Electric Power Supplier Choices Discussed at City Council Forum

The Greenbelt City Council held a forum on July 24 to discuss issues surrounding the opening of the electricity market to individual choice. Pepco has always been the supplier of electricity to the Greenbelt area, but beginning on July 1, new regulations allow customers to choose their own source of power. Some homeowner associations, such as Greenbelt Homes Inc., have already been investigating the use of a different source.

The council invited Gunter Elert, Regulatory Economist, Maryland Public Service Commission, to provide background information on this issue. Representatives from Greenbelt housing groups, including GHI, Boxwood, and Greenbelt East were also present. After many questions, it appeared that individuals do not need to rush into a change in electric supplier; there has been a slow movement toward advertising new suppliers; and the percentage savings promised by Pepco may be as good a deal as an individual homeowner or group of homeowners can expect to get in the near future.

Chain of Command

Elert described what the roles of the various players are or will be in the new electricity market. At the base level is the power source that actually provides the electricity. In the Greenbelt area that source is Pepco. Now, there will be an electricity supplier that buys power from the source and sells it to the customer. However, to add to customer confusion, companies like Pepco and Baltimore Gas and Electric can be both suppliers and power

At the highest level is another group known as aggregators who try to put together (aggregate) groups of customers to help the

supplier have the right mix of customers to be able to buy electricity at its cheapest rate. In addition, marketers may be contacting individual customers to try to switch them to a new supplier.

GHI members heard from an aggregator at their annual meeting in May who promised to get them the best deal in electricity for a percentage of the savings. However, GHI member Joyce Abel, who is working on this is-

sue for GHI, does not know how many members have signed up for the new service. In response to a question from councilmember Tom White, Abel responded that there was no threshold number of members that needed to change to obtain service through this aggregator.

However, Alan Turnbull, who is a councilmember as well as a GHI member, stated that the aggregator apparently has not yet found a better rate since those who switched are still being billed by Pepco. Elert said this may not be the case as the supplier does not have to indicate where power is coming from and Pepco could still be doing the billing.

David Moran, assistant to the City Manager, reported a conversation with a representative from Greenbriar management who indicated that, since their electric usage is heavy in the evenings and on weekends, it may not be possible for them to obtain a better rate than Pepco is currently offering. Abel concurred, saying that GHI was told that they have a similar usage imbalance.

Discussion Councilmember Ed Putens from homeowner associations.

questioned who was going to benefit from this change: "Is it just for big business?" Elert "suspects that big business will benefit the most" but that the legislation states that residential customers must receive a 3.5 to 7.5 percent decrease in base bills. Pepco is offering a 7 percent savings. He indicated, however, that under the legislation, aggregators are working for the individual customer and not the

Responding to a question that many customers have received no offers from electric suppliers, Elert opined that, in retrospect, July was probably not a good time for the legislation to go into effect as the summer is often a time of power shortage, not glut. He feels that by the fall customers will be receiving offers in the mail and by phone.

White asked how customers will know what prices various suppliers are charging. Elert indicated that the Maryland Office of the Attorney General is supposed to be putting out a list of 'standard offer" services, which are the prices to be compared. However, he thinks that the list has not been made available yet. Due to the high cost of mass mailings, it appears that few companies will send information to everyone. Pepco inserted a postcard in a bill that could be returned to get a packet of infor-

It appeared that after listening to the presentation by Elert and his responses to the many questions, council now viewed this meeting as a first step in learning more about the electricity changes and that there is no rush to make a change. Putens suggested that a next step would be to invite several aggregators to a meeting with representatives

Hanover Roundabout Due For Completion This Week

According to Celia Craze, director of planning and community development, the roundabout on Hanover Parkway, which is currently under construction, is scheduled to be finished by the end of July. A design modification will provide for better deflection of traffic and intersection control, and is intended to be more effective in supplying traf-

After the roundabout is completed, curbs and gutters will be poured, backfill will be done and the island and a crosswalk will be filled with "stamped and colored" asphalt. Instead of concrete, this lower-cost method uses a pattern which is stamped into the asphalt and then colored in. After all of this work is done, the developer of Greenbelt Lake Village will come in and repave this section of Hanover Parkway.

The roundabout was planned because residents had problems getting out of their development; the posted speed limit was being exceeded and the volume of traf-

fic was high. However, not enough traffic was coming out of the side streets to justify stop signs or traffic lights.

Craze commented that the circle should provide a successful solution for pedestrians. If it works as well as expected, the city will have "a path to follow" to remedy similar problems in the

In reference to the ongoing repairs of Hanover Parkway adjacent to Hunting Ridge, the project's cost was greater than expected because of problems with poor subsoil conditions under the roadway. Excavation to a deeper level than planned had to be carried out to address the is-

Hanover Parkway was extended to Good Luck Road in the late 80s, under a Prince George's County Capital Improvement Program. The county has not contributed to the repair. Negotiations between the city and the county are still ongoing but have not been fruitful thus far, according to Craze.

Mayors Pilski and Weidenfeld

Former mayors Richard R. (Dick) Pilski and Gil Weidenfeld were inducted into the Maryland Municipal League (MML) Hall of Fame on June 13 during the MML annual convention in Ocean City. The Hall of Fame recognizes extraordinary service to the public. This recently established recognition is awarded to current elected officials of member municipalities in appreciation for 20 or more years of service as elected officials.

This year, however, an exception was made to allow the nomination of officials who had completed their years of service prior to the establishment of the Hall of Fame. Both men met these criteria. Pilski and Weidenfeld each served 11 twoyear terms for a total of 22 years as Greenbelt elected officials. Each served as mayor as well as a member of the city council.

Dick Pilski

Dick Pilski has been a Greenbelter since 1958. First elected to the council in the early 60s with one short break, he served until 1985. For six of those years, he was mayor. During a 1993 celebration honoring Pilski's many contributions to the city, then-mayor Weidenfeld singled out some of Pilski's many accomplishments, including his support for the construction of Green Ridge House and support of the city's first multimillion dollar bond issue. The construction of the new police station, the renovation of the outdoor swimming pool, the construction of the indoor pool and the purchase of green space were made possible

by these bonds, Weidenfeld noted.

After living in two homes in old Greenbelt, Pilski and his wife, Claire, moved to Greenbelt East, where they have lived for about 15 years. He is involved in a number of activities, including his position as a member of the State Medical Arbitration Board, which considers medical malpractice complaints. He works part-time in real estate for Century 21 Trademark and continues to devote many hours a week to charitable activities.

Gil Weldenfeld

Gil Weidenfeld and his wife, Micki, first lived in Greenbelt in Springhill Lake. In a News Review interview in 1994, he indicated that he ran for the city council in 1971 because "I wanted a community center for

Springhill Lake." That was the beginning of his career with the city. He served on the city council from 1971 to 1993, including 14 years as mayor. Weidenfeld was proud of his role in renovating Roosevelt Center and he took an active role in the city's 50th anniversary celebration.

Too Much Secrecy?

It is time for the Greenbelt City Council to come out into the open about its open space plans. Two matters have come to our attention since we prepared our June 29 editorial. On June 26, the Monday before our editorial, but not known to most of us until later, council voted to give to District Heights state open space funds allocated to Greenbelt that Greenbelt could have used either to make park improvements or to buy park land. In return, District Heights is to give Greenbelt an equal open space allocation, but one that can be used only to buy land. Although this request was made on May 26 and not acted upon until a month later, the only public notice citizens were given was the cryptic line in the published agenda, "City of District Heights- Program Open Space Request." Especially since council has yet to discuss its open space plans with the citizens, we question the wisdom of this swap. We see no benefit to Greenbelt in this deal, particularly when the city expects to make expensive playground improvements that remain unfunded. We think council acted precipitously in granting this request at the same meeting when it was first announced.

The second disturbing action of council was to hold an executive session on Wednesday, July 12. As we understand it, the meeting's purpose was to discuss land acquisition at the Jaeger tract, according to Mayor Judith Davis, and to an oral communication received "from our federal representative making an offer," according to Rodney Roberts. This relates to the acquisition of a vacant parcel of the Jaeger tract located outside the city limits for addition to the National Park Service's Greenbelt Park. The residents of Westchester Park are trying to prevent development of that land. Most of the Jaeger tract was developed in the '60s as the Westchester Park townhouse and apartment complex. It is located on Kenilworth Avenue, next to the park.

We suspect that the proposal considered behind closed doors is for Greenbelt to give up some of its open space monies to help buy this land for the benefit of Westchester Park and the National Park Service. A public proposal has already been made by one city councilmember to use \$100,000 of city open space funds for this purpose. We think proposals made by public officials deserve public scrutiny and public comment, not consideration and possible commitment behind closed doors.

More than ever, we believe that it is time for the Greenbelt City Council to tell the citizens what its plans and priorities are regarding open space and to allow those citizens to join in the discussion.





Charles Nelson

Charles Burdette Nelson (Chuck), 50, of Lakecrest Drive, died on Wednesday, July 19,

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Local Resident Offers Holistic Therapies in Center Spa

Five years ago when Greenbelt resident Gwen Vaccaro walked into the basement of a vacant Roosevelt Center building, mildew-covered walls greeted her. Undeterred, Vaccaro hung her shingle, Pleasant Touch, and began offering massages, facials, waxing, and make up services to the public.

"I feel real good about contributing to my town," said the 24year resident. "I never wanted it (my business) anywhere else than in the heart of Greenbelt, downtown Greenbelt."

Vaccaro, who is also a registered and holistic nurse and esthetician, recently completed advanced allergy elimination treatments (NAET) in California and has added them to her repertoire. She studied under Dr. Devi Nambudripad, who discovered this technique more than a decade ago. Vaccaro finished the basic training in December and returned to Orange County and completed the advanced classes in March. NAET uses neurological muscular testing to detect allergies in clients by exposing them to allergens in vials and treat them with massages and breathing techniques.

"I came in the back door with massage therapy," Vaccaro said. "This is a vision that has evolved." Her vision began at the Baptist Hospital School of Nursing in Columbia, SC, where she learned massage techniques as part of her training. From there, she worked in various hospitals, teaching at Mercy Hospital in Portland, ME, and serving as a surgical nurse in the old Doctors Hospital in Washington, D.C. Then, while caring for her late husband and 1997 Greenbelt Outstanding Citizen, Michael Vaccaro, she went out and became a Mary Kay consultant. Later, she worked in massage and esthetician shops, while earning certificates in those fields, along with holistic nursing training.

Today, Vaccaro blends these experiences and skills in her work at Pleasant Touch, which is a family affair. Vaccaro's daughter, Angela, is the office manager, and her son Jay is the bookkeeper. Greenbelters Bethan Thomas and Kelly Irving are also estheticians and massage therapists employed at the shop.

"I'm very impressed with her work and with her personally," said Diane Hill of Seabrook, who has gotten a monthly facial for the last 13 years from Vaccaro.

Arianne Gregory of Washington, DC sought out Vacaro's alpha-hydroxy acid facials in the mid-90s to treat the effects of teenage acne.

"She was so nice. She talked to me and explained things to me," said Gregory who was in her mid-20s at the time.

"No matter how many questions I asked she never got tired or insulted. She let me participate in my skin's rebirth."

Asked about massage, Vaccaro says, "muscles talk to me." She has developed a unique skill in tailoring massages to special needs, her clients say, particularly those with chronic muscle pain.

Vaccaro said her shop has come a long way since its mildew days. Low lights bounce off softly painted walls while background music plays, and sometimes, the

sounds and vibrations from the movies at the Old Greenbelt Theatre. One thing, however, has remained the same. "I want to take care of people and see them as a whole - mind, body, spirit," she said. "This is a therapeutic space."
