would apply only to the county levy and would not be applicable to the other portions of the member's tax liability, such as city taxes and water or sewer charges. Because the cooperative pays GHI's overall property tax bill, the cooperative's fiscal department would allocate the benefits of these additional credits to the individual members making the investments.

Enhanced Protection

The 1997 draft guidelines point out the significance of a county historic district designation. In 1980, the National Register of Historic Places listed Greenbelt as an historic district. Two years ago, the federal government granted the city the highest form of recognition for privately owned historic properties, the National

report states. The Ad Hoc Historic District Study Committee believes that only through county historic district designation would area development proposals, transportation projects, and potential changes to buildings and their settings be reviewed for their effect on the community.







Craze said Springhill Lake is the department's top priority complex. The Parkway apartments were the priority area when the department started four years ago and now it looks better, she said.

To fund the new position Craze proposed raising the apartment license fees to \$50 per apartment unit from \$33, and to \$75 from \$50 for single family rental units. Some councilmembers sounded receptive toward both ideas.

Historic District and Zoning

If the membership of Greenbelt Homes Inc. (GHI) votes to approve making much of the central section of the city an historic district, the Greenbelt City Council will then have to vote on whether to ask the county to designate part of Greenbelt an historic district. This would mean an additional layer of oversight by the county on the city that is not currently required, said Craze. Department staff is troubled, Craze said by the possibilities. Does county oversight merely fall on GHI buildings or would the guidelines apply to every church, building, park and street in the area? For example, if the city does work on the streets, would it be subject to county approval, which it now is not?

The city has been trying to obtain full planning and zoning authority. In view of this, Craze suggests assuming full building code authority. It is like sediment control authority, Craze explained, the city could just assume it. It would mean the city would have more control over the quality of future construction in the city.

Miscellaneous

A Neighborhood Audit Program will be done this year. Walk through inspections will be done in each neighborhood with a special eye toward things that appear to make a neighborhood more or less safe and secure. The results will be shared with the neighborhoods, concerns pinpointed, and solutions sought.

Two traffic calming pilot projects will be completed this fiscal year. They are at Breezewood Drive and Hanover Parkway. Further projects will be considered.

The department's planners have been and will continue to attend the planning process for the proposed development on the large tract of land near the Greenbelt Metro station. This is just west of the city boundaries and currently the only access to the site is via Cherrywood Lane.

Driver Shot, Killed: Police Seek Witnesses

by James Giese A man was shot and killed while driving his vehicle at the interchange of the Capital Beltway and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. The shooting took place on Saturday, April 10 at approximately 3 a.m. According to Pfc Britt Cave of the Greenbelt Police Department, the victim, Troung Duc Le of Takoma Park, 21, and a companion were apparently returning to Takoma Park from a night club in Washington when the shooting occurred. The companion, whose name is being withheld by police because he is a material witness, was also shot, but refused medical treatment.

The shooting occurred on the merge lane of the northbound Parkway ramp with the outer loop of the Beltway. The car, riddled with bullet holes, left the roadway and traveled on adjacent grass land until it came to a stop. Le was pronounced dead at the scene.

According to Cave, the police department is actively investigating leads that were discovered during the

investigation as well as leads obtained from witnesses. The information is considered sensitive and of material importance to the investigation, and, therefore, has not been made available to the public. A brother of the victim told a television reporter that his brother had frequently been in trouble.

Although the Maryland State Police normally handle crimes on state highways, the agency has an agreement with Prince George's County under which criminal cases occuring on state highways will be investigated by the county police. In turn, the county has an agreement with the city that homicides occuring within Greenbelt will be investigated by the city department. The scene of the shooting is barely within the Greenbelt city limits.

Dental Health

In order to remove bacterial plaque from our teeth, we have to see it. This is done with something called a disclosing agent, usually a red dye that stains bacteria. You can buy it at any pharmacy. Apply it with a Q-tip (after you brush and floss). Paint the edge of your gum where it meets the teeth. Move the Q-tip along, up and down, following the gumline. Now rinse and look to see where the stain is. Then brush and floss again. You'll notice that although brushing removes some of the stain at the edge of the gum, it did not get it all BETWEEN the teeth. Only dental floss will get into these areas to remove bacteria. Brushing won't. That's why flossing is so

Do this disclosing daily at first until you really know your mouth, and later three times a week. You really won't know if you've effectively removed plaque if you don't disclose. It's like trying to lose weight without checking yourself on a scale. You need a guideline. The disclosing solution is it.

"If I can do it, anybody can!"

Note: Mary Clarke, the leader of the Earth Day Bike-In of bicycle commuters from Greenbelt, is an attorney with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. She was 49 when she began bicycle commuting 4 1/2_ years ago and wrote this article. She now commutes from Greenbelt to her office in the Ronald Reagan Building where her colleagues are happy that there are showers for bicycle commuters. Her commute is 15 miles one-way.

I was not really a bicycle rider when I started thinking about alternate methods of commuting last fall. Our family had done a lot of riding fifteen years ago with our sons. My husband, Bill, is an avid rider and bicycle advocate. However, I had not been on a bicycle more than a half dozen times in the last decade when the coming of the Green Line of METRO to Greenbelt and the proposed transit-fare subsidy for Federal employees started me thinking about my single occupant automobile commute from Greenbelt to Southwest DC.

There were going to be significant challenges in getting to the transit station without using an automobile since I wear the "attorney uniform" at work. I found a solution to the problem of clothing when I discovered a commuter bag which fits on a standard bicycle rack and carries a suit and a blouse on hangers with room for shoes, lingerie, makeup and all of the other necessities. My purse and calendar planner fit into a standard pannier on the

other side of the rack.

After resolving the clothing problem, it was just a small mental leap to decide that commuting all the way by bicycle was no more difficult than getting to the transit station by bicycle. I began the season committed to the principle of gradualism, recognizing the benefits of the carrot approach to behavior modification. My husband and I rode from Greenbelt to College Park for lunch on weekends. Then we rode to Union Station for lunch and took Metro back to Greenbelt. Finally, I was ready to ride into work by bicycle. Bill met me in Brookland, about one third of the way home, bought me dinner and we took the bicycle home by car. After a couple of once-a-week dinners in Brookland, we extended my after-work commute, and dinner, to College Park. Finally, several weeks after beginning my commut-

ing career, I was able to ride all the way, both ways.

There are no showers yet in my office building, so I sponge off and use lots of baby powder when changing in the bathroom. The pannier garment bag is very successful (except for the day of an important meeting when I forgot the skirt to my suit). I can also carry files in a compartment of the garment bag.

My automobile commute takes from 35 to 50 minutes depending on traffic. My bicycle ride takes 1 hour and 15 minutes in the morning and 1 hour and 30 minutes in the evening. Since I began bicycle commuting, I no longer work out at the fitness center, which took two hours twice a week. I thus realize a small net gain in available time per week. The ride expends approximately 1,200 calories per day and I save \$7 in parking each time. The lost 10 pounds since I began bicycle commuting.




