GHI Board Tells Council Its Concerns at Joint Session

Derelict and very unsightly cars parked on city streets are a real problem as are tight parking conditions, the Greenbelt Homes Inc. (GHI) Board of Directors told the Greenbelt City Council. GHI board members also expressed their great concern about not being notified when GHI issues are to be discussed by the city council. These and other issues were part of a lively discussion at a worksession held on Wednesday, February 9 as part of a series of meetings council has held with property holders in the city to hear their concerns.

GHI board members were very concerned about the problem of cars that do not appear to be moved and/or are unsightly. Several examples of the problem were mentioned, such as a number of unmoved cars parked on Research Road. GHI Director Susan Ready said she had counted 27 cars parked along Ridge Road that still had not been dug out a week after the

big snow storm.

GHI Director Betty Deitch passed around photos of a car that has parked near her house and the nearby playground for years. The covering of the car appeared to be hand sewn with haphazard seams.

Some towns have eyesore ordinances, said Deitch and wondered why something could not be done in Greenbelt. This issue should be looked into, she contin-

Boathouse Will Be Razed At Buddy Attick Park

The boathouse at Buddy Attick Park is nearing its end. At the February 28 regular council meeting, razing the building was approved without discussion as part of the consent agenda.

The building will be taken down as soon as county permits are obtained.

Also discussed during the meeting was the condition of the entrance to Greenway Center from Hanover Parkway, repaving of Hanover Parkway and the deferral of resurfacing of streets in the Lakewood neighborhood.

Boathouse

The boat rental operation has been closed since a drowning in July, 1996. According to City Solicitor Robert Manzi the city terminated the lease in March 1997. At the time of the drowning, the previous owner and Joseph Johnson were in discussions with council to transfer the lease to him, but the transfer was never

approved as required by the lease.

Joseph Johnson presented his position under "Petitions and Requests." Now that all legal actions related to the drowning have been settled and he was found not to have been at fault, Johnson declared himself "very interested" in resuming the business. He said that he had not abandoned the business, rather the city had sent him several letters saying that he could not operate until the legal proceedings were complete. Johnson threatened legal action if the city refused to allow him to operate and did not offer him reasonable settlement for the value of the business and the lost revenue while the business was closed.

Manzi saw matters differently. He said that "In my opinion, there is no lease." Prior even to its termination by the city, it had run out on its own terms, he

Greenbelt Native Wins GRAMMY

Joan McFarland, who grew up in Greenbelt, was awarded a GRAMMY last week for "best choral performance" by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences. The GRAMMY is the recording industry's most prestigious award. McFarland, director of the Maryland Boy Choir, was present last Wednesday at the awards ceremony in Los Angeles.

The GRAMMY was awarded for a performance of Benjamin Britten's "War Requiem," which was performed and recorded at the Kennedy Center in 1995 and

released on a CD last year. The co-winners were Robert Shafer, conductor of both the Washington Chorus and Orchestra and the Shenandoah Conservatory Choir, and Betty Scott, who was the founding director of the Maryland Boy Choir. (Greenbelters may remember Scott, who grew up in Greenbelt and then taught music briefly at the Greenbelt North End Elementary School in the late 1960s.)

Greenbelters Tom Hindsley and Kurt Nelson were members of the Maryland Boy Choir in the 1994-95 season, and sang in the See GRAMMY, page 12

Local Police Program Caught in Ironic Bind

Catch 22 has struck Greenbelt again. This time it explains why the \$2.4 million COPs in Schools program cannot be used to fund Greenbelt's very effective police presence at Eleanor Roosevelt High School, the first such program in the county. The grant will be used to hire 20 county police officers to perform community oriented policing activities in local high schools, but like most federal funding the money applies exclusively to new programs, not to those already in existence. Greenbelt was a pioneer in ensuring that there would be a police presence, regrettably a necessity nowadays, at ERHS, and lobbied hard to use a member of the local police force, in the person of Greenbelt police corporal David Buerger.

"We're being penalized again for being ahead of the curve," commented Lt. Mike Craddock of the Greenbelt Police Department. "I guess if we'd just sit back and wait for someone else to take the lead, we could jump on the bandwagon." He noted that another example of Greenbelt's leading the way was in the DARE or Drug Abuse Resistance Education program.

The City of Greenbelt recently applied to federal, state, and county agencies for funding Mayor in the Hat to help support its school policing efforts, without success. A plea to County Councilwoman this matter did not help.

The county's COPs in Schools program is not identical to Greenbelt's. County officers are supposed to do a certain amount of training in the true of the Greenbelt approach. The latter is more flexible, to allow officers to respond to particular needs. Greenbelt had planned to assign classes. one police officer to all the schools in town, but it soon became apparent that Eleanor Roosevelt alone would keep an officer busy all day.

It appears that the only way of the \$2.4 Million grant funds would be to abolish the successful program that was develwould be followed by the as-Eleanor Roosevelt, rather than a dents in the lower grades. Greenbelt officer, as at present. Neither the school nor the city would welcome this change. Corporal Buerger has been a popular fixture at the school for almost five years, and the general feeling is, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

There seems to be something unjust about Greenbelt being penalized for being forward-looking Then again, that's Catch 22.



said. Although council had held a worksession to consider the transfer of the lease, Johnson had never supplied the additional information council had requested, so council never approved the transfer, as is required by the lease. He said that the real problem is between Johnson and the previous owner, not Johnson and

Greenway Center

The condition of the entrance to Greenway Center Drive off Hanover Parkway was raised by Sheldon Goldberg, of the Greenbelt East Advisory Committee and by Councilmember Edward Putens. The entrance has deteriorated badly and some motorists have damaged their cars driving through the large potholes. The driveway is located on a piece of private property that was left out when the shopping center was sold. The original owner, however, stopped paying taxes on it. Late last year the county became the owner of the property when no one bid on it during a tax sale. The county is reluctant to make repairs to it using tax dollars. (And, for that same reason, Manzi advised council against making repairs.)

City Manager Michael McLaughlin said that the county staff has talked about closing the entrance. However, as both he and Manzi (who was the attorney for Greenway Center during its development) recalled, a second point of egress was required for approval of the site plan. McLaughlin has directed the Department of Planning and Community Development to investigate the city's options.

Hanover Parkway Issues

Council unanimously agreed to defer the resurfacing of streets in the Lakewood neighborhood until this summer or fall (the next fiscal year). Instead, the funds will be used to repair Hanover Parkway from Greenbrook Drive to Megan Lane. Staff recommended this change in priorities, based upon the rapid deterioration of Hanover Parkway this winter.

On a 3-1 vote, with Councilmember Alan Turnbull opposed, council also agreed to request partial funding of the work from Prince George's County. When the county extended Hanover Parkway to Good Luck Road, it constructed the road to the specification of a rural residential road, which is "completely inadequate" in McLaughlin's opinion, for the traffic on the roadway. McLaughlin said that the road, which connects Greenbelt Road to Good Luck Road and beyond to Annapolis Road, should have been constructed as an arterial roadway, which has an asphalt base layer, rather than being built directly on compacted soil.

Turnbull had earlier urged council not to make this request, saying that the city accepted the road as constructed. He felt that the city had more legitimate claims for county assistance. Councilmember Edward Putens agreed, but said that he would not hesitate to ask in a courteous letter. In the end, that approach was approved.

Council approved construction of bus shelters at three locations, all along Hanover Parkway in Greenbelt East. Shelters will be across constructed Greenbrook Drive, in the 7800 block of Hanover Parkway in Greenbriar, and at Hunting Ridge.

Other Actions Mayor Judith Davis presented Kevin Hammett, chair of the Millennium Task Force with a certificate signed by President and Mrs. Clinton designating Greenbelt as a Millennium

As Dr. Metts' first academic year with the county schools nears its end, ACE is interested in learning more of her views on the state of education in Prince George's County. Dr. Metts has been asked to discuss her goals for Prince George's County public schools and her plans to achieve them. ACE and the Greenbelt community are also interested in learning about how to involve municipalities and parents in the plans to improve schools, as well as budget proposals and boundary changes.

Citizens who attend the forum will have an opportunity to address Dr. Metts and pose other questions of concern to them.

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

The current ordinances do state the vehicle must be operable. Director Chuck Hess asked how the city determined if a vehicle was operable. These cars affect property values, he said. City Manager Michael McLaughlin explained that the city's parking enforcement officer, using his experience, eyeballs the vehicle to judge whether it is operable and also can contact the owner of the vehicle.

City councilmembers were clearly not as heated about the problem, but agreed to ask the city's solicitor and director of planning and development about the issue.

On other traffic issues city council told the GHI representatives that if there were areas in GHI that seemed to need permit parking and if there were issues related to permit parking they wanted discussed, then they should inform council of their interest and council would hold a meeting to dis-

Green Ridge House Parking

The issue of what to do about parking at and near Green Ridge House has been ongoing and flared up at this worksession. Ridge Road resident Brian York expressed his displeasure with the tight parking situation. It is "a dog eat dog world on that block at night," he said and "last night my choices were down near Southway or near the dentist office."

The number of cars related to Green Ridge House increases every year, claimed Ridge Road resident Ron Jewel. In 1993 there were 30 cars, in early 1999 47 cars, and in late 1999 54 cars related to Green Ridge House, he said. The planned parking lot is not even built and it is already filled to capacity, Jewel claimed, and the city's count of cars related to Green Ridge House was not accurate since it did not include nurses and lovers of Green Ridge House residents. Mayor Judith Dayis admonished that this topic will require its own special meeting.

Notify GHI

GHI board members were clearly not happy that a tree removal issue they had discussed at a number of meetings was discussed at a city council

meeting and they were not notified beforehand that it would be discussed. They requested that GHI be informed in written form if any issue affecting GHI would be discussed at a city council meeting. McLaughlin replied that they would be added to the list of those who receive the final city council agenda. Davis suggested that directors take turns attending city council meetings.

City Councilmember Thomas White explained that in that case involving the possible removal of a tree in 56 court Road, City Crescent Councilmember Rodney Roberts added the item to the agenda that night because a citizen requested it. This is one way an item can appear on the city council's agenda.

Other Issues

GHI representatives asked about the status of the city's review of the proposal to designate a large part of the central core of Greenbelt an historic district. The city's Advisory Planning Board is reviewing it piece by piece and finds it has a lot to discuss, said Davis.

The mayor asked about the GHI tree management program. One fifth of the area of GHI is worked on every year. Trees are pruned and removed explained General Manager Gretchen Overdurff. Probably 20 - 25 trees are removed a year at a cost of about \$400 each, with the total yearly tree budget of \$100,000 continued Director Bill Phelan. A tree is planted for every one removed.

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
