Richard Castaldi Honored By Md. Municipal League

Richard J. Castaldi, former director for Intergovernmental Relations for the Glending administration, joins a group of eight individuals to be awarded the status of Maryland Municipal League (MML) Honorary Member. This honor was bestowed upon Castaldi during the MML Convention inaugural dinner on Tuesday, June 24 in Ocean City.

From time to time a person renders such conspicuous service to municipal government that it is appropriate to recognize that individual with an honorary membership in the Maryland Municipal League. Over his many years in public office, Richard J. Castaldi has demonstrated tremendous leadership abilities. He began his service to Maryland municipalities as a councilman in the City of Greenbelt in 1973, continuing through 1981, when he became Greenbelt's mayor.

Castaldi left that office when he was elected as a Prince George's County Councilman in 1982, a post he held until 1994. He then served as the director of

Intergovernmental Relations for Governor Parris N. Glendening from 1999 to 2003. Throughout this time, he consistently demonstrated his commitment to Maryland municipal government and has been a trusted friend to MML.

The other MML honorary Members include: Charles T. McDonald, former Greenbelt city manager, inducted 1964; former State Senator Edward T. Conroy, inducted 1969; former Lt. Governor Samuel W. Bogley, III, inducted 1982; State Senator Leo E. Green, inducted 1989; Henry Bogdan, Baltimore, inducted 1997; and Governor Parris N. Glendening, inducted 2000.

The Maryland Municipal League is a non-profit, non-partisan association representing over 150 city and town governments and two special taxing districts throughout Maryland. MML works to strengthen the role and capacity of municipal government through a program of services including legislative representation, research and technical assistance.

Couple Visiting from China Both Stabbed, Woman Dies

On Sunday afternoon, July 27, a woman and a man, residents of China, were stabbed inside a home in the 7100 block of Mathew Street during an apparent home invasion, according to Greenbelt Police. A woman inside the home told the police that she was upstairs when she heard some sort of struggle coming from the floor below. When she looked down the stairs, she saw the woman sitting on the steps suffering from what appeared to be multiple stab wounds and the man involved in a physical confrontation with another man.

Upon seeing that there was a witness the suspect ran up the steps after her, but she locked herself in a bedroom. The man attempted to force his way into the bedroom but was unsuccessful. He then fled the scene.

According to police, both victims, who had been visiting relatives here, were transported by ambulance to Prince George's General Hospital for treatment of stab wounds. The woman, identified as Yu Ying Yang, 50, was pronounced dead at 9:55 p.m. The man, the deceased's 59-year-old husband, is being treated for a non-life-threatening knife wound.

After some investigation, police issued an arrest warrant charging You Xiang Zhu, 20, of no fixed address with first degree murder, attempted first degree

murder and assault. Zhu had entered the residence through a rear window, according to Greenbelt Police MPO George Mathews. The motive was robbery. Zhu, police learned, had been recently fired from his job as a cook at the New York Buffet restaurant in Beltway Plaza and had lived for a short time in the home on Mathew Street. The home is owned by the owners of the restaurant.

Neighbors of the Greenbrook Estates neighborhood expressed surprise and shock at the incident. Councilmember and neighborhood resident Ed Putens stated that there had been a lot of people coming and going at the house. Putens is president of the neighborhood home owners association, whose residents have requested an emergency meeting with city council scheduled for today.

Another close neighbor, who did not want to be identified, expressed shock "that such a violent crime came to our peaceful street." It had been quite a day on her street Monday and Tuesday "with news people all over the place." Although she does not know the current residents, she also commented on the increased activity. On further reflection, she noted that there had been earlier violent crimes nearby, including an "armed robbery with knives and guns."

Register to Vote In City Election

Registering to vote is the first step to qualify as a voter - whether to run for office or to vote for a candidate in the November 4 city council regular election. Although the county Board of Elections will handle all registrations, registration forms may be picked up during regular office hours at the Municipal Building, 25 Crescent Road or at the Greenbelt Library on Crescent Road. White, Turnbull Announce Retirement from Council

In an announcement that caught many Greenbelt political pundits by surprise, long-time Greenbelt City Councilmember Thomas X. White announced his intention not to seek reelection this November. Also declaring his intention not to seek reelection is Councilmember Alan Turnbull. The three other incumbents are all expected to seek reelection.

The last time an incumbent chose not to run for reelection was in 1997 when Mayor Antoinette Bram retired from office by not seeking reelection to the council. (Mayors are elected to the city council by the voters as councilmembers and are elected by the city council from its membership to serve as mayor). Turnbull succeeded Bram as a councilmember in the following election.

Although in the early days of Greenbelt's history, councilmember tenures were often only one or two two-year terms and incumbents were often de-

feated for reelection, the political situation changed in the 1960s and the number of terms councilmembers served before stepping down or being defeated increased dramatically. Since then incumbent councilmembers seeking reelection have seldom been defeated and vacancies have been few and far between.

The last time there were two known vacancies to be filled at an election occurred in 1961 when Mayor Alan Kistler and Councilmember Edgar L. Smith did not seek reelection. In that election incumbent Bruce Bowman also was not re-elected, resulting in three newcomers to the council - Francis W. White, Benjamin P. Gold-faden and William R. Phillips. In the following election, Smith ran again and served as mayor for more than three terms until he resigned to become a circuit court judge.

1973 was the last time that two newcomers were elected to

Filing Deadline for Council Candidates Is Sept. 22

On Tuesday, November 4, Greenbelt citizens will elect the five members of the City Council who will represent them for the next two years. Greenbelt residents who want to run for City Council, sign a petition for someone to run for council or vote in the election must be registered to vote in Prince George's County. Since universal voter registration began in Greenbelt in 1991 the city has not maintained a separate voter registration list.

Candidacy for Council

Any qualified voter of the city wishing to run for council may do so by submitting the following forms:

1. Nomination Petition - This form requires the signature of at least 50 qualified voters of the city and must be signed by the circulator of the petition and notarized. The signatures should give the petitioner's proper name (e.g. Mary Doe or Mrs. John Doe) and address.

2. Acceptance of Nomination - This form notes that the nominee agrees to serve, if elected. It must be filed along with the nomination petition and an affidavit containing a sworn statement providing the

candidate's name, date of birth, Social Security number and resident address.

3. Financial Disclosure Statement - This form lists business entities and real estate interests held by the nominee and family and sources of specified income or debt. The statement covers the period January 1, 2002 through December 31, 2002. Candidates who have had changes in their financial status are required to file a supplemental report for the period of January 1 through June 30, 2003.

The deadline for filing to be a candidate in the November 4 regular election is Monday, September 22 at 5 p.m.

The city clerk verifies that nomination petitions meet the requirement of the city charter. A drawing will be held by the Board of Elections in the City Offices on Monday, September 22 at 7:45 p.m. to determine the order in which names shall be placed on the ballot. This meeting is open to the public; candidates, their families, supporters and interested citizens may attend to witness the draw.

Candidates must appoint a

Walking Tour Guide Is Now Available

A new walking tour trail guide for historic Greenbelt is now available. The guide suggests three major walks. One is in the heart of historic Greenbelt for those interested in local history. Another is around Buddy Attick Lake Park and is designed for nature lovers. Those who want a longer hike are encouraged to walk in the Beltsville Agricultural Research Farm and the trails leading into the woods from Northway Field.

The trail guide is one page that folds open to reveal a colorful map of the crescent shaped roadway system and the housing courts. There are 18 points of interest noted on the map from the Community Center in the heart of the city to Greenbelt Park on the perimeter, near Greenbelt Road and the Capital Beltway. While many of the sites will be familiar to most Greenbelt residents, a few such as Hamilton Cemetery and the Parkbelt Homes may be less well known.

The Greenbelt Museum curator Katie Scott Childress designed the brochure; it was printed with funds from the Preservation Maryland Special Grant Fund. It is available free at many locations throughout the city including the Greenbelt Library, Municipal Building, Community Center, Greenbelt Homes, Inc. and the New Deal Café.

Lions Select Poster "Dream of Peace" Winners

Since 1988 Lions Clubs worldwide have encouraged young people to express their feelings about world peace in a visual and creative way in the form of a poster contest. More than two million children from 72 countries have been participating in this contest over the past 14 years. Participation has grown steadily each year and so has the positive feedback from Lions, teachers and children. The theme for the 2002-03 Lions International Peace Poster Contest was "Dream of Peace."

This is the sixth year that the Greenbelt Lions Club has participated in this contest, which can be used as a tool to help people, young and old, reflect on the importance of world peace and their feelings about the subject. The club has sponsored groups at St. Hugh's, Thomas Pullen Arts Magnet School, Greenbelt Middle School, Eisenhower Middle School and Glenarden Woods Elementary. For the first time it has also sponsored a Homeschooler's Group.

The local first place winners were Lisbeth Fuentes (Greenbelt Middle School), Vincent Scalco (Eisenhower Middle), Tomara Nixon and Sarah Choi (Glenarden Woods), Elizabeth Hammett (Homeschooler's Group), Shaine Siegel (Thomas

Pullen) and Kimberly Barasch (Eisenhower Middle). Mayra Garcia was also a first place winner and her poster was also voted the club favorite. Mayra is a student at Eisenhower Middle. Each first place winner received a certificate and \$25 in prize money. Certificates and prize money were also awarded to the second and third place finishers.

Contest Design

Posters go through several levels of judging, including club, district, multiple district and international. At each level, posters are judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of theme. Hammett's poster was not only judged best in the Homeschooler's Group at the local club level but also went on to place second (among all first-place entries) at the District 22-C level.

Eventually one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners were chosen during the final international judging. The 23 merit award winners each received US \$500 (or local equivalent) and a framed certificate. (One grand prize winner received a trip to Lions Day with the United Nations in New York City, \$2,500 in prize money, and an engraved plaque.) This year's



the council. At that election, Rhea Cohen did not seek reelection and Elizabeth Maffay was defeated for reelection. The two newcomers were Richard J. Castaldi and Thomas X. White. The last incumbent to be defeated for reelection was Richard Pilski in 1985. Before then Pilski had served and been elected to 10 terms and had also served part of another term as a council appointment to fill a vacancy.

With two known vacancies on the council to be filled, it can be expected that there will be more than the usual number of candidates to seek the office.

White

White holds the record for the longest tenure on the Greenbelt council. He is completing his 15th term and 30 years on the council. During that time, though reelected, his vote count never was sufficient to be the top vote getter. By tradition the mayor is the top vote getter among the councilmembers. White placed second at several elections and became mayor pro tem.

He announced his decision at the close of a July 8 taping of an interview conducted by Konrad Herling for Greenbelt Access Television (GATE) for its premier of a new program, "Greenbelt in Focus." Following the last election in 2001 White said he made a commitment to his family that he would not seek another term. Now that he and his wife, Helen, are both retired, he says that he is looking forward to being able to plan many trips to visit his family scattered about the country and world without having to first check his city council schedule.

As a member of the council White considers his most important contributions to be related to the planning and development

of the city. He was an advocate for reducing the scale of development, preserving open spaces, making certain that adequate protection for the environment was there and maintaining a high standard for the quality of life expected in Greenbelt.

White expressed amazement and humility in his achieving such a long tenure on the council. "Looking back I must have been infected by the Greenbelt 'Bug.' There is a clear track that I put myself on in order to work on behalf of Greenbelt and especially to preserve its character. I'm very grateful to Greenbelt voters for trusting my advocacy and returning me to the council for an unprecedented 30 years of service," he said.

Turnbull

Turnbull will have completed three terms on the council. In 1999 he garnered the second greatest number of votes and became the mayor pro tem. Turnbull indicated that he made the decision not to run so that he might devote more time to his family and career.

Others

The three other members of the city council have indicated their intention to seek reelection although their formal candidacies have not yet been declared. Mayor Judith Davis stated "at this point, I am planning to run again." She is completing her fifth term on the council.

Edward Putens, when asked, said that he is "leaning more toward running than not running." Putens is completing 22 years on the city council.

"I'm definitely running!" Roberts exclaimed when asked about his election plans. "This could be an interesting campaign," he said. Roberts is completing his sixth term on the council.

treasurer. Candidates are also required to file a notarized interim report of campaign contributions and expenditures no later than noon, October 20. A final campaign contribution and expenditure report must be filed no later than 5 p.m. Monday, November 10. These reports shall list the name, address and amount donated by every contributor, other than the candidate or a member of his or her family who has contributed more than \$25 in furtherance of the candidate's nomination and election; and a detailed description of every expense.

Absentee Ballot

Voters who will be unable to appear at their polling place on November 4 by reason of illness, religious beliefs or absence from the city may vote by absentee ballots. The first day to apply and vote by absentee ballot will be Wednesday, October 15. (Watch for city ad.)

Election of Council

The five candidates each receiving at least 40 percent of the total number of votes cast and the highest number of votes cast will be elected. If fewer than five candidates receive at least 40 percent of votes cast, a runoff election will be held on Tuesday, November 11. A runoff has not been necessary in more than 20 years.

Greenbelt does not have provisions for election of the mayor by the electorate. At the organizational meeting on the Monday following the election (Monday, November 10) the newly elected council will elect the mayor and mayor pro tem. Traditionally, the new council has elected the highest vote-getter to be mayor and second highest vote-getter to be mayor pro tem for the ensuing two-year term.


