Council Pleased with Improved Site Plan for Greenbelt Station

The Multipurpose Room in the Community Center looked festive on Wednesday evening, May 28, as people gathered for a Greenbelt City Council worksession on the latest design proposal for the Greenbelt Station development. Along three sides of the room at the front, where a long conference table had been arranged, were large posters and architectural designs in bright colors.

Some were placed on tables against the walls but most were freestanding and arranged on easels. A pull-down screen at the very center was behind the mayor's seat, ready for a presentation. Obviously a crowd was expected, as rows and rows of chairs were stretched across the

As people began to gather they dispersed at the front to look over and discuss the various design demonstrations on display. These included drawings of architectural concepts showing the front and rear views of a hypothetical main street, a mainly "green" concept of the natural environment along a roadway and the portrayal of a high-rise skyline. There was an air of expect-

To be presented this evening was a rendering of the latest version of the preliminary site plan for Greenbelt Station. The development will encompass the two adjacent properties that include the Metro parking lot and the Smith sand-and-gravel operation to the south. To the east and in between is included a stateowned wetlands area.

This presentation would highlight one of several renderings of design possibilities for the combined site, which has undergone several transformations over the last several years, including two within the month of May 2003. These changes in large measure reflect the developers' responses to public input and political and professional guidelines and inter-

Leading the team of presenters for the meeting was attorney Norman Rivera of Metroland, LLC, who sketched out the agenda: 1) presentation of the architectural scope and layout of the two areas, 2) overview of the


tural Group Inc. used a number of poster boards, stacked one behind another on several easels, to demonstrate new design concepts for the physical appearance and arrangement of the structures being proposed. What would otherwise be considered single large buildings were in this design broken up by a variety of different-appearing materials, colors and styles to look like separate adjacent structures. In general, retail and other commercial uses would be assigned to the ground floor, he said, and residential units placed above.

North Core

Still in the works for the northern tract closest to the Beltway would be two depart-

Greenbelt Day Weekend



Some Fees Raised, Increasing City Budget to \$17,989,700

The Greenbelt City Council held the second public hearing on the proposed FY 2004 budget and the proposed real property tax increase at its regular May 27 council meeting and heard only a few objections from city residents present. Council also passed - but not without debate - a new policy making the city responsible for repair and replacement of driveway aprons which connect private driveways to city property.

Budget Hearing

The city held a second public hearing on the FY 2004 budget. Mayor Judith Davis went through the final balanced budget proposal of \$17,989,700. She mentioned a few changes from the earlier submission, including an increase in rental fees at Attick Park and Schrom Hills and increases in gym rental fees at the Youth Center and Springhill Lake.

These changes were matched on the expenditure side by restoration of hours at recreation facilities on holidays and seemed to illustrate the theme of this year's budget - the need to review carefully all expenditures and sources of revenue to reach a balanced budget in a time of financial challenges. One challenge was a reduction in state funding in various areas, which seems likely to increase with further state legislative action according to a member of State Delegate Justin Ross' staff who was attending the council meeting. Assistant to the City Manager David Moran, who was filling in for Manager Michael McLaughlin, also pointed out that while no specifics were known yet, more cuts were likely to follow the governor's veto of a recent tax bill. (McLaughlin was attending his son's graduation at Eleanor Roosevelt High School.)

Bob Zugby, representing GATE, Greenbelt Access TV, seemed to understand the budget realities and did not oppose a cut in funding for GATE in this budget but he wanted to be sure that it did not set a precedent for next year. Zugby said that GATE provides many services to the city and its residents and that the cut would slow down progress in some areas. He was assured by the mayor and councilmembers that this was a one-time budget cut. The mayor said that "no cuts were made with glee" and indicated that each budget decision was a hard one.

Another speaker objected to the earlier closing of the fitness center (at 10 p.m. rather than 10:30), while fees had been raised. He said he was planning to submit a petition from people who use the center to indicate their concern with this change. He spoke on behalf of many people who work late and for whom the later hours are conve-

Mayor Davis replied that the city had tried to determine use after 10 p.m. and found that many people stayed until 10 but only a few until 10:30. She said the cost of operating the facility continues to rise. "Everyone suffers a little bit," she said, with the new budget and mentioned cuts in other areas. She said the city had tried to be fair and even-handed so that no one area of city services would bear a disproportionate impact.

The budget is scheduled for adoption at the city council meeting on June 9. There were no comments on the proposed real property tax increase that will also be adopted at that meeting.

Old Timers Gather, Greet Their High School Cohorts

There was a wonderful incongruity between the massive chandelier overhead and other snazz and gilt in the Martin's Crosswinds ballroom and the huge crowd of aging, mostly simplydressed, plain-speaking, hugging and kissing Greenbelt High School graduates of all years who attended their May 10 afternoon reunion.

Some used canes; many had obvious age-related problems. But all seemed to be at their happiest in a room overflowing with about 300 people seated at round tables or wandering around the room sharing sweet memories of a long-ago simpler life. All pretense seemed absent in this crowd who first loved Greenbelt and its high school back when the town consisted only of lowincome people living in government-run housing and glad to get

Greenbelt High School, now Greenbelt Middle School, opened in 1938 and closed in 1951. It was a plain high school without frills which in the early years employed among others a few willing but inexperienced teachers who were barely older than their pupils.

Some alumni had come from great distances to be part of the day. Cameras flashed, hands reached out and laughter rolled. People pored over photos in the old Greenbelt High School yearbooks some had brought. A cash bar seemed to have few takers.

The food was decidedly unmemorable, but it mattered little. Rather, the order of the day was roaming the crowded, stuffy room looking into faces, looking at name tags and remembering or trying to remember. Hugging was the greeting of choice. Outside in the lobby, professional photographers were posing attendees and mounting little photographs in round key chain frames.

Genial Bob Sommers, a wellknown Greenbelt pioneer and American Legion chaplain as well as Greenbelt High School graduate of 1942, took the microphone around 1 p.m. He mentioned speaking with the first principal of the school, Col. Roland Sliker (USA Ret.), who lives in Upper Marlboro and had to send regrets.

Sommers then introduced and thanked those who had arranged the event. They were Gloria Shelton Drake, committee chair, and Pauline St. Martin Bordas, treasurer, as well as alumni who volunteered to contact classmates and help in other ways.

In concluding, Sommers read to knowing laughter from the audience an anonymous poem he had gotten from the Internet about how attendees at class reunions had changed over the

Although arrangements had been made for attendees to visit the Greenbelt Museum at day's end, later reports were that attendance was small.

Privacy Concerns Are Misplaced

Misplaced privacy concerns threaten to severely limit the knowledge and benefits the city will be able to derive from the ongoing Greenbelt Senior Needs Assessment Survey.

As reported on several occasions in the News Review, the grant the city received from the NORC (Naturally Occurring Retirement Community) Supportive Services Center did not only contain the monies needed for the Resource Advocate position, but also the funds needed to conduct the above mentioned Senior Needs Assessment Survey.

The two projects are closely related. Obviously the Resource Advocate has first to know the needs of seniors which have to be taken care of before they can "age in place," in their own

homes. Only then can she locate the necessary resources. What better way to ascertain those needs than to personally interview the Greenbelt seniors? But before anyone can be interviewed, the interviewers have to know how to contact that person. That is the reason why articles in the News Review, flyers in the stores and announcements in meetings have been asking seniors to volunteer to be interviewed. Unfortunately, the response has been disheartening. I have been told that one reason is that older residents don't want to share personal information. Folks: the information is ANONYMOUS!! The survey does not care whether Mrs. A or Mr. B. needs help with yard-work or the assistance of a domestic health-care worker. The only aspects the survey is interested in are what the current or future needs of the Greenbelt seniors are and the relative importance of those needs (do 100 respondents express the need for a visiting nurse or 300?)

So please, seniors, show that you can be counted on! All you have to do is call the city at 301-474-8000, ask for Gwen Worley and tell her that you are available to be interviewed.

If you participate, you help yourself and all seniors. If you worry about an imaginary privacy problem, then you do not only shortchange yourself, but all Greenbelt seniors. And you would not want to do that, right? So, please, let's all make sure that Gwen Worley's phone rings off the hook!

Mr. Carneal was preceded in death by his father James C. Carneal, Sr. and brother James C. Carneal, Jr., who also lived many years in Greenbelt.





Join the Advisory Committee on Trees and the City Horticulturist on a tour of City trees of significance. This is the first in what will be an annual event celebrating large and unusual trees in Greenbelt. This year's tour will begin at Schrom Hills Park, the location of a Deodar Cedar and a Longleaf Pine, both champion trees. The Longleaf Pine is the largest of its type in Maryland and was protected during construction of the park. Trees of over twenty different species are represented on the tour which includes three Prince George's County champion trees, in addition to the state champion at Schrom Hills Park. Transportation will be provided to different sites in the City where trees are located with a return ride to Schrom Hills Park at the conclusion.

City of Greenbelt **PARKING ENFORCEMENT NEWS**

In an effort to better enlighten the public about the City of Greenbelt's Parking Regulations, we will be bringing you periodic articles explaining some of our laws. Most parking regulations are already in place throughout the State of Maryland.

One such regulation is the parking of a vehicle within 30 feet from the approach to any stop or yield sign. This is located in Sec. 11-39 (2)d of the City Code. It is also a state law, which is in the MD State Drivers Handbook. The fine for this offense is \$25.00.

Another frequently asked question is the access aisles adjacent to a handicap parking spot. These are called wheelchair access aisles, and it is illegal to park in these white hash marks. The penalty is the same as if you were to park in the handicap space itself, \$250.00.

It is also illegal to block the handicap ramps that are usually found at the end of sidewalks at most intersections.

Remember that all citations must be paid within 15 calendar days from issuance of citation, or if you wish to stand trial, you must notify the City of Greenbelt Police Department within ten days. Failure to do either will result in additional penalties and your vehicle's registration being suspended.

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

ment stores and a 15-story tower in the northeast segment, as distant as possible and away from the view of the residential Hollywood section of College Park across the railroad tracks. Also planned would be two residential towers of about 12 stories over a retail base, as well as office buildings of from six to eight stories. A 1300-room hotel and a performing arts theater will add to the residential and commercial mix, Gang said.

The entire northern area development would be raised to the present level of the Metro platform. Because of a high water table, Gang said, excavation for parking garages below the present parking lot is deemed impossible; hence, parking will be provided at the present level, with several smaller parking lots interspersed among the groups of structures at street level.

Altogether 13,000 parking places will be allocated for WMATA use and 14,700 for shared parking. Gang pointed out that most residential spaces would be vacant during the day and available for Metro use. During nighttime hours the uses would be reversed. Only during the pre-Christmas season would more parking spaces be needed, Gang said, and at that time arrangements would be made for offsite parking for retail employees.

In the south area closest to Greenbelt Road townhouse units and apartments located over retail units are planned, all in structures of about four stories. One supermarket and a building for senior living will also be included with parking in the rear.

Environmental Concerns

Greg Ault of EDAW, the landscape firm that has consistently participated in the planning process for Greenbelt Station, then described how the original idea of a four-lane north-south roadway between the two developments has been transformed

Because it would traverse the true wetland section of the tract near the railroad this projected roadway had become especially controversial to members of CCRIC (Citizens to Conserve and Restore Indian Creek).

Now it has been redesigned as a two-lane road, possibly with a small traffic circle between the two built-up sections and with part of the roadway bridged over the wetland. Walkways and bike lanes and possibly a rooftop garden above the north area parking garage are also in the plan, Ault said.

He was succeeded as speaker by Eileen Straughan of Straughan Environmental Services, who joined the team last July and is concerned with wetland mitigation and stormwater management. She commented that in the new design, with the roadway reduction, the wetland impact had been reduced from a little over three acres to less than half an acre. She was designing a new mitigation site, she said, on a segment of the state-owned property.

Plans for the mitigation site

brought an immediate response from Mayor Judith Davis. "We look on the 111 acres of state-dedicated land as a bank," she pointed out. The new mitigation site should be located on the private section of the property, she said.

Pat Blankenship, CCRIC president, concurred. She wondered about the failed mitigation site, which she now understood had been created over an impermeable clay cap. Straughan responded that test borings would be carried out on that three-acre stretch of property to assess its condition and why it failed.

Celia Craze, director of planning and community development, wondered about ownership of the new streets shown in the layout of the property. The north-south road would be a public artery, she was informed, but the other streets would be private. Craze also stressed the need for mandatory dedication of parkland. Private workout rooms in the residential buildings are not an adequate substitute, she said.

Councilmember Alan Turnbull worried about the design concept that the Beltway ramp from the west would devolve into the main street of the commercial/residential area. He stressed the danger

of such a short distance for deceleration into a region where people were walking. He also emphasized the distance between the residential area of the south core and the Metro platform. He stressed the city's desire for a second Metro platform near Greenbelt Road.

John Kraus, whose back yard in the Hollywood section of College Park abuts the railroad track, strode to one of the easels displaying a drawing of the proposed skyline along the Beltway. With a good deal of passion he pointed to what he characterized as misrepresentations of scale that it contained. "Here is my onestory house," he said, putting his finger on a small square, "and here is the Metro station," touching another that appeared far smaller. "If they are building this 1,000-unit development at the level of the present Metro platform and most of it an impermeable surface, rain water will have nowhere to go but to cascade into my basement."

Davis pointed out that all the housing stock shown was highend. She emphasized that the very people who would most likely be using Metro need affordable places to live. Nevertheless, she complimented the development team on the many great design improvements since the original proposals were presented and the attention to community concerns. What had been shown was very promising, she said. "But we're not there yet!"
