Primaries on "Super Tuesday" To Choose Candidates, Delegates

Maryland Democrats and Republicans will be voting on Super Tuesday, March 2, for their presidential preference, for delegates to their party's convention and for candidates for United States Senator and Representative to Congress. Greenbelters will be participating in the selection of a Representative for the Fifth Congressional District. Also on the ballot are candidates for Circuit Court Judge for the Seventh Judicial District.

The outcome of the upcoming Maryland primary and those of primaries in nine other states on what is known as Super Tuesday because of the large number of delegates to be elected to party conventions could determine who will be the Democratic nominee for president at the Democratic National Convention on July 26 to 29 in Boston, Massachusetts. Since President George W. Bush is running unopposed for reelection, he is certain to be the Republican nominee at the Republican National Convention to be held August 30 to September 1 in New York City. He is the only Republican presidential candidate on the ballot in Maryland.

Voting Guide

According to a League of Women Voters Primary Voting Guide, "the Presidential Primary is just one step in the process of choosing candidates for President of the United States. The candidates for President are actually selected [by delegates] at conventions held by parties."

Eligible voters next week in Maryland will be choosing delegates listed on the Republican and Democratic ballots. According to the League of Women Voters Guide, "The results of the presidential primary in Maryland for each party will determine how many delegates will be pledged to each candidate at their respective national conventions."

The key question is what happens to delegates pledged to candidates who have dropped out of the race. (Carol Moseley-Braun, Joseph Lieberman, Howard Dean, Wesley Clark and Richard Gephardt have done so, although their names still appear on the Maryland preferential ballot and candidates for delegates who have pledged to support them are also still on the ballot.) According to Josh White, executive director of the Maryland Democratic party, all delegates remain committed to their candidates on the first ballot cast at the national conven-

The League's Voter Guide notes that Maryland will send 98 delegates and 11 alternates to the Democratic convention. In Greenbelt, Democratic voters can vote for no more that three of the 19 female delegates listed. While only one delegate is pledged to current contenders John Kerry of Massachusetts and Dennis Kucinich of Ohio and none are pledged to Alfred Sharpton Jr. of New York, John Edwards of North Carolina is fielding a full slate. Four delegate candidates are pledged to Gephardt, three each to Dean and Clark and one is uncommitted. Former Libertarian and Democandidate Lyndon LaRouche Jr. of Virginia is also on the Democratic preferential ballot. He has three candidates for delegate pledged to support

Brings Changes to Paper by Dorothy Sucher grocery has consistently placed a large centerfold ad in the News

New Co-op Sales Insert

Readers of the Greenbelt News Review will notice a change in the paper this week. Longtime advertiser Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative is introducing a new advertising insert. For a few weeks, readers will have the benefit of both the centerfold in-paper advertisement and the new four-color insert. Unfortunately, a variety of rumors have circulated regarding this new insert, and the nature of the Co-op's relationship with this newspaper. Although the nature and amount of advertising will change, the manager and board have made clear that the News Review continues to figure prominently in the store's advertising plan.

This new six-page, full-color insert advertises Co-op weekly specials and the Shur-Fine brand, carried as a "house brand" by many co-ops besides Greenbelt's. The familiar two-page ad in the paper will continue to run for at least another three weeks and will then be replaced by a onepage Co-op ad for an undetermined period of time, according to Co-op General Manager Bob

Review. Both Davis, the store manager, and Dorrie Bates, chairperson of the Co-op's Board of Directors, have assured us they want to continue their "very special relationship with the News Review," as Bates put it this week. "It helps our business, our members and customers and helps us get our message out into the community," she New Wholesaler

For many years the Co-op bought its groceries from a large wholesaler called Fleming, which last spring filed for Chapter 11 and closed all of its warehouses. The Co-op then made arrangements to join a large Pennsylvania cooperative called Associated Wholesalers, Inc. (known as AWI), a food distributor owned by almost 500 groceries in the mid-Atlantic region. AWI promised to provide an "extensive and more reliable source of grocery items," according to Bates, as well as offering its member co-ops a number of special rebates, discounts and other ben-

Senator, Congressmember, Judges Are on "Super Tuesday" Ballot

Greenbelt voters who are registered as Republicans or Democrats will have the opportunity in Tuesday's Primary Election to select party candidates for the U.S. Senate and Fifth Congressional District of the U.S. House of Representative. It is expected that the voting for the two offices will be dominated by supporters of the incumbents: Senator Barbara Mikulski and Congressman Steny Hoyer. Also on the ballot is the selection of party nominees for Judge of the Circuit Court. However, the names of the two incumbents and one challenger seeking this office are the only names on both the Republican and Democratic ballots.

U.S. Senate

Senator Barbara A. Mikulski is seeking the Democratic nomination for a fourth term in the United States Senate. Mikulski hails from the Fells Point section of Baltimore. A former social worker, her political involvement began as a citizen activist opposed to the routing of I-95 through Fells Point. She was a Baltimore City Councilmember and a member of the U.S. Congress before first being elected

Mikulski faces two opponents in the primary. Sid Altman of Gaithersburg was a teacher for 17 years and was once a teacher's union president. He was a delegate to the 1968 Democratic convention and unsuccessfully ran for the senate in 2000 against Paul Sarbanes. A. Robert Kaufman of Baltimore is also

Nine candidates are vying for the Republican nomination for U.S. Senator. The only candidate currently holding office is E. J. Pipkin who is serving his first term in the Maryland Senate, having been elected last year. A resident of Stevensville with a M.A. from the University of Virginia School of Business Administration, he has had a career in business and finance.

Ray Bly has a used appliance shop in Jessup and has posted his biography on the Internet detailing a long life of difficulties with various governments.

Dorothy Corry Jennings lists herself with the League of Women Voters Voters Guide as having served on a presidential task force on city, state and federal planning and program implementation and being on the Inner Circle Senatorial Committee

James A. Kodak of Odenton is a native of this county and a graduate of the University of Maryland. He obtained a law degree from a school in Ohio, has practiced before the Maryland and U. S. Patent Board, is serving in the U.S. Army Reserves as a First Lieutenant and is working at the University of Maryland helping to conduct cancer research.

Ellen Martin of Crofton is listed on the ballot as "Cookie Baker." She says she has a B.A. and a masters degree and is a leader, not a follower.

John Stafford of Jessup has served for 40 years on the staffs of three members of Congress. He is a former federal administrative law judge and a trial counselor. He also has 40 years in investments, as a journalist and in publicity and is a lay minister.

Gene Zarwell is a five time candidate and a global businessman who has built business entities on three continents. He has 35 years in the military reserves. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College.

Earl S. Gordon and Corrogan R. Vaughn are also on the ballot.

Steny H. Hoyer is the only Democrat on the ballot for Member of Congress from the Fifth Congressional District in which

Democrats Outnumber Republicans Five to One

Approximately 8,300 Greenbelters are registered and likely to vote in next week's primary election, according to the Prince George's County Board of Elections. Although fewer than the total of 10,700 Greenbelters reported to be registered for the primary, these people are considered "active" registrants. "Active" means that they are newly registered or have voted in at least one of the last two presidential elections.

Polling Locations

The four Greenbelt polling locations will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Primary Election Day, Tuesday, March 2. Greenbelters from the center of the city, precinct 3, will vote at the Greenbelt Community Center, 15 Crescent Road. Residents in precinct 6, the North End, will vote at Greenbelt Elementary School, 66 Ridge Road;

Springhill Lake residents, precinct 8, will vote at Springhill Lake Elementary School, 6060 Springhill Drive; and voters in precinct 13, Greenbelt East, will vote at Eleanor Roosevelt High School, 7601 Hanover Parkway.

Party Preferences

In Greenbelt, active Democrats outnumber Republicans by five to one. Of Greenbelt's total active registered voters, 68 percent are Democrats, 14 percent are Republicans and less than 1 percent are registered as belonging to the Green party, the only other political party separately reported by the county. Another 4 percent are members of other

More than 1,100 residents are registered as unaffiliated with any political party (14 percent) - the same percent as registered

Author Dorothy Sucher Shows Art at New Deal Café

Greenbelt author Dorothy Sucher will have an exhibit of her paintings at the New Deal Café in Old Greenbelt during the month of March. A reception to which the public is invited will take place at the Café on Sunday, March 7, from 7 to 9 p.m.

The show will feature water-colors created during the last year and readers of her book of personal essays "The Invisible Garden" will not be surprised to find that many of the pieces are landscapes and flower paintings. They reflect her love of the land and her garden in Vermont, where she spends half the year. There her closeness to nature in its many moods and seasons provides inspiration for her art.

As a teenager in New York, Sucher was an art student at the Brooklyn Museum, the Art Students' League and the High School of Music and Art. Married at 19, she moved to Greenbelt when her husband accepted a position at the University of Maryland and the two raised their family here.

Once her children were in school, Sucher went back to school herself, earning a psychotherapy degree at Johns Hopkins. She practiced as a therapist for a number of years and then began publishing stories and mystery novels. She was the "Founding Mother" of the Greenbelt Writers Group and is a long-term staff member of the Greenbelt News Review. Although she had little time for serious painting, she never lost her interest in art, which for many years she expressed mainly through quilting and gardening.

In the summer of 2002 she began to study watercolor with artist Kathrena Ravenhorst Adams in Barre, Vermont. Sucher had never tried watercolor before and found it challenging. Before long she was painting every day as well as selling her work, much to her own surprise. She says, "I feel as if I turned a corner at the age of 70 and rediscovered my 16-year-old self."

efits. One is a program to provide a coordinated six-page, fourcolor advertising flyer to approximately 16 grocery stores in the Baltimore-Washington area. This program offers economies of scale, including both cheaper printing costs and cheaper prices on certain grocery items purchased jointly. It will make it possible to put out a "bigger, more attractive advertising format," said Davis. It will also relieve Davis of the need to spend many hours composing the News Review ad.

He decided it would be advantageous for the Greenbelt store to join this program, especially since, as he reminded the News Review, the Greenbelt area has a "very competitive grocery climate" because of the presence of Safeway and Giant in the city as well as other supermarkets nearby. "It can't be a level playing field, because we're a very, very small company" compared to the chains, he said. However, he noted that business at the Coop "continues to hold up very, very well."

Davis said he was "very aware the News Review is critical to communication in town. [The paper] has been our way of communicating with Greenbelt . . . there is no plan in place to pick up and run from the News Review. Certainly if it turns out that income from Co-op's ad is essential for the News Review to stay in business we'd rethink it yet again."

Effect on Paper

The proposed change brings with it, of course, some loss of income to the paper, once Co-op reduces its in-paper advertising. All the paper's advertisers are important, but since 1992 the Co-op has been the paper's largest, most consistent advertiser. Its weekly, two-page spread has provided a stable source of income for the paper. During much of the paper's early history, its finances were shaky. In recent years, however, the consistent advertising of the Co-op and the city have helped place the paper on a secure financial base. At present the 12-page issues are often printed at a loss. Larger papers, which generally make money, offset those losses. The goal, at year's end, is to break even.

The fact that the News Review, a co-operative staffed largely by volunteers, has managed to come out every week without fail for 67 years makes

it unique in American journalism - even something of a miracle, especially in a world becoming more and more commercialized.

The change in the Co-op's advertising volume may also mean slightly less news coverage, because articles and ads that currently fill 10 pages will have to be fitted into seven or eight. As for the News Review's size a year or two down the road, the long-range effects are currently being assessed. The News Review has always needed help in soliciting advertising. The need is now more critical, so that we can more aggressively seek out new advertisers or convert occasional advertisers to more consistent ad placement.

The advertising changes, Davis noted, were an "operative decision" - that is, his as general manager of the Co-op - of which he advised the Co-op's board of directors. Stressing again that the store intended to maintain its presence in the newspaper, he said that if a decision were ever made to sever the connection with the News Review, "that would be a board de-

Davis' explanation of his relationship with the board was echoed by board chairman Bates, who said: "The board has an oversight responsibility to the Co-op, and Bob [Davis] keeps us informed of what he's doing . . . the board and Bob have consistently reaffirmed that we have a very special relationship with the News Review and we want to continue it."

Bates's statement was not unlike the words of her predecessor, long-term board chairman Jim Cassels, whom she called "the soul of the Co-op." When interviewed for this article he said simply, "The continuation of the News Review is essential."

While the Co-op's change in advertising will present a challenge to the News Review, the board and staff have been impressed by the consideration that Davis and the Co-op Board have shown in working with the newspaper to ease the transition and to ensure a continuing advertising presence, including the supplement, in the News Review.



Republican and Democratic party members will also be choosing judges of the Circuit Court for the Seventh Judicial District. All three candidates, Graydon S. McGee, III, William D. Missouri and Cathy H. Serrette, have cross-filed in both parties and are running as non-partisan. Voters must vote for just two of the three candidates. McGee and Missouri are incumbent judges and Serrette is a challenger.

If both parties nominate the same two, those two candidates will be the only names on the Regular Election ballot and will be assured election to office. However, if one party chooses different candidates from the other, then the election will be contested in November.

According to the Prince George's County Board of Elections, persons who have declined to designate a party affiliation (independents) cannot vote in this election, as Maryland is a closed primary state. Registered Republicans can only vote for Republicans and registered Democrats only for Democratic candidates.



Chief Craze to Discuss Issues With Congressional Leaders

Chief James R. Craze of the Greenbelt Police Department is going to Washington, D.C. on March 2 members of the Maryland congressional law enforcement agencies. He will join



from around the nation, as part of a law enforcement "Day on the Hill," organized by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP).

Craze's visit to Washington comes at a critical time for the law enforcement community. According to an IACP analysis of the proposed budget for FY 2005, law enforcement assistance programs at the Department of Justice and the Department of Homeland Security face cuts of more than \$1.5 billion, which represents a 30 percent decrease from current levels. Craze stated, "Targeting law enforcement assistance programs for reductions of this magnitude has the potential to significantly weaken the ability of state, tribal and local law enforcement agencies to protect our communities from both tradi-

tional acts of crime and the new specter of terrorism. I am heading to Washington to make sure that our elected representatives understand that this is simply unacceptable."


Specifically, the proposed budget calls for significant reductions in programs such as the Local

Law Enforcement Block Grant Program, the Edward Byrne Memorial Grant Program, the Community Oriented Policing Services Program and the State Homeland Security Grant Program. Craze said, "All of these programs have played a vital role in dramatically increasing the capabilities and effectiveness of our nation's law enforcement agencies. Today, when so much more is expected of our state, tribal and local law enforcement agencies, is not the time to be reducing the funding for these critical programs."

While in Washington, Craze will also be participating in a Capitol Hill press conference, where a comprehensive analysis of the proposed budget and its potential impact on law enforcement will be released.

Democrats (active and inactive) outnumber Republicans by almost 2 to 1 at the State level. Active Democrats outnumber active Republicans by about 6 to 1

in Prince George's County and in the Fifth Congressional District by more than 3 to 1.

Active voters represent about 80 percent or more of all registered voters in all polling loca-

tions except Springhill Lake, where due to the more transient nature of that population, only a little more than half of registered voters are considered to be active voters.

listed on the ballot in Greenbelt for male delegates and alternates to the Democratic convention, from which voters can choose four. Of the four remaining presidential contenders, Edwards has four candidates pledged to support him, Kerry three, Kucinich one and Sharpton none. Five delegate candidates support Gep-hardt, four support Dean, three support Lieberman, Clark and LaRouche, one supports Braun and one is uncommitted.

On the Republican side there is no separation of delegates by gender. Republican voters can vote for no more than three delegates and three alternates. Of the eight delegate candidates, three are committed to George W. Bush and the rest are uncommitted. Three alternate delegates are pledged to Bush and the fourth is uncommitted.

Democratic Primary

Four years ago, the Democratic presidential primary race between Bill Bradley and Al Gore had been overshadowed by the bruising battle between Republican front runners Texas Governor George W. Bush and U. S. Senator John McCain. The tables have been turned this year. Bush has no opposition in his bid for reelection. While political pundits might not describe the Democratic party's primary race as "bruising," they might say that the contenders, thus far, have been fairly civil toward each other but could, in the closing days before the March 2 primary, cause sparks to fly, particularly in a debate scheduled for February 26. Voters can expect vigorous and heated crossfire on the

At this time Kerry and Edwards are drawing the most interest nationally as Democratic candidates for President. Kerry, a U.S. Senator for 22 years, has been building momentum by winning 15 primaries already held. Edwards, who is serving his first term in the U.S. Senate, has won one primary in South Carolina and placed second in several.

With Howard Dean dropping out of the race after the Wisconsin primary, the contest between Edwards and Kerry has heated up. Both have been in Maryland, Edwards at Prince George's Community College and Kerry in Annapolis. Both candidates have been actively courting Dean and his elected delegates to the convention.

Biographies

Born and raised in North Carolina, John R. Edwards worked his way through North Carolina State University and earned a law degree from the University of North Carolina in 1977. Describing himself as "an advocate for the average citizen, Edwards is serving his first term as U.S. Senator where he has established himself as a "centrist." He is a member of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence.

Born in 1943 in Denver, Colorado, John F. Kerry graduated from Yale University in 1966. He enlisted in the Navy and served in Vietnam. Kerry was awarded the Silver Star, a bronze star and three purple hearts. In 1976 he earned a law degree from Boston College and in 1982 was elected Lieutenant Governor of Massachusetts. Kerry was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1984 and has served there continuously since then. Kerry's voting record is considered typically liberal, but he has been known to go against party positions on some issues.

Dennis J. Kucinich was born and educated in Cleveland, Ohio. He did his undergraduate and graduate studies at Case Western University. In 1977, at the age of 31, he became Mayor of Cleveland, the youngest ever elected to lead a major American city. He lost reelection in 1979 and was unsuccessful in his bids for a seat in Congress. He was elected to the Ohio Senate and after serving one year successfully gained a seat in the U.S. House of Representatives, where he is now completing his fourth term. He is chair of the Congressional and Progressive Caucus.

From Brooklyn, New York, Alfred Sharpton Jr. became an ordained minister at the age of nine. In 1969 he worked for Jesse Jackson's "Operation Breadbasket." His foray into politics began in 1978, having run for the New York state senate. He also failed in bids for the U.S. Senate in 1992 and 1994. He unsuccessfully ran for mayor of New York City in 1997.

Also on the ballot in Maryland is Mildred Glover. She is a Baltimore resident and veteran educator at the School of Business and Management at Morgan State University, where she is assistant dean. A native of Savannah, Georgia, she received her undergraduate degree from the University of Georgia and Savannah State College and graduate degrees from New York University. She served in the Georgia legislature for eight years.

Lyndon LaRouche Jr. was born in Rochester, New Hampshire. He attended Northeastern University and served in the military in India and Burma. He has been a management consultant, economist, founder of the Executive Intelligence Review weekly and co-founder of the Fusion Energy Foundation in 1975. He has been an unsuccessful candidate for the U.S. presidential nomination of the Democratic Party in 1980, 1984, 1988, 1992, 1996 and 2000, of the U.S. Labor Party in 1976 and for U.S. Representative, Virginia in 1990. He was convicted and sentenced on

conspiracy charges, December 1988, 1989-94.
