Seven Candidates Vie for Five Seats in City Council Election

Seven candidates will be vying for five city council seats in the upcoming November 2 Greenbelt City Council election. Five incumbents — Mayor Judith Davis, Mayor pro tem Thomas X. White and councilmembers Edward Putens, Rodney Roberts and Alan Turnbull — are running for reelection. Throwing their hats into the ring are challengers Kelby Brick and Robert Auerbach. The filing deadline for candidates was September 20 at 5 p.m.

In previous issues the News Review has printed the biographies of three candidates who had filed earlier: Judith Davis, Kelby Brick and Edward Putens. The biographies were prepared by the candidates.

Rodney Roberts Rodney Roberts, 41 years old,

is a Greenbelt native. He is currently serving his fourth term on council. Roberts owns and operates a small business that specializes in on-site repairs of various types of equipment and vehicles.

Roberts attended nearly every city council meeting during the four years prior to his being elected to City Council in 1991. He became known as an outspoken community activist and was a leader in the citizen movement that resulted in the city's acquisition of 184 acres of woodland, part of the original Green Belt. In 1991, Roberts proposed and worked through to implementation community policing and police bicycle patrols. Roberts is council liaison to the Youth Advisory Board, a member of the Metro Area Sector Planning Group, a member of the Council of Governments Transportation Planning Board, a volunteer for GIVES, a founding member and member of the board of the Greenbelt Foundation for the Arts, and a member and former chair of the Committee to Save The Green Belt.

Officers Buerger & Parker Talk about ERHS Activity

At its September 13 meeting, the Greenbelt City Council heard a report from Corporal David Buerger, the city's original school resource officer, on the past school year. He was accompanied by Pfc. Marty Parker, who, as Buerger's sidekick, has been dubbed "Fries" by students, after their favorite fast food meal.

During the 1998-99 school year, the two officers made 105 arrests for incidents in and around Eleanor Roosevelt High School. Of those, 25 were for trespassing, 23 for disruption (fighting and disorderly conduct), 11 for theft, 7 for weapons, 6 for possession of alcohol, 5 for distribution of marijuana, 4 for possession of marijuana, and 3 for possession of drug paraphernalia.

Buerger said that he spends most of his time on enforcement activities within the school and in the surrounding residential areas, plus Greenway Center. During the school year, Buerger reported placing criminal charges against 82 juveniles and adults. He emphasized, however, that most minor criminal infractions are handled through "diversion" rather than criminal charges. For the 1998-99 school year, he said, 222 juveniles and adults were diverted, through penalties imposed through the school administration or by contacting the parents.

One frustration he faces, he said, is the refusal by the county's Division of Juvenile Justice to prosecute cases if the student has been expelled. Officials claim that to prosecute would constitute double jeopardy, a claim strongly rejected by Buerger, who noted that suspension is a civil action which does not constitute double jeopardy with a criminal action.

During the school year, 250 trespassers were encountered at Roosevelt, 25 of them were criminally charged. Buerger called trespassing the number one security issue at the school. There were also arrests for fighting and disorderly conduct. In September, 1998, there was a large group fight near the front gym steps including youths from Landover and Springhill Lake, which Buerger said stemmed from a long-standing feud between the two neighborhoods. Council Eyes Budget, Y2K Status, Street Sweeper, Pay Increases

At its September 10 regular meeting, the Greenbelt City Council heard reports on the impact of the summer's drought and on the city's Y2K compliance status. They also approved a revised Capital Projects Budget for the current fiscal year.

City Manager Michael McLaughlin reported on this year's drought based upon information from the city. A few annual flowers have been lost but the trees are in good condition. When the governor imposed mandatory water restrictions, the city reduced the showers at the Aquatics and Fitness Center from three minutes to one and plans to stay with the one-minute setting. McLaughlin said that the pool staff had also saved more than 200,000 gallons of water by finding a way to clean the indoor pool without dumping the water. Instead, they switched the water between the outdoor and indoor pools.

new budget increases planned expenditures to \$1.2 million, up from the originally adopted \$1.1 million. Major projects included are \$81,700 for firehouse renovations (new), \$180,000 for street and sidewalk improvements, \$400,000 for repairing and replacing windows in the Community Center, \$126,700 for stream bank stabilization at Greenbelt Lake, \$160,000 for beginning to implement the Attick Park Master department's telephones. In addition, the city may need to make some modifications to its backup generators in case of power problems.

The main emphasis at this point, Ferguson said, is on contingency planning to ensure that the city has staff and systems in place to deal with unexpected problems. City police are now scheduled to work 12-hour shifts (with half the staff on at any given time) from December through January 3. If no Y2K problems arise, these schedules may be revised. All city departments will be required to have adequate staffing to deal with problems. In addition, the city will attempt to speed up deliveries of essential materials like gasoline, in case of later delivery problems caused by the Y2K.

Animation Class-A Joint

Visual Arts/Video Project

"I really want to build a whole animation project...get the kids to work in film festivals...so I am trying to find film festivals across the country and other people interested in children doing animation," said Barbara Simon, director of the Greenbelt Association for the Visual Arts (GAVA) and pioneer of its joint animation project with Greenbelt Access Television (GATE).

Animation is an art form not readily accessible to children and young adults. Thus, Simon, who was "always interested in innovative programs for children," made It a priority to create an animation project in Greenbelt. Two years ago, when George Kochell a freelance cartoonist and teacher - was recommended to her, Simon persuaded him to teach an animation class. Naturally, two visual artists alone could not run an animation project. They needed a camera, editing equipment, and people with experience in filming. Because different artists with various skills and abilities work within the Community Center, the fact that GAVA shared the same building with GATE made the project possible. In 1998, Simon and Kochell asked Douglas Love and Kjell Forsting at GATE to help them develop an animation class for children and teens ages 11 through 16. "Kjell impressed me immediately because he was very excited about doing anything

with children. He had a very profound commitment for children. He was very, very supportive," Simon remembers.

After GATE agreed to allow this joint project with GAVA, Greenbelt had its own successful animation class. Simon believes that only collaborative creation of art, such as with film and theatre, teaches students teamwork. "I wanted to create a program owned by children...the kids take full responsibility: they create the story, the characters; they film and edit it," she explained.

Instead of each student's creating a short film, the project's

Capital Budget

Y2K Compliance

Senior Management Analyst W. Bowman Ferguson reported on the city's Y2K compliance efforts. A formal report summarizing the city's status is available at the city office for public review and comment. The plan will be formally adopted by council on September 27, in order to meet the October 1 deadline for coverage to local governments by insurance and legislation providing limited immunity from lawsuits.

Ferguson noted that most city automation systems are new, including the police and financial systems. All critical systems have been tested and all vendors have been asked to certify their Y2K compliance. The only change needed to date was a minor adjustment to the police

Bus Routes

The new county bus service in Springhill Lake has started with little fanfare from the county, which is waiting until a second bus route begins in October. Information on the new bus route, R-11, is available on the city's Internet site (<www.ci.greenbelt. md.us>) and cable channel B10.



Floyd Levels Trees, **Keeps Crews Busy**

Greenbelt did not escape the fury of Hurricane Floyd last Thursday, according to Bill Phelan, acting Public Works liason in the absesnce of Kenny Hall. Sixteen trees were blown down and a four-person crew worked from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. to clear up the debris. On Friday two crews involving some seven or eight workers worked all day chipping broken branches around the city.

Only one house, on Plateau Place, was hit by a fallen tree, but without serious damage.

Fallen trees, one in Greenbelt East and another on Ivy Lane, blocked traffic, as did two at Greenhill and Crescent Roads. Fences were broken by several pine trees and two or three locust trees fell behind the Citgo station, one hitting a car. Flooding was reported in the basement of the city offices and the Community Center. According to Phelan, three or four more days of work were needed to restore Greenbelt to pre-flood status.




Boxwood News


City Notes

In 1979 the Millers moved to Greenbriar. They would have celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary on October 1.


The Millers were members of the Greenbelt Golden Age Club. Mrs. Miller was a retired president of Hadassah.

more animation classes. At GATE, production manager Christopher Konkel now runs the animation project, and Simon and Kochell are still the GAVA artists in charge. When this was written, animation participants were creating a story on saving the wetlands. The theme for this summer's short film was to "interview" different kinds of animals about the drought.

Kate Spencer, chair of Citizens to Conserve and Restore the Indian Creek (CCRIC), offered her expertise to assist with the children's project. She helped with the claymation animal design, for example, which included wetland creatures like alligators and snakes. as well as rats and rabbits.

GAVA and GATE also found a musician to help with this year's film. Shydi Evans showed the children how to compose film music to communicate emotion. The rough version of the short film was to be shown during GAVA's Labor Day exhibit in the gallery of the Community Center. The edited version will later appear on GATE's cable channel B10.

GAVA's and GATE's animation classes are unique. Few if any communities offer film projects for middle and high school students. "When Beavers Attack" was entered in a film festival and chosen to air during a screening entitled "Crash Test Videos" last April in Largo. 
George Kochell, the animation director, was pleased with the way the project turned out. Chris Konkel, GATE technical director, said he thought the project was a lot of fun.



Buerger's responsibilities as School Resource Officer are limited to Eleanor Roosevelt High School and the surrounding area. Parker spends about half of his time at Roosevelt and the remainder visiting each of the other Greenbelt schools. Parker charged 25 juveniles and adults during the school year, 21 related to incidents at or near Roosevelt and 4 at other schools.

He noted that shortly after the program concluded last year, a student at Springhill Lake Elementary found his father's handgun in his book bag. As taught in the program, he reported to the main office, and his father was called.

State, Feds Grant **Tax Filing Extensions**

Maryland has extended the September 15 deadline for estimated tax payments to September 30 for taxpayers affected by Hurricane Floyd. The extension also applies to taxpayers with corporate, partnership or fiduciary returns that were due on September 15.

The Internal Revenue Service has granted a similar grace period for federal returns.

"Anyone who needs the extra time to file should write 'Hurricane Floyd' at the top of their return," said Maryland State Comptroller William Donald Schaefer. "This is the right thing to do since many state residents, especially on the eastern shore and southern Maryland, spent a lot of time preparing for Floyd and didn't have time to finish their returns."





a street sweeper with the cities of New Carrollton, College Park and Berwyn Heights. Each city would have use of the sweeper for about six weeks per year, according to Acting Director of Public Works Kenny Hall. The four cities will each pay onefourth of the purchase price (roughly \$26,000 per city). Maintenance and operating costs will be prorated based upon street mileage, with Greenbelt responsible for 23 percent.

Pay Increases

Council unanimously approved the reclassifying of several staff positions based upon review of the positions by the human resources officer. The increases include a one-grade increase for the city clerk, who will become an assistant to the city manager, and a two-grade increase for the therapeutic recreation supervisor. **Boards and Committees**

Joi Loretz and Jaime Pereira. **Gun Buyback**

At the request of Councilmember Edward Putens, the Public Safety Advisory Board will be directed to evaluate whether the city should conduct its own gun buyback program,

by the District of Columbia. One issue is whether such a program could be done at the city level, or whether it would be more appropriate at a county level. Some federal funds are now available for buyback programs, and the conditions for those grants will similar to that recently conducted also be taken into consideration.



PULP CAPPING Pulp capping is a technique used by dentists to restore a tooth to health when decay gets dangerously close to a vital pulp. The pulp is the inside portion of a tooth which contains nerves and a blood supply. If the decay goes all the way to a vital pulp, a medicating material is placed directly on the pulp after all decay has been removed. This stimulates the pulp to heal by producing a protective "bridge" under the medication. If the decay is deep but has not yet touched the pulp, a medication is placed at that point which stimulates the remaining dentin to remineralize and harden. The tooth is then restored with a

conventional filling.

If the procedure fails, root canal therapy will be necessary. Why not then do root canal procedures immediately? The answer is that root canal treatment is more involved, takes longer, and is more costlyand in some situations, may not be advisable. It's a judgment call that only your dentist can make.



White began his active community service in 1962 when he served with the Greenbelt Jaycees, the Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt, and on GHI committees. He was elected to the GHI board of directors, the GHI Audit Committee, and served as the treasurer of GHI.
