## Democrats Outnumber Republican Voters in City, County and State

Slightly fewer than 8,800 Greenbelters are registered and likely to vote in next week's election, according to the Prince George's County Board of Elections. Although less than the total of 10,000 Greenbelters reported to be registered for the primary, these people are considered to be "active" registrants. "Active" means that they have voted in at least one of the last two presidential elections.

#### Polling Locations

The four Greenbelt polling locations will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday, November 7. Greenbelters from the center of the city, precinct 3, will vote at the Greenbelt Community Center, 15 Crescent Road. Residents in precinct 6, the North End, will vote at Greenbelt Elementary School, 66 Ridge Road; Springhill Lake residents, precinct 8, will vote at Springhill Lake Elementary School, 6060 Springhill Drive; and voters in precinct 13, Greenbelt East, will vote at Eleanor Roosevelt High School, 7601 Hanover Parkway.

In Greenbelt, Democrats outnumber Republicans by 4 to 1. Of Greenbelt's total active registered voters, 67 percent are Democrats, 16 percent are Republicans, and less than 1 percent are registered as belonging to the Green, Reform, or Libertarian par-See REGISTRATION page 5

## Most State Politicians Are Ignoring State in Election

There's a big election coming up this Tuesday with the outcome in doubt as to who will be president of this country, but you wouldn't know it listening to Maryland television or radio commercials. The political parties and their presidential candidates are ignoring this state. Democratic presidential candidate Al Gore thinks that Maryland is in the bag for him, so he is off campaigning in states where the outcome is still in doubt. Republican presidential candidate George W. Bush has written Maryland off as a state where he can score a victory. He too is in other states. Neither candidate is spending much on advertising here either. Even Maryland's Democratic Governor Parris Glendening is reported to be off campaigning for Gore in other states.

The one statewide contest also has engendered little excitement. The polls predict and the political pundits expect incumbent Democratic Senator Paul Sarbanes to win his fifth term by handily defeating Republican Paul H. Rappaport.

The only other contest for elected office that Greenbelters are asked to vote on is that of Congressman for the Fifth Congressional District of Maryland. This district includes all of Greenbelt, most of Prince George's County outside the Beltway, the southwestern half of Anne Arundel County as well as all of Calvert, Charles and St. Mary's Counties. Here too, there appears to be little doubt as to the outcome. Incumbent Steny H. Hoyer is expected to handily defeat Republican challenger Thomas E. "Tim" Hutchins. Hoyer's top political aide is reported to be in the midwest, working for Democratic candidates there.

Voters in Greenbelt also are expected to give strong support to the three Democratic candidates, as the city continues to be a stronghold for the Democratic Party. In 1992, Greenbelt cast 63% of its votes for Democrat Bill Clinton. In 1996, Greenbelters helped Clinton stay in office by casting 73% of its votes for the Democrat. Greenbelters have been equally supportive of Sarbanes and Hoyer.

Also on the ballot are the names of seven sitting appointed judges up for voter approval (or disapproval). There are no opposition or alternative candidates. For the seventh circuit of the Circuit Court voters are asked to vote for the five incumbents: Herman C. Dawson, G. R. Hovey Johnson, Maureen M. Lamasney, Ronald Dean Schiff, and Michael Patrick Whalen. For circuit 4 of the Court of Special Appeals, voters are asked to vote yes or no for Glenn T. Harrell, Jr., and for at large, Peter B. Krauser.

#### Gore

Al Gore, 51, Democratic Candidate. The son of a senator, Gore has been in politics most of his life, as a congressman and senator from Tennessee and for the past eight years as vice president. Before that he was a newspaper reporter for seven years. He has a B.S. from Harvard and attended first divinity school and later law school at Vanderbilt.

As vice president with President Clinton, Gore has asserted greater influence on the administration's operations than any other holder of this office. He is particularly noted for his efforts to downsize government by streamlining some of its operations. Gore has taken a popuGore selected as his running mate Joe Lieberman, a senator from Connecticut. Lieberman is the first person of the Jewish faith to be nominated by a major political party to be vice president.

#### Bush

George W. Bush, 53, Republican Party. The son of a president, the grandson of a senator and the brother of a governor, Bush is currently governor of Texas, halfway through his second four-year term. A graduate of Yale University (B.A.) and Harvard University (M.A.), Bush was involved in oil drilling and exploration and other business enterprises including becoming the general manager and part of their Social Security funds in private investments and wants to cut income taxes across the board. He and his wife Laura have twin teenage daughters.

Dick Cheney was selected as Bush's running mate for vice president. Cheney was Secretary of Defense during the "Desert Storm" invasion of Iraq and has also served in Congress representing a district in Wyoming. More recently he has been an executive in the oil industry.

#### Browne

Harry Browne, 67, Libertarian Party. Browne was a successful investment advisor for 30 years and has written 11 books that have sold over 2 million copies. He married Pamela Lanier Wolfe in 1985 and has one grown daughter, Autumn. Born in New York City, he grew up in Los Angeles and currently resides in Franklin, Tennessee. ## Why Vote?

So if the election here in Greenbelt is already decided, with Gore, Sarbanes and Hoyer all expected to win handily, why vote?

If you support these Democratic candidates, your vote is needed to prove that the Maryland state polls are correct and that this city's electorate does support the party's three candidates. The greater a plurality they receive, the greater will be their mandate to do the things that they promised to do. If you favor the Republican candidates, on the other hand, you need to be part of a big turnout in case the Democrats stay home so there can be a surprise upset. Also, the greater vote your candidates receive, even if they lose, the greater the chance that their views will be listened to and credence given to them by those in office.

Even more important, your vote will count in the presidential election toward the total number of votes cast. Nationally, pollsters regard the presidential contest as a toss up, and your vote could help give a national mandate to govern to the candidate of your choice. If you don't like either of the two leading presidential candidates, you still should vote, because you have four others among whom to choose who represent a broad political spectrum.

Still another reason to vote is to support or oppose the repeal of term limits for the Prince George's County Council and County Executive. This issue was closely decided in 1992 and the vote could be close once more. Your vote could make the difference.

But the most important reason to vote is that you have been given an essential right by our federal constitution, the right to participate in the selection of those who govern you. You can freely vote the rascals out, or prevent the rascals from getting in, without fear of retribution or retaliation. Failure to exercise these rights in other places has led to the downfall of democratic government. This country can only remain a country by the people, for the people and of the people if all of us as citizens do our job and exercise our vote.

The person or a duly authorized agent must appear in person at the office of the Board of Elections, seven days prior to the election through the day of the election (prior to the polls closing). ## **Herling Concert Tribute Benefits the Community**

As a youngster growing up, music of my father, matched by fingers of alacrity and speed, it is no mystery as to why I grew up filled with fondness for the classics, be it Beethoven or Bach, Mozart, Grieg or Chopin. Not only was my father capable of conveying the powerful passages of these composers, but also the texture and softer portions which would draw me more into the piece to listen all that much more carefully. One can only imagine what it was like when Professor Santiago Rodriguez first met Albert Herling. After all, his skill, passion for music and understanding of the respective composer was just one way in which Al Herling communicated with friends and music lovers alike. While he always described himself as a "professional amateur," it was more a statement reflecting his many interests, be it labor relations, both professionally and voluntarily as chair of the city's Employee Relations Board, or in promoting an environment that stimulated the mind and heart, expressed through his hard work to persuade Prince George's County to build the new library it had promised, or his critical involvement in helping to found the Greenbelt Arts Center and the Prince George's Arts Council. And yet, my father, who had last played on a professional basis over 50 years earlier, was inspired by this most talented artist, Santiago Rodriguez.

Rodriguez, who was the Silver Award winner of the Van Cliburn competition in 1981, is critically acknowledged as one of the finest pianists on the international scene. But it was Rodriguez's sense of humanity and the experiences that he felt in common with the composers themselves which Rodriguez interpreted and conveyed. And it

was this common understanding and approach which probably brought Herling and Rodriguez closer together. My father, who was always thinking about the future, dedicated his last concert to raise funds for the Greenbelt Arts Center and the University of Maryland Music Scholarship Fund. It was in this spirit, thinking of the pianists of the future, that Rodriguez proposed that the Greenbelt Arts Center present an annual piano concert. A concert which would inspire talented young artists to have a chance to bask in the spotlight, at a nice facility such as the auditorium at Eleanor Roosevelt High School. An event which might give such artists the exposure and experience to possibly launch a career. The concert would be one to showcase young artists of the new millennium, and to raise funds for a new performing arts center and other worthy causes.

ties combined (see chart). Those who consider themselves to be Independents or Declines (for declining to choose a party) represent 17 percent of registered voters or a slightly higher percentage than registered Republicans. The Declines figures also include a very small number of persons who belong to the Constitution or other parties not of a size to be broken out separately.

Democrats outnumber Republicans by almost 2 to 1 at the State level and by 5 to 1 in Prince George's County. This year's figures for the 5th Congressional District indicate that in the Prince George's County section of the district, Democrats outnumber Republicans by almost 3 to 1. However, the 5th District also includes all of St. Mary's, Calvert and Charles Counties as well as part of Anne Arundel County, areas often thought to be more conservative than Prince George's County.

In the 1996 Presidential election, 69 percent of active and inactive registered Greenbelters went to the polls and voted. The distribution of registered voters was similar to this year's. In 1996, Greenbelters cast 73 percent of their votes for Bill Clinton and 24 percent for Robert Dole. The north end of town, with a somewhat smaller percentage of registered Democrats, cast only 63 percent of its votes for Clinton; Springhill Lake, with a higher percentage of registered Democrats, cast 85 percent of its votes for the incumbent president.

Greenbelt East Advisory Committee have already approved a site plan for the facility. However, there is a covenant on the land which specifies that the property could only be used for commercial office space. If approved, the resolution will enable the city to pursue condemnation of the property, a move which would invalidate that covenant.

#### **Theater Acquisition**

A report was presented on the possibility of the city's acquiring the Greenbelt Theater to help it remain open. The overwhelming majority of those speaking at the hearing or contacting the city by email had been in support of the city's acquiring the theater. A number of questions would have to be answered, however, if the city were to take this step, McLaughlin explained, and council agreed to an executive session on October 25, continued on October 30, to deal with those issues.

In answer to a council question, McLaughlin explained that funds raised by the Friends of the Greenbelt Theatre (FOGT) and currently held by the city are dispersed as requested by FOGT. He indicated that this situation was temporary since FOGT was now applying for tax exempt status to raise and distribute its funds.

#### **Transportation Issues**

Greenbelt's position on a number of transportation issues was clarified in response to the State of Maryland's annual program for capital improvements to the transportation system, called the Consolidated Transportation Program. While no major construction projects in the program are planned for Greenbelt, there are minor projects, including the construction of a double left turn lane from MD 193 (Greenbelt Road) to Cherrywood Lane, and a study of streetscape improvements on MD 193 from Route 1 to Mandan Road. Also listed is the widening of MD 201 (Kenilworth Avenue) from Cherrywood Lane to Sunnyside Avenue, a project just outside the city limits. There is also

velopment and evaluation of a full interchange at the Greenbelt Metro Station to serve the Metroland development and for extending Kenilworth Avenue to intersect with U.S. 1, though no funding is included for construction or right-of-way acquisition.

A meeting of elected officials will be held on November 8 to comment on the transportation and program and councilmember Alan Turnbull volunteered to represent the city. Council agreed to restate the city's concerns over the Kenilworth Avenue and Greenbelt Metro projects, to request funding for the Greenbelt Road streetscape improvements and to seek funding for a pedestrian overpass in Greenbelt. On the latter issue, it had not escaped council's notice that Bowie had obtained an overpass on Route 50 at the new Bowie Towne Center site.

Turnbull also wanted to urge State transportation officials to spend more transportation funds on public transport and less on roads. While work on sidewalks in some areas would be postponed until after street improvements, he wanted to remind the officials that sidewalks are important and should be included in future plans.

Councilmembers also discussed the volume of traffic exiting the Greenbelt Metro station and the difficulty sometimes of turning right with the long line of cars waiting to turn left. Council agreed to ask that this intersection be studied for a possible change in markings and traffic turn patterns.

#### **Legislative Program**

Council's annual dinner with the city's state legislative delegation and county council representatives will be held on November 28. In preparation for that meeting council discussed and honed its list of legislative priorities for the upcoming year. At the top of the list is a state bond issue for construction of an addition to Springhill Lake Recreation Center, followed by another bond issue for renovation of the Greenbelt theater (if acquisition is approved). #### Theater's Financial Future Reflects Serious Melodrama

The public hearing on Wednesday, October 18, where Greenbelters had discussed the city's possible acquisition of the Old Greenbelt Theatre became the most emotionally charged subject on October 26 at the meeting of the Friends of the Old Greenbelt Theatre (FOGT).

"It used to be a lot of fun running the theater. It is not anymore. It is a hassle," said theater operator Paul Sanchez. He does not believe that the theater will ever be able to sustain itself without the city's subsidy. Sanchez illustrated how aggravating the situation is for him by exclaiming: "People call me (Sanchez) for the money!"

Sanchez also said that even though he is grateful for the support by FOGT, "I don't want a few people to pay for the operation of the theater." According to Sanchez and others, the theater either has to significantly increase its attendance, or the whole community has to pick up the tab (by means of a city subsidy).

As of the previous Thursday, FOGT had raised \$5,000. President Kevin Denney announced that he just received a check of over \$1,000 from a generous Greenbelter to be paid toward the theater's debt of between \$9,000 and \$10,000. Sanchez said that if the remaining \$4,000 to \$5,000 can be raised, "There is a good chance the theater will stay open until the end of the year."

To answer questions in terms of the theater's possible closure. publicity manager Andrew Carruthers said, "We are not certain what the next immediate milestone by the city is." Carruthers reminded the group, however, that the city is aware that "the community is rallying strongly (in favor of the city purchasing the theater)." Sanchez claimed, "In the meantime, the



theater will stay open until something happens." Everyone is now impatiently awaiting the city's decision.

Suggestions for Action

In order to insure that the theater will have a future in Old Greenbelt, and in order to speed up the city's actions, several FOGT members made suggestions. Jorge Bernardo recommended a "good faith payment to (landlord) Christacos." A woman who asked not to be identified suggested asking the city to match the amount already raised by FOGT in order to pay off the theater's debt now.

Bernardo's earlier idea of the impending Filmathon on November 11 sparked hope and comments from his fellow members. Gary Stone of Laurel suggested gift certificates by mail in order to reach non-Greenbelters with this fund raiser. #### **City of Greenbelt** COMMUNITY MEDIATION BOARD

The City of Greenbelt has re-established a Community Mediation Board under the auspices of the Prince George's County Human Relations Commission. This Board is comprised of city residents who have volunteered to receive mediation training and be available to mediate disputes between reighbors.

Mediation consists of a step by step problem solving process that results in the involved parties agreeing on a fair solution. Mediation serves as an alternative to litigation and brings both parties to the table on an equal basis. A mediator does not act as an advocate of either party. He/she reserves judgment and does not voice opinion.

Types of problems mediated may be noisy neighbors, barking dogs, trespassing children, blocked driveways, family feuds, littering, loitering, neighboring property neglect, small claims matters, etc.

Mediation services will be available at the Greenbelt Community Center on the second Tuesday and fourth Wednesday of each month. Any Greenbelt citizen who wishes to make use of this free service should call the Human Resources Officer, City of Greenbelt, 301-345-7203.

for this office in 1996 as the Libertarian candidate. His running mate for vice president is Art Olivier of California.

The Libertarian Party advocates a smaller government, one so small that income tax would be abolished. Social Security would also be eliminated with sold off government assets financing private retirement accounts for everyone.

#### Buchanan

Pat Buchanan, 62, Reform Party. Once a senior advisor to three presidents, Buchanan unsuccessfully ran for president as a Republican in 1992 and 1996. This time, he switched his party affiliation to the Reform Party where he and his supporters wrested control from the former supporters of Ross Perot. He has a master's degree in journalism from Columbia University and has been an editorial writer, columnist, television commentator and author of five books. He is married to the former Shelley Ann Scarney, once a member of the White House staff, and resides in Virginia. His running mate is author, educator and conservative activist Ezola Foster of California, an African-American who grew up in poverty in the segregated south but "embraces a color-blind American dream built on traditional values that build strong families and peaceful communities," according to Reform Party information. Buchanan's conservative philosophy is reflected in his campaign slogan, "Right from the beginning-right for 2000."

#### Howard Phillips, 49, Constitution Party. Phillips was founder of the U.S. Taxpayers Party in 1992 (now renamed the Constitution Party) and has run as that party's presidential candidate in the last three elections. A resident of Fairfax County, he is married, has six children ranging from age 13 to 34, and 12 grandchildren. He was active in the Republican Party until 1974 when, as Director of the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity, he had a falling out with President Nixon. Since then he has been chair of the Conservative Caucus which has provided opposition to the Panama Canal and Carter-Breznev SALT II treaties, advocated eliminating the graduated income tax, opposed NAFTA and the World Trade Organization and opposed socialized medicine, abortion and special rights for homosexuals. He is also president of the U.S. Taxpayers Institute and chair of the U.S. Taxpayers Alliance. A graduate of Harvard University, he is the author of four books. His running mate for vice president is J.Curtis Frazier of Missouri.

#### U.S. Senate Sarbanes

Paul S. Sarbanes, 67, Democratic Party. Born in Salisbury, Sarbanes is a graduate of Princeton University and Harvard Law School. He was also a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford University. He is married and has three children. He was first elected to office in 1966 as a state delegate, moved up to Congress in 1970 and was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1976. He is seeking his fifth term in that of-
