Greenbelt Couple Peddling Budget Issues and Lake Park To Oregon This Summer Facility Top Council Agenda by Susan Newton

The second public hearing on the proposed \$15 million FY 2000 city budget was the primary focus of the May 24 Greenbelt City Council Meeting. The Council reviewed each change in the budget that had received a majority, but not unanimous, approval at an earlier work session. Most discussion centered around police compensation issues and use of city reserve funds to cover a shortfall of revenue to expenditures. The budget will be officially adopted at the June 7 city council meeting. Council also took up a number of other financial issues.

Police Compensation

A majority of council approved a \$1.35 per hour increase in night differential, funding for an additional 15 master police officers, and an increase in the city contribution to retirement benefits. In arguing for these provisions, councilmember Thomas White stated that these were the top items on the list presented by the Fraternal Order of Police. He felt that the city should try to be responsive to the immediate needs of its rank and file police officers. Long-term salary, benefits and retirement compensation issues will be addressed later in a comprehensive study. Councilmember Rodney Roberts, how-

ever, wanted more detailed information on how the city compares with other local jurisdictions in terms of pay scale and benefits.

Presenting another viewpoint related to the overall budget status, councilmember Alan Turnbull thought that city reserve funds should not be used to cover a \$44,000 budget shortfall caused by recurring expenditures. Greenbelt resident Sylvia Lewis echoed this concern, while City Manager Michael McLaughlin indicated that a number of one-time capital expenditures in this year's budget actually accounted for the shortfall and that these would not be expected in future years.

The adequacy of police staffing in Greenbelt also came up in the budget discussion. Last year, the city authorized hiring four additional officers; several others should be returning soon as well from absences caused by injury or other factors. Citizen Mat Amberg nevertheless thought that the size of the police force was inadequate to patrol the city properly and prevent crime. Mayor Judith Davis felt that the city should wait until the new officers are on board and the redeployment planned by the police chief takes place before making judgments on the need for additional police officers.

Public Works, Recreation and Parks

Council then reviewed proposed additions to the budget in public works, recreation, and parks. Council approved the acquisition of a materials storage shed, an expanded recreation brochure, a new scoreboard for Springhill Lake, additional cleaning staff and tables for the Community Center. Other items included support for winter basketball, a defibrillator for the Aquatics Center, irrigation heads to be rotated among the athletic fields,

Jessica Mealey's Many Talents Win Much Praise and Prizes

She photographs, designs, draws, acts, writes, plays piano, teaches art workshops, and wins art awards - the list continues. The pastimes and accomplishments of a typical 12-year-old? Hardly. Jessica Mealey is a versatile student who lives in Greenbelt and attends Thomas G. Pullen Magnet School for the

Education in Baltimore. The national award ceremony for the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards will take place at the Kennedy Center in Washington on June 19. History of Project

Jessica's idea for her winning project took shape during a photography field trip with her middle school. She photographed a street cafe in Annapolis and subsequently, using a computer, experimented with its colors, shades, and shapes. Jessica remembers that she "had this idea to distort the picture by twirling its center around." Jim Lipiano, her art teacher, encouraged her to do this project. He helped her use an advanced computer graphics program. Now an experienced computer graphics user, Jessica holds a workshop at Surrattsville senior High School in Clinton, showing other students how to use a scanner and computer graphics software to create images. Drama is another passion of Jessica's. She enjoys acting and backstage work, especially lighting. She had the opportunity to run the spotlights for her school's performance of "Anastasia." Currently she is rehearsing a role at the Greenbelt Arts Center in an

the Maryland State Department of interpretation of Edward Lear's poetry. During this coming summer, she will attend a drama camp at Greenbelt.

Greenbelt Activities

Several of Jessica's achievements have occurred within the Greenbelt community. In 1995, she was Little Miss Greenbelt. Later she won second and third place for pastel drawings at the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival Arts Competition in 1997 and 1998, respectively. Jessica also enjoys creative writing, especially poetry, and recently submitted several of her poems to a newspaper. "My mother told me I was always a creative kid," Jessica says. Carol Mealey, Jessica's mother, suggested Thomas G. Pullen School when she noticed her daughter's artistic talent. She enrolled Jessica for the school's kindergarten program. "When I was accepted, I jumped up and down," says Jessica. When she started middle school, which required a short proposal, Jessica did not hesitate to choose a major: visual arts. Thomas G. Pullen School runs through 8th grade. After middle school, Jessica will apply to Suitland High Annex School. See JESSICA, page 5

Recently, Jessica won a Gold Key award in the 1999 Regional Scholastic Exhibition, titled "Arts for Change," where she competed with approximately 3,000 students on a middle and high school level. Only 20 competitors received such an award. On February 17, the Prince George's County Schools Regional Scholastic Art Exhibition honored Jessica for her winning computer graphic work, "Café." The U.S. District Courthouse in Greenbelt hosted the award ceremony.

"Café" went on to a national scholastic art competition in New York, where Jessica won a Silver Key in the category of computer graphic representation of an original photograph. It is uncommon for a middle school student to win an award in this division. Her work is currently on display at

and partial funding for a curator for the Greenbelt Museum. Contributions to the Greenbelt Advisory Committee for the Visual Arts and other community groups wound up the list.

Lowell Owens, speaking on behalf of the Citizens to Conserve and Restore Indian Creek, requested financial support from Greenbelt for their efforts in protecting the wetlands. Owens indicated that College Park had already provided a \$1,000 grant. He asked for a similar level of support from both Greenbelt and Berwyn Heights. He said he also hopes to involve the Springhill Lake community, which is adjacent to the wetlands, in future cleanup projects.

Councilmember Edward Putens raised the issue of support for political action groups. He asked the city attorney to make sure that the city could make such a contribution without supporting a particular political group.

One budget deletion of \$9,000 occurred in savings in the purchase of a street sweeper after an agreement to share costs with New Carrollton, Berwyn Heights, and College Park.

Attick Park Restroom

Included in the current capital budget are \$15,000 in funds for the preliminary design of a restroom facility at the Buddy Attick Park. This item had been recommended in the long-standing master plan for the park. Four responses had been received to the city's Request for Proposals. The city staff has recommended approval of the bid from Greenhorne & O'Mara, which had designed the master plan. Theirs was the lowest bid submitted for both the preliminary design phase and the more detailed design phase.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts objected to a facility with restroom and concession stand (as called for in the master plan). noting problems with the latter but agreeing that a restroom facility is needed. In additional discussion, McLaughlin indicated that this facility might be evolutionary and include a second story which might serve as a bandstand with restrooms below.

other model might be like that in Schrom Hills Park, which includes a restroom and classroom area. McLaughlin indicated that a preliminary work session with the contractor would make the final decision on the scope of the design, in other words what type of facility the council and public want at the Lake Park.

Financial Reporting

New proposals for financial reporting by candidates for city council have been recommended by the city Board of Elections, which reviewed the issue following questions raised by Turnbull almost a year ago. The board recommended retaining the current requirement that specific donations of more than \$25 be reported. They also recommended establishing a new requirement that candidates report a total figure for all donations received (including those of \$25 or less).

The new requirements would also mean that candidates must appoint a treasurer, who would be responsible for submitting Several these reports. councilmembers were surprised that a treasurer was not a current requirement.

White agreed with the Board's recommendation, stating that he felt it provided a fuller picture of election financing and that it "was not only of interest but of educational value to other potential candidates." Mayor Davis suggested that "by authority of the Treasurer" be featured on campaign materials so that those who have questions would know whom to contact and that the materials would be appropriately authorized. City Attorney Robert Manzi indicated that that provision would bring the city in

When drivers concentrate on making turns, they sometimes fail to notice people in the street.

ADVICE:

When you are making a turn, don't concentrate only on traffic. LOOK for both traffic and pedestrians.

When you have a gap in traffic, LOOK both to your right and to your left to make sure there are no pedestrians in your path. What was an empty crosswalk when you first looked may now have a pedestrian in it. Continue to LOOK for pedestrians as you make your turn.

Since car door posts are wide enough to screen a pedestrian from your view as you turn, always LOOK around the posts to make sure there is no one in your path.

Remember that cars are much bigger and much easier to see than pedestrians. Always LOOK for pedestrians (and bicyclists too) and yield to them in the roadway.

STREET CONTRACTORS AND A DESCRIPTION OF THE STREET AND A DESCR

Inside each tooth is the pulp which contains a variety of things including nerves, lymphatics and blood vessels. When this is traumatized or infected by decay, the death or necrosis of the pulp begins. Bacteria then produce pus and gases resulting in pain and swelling. To restore the tooth, the dead and infected tissue must be removed. This is accomplished by cleaning out the dead contents of the pulp chamber, and then destroying any remaining bacteria by instrumentation and flushing with medications. Because the chamber continues into irregular roots, cleansing can be complex. Additional canals off the main one also harbor dying tissue and bac-
